1984-85 Public School Year Will End Here Friday

The year-end activities got underway with the Baccalaureate Service last Sunday night at Harrell auditorium. Ministers of local churches took part in the program with Jim Hatcher of the Church of Christ as speaker.

The commencement program will open with Scott Roberts giving the invocation. The salutatory address will be given by Shelly Schaefer and the valedictory address will be by John

McGinness, president of the school board. Davene Jeffcoat will play the professional and the recessional. Bicyclist Stops Thru Cisco On 2,000 Mile Journey

Almost half-way to his destination, Bill Warren, 65-year-old retired news photographer, stopped in Cisco Tuesday morning on his bicycling trip from Casa Grande, Arizona, to Asheville, North Carolina.

Warren is helping to show what American medicine can do for arthritis sufferers. Warren used to suffer from a degenerative knee joint caused by arthritis which made him "a virtual captive in my own home. Twenty-four-hour-a-day pain has a way of blotting out the good times and making every day a bad experience. For eight years I had waited, but no more. It was decision time."

Three years ago, Warren underwent a total knee replacement with an artificial joint and six weeks later he says he was on the golf course. He said the physical therapy, "building up strength from a month on crutches" was tough, "but the discomfort was not like the painful existence I had endured for years."

Warren says when he finishes his 2,000 mile bicycle trip, he will have used his knee more times than the normal person would in 200 years. He says, "this should prove to even the most skeptical reader that this implant has brought back a quality of life that I thought was gone forever."

Having left Casa Grande, Arizona April 20, Warren plans to arrive in Asheville, North Carolina June 8. His original schedule called for him to arrive on June 1, but he said the new date is more realistic.

On Monday, Warren traveled 89 miles from Sweetwater to Cisco (the longest distance traveled in one day so far) but he said he might not travel but 20 miles on Tuesday due to the strong northerly winds. He said his distance traveled depends on weather conditions.

After leaving Cisco, Warren planned to go to Breckenridge, Graham and on to Denton, which is his half-way mark. He planned to be in Denton by Friday.

Along the way, Warren is making pictures of homes and unique buildings which "take his fancy" which he plans to compile together in a photo essay when he is finished. While in Cisco, he decided to make photos of the Moblely-Hilton Hotel.

Storms Hit Area Sunday

Area lakes gained water and farms and ranches benefitted as a thunderstorm swept through this West Central Texas region Sunday night. A tornado alert condition prevailed in Eastland County Sunday night and until noon Monday.

Light hail was reported in some areas and a tornado was reported in the Olden area. No damage was reported. Highway traffic on I-20 in the section between Eastland and Ranger was buffeted by high winds for a time Sunday night, and three tractor rigs were reported to have been blown off the road.

Heavy rains were reported in the Moran area. One resident said his gauge measured over nine inches, while gauges in Moran registered between four and five inches. The Jimmy Brooks home in Moran was evacuated due to rising water. Highway 6 between Cisco and Moran was closed for a time due to high water. City Manager Mike Moore reported that Lake Cisco gained some water as rainfall in that area measured 1.5 inches or more. The fire station gauge showed .95 of an inch. Gauges over town registered up to 1.5 inches.

George & Anna Brazell Have Retired From CJC

George and Anna Brazell, members of the faculty of Cisco Junior College for the past 18 years and veterans of some 35 years in the teaching profession, retired with the end of the 1984-85 school year. They are shown in the accompanying picture.

Mr. Brazell has taught classes in psychology and sociology while Mrs. Brazell has taught journalism and photography. They were presented an engraved tray at the recent CJC Appreciation Dinner and honored by members of the faculty.

The Brazells came to CJC in 1967 from Southwestern College in Waxahachie where they taught for 12 years. Previously, they were members of the faculty of Lee College in Tennessee for five years.

Both are graduated with BA degrees from SMU, Dallas, and with MA degrees from the University of Oklahoma. Mr. Brazell has done graduate study at Baylor and elsewhere, while Mrs. Brazell has studied at Texas Tech, the University of Hawaii, the Institute of Photography and the University of Texas.

The Brazells were married in 1938 and have one daughter, Miss Elizabeth Brazell, who was in speech and drama work for an Austin radio and television station. They live at Desdemona on a stock farm that has been in Mr. Brazell's family for three generations. They own property in Cisco.

Mr. Brazell, an ordained minister of the Assemblies of God Church, is in considerable demand as a public speaker, appearing 111 times in 1984 to address various audiences. He has continued that work this year and plans to do so in the future. His recent appearances included speaking at the junior-senior banquet at Albany and a baccalaureate address in Kansas last Sunday night.

The author of a best selling book, Mr. Brazell plans to continue writing. He has made several recordings of inspirational matter and will continue this activity.

Mrs. Brazell's interest in photography has grown with the years, and she remains active with her cameras. She held a one-person show of her photographs a few years ago. She taught art as well as journalism and photography when she first came to CJC.

In retirement, the Brazells plan to continue living at their stock farm where they have cattle and horses. They plan to do some traveling as well as pursue other interests.

"Teaching has been a rewarding profession," Mr. Brazell told the Press. "Hearing from many former students is a pleasure that we greatly enjoy."

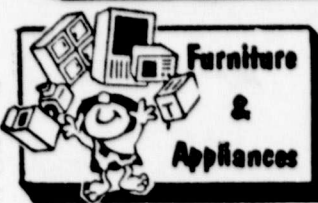
Homecoming Set Sunday At Nimrod

Brenden Downing Signs With C.J.C.

Brenden Downing, a 6-5 forward from Hahnville High School in Boutte, Louisiana, has signed a basketball scholarship agreement with Cisco Junior College. He is the fourth player that Coach Dan Montgomery has signed to date.

