

The murder trial which began Monday in 91st District Court is expected to take up most of this week.

A jury panel of nine women and three men, sworn in Monday afternoon, began hearing the state's testimony Tuesday morning. Richard Dwaine Gaeta is being tried for murder.

Indications are that the court might work an hour or two later each day, and perhaps Saturday if necessary, to complete the trial, since next Monday is a holiday (Memorial Day) and the courthouse will be clos-

Gaeta, 28, is accused of killing Gailey Johnson "G.J." Carter, 65. Carter's body was found bound and stabbed in a bed room of his home on April 3, 1983.

Gaeta was first tried for capital murder in October, but a mistrial was called. Freed on a \$100,000 bond

Thursday, Gaeta had been in the Eastland County Jail since his first indictment. District Attorney Emory Walton is prosecuting and Gaeta is represented by Eastland Attorney Saul Pullman and Garry Lewellen of Stpehenville.

The Caladium is a tuber, not a bulb, and is native to the banks of the Amazon River in South America. Therefore, it comes to us from the tronic region. There are only 50 cultivars of Caladiums. They are very tolerant to varying light conditions from full sun to deep shade. Since they come from the tropic region, they are subject to cold damge very easily.

The tuber is stored at a temperature of 55 degrees while it is in the dormant state. The minimum low temperature is 50 degrees. When the day temperature reaches 70 degrees and the night temperature stay above 55 degrees, you may plant the Caladium tuber.

The roots grow from the top of the tuber: therefore, plant the tuber upside down and cover with one inch of soil. Plant the supter in moist compost or vernitculite about 10 to 12 inches apart. You may add well rotted cow manure and sand to your planting medium. The Caladium should be fed every two weeks with a well balanced fertilizer wuch as 20-20-20 or a 6-10-5.

Remember to water regularly when the soil becomes dry around the Caladium.

The Caladium may be started in pots inside and transplanted outside as the temperature rises to a safe level. When starting the Caladium in pots, a four-inch pot shall be used along with planting medium described above.

The plants grow about a foot to 18 inches tall. The leaves resemble wet tissue paper texture. All wilted leaves should be removed. The flowers should be removed as they appear since the Caladium is grown are a pale pink and are usually hidden by the foliage.

When frost threatens in the fall, dig up the tubers with the soils and rests as well as the foliage attached. The let them dry in an airy place out of the direct sun for about a week or 10 days or until the foliage can be removed by an easy pull. Then shake the dirt off the roots and dust with a fungicide and store in dry peate moss at a temperature of 55 degrees or above. You may propagate the Caladium not by cutting the tuber and leaving one eye to each piece.

We have been discussing the standard Caladium. The Dward Caladium which reaches only 10 inches tall can be handled in the same manner.

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
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Area News Briefs

Education Must Begin Early

AUSTIN-The dull, business like atmosphere of the current Legislature, which has drawn complaints from Capi-tol-watchers hungry for a little action, was interrupted last week by all the hubbub anyone

could want. Hundreds of University of Texas students, upset with Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby's plan to triple state college tuition, marched five blocks from campus to Capitol and, unluckily for Hobby, cornered him in a hallway

for a 15-minute confrontation. When Hobby escaped into the Senate chamber, the students ran upstairs and filled the Senate gallery, where they heckled and booed as Hobby tried to explain his proposal.

Hobby stuck to his guns, however, and the following day his position was reinforced by the UT Board of Regents. The Texas Student Lobby, which opposes the tuition hike, also sent apologies for the confrontation.

Dead Last

Hobby's proposal would raise in-state tuition from \$4 per semester hour to \$12 and outof-state tuition from \$10 per hour to \$120. Texas is currently ranked 50th-dead lastamong the states in tuition charges.

Before he walked out the back of the Senate chamber, Hobby told students in the gallery, "Texas is so low that if tuition is tripled, Texas would leap up and become 48th."

An important provision of his plan dedicates nine percent for financial aid, as opposed to 25 percent included in a House

Scuffling Match

As if the student protest weren't enough excitement, the next day a representative and a senator, both from Houston, got into a scuffling match by the tourist desk just outside the governor's door.

The governor, who was with them when the finger-pointing and lapel-grabbing began, retreated into his nearby offices. A third lawmaker stepped in just as blows were about to be exchanged and broke it up, leading the senator away from

The subject of the argument was of minor importance: whether one of them had requested an attorney general's legal opinion regarding minority contracting by the City of Houston. But it's the local issues which can provoke some heated debates, as demonstrated once again.

In The House

On a more positive note, the House voted last week to:

Increase the penalty on checks returned for insufficient funds, up to three times the amount when the writer of a hot check refuses to pay.

Give committee approval to a \$200 million fee hike package on items such as wrestling and boxing permits, personalized license plates and vehicle inspection fees.

-Offer a \$96.1 million package of enticements to bring a battleship home port to the Texas coast.

Senate Action

Meanwhile, their colleagues in the Senate acted to:

-Allow police officers to use deadly force when assaulted by persons armed with modern electric "stun" guns.

