The resignation submitted by James Couch as superintendent of the Cisco Public Schools will be on the agenda for the regular monthly meeting of the board of trustees at 7:30 p.m. Monday at the high school library.

The board considered the resignation but tabled action at a special meeting last Monday night. After an executive session, the board returned for the open meeting. A motion to table action on the resignation

carried by a 6-to-1 vote of the trustees.

A total of 48 applications for the superintendent's position had been received by the school system Thursday, officials said. Plans called for applications to be received through Saturday, May 18, after which they will be reviewed and a number of applicants invited to appear for interviews.

Officials said the board hoped to fill the post by June 1.

Dr. Thompson observed that "no more than 20 per cent of our people are givers, leaving 80 per cent as takers in today's society." The 20 per cent of givers represent people who make living in this country worthwhile, he added.

Noting that he was envious of graduating high school students because of the opportunities available to them in virtually all fields of education and endeavor, Dr. Thompson said that "we are in the midst of a high tech

revolution - an era when lessons taught just a few years ago have been entirely changed."

"By the time you reach the potential of your maturity," he told the young honorees, "life expectancy will have passed 100 years with more and more break-throughs in medicine for sustaining and improving life."

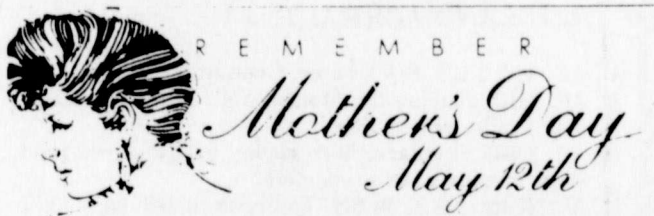
Connell Elected As Fire Chief

But is this a true test of fishing savvy, or more a luck of the cast? A one fish tournament many anglers feel this type of tournament is more luck. With perhaps a total entry of near 1500 anglers, someone is going to place a lure at the right place the right time and hang the winning fish. All tournaments have winners, but with most being 3 fish or more stringers an angler must find a pattern and exhibit some bassing skills. Don't get us wrong folks, we're not saying KEAN is a bad tournament, we would just prefer seeing it made into a little more professional tournament. Especially with megabucks being offered.

Hubbard Creek has been the site of more tournaments than we can count. Some with live release programs

and some which do not release these fish back into the lake. Most of us have seen a dramatic decline in success on Hubbard Creek. Every lake cycles with good and bad stretches. But Hubbard is long over due. Other factors involved are the low water levels which have been present for a number of years.

What can we the sportsmen do to help this lake. RELEASE in good shape more of our catch. This holds true on any impoundment.

Area lakes are sliding into some slow times. Leon bass fair to 3 pounds, crappie good stringers of 30 tops, strippers fair, some 6-8 showing on trotlines. Catfish excellent a number of 40 pound cats showing up and one 56 pounder. Live bait producing best. Daniels bass good to six pounds, crappie slow, catfish good. Brownwood bass good to 4 pounds on worms, strippers good. Proctor bass excellent, strippers excellent, crappie good, catfish good on skimmer lines.

GROWING GERANIUMS

It has been said that Geraniums which are natives of South Africa, are known and loved by more people than any other flower in the world. Geraniums grow almost anywhere with a minimum of care and are found in most gardens. The color ranges for geraniums are white, pinks, brilliant red and purplish black. Geraniums grow outdoors from year to year with little attention.

They can become shrubby plants four to five feet tall while in colder climates they are treated as annual delicate annuals. The Lady Washington Geraniums also called Martha Washington may reach a height of three feet and have huge clusters of three to four-inch single and double blossoms sometimes blotched with a darker shade on the two upper petals.

The ivy and the common geranium produce single or double flowers. The ivy lemon, peppermint, apple or nutmeg scent to mention only a few. Then the geranium may have no scent what so ever. The fragrance emanates from the leaves and not the flowers.

You may use the ivy and common geranium as borders, beds and pot plants because they will bloom through out the growing season. The ivy geranium is particularly effective in hanging baskets and window boxes. They can also be used as ground cover.

The Lady Washington is not successful in many sections of the country as other geraniums since it needs temperature below 60 degrees to bud. It is usually grown by florist for Mother's Day and Memorial Day.

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A New Wall For The Watchman What Of Kent Hance?