Because of Louisiana's five year rule, Downing did not play during his senior year, but was a standout during his junior year, being named to All-River Parishes 2nd Team and All-District honorable mention.

Hahnville is the same high school that produced David Jones, who starred for CJC during the 1982-83 season and later played at Southeastern Louisiana University in

Hammond. According to Coach Montgomery, "I feel that we have signed a real 'sleeper' in Brenden Downing. Because he was not eligible during his senior season, many college coaches are unaware of the prospect that he is. I thought that he was the best player that I saw at the tryouts in Lafayette, which included seventy of the top prospects in Louisiana."

Cisco's Chances For Grant Improved 'Substantially'

Cisco's chances of getting an environmental protection agency construction grant from the Texas Department of Water Resources has improved substantially, according to City Manager Mike Moore.

He said he received a notice from the department which indicated Cisco might have the opportunity to get some "left-over" 1985 money. The city should know in 60 days whether it will get the 1985 money.

If not, the Water Resources Department indicated that Cisco's chances for 1986 money is "excellent." The preliminary priority funding

list will be made available in mid-July.

Such a grant would provide approximately 55 percent of the "existing needs" of the City of Cisco for a new sewer disposal plant. City Manager Moore said that would probably be around \$300,000-350,000 for Cisco.

The proposed cost needed for the project is \$875,000. The city is already in the process of making application to Farmer's Home Administration for a loan in the full amount at 7 1/4 percent interest. Moore said they are expecting approval of the loan any day.

Should the city get a grant from Water Resources, the loan from Farmer's Home Administration will be re-applied for only the amount not covered by the grant. In that case, Moore stated the proposed future increases in sewer costs will not be near what they would be if the city has to borrow a loan in the full amount.

The City of Cisco is in an agreed judgement with the State of Texas which called for the new sewer plant to be in operation by October 1, 1985. Moore said that date is impossible, since there has been so much difficulty in

obtaining funding for the project.

Moore and Cisco Mayor Eris Ritchie recently met in Austin with Texas Attorney General Jim Maddox and Senator Bob Glasgow to present the case for the city and ask for more time in building the plant.

Mr. Moore said he received a letter on Monday, confirming a one-year extension on the final deadline for the sewer plant, moving it to October 1, 1986. Final specifications of the new agreement between the city and state will be worked out after mid-July, according to Moore.

Although possible tornadoes were reported in clouds west of Cisco as early as 6 p.m., they did not touch the ground. The main storm struck Moran between 6:30 and 8:30 p.m., dropping 4.80 inches of rain in the town. Golfball-size hail was reported, with flooding in the area. Highway 6 from Cisco to Moran and Moran to Albany was closed due to high water, as well as Farm-to-Market 576 from Moran to Breckenridge.

The heaviest of the clouds circled north of Cisco, but left .95 inches of rain in town. Winds were clocked at 40 m.p.h. with heavier gusts running up to 70 and even 90 m.p.h. Some trees were toppled, and the wind gauge was knocked over at the Fire Station.

During the storm two Enray tank batteries caught on fire just west of the Dothan cemetery. The tops and ladders were blown off, with the fire presumably caused by lightning. A Baird Fire Truck, out on another call, put out the fire as local firemen reached the scene.

After reaching Morton Valley the storm did considerable damage, then moved into Olden. There it hit one house, blew away out-buildings, downed trees, broke out windows, and turn-

ed over an 18 wheel truck on the Interstate 4 miles east of Eastland. The storm then veered toward Lake Leon and Erath County.

There were no injuries reported from the storm.

The North fork of the Leon was running over banks threatening flooding in the north part of Eastland and although the newly cleaned route was carrying record amounts of water, there was also threats of flooding the north and on East Main St.

Clean-up and repair began Monday as the area cleared and the sun came out again.

The Volunteer Spotters throughout the county were out and reporting in.

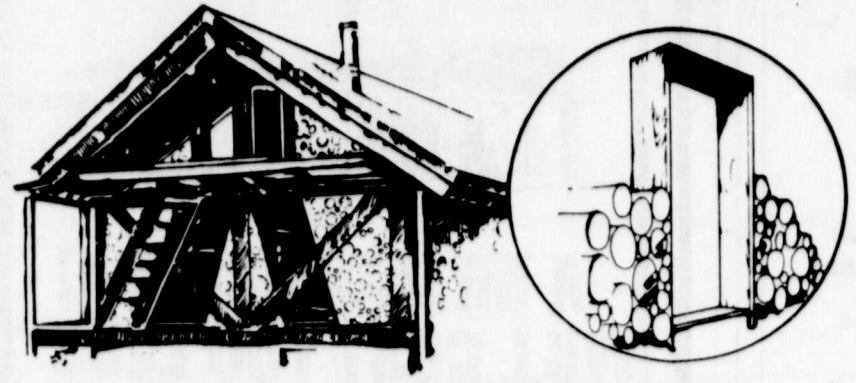

A DURABLE AND EASY-TO-BUILD STACKWOOD HOUSE!

Back in 1977, Jack Henstridge built an expensive (\$75,000, appraised value) home out of stackwood (also called firewood, cordwood, pilewood, stovewood, stackwall, etc.) for only \$10,000, and he detailed the experiment for THE MOTHER EARTH NEWS (in issue 45). By merely stacking 9" long sections of logs on their sides in a mortar matrix (and 6" long chunks for the interior walls), Jack and his wife constructed a unique and expansive house that's still braving the extra-cold winters common to their New Brunswick, Canada homestead.

