### HALL OF REMARKS BY HERREL HALLMARK

WITH A LOT of talk still going on about the traintruck accident in Eastland last week, a lot of thinking has been done on how lucky the entire area was that there were no tragedies. Also area officials have been praised for their quickness in getting people out of the area and keeping people from the scene.

A timely article appeared in the May edition of The Electric Times, a magazine published for employees of West Texas Utilities. It is entitled: Bystanders Can Turn Bad to Worse.

Fortunately, in the Eastland accident there have been no reports of bystanders getting in the way. However, the article helps you to know how to react in the future if another

catastrophe happens. The article is as follows:

Curiosity seekers at the scene of an accident have made a bad situation worse in literally hundreds of cases by causing more mishaps braking suddenly, parking unsafely or walking around in the way of professionals trying to help - according to the National Safety Council

Many times onlookers themselves are hurt by the misfortune they are gawking at. An accident scene is a dangerous place for a

curious onlooker to tarry. The sooner you can get away, the safer you'll be.

Still, there may be times when you can be of genuine assistance and perhaps save a life. It's important to judge when and to know what to do. Too many variables make it difficult to set hard and fast rules, but experts agree on this general advice:

1. If you are first at the scene, park carefully, well away from traffic, and do what you can to help. If you're trained in first aid, treat the injured to the best of your ability. If you're sure you can do so without compounding injuries, or if there is likelihood of a fire, remove the victims as far as practical from the vehicles. If you can do nothing else, drive to a telephone and ask the operator to put you in touch with the nearest police

command. 2. If you're at the scene when the professionals arrive, get out of their way, offer to help and obey their in-

structions. 3. If you come upon an accident that already has emergency personnel at the scene, keep moving. Slow down so you have instant control of your car, but don't stop to gape. Mentally put yourself in the victim's

4. If you hear about an accident on the radio for example, avoid the area. By the time you hear the news, the officials have already taken charge and there'll be nothing you can do to help. Going there just for curiosity's sake will do more harm than good, and you may be among the losers.

As everyone should be aware, the City's water tower is now, and has been, out of service for the last 25 days because of the reconditioning and repainting of both the interior and exterior of the tower. While the tower is out of service it is necessary for the City to supply water and maintain pressure by only running the high service pumps at the College Hill Pump Station. To accomplish this the pumps must run 24 hours a

## Citizens Attend City **Public Hearing Here**

Approximately 19 citizens attended the second public hearing conducted by the city on the purposes and development of a Community Development Block Grant Application. To comply with regulations, the hearing was held in the area to be affected by the application.

Cisco Mayor Eris Ritchie expressed his gratitude to the Greater St. Marks Baptist Church, located on Bedford Street, and to Howard Shelton for allowing the city to hold the public hearing, as well as the regular council meeting, at the church. Despite the hot weather, the building was very comfortable with good air condition-

City Manager Mike Moore stated the council received some very good input from the people attending the meeting. However, Mr. Moore said the council tried to stress to the people that although Cisco has a very good application, the city will be competing with about 30 other cities for the grant. Probably only three or four will receive funding.

If awarded, the grant in the amount of \$400,000 will be used to upgrade water and sewer lines improve streets and tear down 12 vacant structures in the area. The area involved is located north of the railroad tracks, west of Highway 183, east of Highway 6, and south of the city limits.

Following the public hearing, the council approved the resolution authorizing the filing of the application with the Texas Department of Community Affairs for the grant. City manager Moore sent the grant application to Austin Wednesday.

Sealed bids were opened Tuesday night for the sell of surplus property by the city. Property up for bids included a pickup, a front end loader, and the old Lake Patrol boat, trailer and motor. Only one bid was received and it was for the front-end loader. The loader was sold in the amount of \$150 to Leon Boles, since the bid was in the form of a sealed bid.

The city also approved an assessment contract with Eastland County Appraisal District to allow the county unit to do the city's tax assessments for the 1985-86 tax year.







It is Friday, May 24, the time is 1:20 p.m. when the telephone rang in the home of Roy Cartee, Eastland Red Cross County Grover Chariman. Hallmark, Eastland County Red Cross treasurer, was calling to inform Mr. Cartee a catastrophe had occured in Eastland.

