Rains Retires As Fireman After 33 Years Service

Odell Rains, former chief and a veteran of some 33 years as a member of the Cisco Volunteer Fire Department, has retired, according to an announcement this week. Mr. Rains is a life-long resident of Cisco.

Mr. Rains' retirement was announced by Chief Richard Connell at a meeting of the fire department this month. He joined the department in 1953 and has served continuously. He served as chief for seven years.

Born and raised in Cisco, Mr. Rains retired a few years ago as a long-time

employee of Lone Star Gas Company. Except for three and a half years in the U.S. Army during WWII, he has not lived anywhere except in Cisco. He presently works part-time at Farm & Ranch Supply.

Mr. Rains and his wife Frances are the parents of three boys—Bobby Rains, employed here by Texas Oil & Gas Co.; Billy Rains, Cisco police chief and fire marshal; and Jimmy Rains, employee of Enre Corp. They have six grandchildren—four boys and two girls.

The Cisco Hospital District Board of Directors will have three places to fill in the April 5th election. The terms of Emma Donovan, Dr. E.E. Addy and Dr. C.M. Cleveland expire this year.

Mrs. Donovan, the board chairman, said she will run for reelection. Dr. Addy has decided not to run, and Dr. Cleveland was reported to be undecided about running again.

Voters will also select three college regents and a mayor and two councilmen in the election. No new names had appeared in either contest last Thursday.

Council Opens Fire Truck Bids, Votes Fee Increase

Bids for the purchase of a new fire truck were opened, an ordinance raising the water meter re-connection fee was approved on first reading and the landfill site problem was discussed at the regular monthly meeting of the City Council at City Hall last Tuesday night.

Two fire truck manufacturers submitted bids to supply the Cisco Fire Department with a new pumper truck. They were: Car-Mar Company, \$56,746, 30-day delivery; FMC Corp., (1) \$65,214, 120-day delivery; (2) \$62,888, 180-day delivery.

The Council withheld immediate action pending a study of the bids and the equipment that would be included with each truck submitted in each offer. City Manager Mike Moore and Fire Chief Richard Connell and others were to study the proposals.

Mr. Moore said that a report with recommendation would probably be ready at the Council's Feb. 25th

meeting. Funds for the purchase of a new truck will come from federal revenue sharing money, the city manager said.

The city has been planning for sometime to purchase a new truck to upgrade fire department equipment. Specifications call for the new truck to be a 750 GPM pumper with a 500-gallon storage tank, two booster reels, complete instrumentation and lighting and a 205 HP diesel engine.

The water meter fee hike ordinance would raise the re-connection fee from the present \$10 to \$25 on March 1st if the ordinance is given final approval on Feb. 25th. City Manager Moore told the Council that the water department cuts off from 10 to 25 meters per month for nonpayment of bills and they must re-connect them after payment. He added that in most cases, the same meters are involved.

Mr. Moore submitted a water department report

that showed \$5,727, in delinquent water bills in January, 1986, when 27 meters were cut off.

During a lengthy discussion, Councilmen studied the land-fill problem and asked the city manager to make a study of a proposed solid waste transfer station that would be the local center for debris to be gathered for Energy Advancement Corporation's plant in Eastland. This plan is an alternative to buying some 80 acres of land in the area and developing a new land-fill site.

Mr. Moore's study, which is expected to be studied at the Feb. 25th meeting, will examine the cost-effectiveness of both alternatives.

In other action, the Council approved a second and final reading of an ordinance to vacate and close Ash Street between East 24th Street and I-20 Access Road.

An ordinance to designate the 100 block of East 3rd and

East 4th Streets as one-way streets was approved on first reading. These streets run in front of and behind the Mobley Hilton and the action had been requested by the Hilton board of directors.

A resolution authorizing the mayor to execute a contract with Randolph, Gilbreath and Associates for the preparation of proposed community development programs, or economic development applications was approved by the Council. This firm has assisted the city for the past few years in preparing applications for federal grant monies and projects. Their charges has been for work done only and never more than \$200 per year, the city manager reported.

Mayor Eris Ritchie presided at the meeting. Present were City Manager Moore, City Secretary Ginger Johnson, City Attorney Bill Wright and Councilmen Brad Kimbrough, Linton Bateas, Roy Dennis, Bill Roberts and Joe Besselaar.