Stackwood, in case you've never heard of it, is one of the oldest types of construction we know of. And it's a wonder more people haven't rediscovered this unusual type of log home building, since it offers a number of significant advantages over the more common log construction methods, such as:

[1] Simplicity. Anyone who can cut wood with a chain saw, and stack a neat cord,

can build a "stackwood wall" house.

[2] Low cost. Windfalls, trees that are too badly bowed or twisted to be used in a conventional log cabin, "waste" lumber... in short, darn near any kind of wood can be used to build a stackwood wall, as long as the wood is dry.

[3] Soundproof design. Because the finished walls are so thick—and because the log ends tend to "reflect away" outside noises—the insides of cordwood structures are unusually quiet.

[4] Fire resistance. The mortar in the wall tends to absorb the heat of combustion, making it all but impossible for a fire to spread.

[5] No chinking. The mortar is largely self-healing. If a crack should develop, lime will leach into the break and calcify.

[6] Building efficiency. Once the wall is up, it's finished inside and out.

[7] Environmental harmony. The edifices are aesthetically pleasing and they blend harmoniously into a natural background.

The main drawback to stackwood construction is that the finished walls have poor insulating properties, primarily because lime mortar passes BTU like the proverbial sieve. The Henstridges have solved that problem, however, by making the walls fairly thick (nine inches) and by "sandwiching" hunks of Styrofoam in the mortar.

After hearing about the "house that Jack built," MOTHER's research staff decided to give cordwood architecture a try by building a stackwood dome greenhouse at our Eco-Village. With the help of visitors to our summer seminars, the crew raised what is to the best of our knowledge the world's first such structure. We found this construction method to be labor-intensive but relatively low-cost, especially for folks who have access to free wood. In fact, our Eco-Village researchers were so impressed that they also used the fast and easy technique when building part of the barn that houses our livestock.

Drilling Bits

Nine new developmental wells are planned by Sun Exploration & Production of Abilene in Eastland County.

The No. R.G. Lewis will be drilled two miles west of Desdemona in a 67-acre lease in the J.A. Curbella Survey, A-53. Drillsites will be in the Desdemona Field in a 67-acre lease.

The Nos. 629 & 630 North Central Ranger Unit will be located in the John York Survey, A-557, Ranger Field. Drillsites are four miles west of Ranger. The operator has 3,370 acres leased.

Drillsites for the Nos. 1901 through 1904, & 2603 Northwest Ranger Unit are four miles north-northeast of Eastland. The operator has 2,641 acres leased in the H&TC Survey, A-1573 & A-296. The wells will be drilled in the Ranger Field.

The No. 1 D.F. Riddle will be located one mile southeast of Desdemona in a 92-acre lease. Drillsite is in the Juana Salinas Survey, A-440, Desdemona Field.

All the wells are projected to reach depths of 4,999 feet, except the D.F. Riddle, which carries permit for 3,600 feet maximum depth.

Two new gas producers have been brought on line in the Eastland Regular Field, with Inland Land & Minerals as the operator.

Located six miles south of Ranger, the wells are in the William Van Norman

Survey, A-545. They are designated as the N. 2 J. Bond & the No. 2 Johnson "DG".

The Bond well flowed 167,000 CF gas per day on a 20/64-in. choke. The absolute open flow rating was 195,000 CFD.

The Johnson well flowed gas at a daily rate of 111,000 CF on a 32/64-in. choke. It was given a 240,000-CFD rating on absolute open flow.

The wells bottomed at 970 & 958 feet, respectively. They will produce from perforations in the Cisco Sand Formation, ranging from 856 to 909 feet into the wellbore.

At a location five miles north of Eastland, Northridge Corp. has finalized a new gas producer in the Beck-Hise Field, Eastland County.

The well is designated as the No. 1 J.B. Harbin, flowing gas at the rate of 161,000 CF per day. The absolute open flow rating was 183,000 CFD. Production tests were run on a 9/64-in. choke.

Location is in the H&TC Survey, A-299. Bottomed at 3,885 feet, the well will produce from a perforated interval in the Duffer Formation, 3,774 to 3,785 feet into the hole.

The Stephens Regular Field gained a new producer when Sun Exploration & Production completed the No. 156 Eliasville Unit three

miles northwest of Ivan.

The well indicated ability to pump 68 barrels of oil, along with 915 barrels of water per day. It was taken to a 3,325-ft. bottom, and production will be from a set of perforations in the Caddo "A" Formation, 3,175 to 3,200 feet into the wellbore.

The operation is in a lease in the TE&L Survey.

A Caddo-based operator has staged location for the No. 2 G. Dye, a developmental well to be located six miles south of Parks in the Stephens Regular Field. With projected total depth of 2,000 feet, the well will be located in a 160-acre lease in the T&P Survey. The operator is Mark Campbell.

At a location in the Breckenridge Townsite, Delta Oil & Gas Co. has finalized a new oil producer in the Stephens Regular Field.

The well is designated as the No. 1 Stephens County Unit, pumping 60 barrels of oil per day.

Location is in a lease in the LAL Survey. Bottomed at 3,300 feet, the well will produce from perforations in the Caddo Formation 3,180 to 3,190 feet into the wellbore.

A new producer has been brought on line in Stephens County's Dickie Ranch Field, with Gober Operating Co., Inc. as the operator.

Located seven miles west-northwest of Crystal Falls, the well is in a lease in the Sarah Blythe Survey. It is designated as the No. 3 Dickie Ranch.

On a 10/64-in. choke, it flowed oil at the rate of 55 barrels per day.

The well bottomed at 2,850 feet and will produce from a perforated interval in the Strawn Formation, 2,760 to 2,764 feet into the hole.