By 1:30 p.m. the territory headquarters in Wichita Falls had been advised and Mr. Cartee asked for a disaster representative to be sent to Eastland. At 1:40 p.m. the Abilene Red Cross was committed to supply vans and a canteen truck, plus staff. At 1:50 p.m. the Brownwood Red Cross volunteer disaster team was committed to send first aid supplies, vans and a canteen. 2:00 p.m. Wichita Falls advised a Red Cross disaster specialist was on his way and that the Ft. Worth Professional team would be supplying a communication system.

The chairman and the treasurer met at Eastland City Hall where Mr. Cartee was briefed as to the number of evacuated, nursing home residents were being moved,

In Texas, a Museum Doesn't Need Art: Try a Famous Toad **Exhibits Honor Cereal Bowls**,

Mutants, Matador's Socks; 'Salute to the Coke Bottle'

museum built around Lee Harvey Oswald's can opener.

Plus a shrine to Rip the Horned Toad, probably the only reptile invited to the White House by Calvin Coolidge. And Miss Hattle's, : museum dedicated to the best in Lone Stir brothels. And the Koliha Pencill Collecton, all 80,000 of them.

Texans love to boast, and their museums show it. Places such as the Cowgirl Hall of Fame and the Confederate Research Center and Audie Murphy Gun Museum are products of a state impressed by its own vast size, frontier heritage, natural wealth and history as an independent republic. In a state so prone to braggadocio that ranches are measured in "Rhode Islands," museums inevitably are different, too.

"Texans love the bizarre," says Ann Ruff, an authority on Lone Star museums and monuments who runs a motel in Llano, "They want to perpetuate the myth that everything in Texas is bigger, better or

everything in Texas is bigger, better or stranger."

Marking the Spot

In preserving the past, Texas doesn't stop at museums. It is adding to its 9,000 historical markers at the rate of more than one a day, showing where lucky prospectors found oil, where unlucky settlers lost caips and where the final spike completed the second transcontinental railroad. Giant statues honor a strawberry in Potect and a mule in Muleshoe, a rattlesnake in Freer and a roadrunner in Fort Stockton, a pecan in Seguin and a peanut in Pearsall.

Museums are everywhere, from crowded restaurants near Dallas and Houston expressways to outbuildings on isolated ranches. Almost every tiny Texas burg has one, often just a gimmick for luring tourists to diners and curio shops. About 500 museums are listed in the official Texas travel handbook. Some towns even brag about how many they have; Marshall, population 24,921, promotes its 95 museums and historic sites on billhoards.

Texas museums run into problems never faced by the Smithsonian. When Moe Spradley loses a tiny earplug from an exhibit at the Moe Spradley Telephone MucCiregor, he doesn't blame thieves. "I think one of the grandchildren must've ate it," he grouses. Museum security can be tough when the museum is in your backyard.

Machismo is a ublemitous feature. Visi-

your backyard.

Machismo is a ubiquitous feature. Visitors to El Paso's Del Camino Restaurant and Motel and Builflight Museum can savor prime rib while studying photos of wildeyed builts stomping and goring hapless matador: The dining room also is resplendent with lisplays of builfighter costumes, right dow.. to one matador's soiled socks. The museum's manager, Jorge Bate, scrambles over a booth to point out a gaping hole in the hip of one uniform. "Here's where he got gored," he says delightedly.

Even grisly photos apparently don't up-set the Texan appetite. One shows a stag-gering matador, trying to hold his insides on the inside, beneath a sign reading "why matadors pray before the builtight." Says Mr. Bate: "It ties in great with having steak in the restaurant."

History Made Better

Texans, who prefer their bravado unchittered with facts, don't mind a little historical revisionism. A film at the Texas Ranger Hall of Fame in Waco ballyhoos the state police, saying, "Had it not been for the Texas Rangers, there might not be a Texas." The film glosses over a 1919 investigation into allegations of gurder, torture and spying by the Rangers, though the scandals are noted in an out-of-the-way exhibit.