Four Arrested In Drug Case, Free Under Bonds

One man and three women who were arrested last week on charges filed after a police drug raid had been released from the Eastland County jail Friday after posting bonds, according to a Cisco Police Department report.

Adrian Roy Swindle, 34, and his wife, Phyllis Ann Swindle, 32, were free after posting bonds of \$25,000 and \$20,000, respectively, on charges of possession of controlled substances and drug

paraphernalia. Sharon Louise Lindsey, 35, was released after making a \$5,000 bond after being charged with possession of a controlled substance. Joy

Laynette Brown, 27, faces charges of marijuana possession and her bond was set at \$1,000.

Charges were filed by District Attorney Emory Walton on complaints filed by Cisco Police Department officers.

Police Detective Risa Livingston reported that a quantity of suspected drug items along with paraphernalia used in "shooting" drugs was confiscated in the raid by six Cisco police officers, including Chief Billy Rains, and two sheriff's deputies.

The cases will be presented to an Eastland County grand jury, authorities said.

Farmers, ranchers and land owners will be facing new "decision-time" in early March with the USDA's new Conservation Reserve Program.

It's a new concept that's being pushed nationwide to 1. reduce production, and 2. improve the soil through conservation measures.

The plan reminds many of the old "soil bank" program, but it's different.

Approximately 69.5 million acres will be eligible in the 1986 crop year for entry in the program which came out of the 1985 farm package, that will take highly erodible land out of farming for 10 years and place it into trees or other permanent vegetative cover. Some five million acres are expected to be enrolled this year.

Texas will probably see about 625,000 acres and these counties will be "pooled" with others in this area with the amount to be accepted determined.

Principals in administering the program are the ASCS Office, Soil Conservation Service, and the County Extension Office.

Gordon spoke to the Eastland Lions Club Tuesday, explaining the program which will be receiving a lot of publicity between now and the March 3-14 sign-up time.

Sign-ups will be at the local county ASCS Office, where additional information is available now.

Landowners will determine which acreage they'll enter; SCS will determine if it qualifies; and the landowners will bid on what he will accept as "rental" from the USDA to take it out of production for a ten-year period. There will be a 50 per cent cost-share through SCS for conservation practices implemented on the reserved acreage.

Certainly, there are a number of guidelines which have to be followed. For example, the owner must have owned the land for the past three years and a record will be submitted of the crop use for two of the previous five years. Nothing can be harvested from the land while it's in reserve, but it could be utilized for wildlife preserve which could permit hunting rights.

SCS will determine the classification or erosion levels of land. All Class 6, 7

and 8 land is eligible along with any land in Classes 2 and 5 that is ending at three times the tolerance level.

Producers wishing to put land into the program must provide a cropping history covering the years 1981 through 1985. The land must have been planted or considered to have been planted during that period (including land in the Acreage-Conservation Reserve or set-aside programs, or land that was in the prevented-

planting category.) Set-aside or diverted acres are not eligible for the Conservation Reserve Program. Reserve acreage will be over and above amounts needed to qualify for price support programs.

Producers must submit bids for annual rental payments at the time of application. Payments will be either in cash or negotiable (PIK) certificates. There is a \$50,000 per person per year limit on annual rental payments, but not on cost

shares. Bases, quotas and allotments will be reduced by the ratio of cropland on the farm to the amount put into the program. The producer will choose which bases, quotas or allotments will be reduced over the life

of the contract and this history will be preserved over the life of the contract.

County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service and Soil Conservation Service offices will have more information.

Conservation Reserve Program Meeting

Eastland County Farmers can find out about details of the new Conservation Reserve Program of the recently passed farm bill at a meeting at Abilene, Texas on February 26.

The meeting will be in the Jury Assembly Room, 3rd floor of the new Courthouse and will run from 9 a.m. to 12 noon.

The meeting will be hosted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, which has educational responsibilities for the program, points out DeMarquis Gordon, county Extension agent.

Extension service specialist plus officials with the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service and Soil Conservation Service will be on hand to explain the provisions of the program.

The Conservation Reserve Program is aimed at taking highly erodible cropland out of production in an effort to protect soil resources and to

curb production of surplus farm commodities, says Gordon.

Farmers with eligible cropland (as determined by the Soil Conservation Service) will qualify for cost-sharing in establishing permanent cover (trees and grasses) and other conservation treatments needed to protect the soil. They will also receive annual rental payments over the life of the 10-year contract which will be based on bids submitted at the time of sign-up. The sign-up period has been set for March 3-14 at local ASCS offices.

