AUSTIN—On the last day of the session, the Legislature passed a \$38.6 billion budget, and while lawmakers avoided a \$1.2 billion deficit crisis, they didn't sidestep a special session called to provide health care

Less than an hour after the midnight gavel banged final adjournment, Gov. Mark White announced he was calling legislators back into session immediately to consider unfinished

Three days later, the Legislature approved a \$70 million health care plan for the poor. The money comes out of general revenue and contingency funds controlled by the gov-ernor, and does not call for a

tax hike. Although the plan was sup-ported by Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby and House Speaker Gib Lewis. the bill died in the final three minutes of the regular session when an opposition legislator talked it to death.

The bill provides that the state will pay for health care for the very poor, and for expanded medical services for mothers, infants and the elderly. County governments will be reimbursed for costs.

#### Indigent Plea Heard

Of course, the poor were naturally for the bill, but so were many rural hospita boards strained financially by

indigent patients. Finding funds for the pro-gram was the major problem because few lawmakers were willing to vote for another tax increase. Most of them, in fact were careful to avoid even the appearance of voting for a tax increase, so scared are they of voter reaction.

When someone proposed latching onto an eight-cent cigarette tax that the feds are rumored to be repealing, most legislators, and especially Gov. White, were uncertain and

slow to act. Hence the delays in bringing the program to a floor

An Election Issue? But once the budget was ssed, the extra money was found to pay for the program, and a tax increase was avoided.

In the early hours of the special session, the indigent care plan threatened to be the election issue of On one hand, Mark White

and the Democrats, including most of the rural conservatives, had revived and advocated the program.
On the other, the Republicans had fought it all along in the belief they were avoiding a tax increase.

### "Sherlock Holmes" To Open 1985 Season

Is it a dective story? Is it a comedy? Is it a romance? The answer to all three questions is a resounding "yes!," according to the theatre director Philip Craik. The opening play of the 1985 Summer Dinner Theatre Season is the original and worldfamous SHERLOCK HOLMES by Arthur Conan Doyle and William Gillette. But don't come expecting to see a murder mystery like Agatha Christi's THE MOUSETRAP or TEN LIT-TLE INDIANS. When Gillette approached Arthur Conan Doyle about making a play adaptation of his famous Sherlock Holmes detective stories, Conan Doyle was thoroughly fed-up with the Holmes character. It seems that he had literary aaspirations other than writing detective stories, but the book-buying public was only intested in Sherlock Holmes, and he had been forced out of economic necessity to contine writing detective stories until he loathed them. So when Gillette asked if Conan Doyle minded his introducing a love interest for Holmes, Conan Doyle is said to have responded "Fine, marry him off, kill him, do whatever you want." It should be noted however, that Gillette was very discreet, and although his play is both a comedy and a romance, he has stayed true to the characterizations of the original stories. In fact, much of the humor in the play is inherent in the original as any Holmes afficiando will tell you. It is a stylist kind of humor the entire family can enjoy. Technically, SHERLOCK

HOLMES presents some major challenges for the intimate ROOF GARDEN DINNER THEATRE in that there are five different settings. In any other theatre this would be challenging, but in a theatre created in an adapted ballroom with virtually no backstage space, it required some very imaginative planning. The answer in the past to multiset shows has been the use of roll-drops and sets on rolling reversible wagons. The solution for this play will be a revolving stage on a large turntable. This marks the first time a revolved has been used in the Roof Garden Theatre. With five different settings a large cast of 18 to outfit in Victorian costume, SHERLOCK HOLMES represents one of the greatest technical challenges to date.

The leading roles in SHERLOCK HOLMES will be played by actors familiar to Roof Garden regulars. The title role will be played by Steven Vincent who also played the hysterical slave Hysterium in A FUNNY





My example is a state agency called the Texas Prosecutors Council. To a casual observer this agency would appear to be a good, solid, law and order mechanism readily deserving of full sup-

For the purposes of my example let me tell you the facts of the Texas Prosecutors Council. Prior to the establishment of the Council in 1977, criminal

justice grants were funded directly to a private agency called the courses and provide education material for Texas prosecutors. The system worked very well.

In 1977, at a time when Texas had significant budget surpluses, the Texas Prosecutors Council was established through the power of House leadership and, just coincidentally, provided an excellent employment opportunity for one of the friends of that leadership, as executive director of that newly created agency. The net effect of the new agency was monies now were funneled from the Governor's office, under the criminal justice grant system, not director to the Texas District and County Attorneys Association, but through the Prosecutors Council.

The budget crunch of 1985 brought the agency to the attention of the Budget and Oversight subcommittee of the Criminal Jurisprudence Committee of the House of Representatives. That subcommittee was charged with a duty of determining efficiency of state agencies within its purview. The Budget and Oversight subcommittee recognized the fact that the Prosecutors

Council was simply an unneeded, bureaucratic boondoggle and recommended a "0" budget for Texas Prosecutors Council. This was death number 1 for the Texas Prosecutors Council.

The full Committee on Criminal Jurisprudence favorably accepted the subcommittee's recommendation and confirmed the "0" budget for the Texas Prosecutors Council. This was death number 2.