Tall tales reach new heights at San An tonio's Fuckhorn Hall of Horns, a helter-skelter collection of stuffed deformed ani-mals, preserved elephant feet and trophies of nearly every species in the wild. The collection was largely amassed at a now-defunct bar where a set of antiers was good for two beers. Now housed at the Lone Star brewery in San Antonio—home of the "National Beer of Texas"—the ex-hibit also includes a bottle-cap collection and portraits done in rattlesnake rattles. On a recent afternoon, guide Melvin 'Fuzzy' Plunkett regales some Norwod, Ohio, senior citizens with his spiel about a stuffed six-foot rattlesnake (a "Texas worm"), an eight-foot narwhal tusk (a stuned six-foot rattlessnake ta "Texas worm"), an eight-foot narwhal tusk (a "Texas toothpick") and tales of how Theodore Rossevelt trained troops in San Antonio for the Spanish-American War. "Teddy got some Texas cowboys, took 'em down to Cuba and whupped up on the Spaniards," he declared.

declares. Mr. Plunkett describes Slamese-twin sheep as an eight-legged, three-eared mu-tant genetically designed by Texas scien-tists to outfox coyotes. "How clever!" one woman whispers.

woman whispers.
Nothing is too small to be rendered larger than life. Readers of "Ripiey's Believe It or Not" may recall Rip the Horner Toad, a wondrous reptile who supposedly awakened from a 31-year sleep in 1928 after he was buried alive in the cornerstone

awakened from a 31-year sleep in 1928 after he was buried alive in the cornerstone of the Eastland County courthouse. Today, Rip is among Eastland's most honored dead, sitting stiffly in an eight-inch, velvet-lined open casket inside a glass showcase in the courthouse lobby. (Rip collapsed and died soon after his audience with Fresident Coolidge.) "Yep, that's one famous toad," observes James Wright, the manager of the local Chamber of Commerce.

When Junk piles up in closets, most people hold garage sales; in Texas, they open a museum and charge \$1 a head. Try visiting Texas Bob Reinhardt's Ardt Showcase, a bizarre collection of Rootie Kazootie comic books, Howdy Doody cereal bowls, some 300 Pez candy dispensers and the ever-popular Tarzan ties and underwear, all housed in a maze of dusty, darkened storerooms behind a hotel in Fort Davis. Tours are led by Texas Bob himself, the 38 year-old hotel maintenance man. Accompanied by theme songs from dozens of ancient television shows, he dons a fedora and shines a flashlight on his "salute to the Coke bottle," snapshots of Texas Bob with comedian Soupy Sales (his hero), and a pyramid of Bieentennial soda cans forming a portrait of Uncle Sam.

Nothing in the nuseum is peculiarly Texan, but then Texas Bob is from New Jersey. "Would you call this demented?" he asks.

Texans unabashedly honor old institu-

Texans unabashedly honor old institutions that other people might prefer to
hide. Miss Hattie's, an elegant brothel on
San Angelo's main street until its closing
in 1946, is preserved right down to the peop
hole with a view of the bed of one "Miss
Blue." You could never separate a Texas
cowboy from his boots, and so the foot of
every bedspread is covered with olicloth.
Owner Evelyn Hill, who uses the museum
to attact customers to her antiques store
downstairs, has even kept some of Miss
Hattle's handwritten notes, tacked to the
wall and announcing such sentiments as
"we believe in the flag and womenhood."

hood."
Unfortunately, not all Texas shrines are in good shape. The site of the state's first oil well, off a dirt road deep in an East Texas pine forest, is distinguished by little more than an oily creek, a sludge-filled pipe and a builet-riddled historical marker. Maybe it's because the site is eclipsed by the nearby East Texas Oil Museum, a monument to H.L. Hunt built by the late billionaire's family. Or perhaps it's because the well was quickly abandoned as a poor producer.

Now, about that can opener owned by Lee Harvey Oswald, a big figure in Texas museums. (Odessa established a presidential museum 20 years ago to soothe regret that President Kennedy was killed in Texas, and the Dallas County Historical Commission is turning the sixth floor of the infamous Texas Schoolbook Deposition.

AUSTIN—Going into the fi-nal week, the business-like Texas Legislature showed all signs of avoiding a major tax increase, something that many said a few months ago could not be done.