A 4,999-ft. developmental well is planned by Canusa Energy of Houston at a drillsite nine miles west of Crystal Falls, Stephens County. The location is in a 320-acre lease in the TE&L Survey. Well's designation is the No. 1 L. Clark. It will be drilled in the Stephens Regular Field.

AEC Oil & Gas Inc., has filed first production figures on a new oil well in the Reid-McLennan Field, Stephens County. The No. 3 Vann Crudgington "C" showed potential to make 36 barrels of oil per day on a 14/64-in. choke.

The operator has a lease in the TE&L Survey, with drillsite three miles southwest of Crystal Falls.

The well will produce from an interval in the Mississippian Formation, 4,399 to 4,424 feet into the wellbore. Total drilling depth was 5,054 feet.

5 Oil Operators Fined For Violations

AUSTIN—The Railroad Commission levied administrative penalties of either \$500 or \$1,000 on five Texas oil operators this week for violations of Commission well plugging rules.

A fine of \$1,000 was assessed to J.D. Richardson of Crane for failure to plug six wells on the Iowa Realty Trust lease in Pecos County. The wells had been inactive for almost a year. Commission rules require well operators to bring back into production or properly plug wells which haven't been operated in more than 90 days.

Mid-Western Petroleum Exchange of Arlington was also fined \$1,000 for failure to plug one well on the Childers lease and another on the J.C. Childers lease in Callahan County. Both wells were inactive and unplugged for several years.

A \$500 penalty was assessed to Covey Oil and Gas Co. of Sour Lake for failure to plug three wells on the Sun Fee lease in Hardin County. The wells were inactive for more than a year.

W.R.G. Oil and Gas, Inc. of Houston was also fined \$500 for violating Commission plugging rules on the David Rorick, Jr. lease in Harris County. The well was inactive from April 1982 until properly plugged Feb. 14, 1985.

EDCO Production, Inc. of Pleasanton was assessed a \$500 administrative penalty for failing to plug a well on the Silvert lease in Atascosa County that had been inactive for several years.

Under state law, the Commission can levy up to \$10,000 per day in penalties for violations of the Texas Natural Resources Code and Commission regulations.

Six Residents Arrested Saturday For Possession

Chief Rains said the raid was made on a search warrant by Cisco police, the Eastland County sheriff's office, Eastland Police Department and representative from the Alcohol Beverage Control Commission at Abilene.

Recovered by arresting officers were a quantity of suspected narcotics along with assorted paraphernalia used by persons in taking doses of narcotics, Chief

Rains said. Local police, who had the materials, were completing paper work Monday for the district attorney to use in the cases.

The six persons were taken to the county jail where charges were filed. Both Mr. and Mrs. Gosnell were released after posting \$2,500 bonds. Miss Grissom was released under \$1,000 bond, and Mrs. Hennington was out on a \$1,000 bond. Mr. Hennington's bond was \$5,000 in the drug case, \$400 on a charge of theft over \$20 and under \$200, and \$500 bond in a driving with expired license case. He remained in the county jail Monday morning. The Escobedo bond amounted to \$1,400.

Chief Rains said the ABC laboratory was given samples of the substances confiscated by officers for analysis.

Last Thursday at 7:40 p.m. local police arrested Mike Phillip Myers, 30, of Ranger in his automobile in the 600 block of Avenue G. He was charged with possession of a controlled substance, Detective Barrett reported. He was taken to the county jail and released after posting bond.

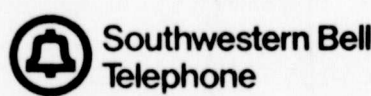

Gaeta Trial Set

Richard Gaeta is scheduled to stand trial in 91st District Court Monday, May 20. Presiding Judge Jim Wright Tuesday denied a motion by the Prosecuting Attorney for a change of venue.

A hearing Tuesday in 91st District Court in Eastland on a change of venue motion for the second trial of Richard Dwain Gaeta, accused of killing Gailey Johnson "G.J." Carter.

Gaeta's first trial on the capital murder charge ended in a mistrial in October.

District Attorney Emory Walton filed a motion for a change of venue Friday, said Saul Pullman, one of Gaeta's two court-appointed attorneys. Garry Lewellen of Stephenville also has been appointed to defend Gaeta.

Carter, 64, of Eastland was found bound and stabbed in the bedroom of his home April 30, 1983. According to

testimony during the trial, he was strangled with a sheet and stabbed four times with the two knives left stuck in his chest.

Gaeta and Timothy Lucky of Ranger were originally indicted for capital murder. Between \$6,000 and \$8,000 was believed to have been taken from Carter the night of his murder.

Gaeta's trial was declared a mistrial after the jury reported extraneous information had been brought before it. Earlier during the jury's deliberations, the foreman told Judge Jim Wright jurors were "hopelessly" deadlocked at eight for acquittal and four for conviction.

EASTLAND COUNTY WEATHER WARNING

Does The System Really Work?

What kind of warning system does Eastland County have for tornadoes? Is it adequate? These questions keep coming up, especially after the turbulent weather Sunday night.

Forty years ago no one would have considered a warning system possible. Each family simply went to the storm cellar if the clouds looked too bad.

Now few people have a cellar at all. And most of them have an idea - with all the sophisticated equipment around - that they will learn in time if a storm is coming. Then they will get to a safe place.

But as far as the location of "safe places" in Eastland County - there aren't many. There are no public shelters in any of the towns. Some buildings, such as the Eastland County Courthouse or the Cisco Postoffice, were once designated as public fall-out shelters. These are now locked, as some people discovered Sunday night. Perhaps some Church basements would be available.