-Let state banks charge a "reasonable fee" between \$18 and \$24 each year to credit card customers. This bill affecting only in-state banks' attempts to give consumers a break by eliminating interest charges where the account is paid off monthly.

-Give the state the right to enter privately-owned land in order to gain access to landlocked state tracts to develop minerals.

—Apply the death penalty to mass and serial murderers.

-Include gang rape as an aggravated offense under the sexual assault statute, punishable from five years to life imprisonment.

—Give committee approval to a bill which directs the State Board of Education to consider shortening the six weeks eligibility period of the controversial "no pass, no play" rule.

The bill also provides for suspension or expulsion of students for assault, possession of weapons, drugs or alcohol, or chronic bad behavior.

Mattox Opinion

Texas Attorney General Jim Mattox filed a lawsuit last week seeking a special master to oversee the charity operations of a Houston hospital for the poor.

Mattox charged that theft and mismanagement of money from the multi-million dollar Hermann Hospital Estate has occurred, presumably by some of the directors and executives of the hospital.



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

Crime Stoppers **Most Wanted**

MONAHANS, Teaxs - Merchants in this friendly west Texas community described the couple as "nicely dressed" with "outgoing personalities"

Law enforcement officals describe the couple as slick bad check writers who took MOnahans for more than \$7,000 during a weekend spree early in April.

This week Gerald Arlington Poole III and Jasmine Elizando Poole have been added to the Texas Most Wanted list as a result of warrants issued for them in Ward County. They are charged with theft over \$750 and less than \$2,000. Ms. Poole is also charged with theft over \$750 and less than \$2,000 in connection with the disapearence of some money from a local tavern.

Rewards up to \$1,000 each are being offered by Texas Most Wanted for information leading to the capture of the fugitives.

In addition to his problems in Monahans, detectives say Poole is also wanted by Ector County authorities in Odessa, Texas, for bond forefeiture in connection with still more bad check charges

Poole is described as a white male, 41, 6-1, 190 pounds, with brown eyes and brown hair streaked with gray. He may be growing a mustache and a beard. Ms. Poole is a white female, 29, 5-3, 150 pounds, with hazel eyes and brown hair. The pair was last seen in a light brown 1977 Pontiac Bonneville with Texas Plates

PBY-45 Sgt Ellis Butler of the Ward County Sheriff's Department says that on that weekend of April 5 "almost every major business in Monahans" was stung by the fallout of bad checks.

3 Video cassette recorders, 1 Television set, 3 Pistols, 2 expensive watches, 2 rings, clothing and auto tires were purchased during the twoday spree.

Sgt. Bulter said several private individuals were also victimized by the bad checks.

Detectives also want to talk to Ms. poole about the theft of weekend bar receipts at the Eagle Lodge, which amounted to \$1,835.97. Ms. Poole was working at the lodge until April 5.

Officals say this is'nt Gerald Poole's first brush with the law.

They say since 1962, Poole has been arrested by a variety of police departments in Texas, Lousiana and Nevada on charges ranging from bad checks and auto thft and burglary.

Sgt. Butler says Poole has a long string of aliases, including Jerry Kennedy and Terry Patterson as well as variations of his real last name.

Aline Berry never wore a fur coat, drove a Cadillac or had hot water. What my mother did was kill rattlesnakes with a hoe-in the garden, in the back yard, and once in the house. Mama washed clothes on a rub board by the cistern, and made lye soap in a big black kettle in the back yard. She also made sausage in a hand-turned grinder when Daddy and the other men butchered a hog; and she "pieces" many quilts.

When it was time for fried chicken, Mama would wring the hen's neck until its head popped off, and the headless chicken did a frenzied dance in the back yard.

Mama's a survivor. She got her grit from her Primitive Baptist circuit preacher father and her patient pioneer stock mother (of French and Indian heritage)-the late Elder and Mrs. C.L. Casey of Cisco.

Married during the Depression, she and Daddy moved in 1938 to the place where she still lives. That is home-the gathering place for the clan. The clan consists of four children and their families. Her children are:

Mrs. Henry (Georgia) Burkman of Lueders; Mrs. Frank (Shirley) Strawn of Abilene;

Mrs. Bill (Margaret) McDowell of Fort Worth; and Mr. Cherry Lee Berry of Arlington.

Mama's a giving person. She gave me whiskey and sugar for the whooping cough-and castor oil for everything else! Mama's a giving person in other ways-During our teen years, she never bought herself a new coat, but bought my sisters and me one every year or two, and she-being the same size-wore our hand-me-downs.

During the 1950's, when I finished high school and worked in Abilene I rode the Greyhound bus home every weekend. I'd leave Abilene with my tin suitcase full of dirty clothes and return with it full of clean ones. Mama did more than my laundry on weekends. On at least two occasions, she spent Saturday night making pretty party dresses for the next week.

Mama still puts other first. When she cooks for the clan, she sits back while everyone else eats; and when she can be persuaded to eat at the same time, she takes the less desirable piece of

When we take her out to eat, she's careful to order the least expensive item, and skip the salad bar or anything that would add to the cost.

Mama will be 75 this summer, but Mama will never be old to her children, her grandchildren, or her two great-granddaughters.