All budget hopes rested in conference committee which is trying to work out \$400 million worth of differences between the versions passed by the House and Sen-

The conferees once again are reviewing state agency budgets, searching for fat to trim, but one major issue is whether to give state employees a raise, and how much.

The House approved a three percent increase, the Senate provided none.

The governor has wisely avoided being drawn into the fray by groups wanting him to veto any budget without/a built-in pay hike.

"I'm not promising any vetos," he said. "We're trying to pass good legislation.

Blue Law Repeal

The Texas Blue Law moved closer to repeal when the Senate tacked on several amendments and sent it back to the House for concurrence.

The new law would allow Sunday sales for all products except automobiles. Present law bans the sale of 42 items on consecutive weekend days.

The measure, if it becomes law, is expected to add some \$24 million or more in sales tax revenues to state coffers strapped for cash.

Rural retailers fought the measure, and Biblical warnings of punishment for Sunday toilers were scattered throughout the debate. But the argument won out that new lifestyles, where both parents work in many families, make the old tradition burdensome.

**Buckled Seats Belts** 

The House approved legislation which is sure to set many Texans to grumbling: a mandatory buckled seat belt law.

The good news for the grumblers is the new law would apply only to persons in the front seat. The bad news is a \$25 to \$50 fine if you're caught unbuckled.

A federal order has mandated that two-thirds of the U.S. population be protected through seat belt laws or installed air bags by 1989. Seat belts are cheaper.

Texas lawmakers, wary of the wrath of Texas pick-up truck drivers, tried to exempt certain types of trucks from the requirement with what came to be dubbed "the Bubba amendment.

Bubba may think he's got a right to drive 75 mph and drink a six-pack of beer driving into the sunset. But Bubba doesn't have the right to injure you or himself on the highway. We outlawed suicide a long time ago," said Bill Messer, the sponsor.

State officials last week signed an agreement to end the costly prison system lawsuit and send it to the federal further.

Parker was accused of criminal drug and pornography offenses, but claimed innocence. Earlier this year, Parker

was indicted on porno and prostitution charges, but a state judge threw out the charges on grounds of improper grand jury conduct.

Last week's ruling marked the end of a second attempt by the local district attorney's office to try Parker. The DA said he will not pursue it





### Evacuation Spoils Produce, Weekend For Hamilton's

Among the losses in Eastland the disater loss at the Hamilton Fruit Market. 811 West Main, is significant.

Hamiltons, a family owned and operated establishment, has been called the last "old fashioned" produce market between Fort Worth and Abilene.

There Herman Hamilton, a lifelong produce man, buys and sells the best fruits. vegetables and melons he can find anywhere. The store does a wholesale as well as retail business. Herman's wife, Ruth, his daughter-inlaw Laura and another employee assist.

The 150 by 125 ft. building also houses many bedding and potting plants. Almost any time of the year Herman can be seen watering these flowers and vegetable plants under the covered sheds.

At 10 a.m. Friday, May 24 Herman Hamilton was stirring about as usual between customers and the telephone. Two big trucks of produce had just pulled in for the weekend trade. Another was partially unloaded.

The blast did no damage to the market, which had a number of customers. Some were looking at the big fresh California strawberries Herman was featuring.

Ruth Hamilton rushed back from downtown, but the

situation did not appear threatening to the Market. Business continued as usual until 12:30 p.m., when Police came up West Main with a loudspeaker.

Everyone evacuate immediately!" They said.

The Hamiltons closed the store and drove in a truckk to Cisco to the home of their son, Dwight. At 4 p.m. they decided to return home, understanding that the area of evacuation ended on Ammerman Street.

Their store was on the east side of Ammerman, but their home was on the west side across Main Street. This put it just out of the restricted

When they got east of Bobby's Burgers the road was blocked. Herman talked with the officer in charge, and he said he would get permission to let the Hamiltons go home. He left at 5 p.m. and did not return

About night, after 31/2 hrs. waiting on the road, the Hamiltons tried again to get home. Other people, they saw, were in the same situa-

This time the road was blocked at Alsups, one block from the house. An officer said he would contact the Eastland Chief of Police, and when he talked with Chief Lyndall Underwood this officer gave permission for the

Hamiltons to go to their house.