When former Texas Congressman Kent Hance announced last Friday that he was changing from the Democratic to the Republican party most Eastland County people knew of it shortly. Some were surprised.
Anything Kent Hance of Lubbock does is always news here, for this is Hance territory. It has been, at least. Both he and his friend U.S. Congressman Charles Stenholm carried this country with a large majority in the last election.

Even last summer, in the Democratic Senatorial runoff, when Hance was in what could be called a dogfight with Doggett, Eastland County voters gave Hance strong backing. Most of these votes apparently switched over to Republican convert Phil Gramm in November, giving him a large county win over Doggett in the Senate seat vacated by John Tower.

Since Friday I have been thinking of the last time I saw Kent Hance, and that was at the big Stenholm-Hance Barbeque at the County Fairgrounds on March 12, 1984.

When I arrived at the Showbarn there were about 400 people milling around, their voices mingling with the music of Sheriff Bill Skinner and his band from Callahan County. It looked like Democratic party members from all towns in the county had showed up, making it the largest political gathering I had seen here.

Charles Stenholm moved around with ease, greeting old friends. And here came Kent Hance, dressed in brown, with guileless brown eyes - and a face you would trust even if you met in the middle of Moscow.

I would have taken him for a College Professor which he has been (a Law Professor at Texas Tech) or the pastor

of a local church. Actually, he is a lay worker in the Baptist Church.

He met people with apparent candor, then sat down on a bench with some of the musicians. He mentioned that he was a relative to Roy Acuff - that he really liked country music. He requested the song "Faded Love".

When he began to speak, however, he was less a "Peace and Safety" man than a Watchman on the walls of West Texas Zion, telling what America must do to survive.

I remembered that he had fought against the Windfall Profit Tax, had been the author of the 1981 Tax Reduction Act in Washington, and had worked for immigration reforms, Government spending reforms, and a number of other hot issues.

We didn't know it that night, but the Political Rally at the Barn was probably one of the happiest occasions Hance had during his 1984 campaign. As the summer wore on his race turned bitter. His narrow defeat by Doggett and Doggett's stunning defeat by Republican Phil Gramm indicated a wide ideological split among Texas Democrats. Eventually Hance faded from press releases. He began work for a Dallas law firm.

Some Eastland County Democrats now indicate a "wait and see" attitude on Hance, saying that the whole thing is not such a big deal.

Other citizens have a different opinion, however some of their comments available for publication.

Jim Keffer of Eastland, County Republican Chairman, studied Business Law under Kent Hance at Texas Tech University.

"I think the change of parties says a lot for Kent Hance," Keffer remarks. "He has set a good example."

"I believe part of the

reason he left at this time is because of the way Tip O'Neal is running congress. The seating of that Congressman from Indiana whose election was in doubt probably triggered it.

"It looks like they (the Democrats) are in trouble. The leaders of the party have left the mainstreet of America. They are not attracting strong new members."

"Congressman Charles Stenholm ought to consider doing the same thing as Hance. He has voted with the Republicans right along. It is time, too, for concerned citizens to reexamine themselves, and look at what each party stands for."

"I call on the County officials, too, to search their souls and then stand up for the party they think is right."

Attorney Bill Wright of Cisco, another former student and also a personal friend of Hance, has a decided opinion about the situation.

"I don't know whether it's as much Kent Hance leaving the Democratic party as it is the Democratic party leaving the mainstream of the people of Texas," he said. "I'll support Kent no matter what - for I know that he is a good, moral man."

"I took Business Law classes from him, and he was one of the best teachers I ever had anywhere."

When asked when he last saw Kent Hance, Bill Wright replied that it was Jan. 1 at his home north of Cisco.

"He was driving out on the Interstate on New Year's eve, with his wife, two kids and a cat. It began to ice over, and he called to ask if they could spend the night at my home."

"We had a great visit. We didn't talk too much about politics and he didn't say anything about switching parties at that time. But knowing Kent Hance, I'm

Producing High Quality Hay

High quality hay doesn't just happen. It takes a lot of advance work as well as proper attention to certain management practices.

Key practices in the production of high quality hay came to the forefront at the 1984 Liberty County Hay Show, and these practices have been emphasized in educational programs by Dr. David Bade, forage specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, and Kelby Boldt, Liberty County Extension agent. These efforts are a part of the Extension Service's Integrated Livestock Management Program.

Producers who entered hay samples in the Liberty County Show completed information sheets that detailed practices they followed during the haying season. This information indicated that maturity of hay at harvest was the biggest factor affecting hay quality, Bade points out.