The subcommittee report and full committee report were forwarded to the House Appropriations Committee and this committee, that oversees spending of every state dollar of Texas revenues, followed the recommendation of the subcommittee and committee and gave Texas Prosecutors Council a zero budget. That was death number 3.

On May 24, 1985, the last

day of the 69th Legislative session when bills could be heared by the full House of Representatives for the first time, low and behold, there on the daily calendar, appears Texas Prosecutors Council. You might say to yourself that any agency that has been resurrected from death three times deserves to live. In truth and in fact, it deserves to live no more than it did on the date it was first fatally stricken. Again, in truth and in fact, and sadly enough for the people of the State of Texas, the realities are that the "good, ole boy," mutual back scratching system will win out in Austin 99 times out of 100 and merit and value mean little.

I served on two of these committees and I suppose I can chalk this up as Lesson number 13 in "how to run headlong, at full speed, into a brick wall."

On the night of May 24, 1985 when the Texas Prosecutor's Council's legislation was being heard by the Texas House of Representatives, I was able to raise a point of order that was sustained, killing the agency for the fourth and hopefully, final time. The error that caused the ultimate demise of this state agency was a failure of the drafter of the document to properly

underline new, added language.

A missing line drawn under a few words saved the people of the State of Texas \$600,000 plus per year and finally eliminated an agency that the entire legislative process could not otherwise

#### **EASTLAND**

Donna Metcalf of the Environmental Protection Agency and Don Wyrick of the Texas Department of Water Resources confirm that there has been no widespread contamination of the area from the recent train derailment and explosion. There has been no contamination of the North Fork of the Leon River, where emergency dams were thrown up after the disaster. The dams will remain in place until after all soil in the area has been completely neutralized. Acidity testing is being done all along the river, Wyrick said, from Lake Eastland eastward. Air quality testing equipment was put into use immediately after the explosion, and the monitoring continues.

Names and phone out for her at Housson's, but Catherine has moved, and I don't believe her numbers are current. This oversight will be corrected, but it should have been done before May 24, 1985.

For reasons of economy, meaning Mandi's fast finger with a phone dial, Mandi has not memorized her father's Waco number nor that for her mother in Navasota.

Don't underestimate your child's ability. Mandi was half past four when a freak wind locked her in an upstairs bedroom. Weeping and wailing? No. Someone had taught her how to dial an extension phone, so Mandi called downstairs to her daddy to "come and get me."

We are grateful disaster came no closer than the pocketbook on the twentyfourth. She may never need them, and I hope she doesn't, but Mandi is going to memorize several more phone numbers in case she needs someone to "come and get me" again.

### **Community Tree Care Important**

Virtually everyone is involved in forestry-at least urban forestry. Eastland County towns are "tree towns.'

Urban forestry is the management of trees in areas where man has significantly affected the "natural" ecosystem by his structures or manipulations, says a forestry specialist. This includes large cities, small communities and even areas outside of municipal boundaries.

Everyone should be interested in urban forestry since trees provide many benefits, points out Dr. Michael Walterscheidt with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

In the summer, trees help moderate temperatures by controlling solar radiation. They also aid in moderating air temperatures through evapotranspiration (water vapor evaporating from leaves). For example, a large tree with sufficient soil moisture can give off about 88 gallons of water in one day. This is comparable to five room-size air condi-

In the winter, trees reduce wind velocity and create sheltered zones. Proper planting of shelter belts can reduce windspeeds by 50 percent for distances up to 20 times the height of the tallest trees, says Walterscheidt.

When planted close to a house on the prevailing wind side, conifers (conebearing evergreen trees and shrubs) create a "dead air space" that can reduce heat loss from the house. In northern areas, this can mean a 23 percent fuel savings.

Many communities in the northeastern midwestern United States have had active forestry programs for years, but Texas town officials are just now realizing the advantages of trees, notes the specialist. However, tree planting programs may prove to be a future burden if little consideration is given to future maintenance problems, drought resistance, size or adaptability to the planting

To aid in this effort, a system of tree management has been developed which can be used in any community, Walterscheidt points out. The system involves consideration of these ques-

1. What kind of trees are now growing in the community?

2. How are insect, disease and man-caused problems affecting these trees identified and corrected?

3. What are trees worth? 4. Are the right trees planted in the right place?

5. What are priority tree

Developing an urban

management plans? 6. What would the community be like without good trees?

forestry program involves several basic steps, according to the specialist. First, leadership must be assigned for implementing and administering the program. This can be done through an existing park board or other city board or by appointment of a tree commission. An effective ordinance developed by the group should establish authority over public trees if this does not already exist.

Next, existing community tree resources should be inventoried since a necessary step in management is to know the resources. The inventory can be a simple listing of species, size and condition, or it can involve a sophisticated computerized list, including location and suggested maintenance

Once the inventory is complete, objectives and work plans can be developed. A goal should be established not to allow any one species to make up more than 20 percent of a community's trees, notes Walterscheidt. This will help avoid future disasters should a disease or insect attack a particular tree species. An example is oak wilt on live oaks in parts of the Texas Hill Country.

Maintaining an urban forestry program must be a continuous concern. New plantings are not the only consideration-existing trees also need care, notes the specialist. Properly caredfor trees are damaged less ice and windstorms. Trees along right-of-ways need to be pruned for clearance and safety