Mama didn't have to say "I love you" in words very often-She proved her love by her actions years ago, and she proves it now. (And Mama, we love you.)

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

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
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
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Drilling Bits

At a location two miles north of Eastland, Advance Exploration has completed the No. 3 Hogan "A" in Eastland County's Reb Field.

The well pumped 35 barrels of 43-gravity oil per day along with 100 barrels water.

With drillsite in the H&TC Survey, A-300, the well was drilled to a total depth of 3,910 feet. It will produce from a set of perforations in the Marble Falls Formation, 3,433 to 3,453 feet into the hole.

AMV Operating, Inc. has abandoned an undrilled loction in Eastland County's AMV Field, six miles southeast of Eastland. The well had been designated as the No. 1 Pope.

Operating out of Duncanville, North Ridge Corp. has staked location for the No. H.L. Gibson, a developmental well in the Eastland Regular Field, one mile northwest of Eastland. With projected total depth of 4,000 feet, the venture is in a 160-acre lease in the H&TC Survey, A-307, Eastland County.

Allstate Petroleum Operations of Early is preparing to make hole for a 2,990-ft. developmental well in Eastland County, six miles northwest of Rising Star. The venture is in the Eastland Regular Field. The operator has 80 acres under lease, with drillsite in the ETRR Survey, A-2089. The well will be known as the No. 1 Beggs.

Three 1,2000-ft. wildcat wells are planned by Browner Development Group of Abilene at a location one mile northwest of Rising Star, Eastland County. The wells will be spudded in a 100-acre lease in the ETRR Survey, A-89. The wells will be known as the No. 21 Brawner, the No. 25 Brawner, and the No. 26

An unsuccessful wildcat has been written off as a dry hole in Eastland County, four miles northeast of Romney. The well probed to a dry bottom at 1,240 feet total depth. Bill C. Burns was the operator. The well had been designated as the No. 1 B.D. Hagan.

Pumping 30 barrels 41.5-gravity oil per day with 60 barrels water, the No. 1 Woods Heirs has been brought on line in the Ranger Field, Eastland County,

Pendragon Oil Co. has finaled a new producer in Eastland County's Reb Field, pumping 30 barrels 40-gravity oil daily with 102 barrels water. Drillsite was in the McClennan CSL No. 364 Survey, A-367, five miles east of Eastland

The well is designated as the No. 1 McClesky.



The Texas Senate Finance Committee has amended a bill to set a fee on all state oil and gas production. The "regulation fee", offered as a substitute by Sen. Grant Jones (D-Abilene) for a proposed well completion fee, is part of a \$220 million fee package offered to meet the revenue needs of the state during the next two years.

If adopted, the bill would repeal the current 3/16-cent per barrel production tax on oil and replace it with a 1.6-cents per barrel regulatory fee. In addition, the bill tags all Texas produced natural gas with a

Although oil operators continue to insist that their industry already pays more than its fair share of taxes and fees, all seem pleased that the Senators have rejected the completion fee concept. These fee proposals would have cost \$,8000 for certain wells, and the independent operators would have been hit particularly hard. A production fee is considered to be more equitable and broad based.

Joe Hanna - now a legislative representative for Texas Independent Producers and Royalty Owners and regional oil and gas associations - for his public service. A resolution was adopted unanimously in which Hanna was recognized for his 13 years of legislative work.

Known for his zeal and hard work, he was Chairman of the Energy Resources Committee in the 66th Legislature, and served on a total of 14 committees during his career," the resolution reads in part.

The Association planned the field day to help pecan growers identify and control pecan insects and diseases.

The subject of the field day will be pecan insect and disease control. County Agent De Gordon says Dr. Chip Lee, Extension Plant Patholoist and Dr. Jesse Cocke, Extension

tomologist will discuss pecan nut casebearers, pecan scab and other pecan pests. Recommended controls for 1985 will be discussed. Following the presentation the group will tour the Boch orchard.

vice serve people of all ages regardless of socio-economic level, race, color, sex, religion or natural origin.

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Pecan Growers Look Out For Casebearers

Pecan growers in Eastland County as well as homeowners with backyard trees need to be on the lookout for casebearers-those perennial pests that can completely destroy a pecan crop if not controlled.

Based on various prediction models as well as trappings and scouting reports, casebearers should be showing up on pecan trees in Eastland County on or about May 25 says DeMarquis Gordon, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

Normally, casebearers damage nuts within a twoweek period-starting the first week of May in southern and coastal areas and the first week of June in northern and western sections of the state.

To Serve You Better

To time spray applications for casebearer control, first check for eggs on a daily basis. Eggs are usually found on the tips of nutlets and are about the size of the ball in a ball-point pin. The eggs are white when first laid, then turn red over a tree-to-five day period before turning white again

and hatching.

Apply an insecticide the third day after the first eggs to kill the larvae before they enter the nutlets. Since the larvae will hatch over a week long period or more, a second spraying may be necessary, says Gordon. He suggests that pecan growers, who are unable to detect the casebearer eggs, spray their trees sometime between May 25 and May 30.

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


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