Hay harvested at 25 to 30 days of age (from the onset of active growth or from the last cutting) was of the highest quality - 8.1 percent crude protein for bahiagrass and 12.8 percent for bermudagrass, notes Bade. Hay harvested past 50 days of age had the lowest quality. For example, bahiagrass at 50 to 60 days of age had only 5.7 percent crude protein.

Proper fertilization was

sure he thought this through very carefully.

the second most important factor in determining hay quality as evidenced by information provided by producers. Samples of hay fertilized with at least 45 to 50 pounds of actual nitrogen per acre were higher in crude protein than those receiving minimum fertilizer levels, says Bad.

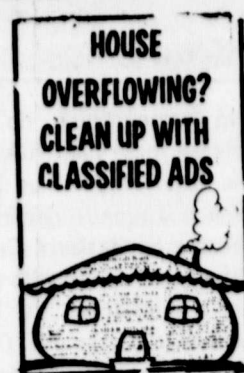
Despite the importance of a good fertilization program to quality hay production, only 17 percent of the pro-

ducers completing the information sheets indicated they soil-tested their hay pastures to ensure proper fertilization.

Weed control practices also helped produce high quality hay as many producers used a herbicide to ensure weed-free crop.

By comparing the chemical analysis of hay samples with production practices, producers can determine what it takes to produce high quality hay for

economically supplementing livestock rations, Bade points out.