Gordon adds that some 45 million acres of cropland across the nation are being targeted for the program over the next five years, with 11.5 million acres being in Texas. Texas has some 8.25 million acres of the 5 million targeted for the program in 1986.

Hightower Calls For Restoration of FFA And VOC Ag Funding

HIGHTOWER CALLS FOR RESTORATION OF FFA AND VOC AG FUNDING

"Who will farm the land?" This is a question being posed by Jim Hightower, Texas Commissioner of Agriculture.

"It's a real question that we Texans must ask ourselves today," the Commissioner says. "There is an effort right now in Austin to dismantle the one high school educational program that has produced generation after generation of highly qualified farmers and ranchers - the Vocational Agriculture program and its student component, Future Farmers of America."

Since 1928 the combination of Voc Ag and FFA has helped to educate more than 11 1/2 million students in the increasingly complex business of agricultural production, processing and marketing, the Commissioner says.

This year, some 59,000 Texas young people are studying under Voc Ag programs in more than two-thirds of the states 1,170 school districts.

"Who needs them?" Hightower asks.

All of us, he answers, assuming we will continue wanting a wide variety of top-quality food at reasonable prices. This morning's bacon didn't originate at the super-market - it was once a well-tended pig, produced by a farmer who most likely was an FFA participant and Voc Ag student.

"That's why we in Texas have seen the wisdom of investing a pittance of public education funds in a high school curriculum and training program that teaches some of our kids to do skillfully what the rest of us don't want to do: raise pigs," the Commissioner says. "Voc Ag and FFA literally are primary training grounds for bringing home the bacon, as well as the beef, the vegetables, the grain products, the cotton and wool clothing, and all the other food and fiber items we count on daily."

"Yet there are some well-meaning reformers of Texas public educational programs who seem to think that raising a proper pig is not as worthy an educational goal as learning to program a computer. Under the guise of education reform, administrators of the Texas Education Agency (TEA) have recently made budgetary cuts that simply get our Voc Ag and FFA programs."

The Commissioner explains that the total budget for the Voc Ag effort in Texas was \$834,000, one two-

tenths of one percent of TEA's 4.6 billion annual budget. Voc Ag's budget has now been slashed by two-thirds, and the field staff of 15 field supervisors and their assistants has been zeroed-out entirely. Only one person, the state Vocational Agriculture Director, remains to handle the entire program.

"For their part, TEA Administrators claim to be acting under the mandate of House Bill 72, which overall is a positive and long overdue step toward educational excellence in Texas," Hightower says.

"But there is no such mandate in this reform bill. It is clear that neither the Legislature, the Governor nor the people of Texas intended that HB 72 ever be used as a hatchet to destroy a program that is integral to our state's second largest industry," he declares.

The Commissioner goes on to say that even an urban, urbane and high-tech society needs the best farmers we can develop. "Fortunately," Hightower says, "It is not too late to reverse this misguided budgetary action by TEA Administrators. The State Board of Education, appointed by the Governor, is the official policy-making body that oversees TEA. They have the authority to overrule the devastating cuts that have been made in Voc Ag."

"As Texas Commission of Agriculture, I have requested that they do just that."

Hightower describes a compromise "bare bones" proposal that he has worked out with public officials, educators, FFA alumnae and other interested parties. They are asking the State Board of Education to reinstate six of the ten field supervisor positions. Some

"Under this compromise," the Commissioner says, "The program still would suffer a substantial cut, but

it would survive."

This plan would require TEA to restore less than \$200,000 to the budget of Voc Ag.

"But even this modest step will not be taken by the State Board of Education unless there is powerful support from people like you," the Commissioner states. "It is not enough for the Commissioner of Agriculture to request action. The Bureaucracy must receive a clear nudge from all Texans..."

"I'm calling on you to make your voice heard in Austin. Support restoration of funding for Voc Ag and FFA by writing Chairman Jon Brumley, State Board of Education, Austin, Texas 78701."

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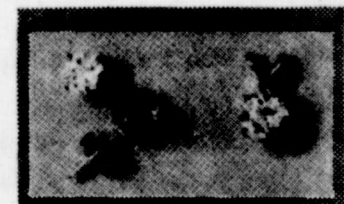
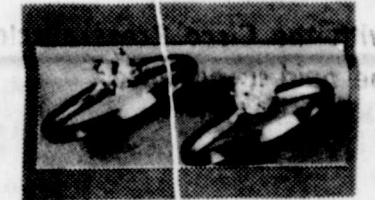

Gorman Bank Files Suit

The First National Bank of Gorman has named the Commercial Insurance Company of Newark, New Jersey in a lawsuit for \$816,075.76. The bank seeks this amount to cover losses it claims were suffered as a result of acts by its former bank President, J.B. Hicks, now of Tarrant County. The lawsuit centers on five loan transactions.