The actual warning system includes The Eastland County Dispatch, the Department of Public Safety, other Law Enforcement officers, the Volunteer Weather Spotters, the Fire Departments, the National Weather Service in Fort Worth, sometimes the Weather Service in Abilene and one in Kansas City. Radios and television stations also play a part.

The tornado warning is supposed to come through the Eastland County Dispatch, which coordinates information from the Fort Worth Weather Service, the local Fire Departments and Law Officers.

The Dispatch has no direct line to the Fort Worth

Weather Service. The Dispatch is primarily a Law Enforcement agency rather than a public weather service, the word of a tornado warning first goes from Fort Worth to Austin, then back by police teletype to the County Dispatch. That may take the news several minutes behind the reports from television stations with direct lines and radar.

Once received, the tornado warning is relayed to the Fire Departments in affected towns, the weather spotters, Lawmen, Hospitals, and (in the daytime) schools. If time and phone lines permit, the warning is also called to

radio stations.

On last Sunday night the warning was not given to radio stations, states and Dispatch operator, because the area people had seen the warning on television and flooded the Dispatch with about 300 calls at a critical time.

"Law enforcement must take top priority with us," the spokesman said. "We are not equipped to give individual warnings on tornadoes. That is the responsibility of the Fire Departments in the towns. It would be best for the public not to call us for weather information during storms. It simply

ties up lines and makes it difficult for us to do our job."

Each town varies on methods of warning the public of an impending tornado. In Cisco there will be loud sirens blowing a full cycle - ten times. (The siren blows only one time for a fire.) There is a full cycle test at 1 p.m. on the first day of every month.

In Eastland a paging system is now used for fires, and a fire house siren is not blown. Fire trucks blow as they go out on the streets. So a tornado warning cannot be mistaken - it consists of 12 siren blasts, such as were blown Sunday night.

If a tornado is spotted in

the Ranger area, the Firemen will drive their trucks out on the streets and begin blowing sirens. There is no central warning system for the town. One Fireman said they would go "house to house if necessary, waking people up and telling them to get to a safe place is possible."

During stormy days and nights people often turn on the radio, hoping to get some information. Station KEAS, the A.M. station in Eastland, has been going off the air at 6 p.m. But Mike Snuffer, News Director, says that the station plans to go on the air at night during future stormy times, and stay on until all danger has passed.

"We have a weather wire direct from the National Weather Service in Fort Worth," he says. "We are the only station in this area with that service. So we will interrupt any broadcasts to inform people what is going on." Station KEAS is located at 1590 on the dial.

A spokesman at Station KVMX FM, Eastland, indicated that the Station wished to cooperate in every way possible. It has a NOAA Weather Radio, and receives information from the National Weather Service in Abilene. It also phones to the National Weather Service in Fort Worth, and has a CB scanner for local news.

In the middle of a storm

the weather spotters from each town are in the front lines. For them, a tornado is not a blip on a screen - it is something you actually see dip from the clouds.

These people are very aware of the difference between a tornado watch - when conditions are right for a tornado to form - and a warning - when a tornado is actually spotted.

The rest of us need to be aware of this too. For in the final analysis, the warning is not perfect.