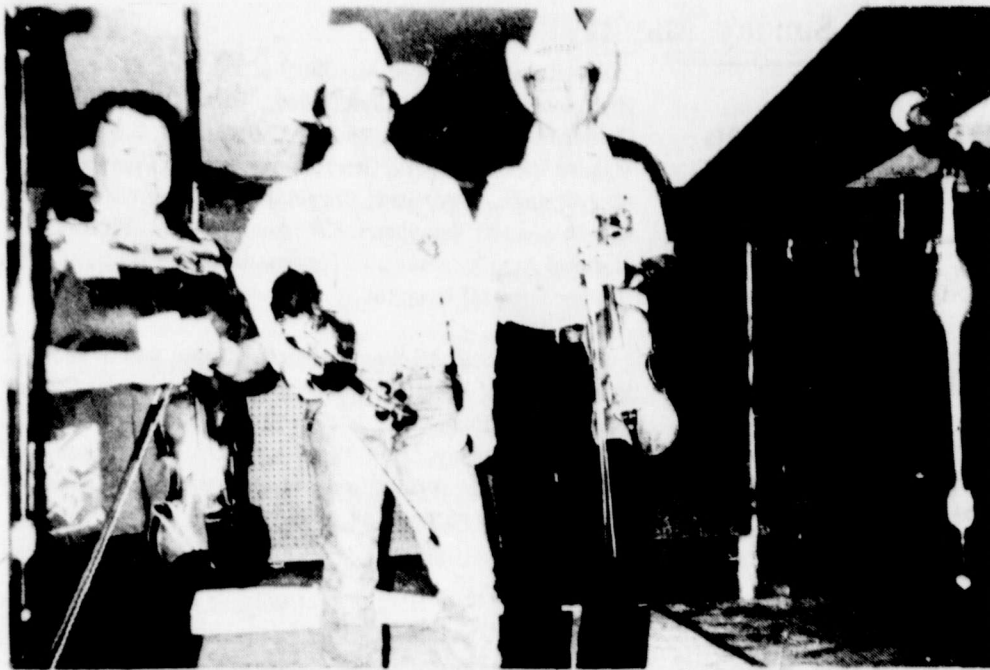

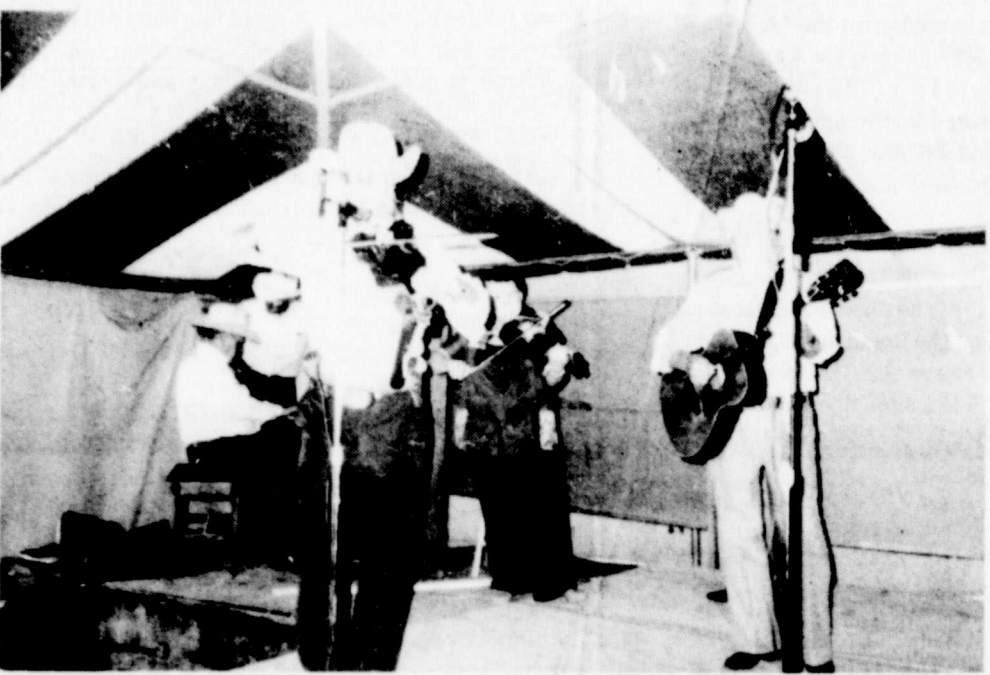

Excellent Year For Spraying Mesquite

COLLEGE STATION-- This may be the year to put the "whammy" on mesquite.

Soil moisture conditions are a key to mesquite control, and good rains since last fall over most Texas the effective mesquite control with foliar herbicides, says Dr. Tommy Welch with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

Now that mesquite is starting to grow actively due to good soil moisture, ranchers should gear up for a spray program, notes Welch, a ranch brush weed control specialist. Correct timing and proper application are most critical.

Before applying a herbicide, make sure mesquite leaves are fully extended and have turned from light to dark green in color, advises the specialist. This usually occurs about 40 days after bud break.

Spraying during the period of seed pod elongation will result in less control because the plants are using food reserves. Also, about 90 days after bud break, control with foliar herbicides decreases as wax builds up on leaves and overall growth slows down, Welch says.

Proper timing also relates to soil temperature. Research by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and Texas Tech University has shown that soil temperature at 12 to 18 inches of depth should be 75 degrees F. or above for good control of mesquite.

Soils on upland range sites and soils with a higher sand content usually warm up faster than bottomland and clay soils. Thus ranchers need to pay attention to particular sites when planning a mesquite control program, suggests the specialist.

If rains during the spraying period start new leaf growth on mesquite plants, leaves should be allowed to mature before spraying. If foliage is damaged by insects, disease or hail, do not spray until new foliage has developed and matured, advises Welch.

Four herbicides are registered and effective for mesquite control on rangeland, says the specialist. These include triclopyr (Grazon ET); 2,4,5-T; picloram (Grazon PC); and dicamba (Banvel).

Triclopyr, dicamba and 2,4,5-T may be used alone to control mesquite. However, control may be increased with one-to-one mixtures of the following: 2,4,5-T and picloram, triclopyr and picloram, or dicamba and picloram. A one-to-one mix of 2,4,5-T and dicamba also may be used but generally is less effective than the other mixtures.

Before applying any herbicide, but sure to read and follow label directions, cautions Welch.

Proper application of foliar herbicides at the right time can be a key step to mesquite control, reminds the specialist. Then follow up with good range management practices.

