## **Makes Headlines**

Soaking rains pushed across all of Eastland County from late Sunday afternoon until early Monday, ending almost three months of dry weather.

Rainfall totals varied from 2.10 inches in Cisco and the Kokomo Community to 1.25 inches 4 miles south of Cisco. Carbon and Rising Star each received 2 inches, with 1.3 at Eastland an 1.8 at Ranger. Some of the rural areas around both the northwest and south-central part of the county also reported heavy rains. Just across the county line near May there were reports of 5-6 inches.

The moisture came from two distince waves of clouds, each streaming into the area from the southwest. The first one settled on the west side of the county about 5 p.m., with flashes of lightening visible in the north. Rising Star and Cisco got a good shower at that time, and Ranger also received rain. This continued in Ranger through most of the night.

The second line of clouds, which lingered around 2 a.m. to 4 a.m. Monday, covered a more general area. It left rain south of Cisco and in Eastland, as well as at places which had received earlier showers.





The reduced payments are due to the better-thananticipated performance of the revised UC tax structure adopted by the legislature in May 1983, the League reports in the January issue of its monthly research publication, ANALYSIS.

After Texas' Unemployment Compensation Trust Fund ran out of funds in November 1982, federal loans were used to pay benefits to unemployed workers. These loans were paid off in August of last year, a full year ahead of schedule, according to Texas Employment Commission figures

In addition, since the Unemployment Compensa-

tion Trust Fund had a positive balance on January 1, 1986, the string of consecutive January 1 dates with an outstanding loan balance has been broken. As a result, the possibility of added federal taxes that are triggered to pay outstanding loans will not be a problem until at least 1988.

Although employers will pay less federal taxes, state law will continue to require state taxes to be above normal until the trust fund reaches the mandated floor of about \$400 million. This is predicted to take several years, and in the meantime the trust fund will remain vulnerable to dramatic and unexpected increases in unemployment.