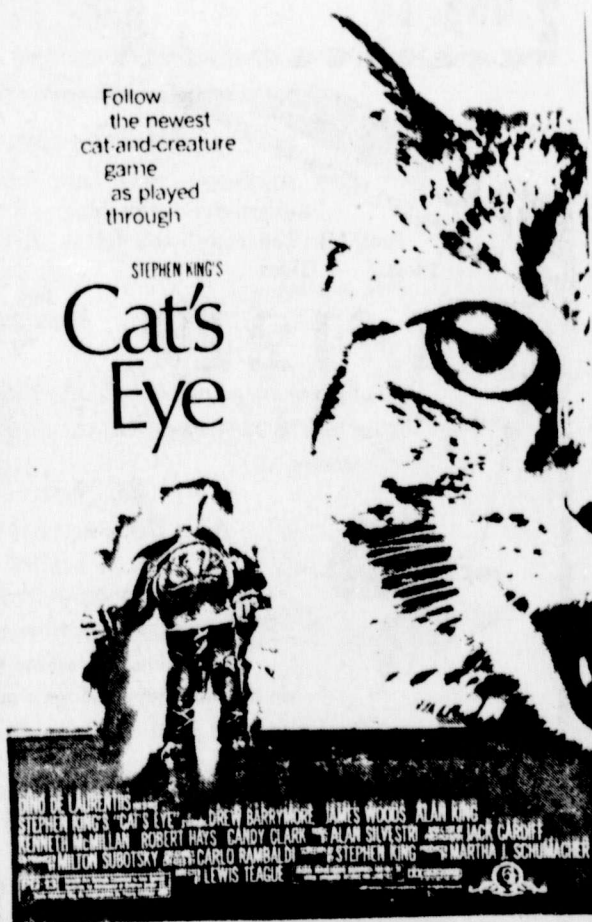

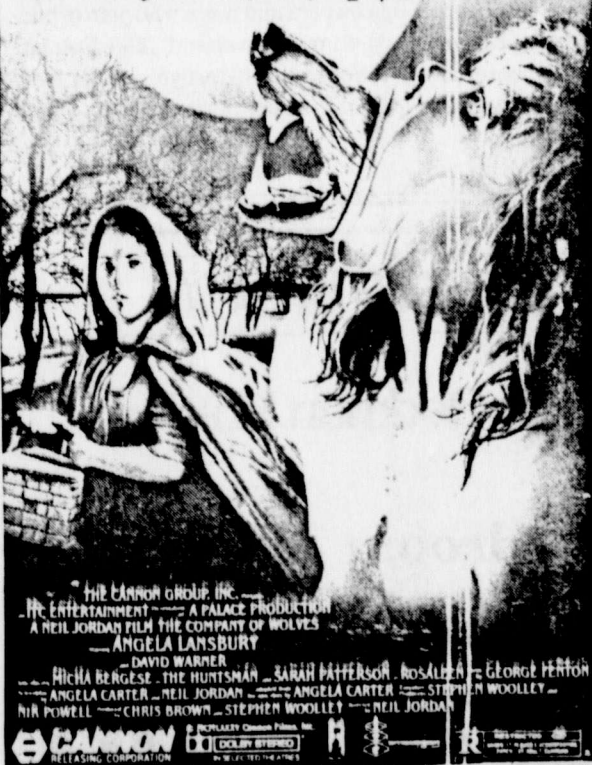

THE BEAUTIFUL COLEUS

The coleus is a tender plant with colored leaves or attractive flowers. They are natives principally of Java and tropical African and belong to the Mint family, Labiateae. Koleos is the Greek for sheath, and refers to the arrangement of the stamens.

The modern varieties of Coleus with brightly colored leaves are descended from C. Blumei, which has bronze-colored, nettle-like leaves. The leaf coloring is very varied and ranges through yellow, pink, red, crimson and green. These plants require a minimum temperature of fifty-five degrees and must be potted in rich, well-drained soil when grown as a house or greenhouse specimens. When used for outdoor summer beds and borders they

thrive in any good soil. They need full sunshine.

To keep pot specimens shapely, the tips of the shoots should be pinched occasionally to promote bushiness. Plants that have filled their containers with roots should receive applications of dilute liquid fertilizers at weekly intervals.

The most important flowering Coleus is C. thyrsoideus, a native of Central Africa and a perennial that grows to a height of three to four feet and bears bright blue flowers of great decorative value. An important point to remember about this plant is that if it becomes necessary to pick off faded leaves this should be done with an upward pull, if a leaf is removed with a downward pull a long piece of the stem will be stripped from the stem and remain

attached to the base of the leaf that is pulled off. Another good flowering species is C. shirensis, which is also a native of Central Africa. It grows about three feet tall and flowers a month or two later than C. thyrsoideus. It, too is a perennial. Its flowers are paler blue than those of C. thyrsoideus.

Coleus Fredericii, a native of Angola, is an annual or biennial kind that has richly colored deep purple flowers

in the early spring. It grows to a height of three to four feet and forms well-branched bushy specimens. The Coleus is best used in this area as border plants for our flower beds and replanted each year or as a pot plant for our homes to add color. Lets color our summer with Coleus.

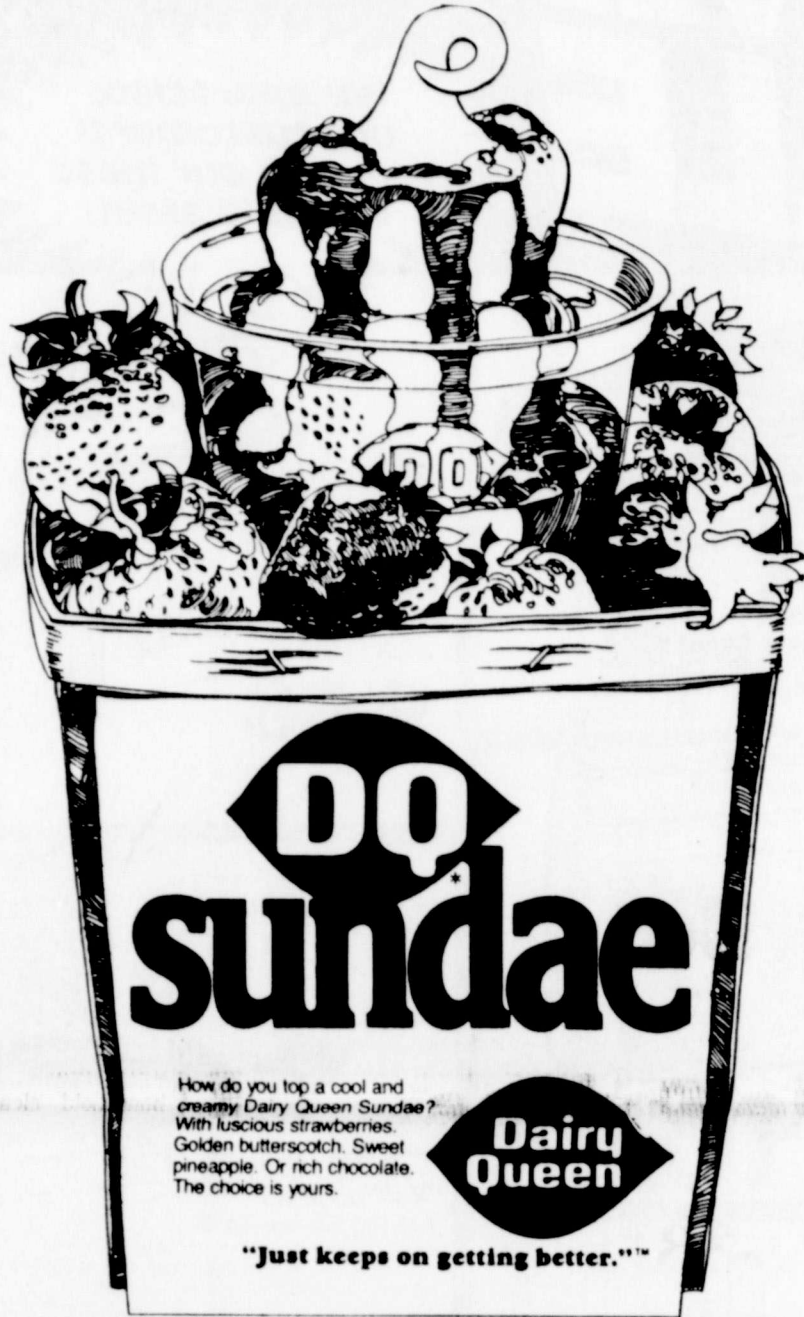

CIVIL DEFENSE?