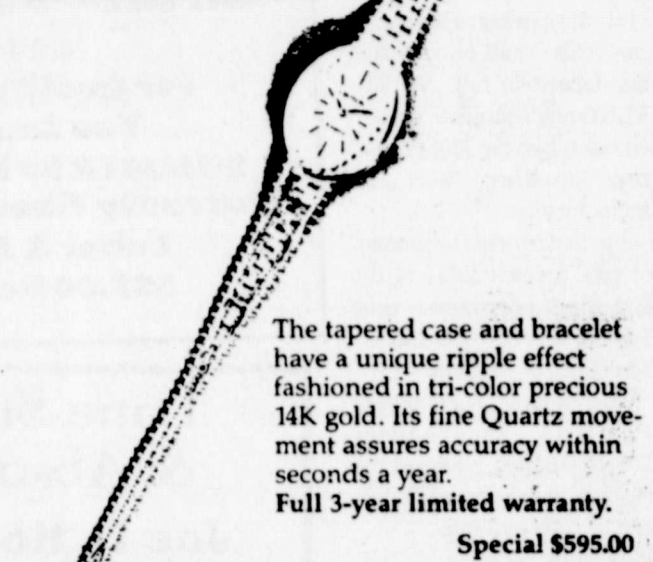

Two 4,000-ft. developmental wells are planned by Snow Oil of Ft. Worth at drillsites five to six miles north of Eastland. Locations are in an 80-acre lease in Eastland County's H&TC Survey, A-298 & A-1748. Wells' designations are the No. 2 Germany "B" and the No. 2 Livingstone. They are to be located in the Snow Field.

At a location one mile southeast of Sabanno, Eastland County, Bill Herod has finaled a new oil producer in the W.R. Burgess Survey, A-25.

Plug-and-abandon orders have been issued for the No. 2 L.Z. Gray, a wildcat venture of Don H. Hanvey Oil Interest in Eastland County's BBB&C Survey, A-822. Spudded September 4, the well had reached 4,000-ft. total depth. Drillsite was two miles west-northwest of Cisco.

The No. 1 J.J. Finley has been finaled by Tiki Exploration. It is a developmental well in Eastland County's Ranger Field, four miles east of Eastland. Drillsite is in the McLennan CSL Survey, A-367.

Daily potential of 25 barrels of oil was posted with the Railroad Commission. The well went to a 3,806-ft. bottom, and production will be from Marble Falls Formation perforations, 3,152 to 3,226 feet into the wellbore.

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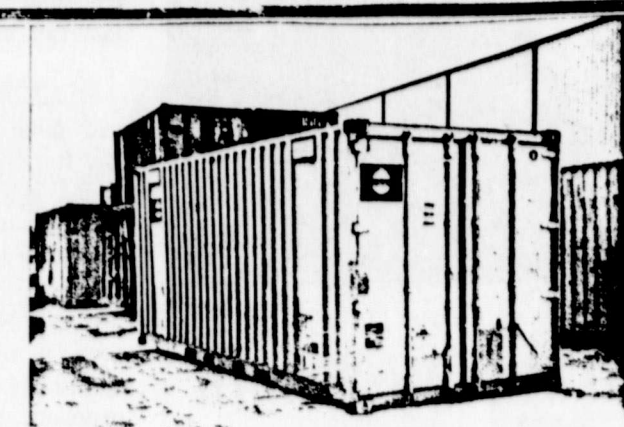

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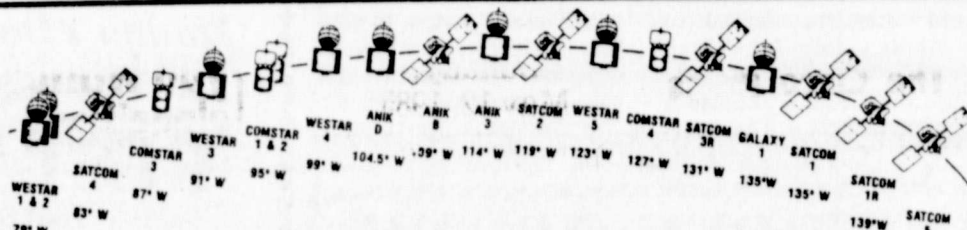

Fire Protection Costs \$69,000 Year

Fire protection costs the citizens of Cisco some \$69,000 per year, Fireman David Gill told the Cisco Lions Club in a talk at their weekly luncheon meeting last Wednesday noon at the Colony Restaurant. Mr. Gill was introduced by Program Chairman Charles Clark.

The city budget provided for the sum of \$69,000 to finance the fire department during 1984-85, Mr. Gill said. He estimated that it costs the taxpayers some \$1,200 every time a fire truck answers an alarm. This estimate, he added, was based on money in equipment plus actual expenses.

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The fire department is manned by three salaried firemen, one of which is on duty around the clock at the fire station.

In addition, the department has a 30-member volunteer crew that is available on call to man equipment and fight fires. The volunteers are reimbursed for expenses at the rate of \$2 per hour for the time they spend fighting fires, Mr. Gill said.

Of the 30 volunteers authorized, the department currently has 27 active firemen because of a recent death and two resignations. The department elects new members from a list of qualified applications, according to Mr. Gill.