As they reached their home Herman began to wonder if he could get any of his produce in coolers, and also water his plants. He looked at the store - cornering right across the road realizing that a lot of the proceeds of his life's work was ruining right there before his

He called Mayor Marshall, asking if there was any possible way he could go to the store for a short while to save his things.

The Mayor called Chief Lyndall Underwood, who came to the Hamilton home. The Hamiltons report that Underwood was very gracious about it, but he would not give permission.

There was not much rest for the Hamiltons Friday night or Saturday. Customers and wholesalers some from a distance - called by phone or came to their home, hoping to obtain produce. Herman explained that there was nothing he could do.

They were not permitted to cross the street until late Saturday, when the blockade was lifted.





## One Of The Team

Ken's Motorcycle Shop on East Main is about back to normal, with people coming in from across the county to look at cycles, parts, and accessories

But the public is not apt to let Kenneth Chapman, the owner, forget that he finished patching the ruptured hydroflouric tank car after that May 24 derailment.

Ken, age 30, is inclined to brush it off as no big deal.

"Other welders in the area could have done the same thing," he says. "I just happened to be there at the right time.'

The set of circumstances which brought him to his "right time" actually began on the stockfarm where he grew up, nine miles north of Putnam. There he learned to do about everything on the place, including welding.

After graduation from High School he came to Eastland and worked for the Perkins Implement Co. for five years, doing some welding there. In 1978 he put in his Cycle Shop down the street, and there has been quite a bit of welding connected with it.

On the morning of the explosion he took his little girl and four-year-old Victoria Jimenez from the blast area, closed the shop, and went out of the restricted area to his home.

At 1 a.m. Saturday Mark Pipkin of the Eastland Volunteer Fire Department called Ken and asked if he would come down to his shop. Some people from Western Hazardous Chemicals Co. needed to construct a steel patch for a car which was leaking hydroflouric acid.

Ken worked with the men at his Cycle Shop until about 3 a.m., constructing a 26 in.-diameter patch made of steel. Then he went with them to the blast site, planning to stand by if needed.

Texas, California and New York lead the nation in the number of advertisements for fraudulent health items carried in publications, according to a recent Food and Drug (FDA) study.

As a result of a survey of the nation's newspapers and magazines the FDA identified advertising for fraudulent items in publications ranging from the small weekly newspapers to multimillion-circulation magazines.

According to the FDA, weight-loss products are the most popular items being promoted by fraud artists. Body wraps, sauna suits, waist wraps and vibrating belts are among the items heavily advertised.

Yet, there is no scientific or clinical evidence to support the use of these devices for controlling weight. There is also no data to back up promoter's claims that these products will eliminate cellulite and bulging fat, make spot reduction possible

or control appetite. Diet pills are another

widely advertised health fraud. The "grapefruit pill" diet accounted for almost half of the weight loss ads surveyed in the FDA study.

Hair restoration schemes for restorers or clinics are next in popularity to diet hoaxes the study shows. However, the FDA has advised consumers that no product has ever been approved as safe and effective for preventing baldness or restoring hair.

Other advertisements included those for wrinkle removers, hypnosis plans, and offers of quick ways to treat heart disease, arthritis, alcoholism, depression and high blood pressure. In addition to wasting millions of dollars on these products, consumers may not be receiving the legitimate health care they

The FDA is now listing product recalls, seizures and other regulatory actions in its weekly Enforcement Report. In addition to taking regulatory or legal actions against the promoters of these products, they hope to do a little advertising of their own to warn consumers about health frauds.

Another thing that sounds so easy and tempting ... pop a piece of candy in your mouth before meals and your appetite mysteriously disappears. It must be a dieter's dream! Actually, there's not much of a secret to the various appetitecontrol diet candies, lozenges and gums on the market.

They contain corn syrup or sugar and the local anesthetic benzocaine, a common ingredient in first aid creams and sprays. Benzocaine numbs the taste buds and decreases the dieter's pleasure in eating. The corn syrup or sugar causes a sudden increase in blood sugar levels and temporarily reduces hunger symptoms.

You can get the same effect without numbing your tongue and taste, by eating a caramel (just one), or juices high in carbohydrates, such as grape or prune juice.

These aids may help you get started on a diet, and