How did we do?

Good. Bad. So-so. Depends on where you were when the Sunday night storm came through.

With the Abilene television stations reporting radar blips indicating possible tornadoes in Eastland County, there was understandably much concern. The storm brought high winds, hail, rain, and at least one or more tornadic funnels.

Were the citizens properly advised?

As well as possible under the circumstances, it would appear.

The Eastland Fire Department did sound the "take cover" siren warning, based on a telephoned advisory from the Abilene Weather Bureau. (There had been a fire earlier but the siren was not sounded for the fire, Chief Jack Graham reports. The Department presently depends on the individual pagers each fireman wears to report fires.)

The big siren isn't sounded for fires, he said.

Many heard the warning siren - many didn't.

Because of the high wind, rain and hail, many in town just didn't hear the siren. Some heard it faintly and weren't sure whether it was for a fire or for a tornado.

It's apparent that Eastland needs a sounding device in other parts of the town.

Other sources inquired of us as to whether the basement of the courthouse could ever be opened as a possible shelter in the time of local emergency - from weather or other threat.

Our reporters and photographers at the Lake Leon area advised us that Mother's Day undoubtedly saved a lot of lives - there weren't as many families at home as normal.

The reports are that there surely would have been injuries and possibly fatalities had more families been at home when it hit.

A citizen on Daugherty St. said he barely heard the warning siren.

Citizens are unanimous in their praise for the volunteers and law enforcement personnel who were out endangering their own lives to keep track of the weather conditions. The various departments work to gether hand in glove, and report their data to the Central Dispatch.

Additional signalling devices would seem to be a high priority item for each community.

A designated Civil Defense Director (Team) should be empowered in advance to take command in such instances - to signal all warnings, alert radio stations, be prepared to open emergency shelters and generally take positive steps to protect lives.

House Subcommittee Approves Measures to Protect Farm Product Buyers

WASHINGTON, DC - A House agriculture subcommittee last week approved a proposal by Congressman Charles W. Stenholm that would provide protection to purchasers of farm products similar to that afforded purchasers of other products under the Uniform Commercial Code.

Under the current law, if the seller of mortgaged farm commodities fails to repay his lender, the buyer can be held responsible by the banker, effectively forcing the buyer to pay twice for the same goods. Congressman Stenholm said, "It is unfair to purchasers of farm products to be forced into paying twice for those products as a result of circumstances beyond their control, particularly when purchasers of all other products take title free and clear."

The clear title proposal now awaits consideration by the full committee as it takes action on the credit title of the 1985 omnibus farm bill. Congressman Stenholm, along with Congressman Steve Gunderson (R-Wis.), introduced the legislation, H.R. 1591, a month ago. The bill, which now exists as an amendment to the pending farm bill, would give buyers

of farm products clear title to their purchases while still allowing lenders to protect their liens on the products. "Consequently we would establish a system whereby this liability would be more equitably distributed between the three parties," the congressman said. In other Agriculture Committee action, the full committee voted to appoint a task force to study the Stamford Democrat's proposed bases and yields legislation, H.R. 1912. Some members of the committee expressed concern about various portions of the proposal, which would revise the formulas

used to calculate acreage bases and farm program yields. The task force will work out differences and file a report. "Throughout the hearing on H.R. 1912 last week, it was apparent there was a consensus that the reforms contained in this bill are needed. I believe the task force will work to resolve any differences as soon as possible so the full committee may consider their recommendations," Congressman Stenholm concluded.

Kathy Klimkiewicz of the U.S. Bird Banding Laboratory in Laurel, Maryland, urged enthusiasts not to try to find the markings themselves. "First, it takes special equipment to find it, and second, you really have to know what you are looking for," she said. "A bird may be carrying only two or three pinpoint dots of color, but that's enough." Researchers are asking enthusiasts everywhere to salvage wings from any mature martins found dead. Wings from this year's hatch are not wanted. To be useful,

salvaged birds must have spent the winter in Brazil. Klimkiewicz said that to be useful, wings must be handled in a special way. She urged persons to follow these instructions exactly:

1. Salvage wings from adults martins only. Cut wings off at the body.
2. Place each pair of wings in a regular paper envelope and then place that in a heavy kraft envelope for mailing. Do NOT use plastic bags as these hasten decay of specimens.
3. With each pair of wings, place this information: Your name, address, daytime phone number, date wings recovered, location where recovered, and cause of death if known. Then list this federal permit number: PRT-67458. This is very important to make mailing of these wild animal parts legal.
4. Mail to: Kathy Klimkiewicz, Bird Banding Laboratory, Laurel, MD 20708, ATTN: Wing Sample.