The fire department averages some 180 alarms per year, more than half of which are outside the city limits, Mr. Gill said. In addition to the volunteer department, there is a Rural Fire

department of volunteers with two trucks, he added.

Mr. Gill told Lions that he was in Fort Worth last weekend attending a two-day seminar on fighting hazardous materials fires. Recently, he spent several days in Indianapolis attending a national conference on fire and accident prevention and disaster work.

The fire department's truck that was purchased in 1956 will be 30 years old next year and will need replacing for the city to retain full credit on the insurance key rate, Mr. Gill said. Truck replacement costs have increased from \$17,000 paid by the city in 1956 to some \$63,000 for comparable equipment in 1985.

Salaried firemen are required to put in 335 classroom hours of study, including courses in first aid as well as fire fighting techniques, to be eligible to hold their jobs, Mr. Gill said.

There is no doubt about it... Osteoporosis is serious business and no one is exempted from the torturous disease.

Normal bones are 90% fibrous collagen protein and about 10% salt. Osteoporosis, or brittle bone disease, is a disorder in which bone strength is decreased due to a decline in the calcium content. As the strength of the bone is also reduced and the person is exposed to the dangers of spontaneous fractures. These fractures usually result from

falls, but may also result from mild stress during everyday activities such as opening a window, lifting a heavy object, or making a bed.

Osteoporosis occurs more often in women than in men, and we shall discuss that more in our next articles.

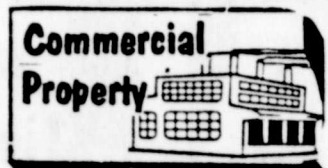

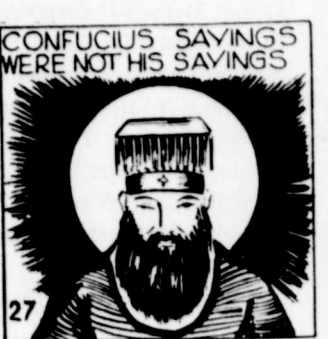

The Texas Agricultural Extension Service joins with the Upper Leon Soil and Water Conservation District and others in the nationwide observance of Soil Stewardship Week during the week of May 12 to 19, 1985.

"Tomorrow Together" is the theme of the 1985 observance. As the 1985 booklet for the observance points out, human survival depends on other living things: the grasses and grain, fishes and birds, and wild and domestic animals. And we all depend for our basic necessities on soil and water. Together, we must think about ways to preserve and renew the topsoil from which all our food comes. Together, we must work to purify and protect our waters.

1985, is the fiftieth anniversary of the state and federal

agencies established during the "Dirty '30s" to combat erosion. During that Dust Bowl era, local soil and water conservation districts, the State Soil and Water Conservation Board, the Soil Conservation Service, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, and other units of government were founded to improve the delivery of soil conservation information and techniques to farmers and ranchers. The task has expanded to include work with urban and suburban citizens in protecting construction sites, school yards, shorelines and parks from erosion. Efforts are also made to clean up the nation's waters.

Since 1955, Soil Stewardship Week has been

celebrated to emphasize the importance of good stewardship of our basic soil and water resources.

Materials especially designed to carry the 1985 theme of "Tomorrow Together" are being distributed through local conservation districts, county Extension agents, and others to clergymen, lay leaders, civic and educational organizations and to participating in an observance.

As part of the observance of Soil Stewardship week we are having a program on "Water - A Source of Life" Thursday night, May 16, at the Eastland National Bank. The program begins at 7:30 p.m. This will be a good opportunity for you to learn of procedures to get water wells tested and information on home water treatment systems. The program will also include the wise use of water in the home, on landscape and gardens.

"When it comes to water" according to John McNeely "the State of Texas is a

deficit spender. By the year 2,000, its credit will start to run out."

If each home in Texas adopted a few water-saving measures, the state would have millions of additional gallons of water every year. These savings could "buy time" for the state to solve its water resource problem.

Water conservation begins with an awareness that (1) water is a limited resource, (2) water costs a great deal in energy and money (3) all wastewater requires costly and energy-wasting treatment, and (4) water consumption can be reduced significantly in the average home.

Once a family becomes conscious of the need to use less water, there are several proven ways to do so. These include no-cost or low-cost ways such as changing habits, repairing leaks, and installing water-saving devices.

We must learn to conserve water either by choice now or by necessity in a few years.