The suit was removed from State District Court in Eastland.

One claim of the bank alleges that in two loans. Others are that he brought property to the recipient of another bank loan.

The largest loan was for \$411,403.91, which was reportedly used to buy a drilling rig used in a venture in which Hicks was a silent partner, the bank alleges.

Commercial Insurance contest the bank's claims that the alleged acts by Hicks constitute fraud, or that the bank suffered any loss directly attributable to fraud or dishonesty by Hicks.

The insurance company also claims that the bank failed to mitigate its losses, did not timely report any dishonest act by Hicks, and had fully released Hicks regarding matters alleged in the suit.

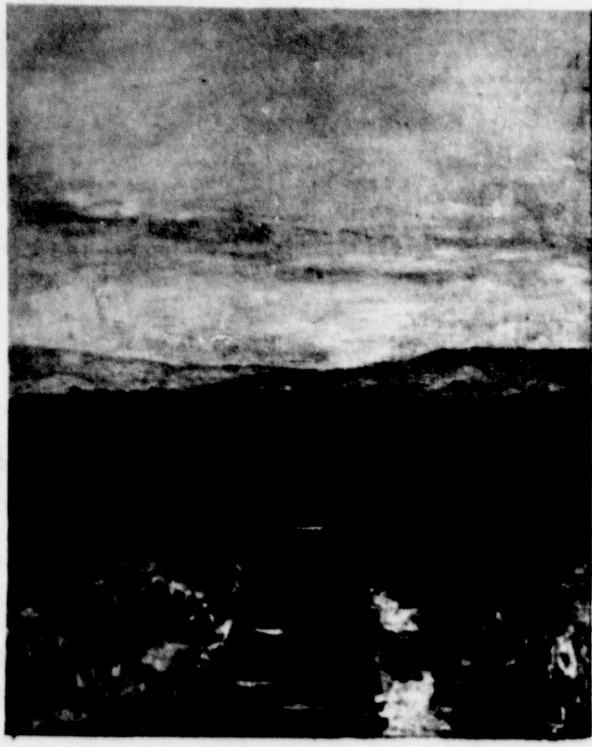

Gibbons Creek, water off colored 55 degrees, blacks fair to 24 inches on minnows, crappie good to 20 fish, catfish slow, Whitney, water clear, 50 degrees, 3 1/2 feet low, blacks fair to 5 pounds on jig and pig, small mouth bass good to 3 pounds 6 ounces, a lake record, strippers good to 20 pounds, crappie fair. Lake Bridgeport: water clear, 55 degrees, 7 1/2 feet low, black bass hitting off points and in river up to 6 pounds, strippers schooling, crappie excellent. Fork, water clear, bass good 8 pounds on top-water and worms, crappie 40 feet of water around bridges. Monticello, water murky, blacks, good to 8 pounds on worms, crappie slow, catfish

excellent.

The big catch this week came from Possum Kingdom. J.D. Riggs of Graham landed a 13 pound 22 hundredths lunker on a jig and pig.

LIFETIME LICENSE PLAN CONSIDERED BY P&W COMMISSION
AUSTIN—The Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission will consider authorizing a lifetime hunting and fishing license program and endowment fund when it meets in Austin March 13.

If approved, the program would allow the purchase of a lifetime resident combination hunting/fishing license for \$500, or a lifetime resident hunting license or fishing license for \$300.

The holder of a lifetime license would receive automatic renewal of the license each year. If a resident buys a lifetime license and becomes a resident of another state, the license would still be valid when the holder returns to Texas to hunt or fish.

Money received from the sale of lifetime licenses and specified contributions would be placed in the License Endowment Fund. Only the interest from the fund would be used to acquire, develop, manage and repair hunting and fishing areas, officials said. The program would become effective Sept. 1, 1986 if approved.

Purchasers of a lifetime license would receive a permanent card and also would be mailed a license prior to

each new license period. Any special hunting or fishing stamps still would have to be purchased by the lifetime license holder.