For a packet of information about this project, write to: The Nature Society, Purple Martin Junction, Griggsville, IL 62340. This is a cooperative project among The Nature

various parts of the range this spring. But they hope to gain even more information checking wings from martins found dead anywhere in the range. Kathy Klimkiewicz of the U.S. Bird Banding Laboratory in Laurel, Maryland, urged enthusiasts not to try to find the markings themselves. "First, it takes special equipment to find it, and second, you really have to know what you are looking for," she said. "A bird may be carrying only two or three pinpoint dots of color, but that's enough." Researchers are asking enthusiasts everywhere to salvage wings from any mature martins found dead. Wings from this year's hatch are not wanted. To be useful,

salvaged birds must have spent the winter in Brazil. Klimkiewicz said that to be useful, wings must be handled in a special way. She urged persons to follow these instructions exactly:

1. Salvage wings from adults martins only. Cut wings off at the body.
2. Place each pair of wings in a regular paper envelope and then place that in a heavy kraft envelope for mailing. Do NOT use plastic bags as these hasten decay of specimens.
3. With each pair of wings, place this information: Your name, address, daytime phone number, date wings recovered, location where recovered, and cause of death if known. Then list this federal permit number: PRT-67458. This is very important to make mailing of these wild animal parts legal.
4. Mail to: Kathy Klimkiewicz, Bird Banding Laboratory, Laurel, MD 20708, ATTN: Wing Sample.

For a packet of information about this project, write to: The Nature Society, Purple Martin Junction, Griggsville, IL 62340. This is a cooperative project among The Nature

Society, U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and Brazilian Association for Preservation of Wildlife. It was organized by noted Brazilian conservationist Dalgas Frisch. Sponsors hope to correlate winter flocks with North American nesting areas and, ultimately, determine the migration routes they use. The project already has revealed a great amount of new information about the species' winter habits, according to sponsors.

CAPITOL UPDATE

by Jim Parker



The 69th session of the Legislature will go down in history as being the "year of the prosecutor." It seems that virtually any piece of legislation, if billed as a law and order measure, finds a friendly environment with uncontested passage into law.

Before some of you switch to the attack mode and decide I need to be pillared for criticizing law and order legislation, let me explain to you something of criminal justice circumstance that exists in our state. We are operating our prison system under a Federal mandate that deals, at least in part, with prison population limits. Once we reach 95% of capacity, generally speaking, an inmate must be pushed out of the system for each inmate that is taken in. This

puts us in a position of "treading water", and the treading is very expensive and often produces ludicrous results in that we frequently take non-violent, reasonably petty criminals in at the front end and put out hardened, violent, repeat offenders on the back side.

No one seems to be committed to the tax measures required to keep every one in prison for longer periods. TDC's best estimate is that, under current entrance and exit statistics, not counting legislation passed in this session, the population of TDC will be approaching 100,000 by 1990. (To help you visualize this massive number of prisoners, 100,000 is the approximate number of the entire population in Abilene, Texas.)

There is, in my opinion, a middle road that no one has, as yet, indicated a great deal of willingness to travel, and that is to be more selective in what we do with the persons convicted of crimes. I am appalled at the difference in the treatment received by convicted felons, convicted of similar crimes, in different parts of our state. The shocking effect is not necessarily based on any sympathy for the criminal element, but is caused by the total lack of consistency around the state in dealing

with similar offenses.

There is no doubt that fully 2/3 of the prison inmates currently incarcerated would post no great threat to life and limb of the general public and also no doubt that a significant number of people walking our streets are violent, dangerous, and pose a continual threat to society.

Obviously, the difficulty is getting the right people in and the right people out. And the current spate of "law and order" bills do not address the issue but do, in shotgun fashion, serve to aggravate the already untenable situation.

As I have stated before, this is not a liberal issue, but is, in fact, a very conservative issue because every tax dollar spent unnecessarily or ill-advisedly on incarcerating the wrong people in maximum security facilities is one less tax dollar we have to address to other vital state and public interests.

Eastland County Gets It's Share Of 109.2 Million

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Friday sent checks totaling \$109.2 million in local tax payments to the 1,003 cities that levy the one-percent local sales tax.

In Eastland County, Cisco received \$24,212.21 net payment for the May pay period compared to \$28,247.15 for May 1984; there was a -10.58% change in the payments to date between 1984, \$91,373.85, and 1985, \$81,703.99.

Eastland received \$40,034.06 this month compared to \$33,896.94 last year making a 12.76% increase from \$130,081.05 in 1984 to \$146,674.81 in 1985.

Ranger received \$17,787.04 in payments in comparison to \$14,340.98 in 1985 in May with a 18.56% increase in cumulative 1985 payments, \$59,680.61, over \$50,336.05. Gorman received \$4,077.88 this May, \$4,486.63 last May with increased cumulative of 6.22% of \$11,000.40 in 1984 to \$11,684.15 in 1985. Rising Star was issued \$3,137.36 compared with last year's \$2,006.55 with an decrease in cumulative of -20.20% with 1984 payments of \$12,260.68

and 1985 cumulative payments of \$59,680.61. County total payment was \$89,248.55 compared to \$82,978.25 in 1984 with an increase in cumulative payments, from \$295,052.07 in 1984 to \$309,527.29 in 1985.

Houston's check for \$18.3 million was the largest, bringing 1985 payments to \$66.3 million. Dallas received \$13.4 million, pushing payments since January to \$48.9 million. San Antonio's payment was \$6.6 million for a total of \$23.9 million this year.

Austin received \$5.2 million, increasing 1985 payments to \$18.8 million. Fort Worth's payment of \$3.9 million brought this year's total to \$14.3 million. El Paso's check for \$2.3 million increased 1985 payments to \$8.9 million.

Bullock also sent checks totaling \$45.3 million to the state's four Metropolitan Transit Authorities.

Houston's MTA check for \$21.4 million pushed 1985 payments to \$76.8 million. Dallas' DART received \$19.1 million for a total \$66.2 million so far this year. San Antonio VIA's payments of \$3.8 million pushed its yearly total to \$13.2 million. Fort Worth's MTA received \$978,954 for 1985 payments of \$3.4 million.

May checks represent taxes collected on sales made in March and the first quarter and reported to the Comptroller by April 20.
