A downtown street parade at 10 a.m. Saturday will kick off a big weekend of activities that will constitute the annual Frontier Jubilee celebration for the Cisco area. The program will include the annual Folklife Festival and the reunion of ex-students of Cisco High School.

The street parade will have Charlie Jordan, Abilene television weather man, as the marshal.

Forming at the old Mobley Hotel between 3rd and 4th Streets on Hilton Avenue, the parade will move south to the Thornton Feed Mill Area, according to Chairman Emma Watts.



Wind Gusts Up To 92 MPH Cause Lot Of Damage

Wind gusts that registered 92 miles per hour on the measuring instrument at the fire station caused considerable damage to property, trees and shrubs and caused a five-hour electric power outage in Cisco last Saturday night.

The high winds accompanied a cold front squall line that moved through this region. Some light hail was reported and local rain gaugeş measured about a quarter of an inch moisture. Fire department storm

spotters, watching in the area just west of town, reported seeing a large orange flash around 10 p.m. Driving toward town on Highway 80, they discovered that the electric lines in the area of Southwestern Bell Telephone Company's warehouse on the highway were down and flashing sparks and fire.

nedy of WTU here. The roof blew off the SWBell warehouse in west Cisco, causing the damage to



Joe Jarvis' mobile home near the Sonic Drive In on I-20 access road had the porch blown away. Trees were blown down in numerous places. The Cisco Livestock Show Association's quonset bulding on the Lake Road had damages.

Supt. James Couch reported that the only damage to school property was to a metal building used as an office at the athletic track back of the high school building.

Fire department spotters were out much of the night Saturday and again for an hour and a half Sunday night. They were out again early Monday when another squall line moved through the region. Rain gauges registered three tenths of an inch early Monday.



Oak Tree Infects 31 **Texas Counties**

WACO - Oak wilt, a serious fungus disease which can kill oak tress in just four weeks to six months, has been identified in 31 Texas counties, according to an article published in the May/-Juen issue of the TEXAS GARDENER magazine.

"With the chemicals now available, chemical control of oak wilt is not possible. Losses to this devastating disease can be reduced by following a series of cutlural practices. The basic principle is to stop the spread of the fungus," writes Dr. Johnson

And the first stop in control is to identify the disease as soon as it moves into an area. Trees infected with oak wilt develop distrinct foliage symptoms. The leaves on live oaks turn a brown or yellow color along the veins. Areas between the veins also may turn yellow, or remain green. Also, some leaves turn brown, either all over or just on the margins. Leaf symptoms of Shumard and Texas red oaks are different. Their leaves develop a wilted appearance and then brown tips are formed.

TIA Attacks Are Sudden

Transient ischemic attacks (TIA) are sudden, neurologic deficts (such as loss of vision in one eye, inability to speak, paralysis, or weakness of one side of the body) that lasts for less than 24 hours. Although they are similar in appearance to minor strokes, they do no discernible lasting damage to the brain's functions.

TIAs are probably due to an interruption in blood flow to an area of the brain. They can be caused by narrowing in the carotid arteries (the arteries in the neck that supply the brain with oxygenated blood). This narrowing is usually due to the presence of atherosclerosis. Blood vessel spasms and showers of tiny emboli (clots that travel to the brain) are also possible causes of TIAs.

They symptoms of TIAs are both varied and frightening to the victim. They can include weakness of the face; numbness in various parts of the body; blindness in one eye; weakness in the arms or legs on one side; and prickling or "pins and needles" sensation in parts of the body. Vertigo (sensation of spinning) combined with any of these symptoms and others can also be due to TIAs.

The major importance of TIAs is their use in the diagnosis of stroke. Any such attack may be a predictor of stroke. Often, when a person describes a "light stroke" he or she is really talking about a transiant ischemic attack. If left unattended, TIAs can indeed lead to major strokes. permanent damage to all parts affected, as well as to the possibility of sudden death. The first line of attack indiagnosis is a complete examination including history and physical, neurological, and eye exam. "Buits" noises caused by narrowing in an artery, are heard in the carotid artery. TIAs can be an indication of serious problems and if experienced, must be brought to the attention of a physician immediately.

Eastland County Receives Storm Damage, Saturday

The Eastland County area was hit by a storm system Saturday night that resulted in extensive property damage caused by high winds. The wind was docked at 92 mph at Cisco at the height of the storm.

Cisco was without electrical power from seven to nine hours. The roof was ripped from the Southwestern Bell Telephone Company's construction storehouse on West Eighth Street and belw about a block northwest, apparently hitting a utility pole, causing it to tilt, snapping power lines, according to Vandell Weathus, West Texas Utilities lineman. A WTU crew from Abilene arrived about 3 a.m. Sunday to set up a mobile substation to replace the damaged substation.

Part of the metal roof of the Cisco Reclaiming Crude building north of town was torn off. There was some roof damage and limbs blown off trees

Eastland received damage from the high winds, including a large plate glass window blown in at Victor Cornelius building on West Main Street. The antenna atop KEAS radio station on South Seaman was toppled during the storm, and many trees were damaged. Several signs around town were also damaged, as were roofs. Light hail fell during the storm, and .44 inch of rain was reported.

Large steel double doors at the rear of Eastland County Newspaper building were blow open. Mrs. Truman Brown reported that a bilding was blown over at Lake Leon.

Texas Electric Service Company's transmission crew went to Throckmorton Sunday afternoon to help restore power after that area was hit by high winds and tornadoes but were turned back by high water. The crew left again early Monday morning.





Object Of Twentieth Century Club Broadens Over The Years

(Editor's Note: This is a second in a series about the history of the Twentieth Century Club which sponsors and operates the Cisco Public Library. This should bring back memories to some citizens today and to others, a glimpse of early day clubwork in Cisco.)

As the years have gone by, our object has become broadened and is now as follows: "The object of this Club shall be to awaken interest in literature, in topics of general interest, social concern and care of the Public Library and Library Building.

Mr. Frank Vernon, Editor of the Cisco "Round Up" and a very enterprising citizen, said "Cisco needs and must have a Public Library." He wrote to Mr. Carnegie who was, at that time, building libraries in many Texas cities, to interest him in establishing a library in Cisco. When Mr. Carnegie's reply came, Mr. Vernon went to the businessmen in the town who said Mr. Carnegie's terms were more than they could meet. Mr. Carnegie sent a check for \$250. With this amount, besides contributions by the founder, the Cisco Public Library became a reality. A little incident is recalled -Mr. Vernon had just read Lew Wallace's "Ben Hur" and liked it so much, he said to his wife, "Mae, this is the first volume of the Cisco Public Library." This book remains a treasured possession of the Library.

In 1900, Mr. Vernon's health required a change of climate. He asked the Twen-

It has been our first consideration, our pride, and our excuse for existence. There were about 300 volumes at that time. Small as it was, it became a problem to find a suitable home for it. Thus, early in the life of the Club was born a determination to build a library building, a home for our precious books.

In order to secure the necessary funds, the Club gave many parties, and home talent plays, and sponsored Lyceum courses, etc. There were no picture shows, Country Club, golf course, etc. in Cisco. Thus, our efforts to furnish entertainment met with hearty support, and our Library fund grew. In 1915, the Club bought a lot in what is now