FALL LICENSE FIGURES SHOW BIG INCREASE IN SALES

AUSTIN—Gains in sales of the major hunting and fishing licenses during September-December 1985 have been noted over the same period in 1984, the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department reports.

Total license sales during the four-month period showed a gain of 151,048 licenses.

Officials said the fall license period is a good indicator of license purchasing trends, since all licenses expire on Aug. 31 each year. The resident combination hunting/fishing license led the way with 3,837 more sold than the year before. Resident hunting licenses rose by 17,887, while resident fishing licenses jumped by 103,457.

On the negative side, cancellation of the white-winged dove hunting season in the lower Rio Grande Valley caused a decrease in sales of white-winged dove stamps, a loss of some \$108,000 in revenues which are used to purchase whitewing habitat.

Evidence of an increase in shooting preserves in the state was reflected in sales of approximately 5,000 or more shooting preserve licenses, bringing in almost \$200,000 in added revenues.

Sales of trappers licenses also posted a big increase of more than 6,000 licenses and almost \$80,000 revenue.

Officials believe that high white-tailed deer and turkey populations, generally higher water levels in the state's reservoirs and a much improved coastal bay fishing situation all probably contributed to increased license sales.

Santos, 25, is wanted in connection with the November 29, 1980 shooting death of 20-year-old Guadalupe Gomez.

Police reports indicate Gomez was shot four times at point blank range with a .25 caliber chrome-plated automatic pistol during a

disturbance at Lulu's Lounge in Aransas Pass. Investigators say there had been bad blood between Santos and Gomez for some time and the shooting was the culmination of their feud.

Santos, a Mexican national, fled the area after the shooting. However, reports trickle in regularly to police that he still comes back to the Aransas Pass area.

"We've been told that he's back to the Gulf Coast area," Titus said recently. "None of the information has panned out yet. But we figure we'll catch up to him eventually."

Sgt. Titus said Santos is employed in the shrimp industry, giving credence to the theory that the elusive fugitive will probably return to the Aransas Pass area.

"Shrimping is about the only type of work he is known to do," Sgt. Titus said, adding that Santos speaks very little English.

Investigators say that Santos had several brushes with the law before the shooting of Gomez, including arrests

for carrying a prohibited weapon and driving under the influence of drugs.

At the time of his last arrest, he was 5-6, 150 pounds, with long black hair and brown eyes. His appearance might have changed somewhat in the past five years. Acquaintances also told investigators back in 1980 that Santos enjoyed going to disco-type clubs.

Santos uses several aliases, including Tony Perez, Tony Mojo and Tony Majado.

This week Santos has been added to the Texas Most Wanted list. A \$1,000 reward is being offered out of the Governor's Office for information leading to the fugitive's capture.

Anyone with information about Santos and where he might be located is asked to call the Texas Crime Stoppers Advisory Council toll-free at 1-800-252-8477 or their local Crime Stoppers program. In all cases, callers do not have to reveal their identities.

Texas Most Wanted is a cooperative program between the Department of Public Safety and Texas Crime Stoppers.

County Extension Office To Present 'Fit for Life' Series

The Eastland County Extension Service Office will conduct a "Fit for Life" series on Tuesdays from 4-5 p.m. in Ranger during March, April and May. The 12 week series will begin on March 4 and conclude on May 20.

The 12 week course emphasizes weight control and physical exercise for improved health.

The first 25 people to pre-register and pay the \$25.00 registration fee will be enrolled for the spring class. \$15.00 of the registration fee will be returned to each participant who completes the 12 week course. The remaining \$10 covers the cost of

materials for classes. The course is limited to 25 people and pre-registration forms and doctor releases are at the Eastland County Extension Service office, located in the courthouse basement or telephone 629-2222.

Instructor will be Janet Thomas Eastland County Extension Agent. The series was written by Texas Agricultural Extension Service nutrition-health specialist based on research from the Behavior Modification Clinic of Baylor Medical Center in Houston and the Cooper Aerobic Center in Dallas.

A total fitness program

that teaches weight control through a combination of basic nutrition and exercise principles, students will learn permanent weight control, develop a personal exercise prescription, improve self-concept and control weight without giving up favorite recipes, snacking and eating out.

Schedule for the program is:

Week 1 - Orientation, measure percentage of body fat, flexibility, cardiovascular fitness, the use of diet and exercise.

Week 2 - Measure heart rate, blood pressure and muscular endurance; identify and control eating cues;

personal exercise prescription.

Week 3 - Nutrition principles, food selection, serving sizes, flexibility exercises.

Week 4 - Prudent snacking, control eating binges, prevent exercise injuries, flexibility exercises.

Week 5 - Select low-calorie foods, sample low-calorie recipes, strengthen knees, and prevent knee injuries.

Week 6 - Stress management techniques, relationship of stress to nutrition and exercise, remeasure fitness parameters.

Week 7 - Nutrition myths, exercises for the abdomen and waist.

Week 8 - Build activity into your day, recipe modification.

Week 9 - Position self-concept, creating a slim appearance through line and color, exercises for hips and

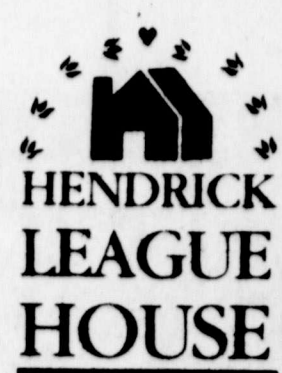

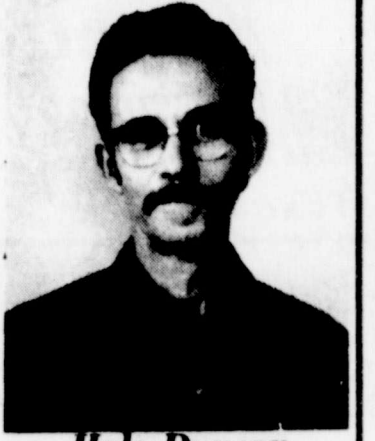

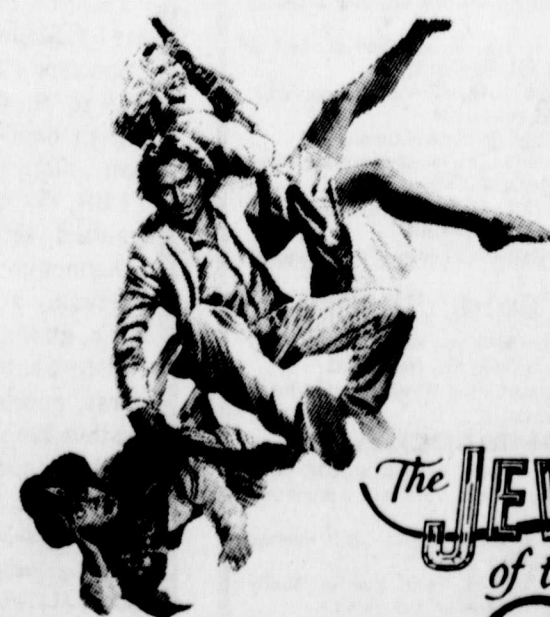

The Eastland plant will be a satellite plant of a very successful operation with a long-standing, good reputation in the Dallas area. The firm reportedly has contracts in hand necessitating the expansion plans. Development of the Eastland facility has been hampered for some months due to the serious illnesses of key officials with the firm.

A 25-year-veteran of the industry, Sanders will move his family to Eastland at the end of the school term. He will be here Monday to begin putting the plant into order and doing all the things necessary to get production started.

Would-be employees are urged to wait for interview announcements before contacting the firm.

The Eastland Chamber of Commerce and the Eastland Industrial Foundation and others have been instrumental in attracting the plant here, and are continuing to work to help bring about the smooth start-up of this important new payroll for this area.

Mr. and Mrs. Sanders

have one son, Miles, an athlete, who will be a ninth grader in the Eastland schools system in the fall. Mr. Sanders is a native of Perry, located in South Georgia.

Announcement of the Tri-Tex Plant for Eastland came at the 1985 Chamber of Commerce Banquet when Principals Tony Borino Sr. announced that he and his son Tony Jr. would develop their expansion plant in Eastland. The plant in Dallas is operating past capacity and additional production facilities were and are badly needed, it was pointed out.

Meeting with Mr. Sanders Friday, M.H. Perry of the Foundation and CoC Manager James Wright, officially welcomed him and his company and pledged the support of their organization and the entire support from this community in bringing additional payrolls to the area and providing jobs.

Tri-Tex purchased the building which formally housed Vassarette of Munsingwear and later Needland of Texas.

"We fell in love with this town when we first visited," Mr. Sanders said, "and since we grew up in a small town, we're looking forward to living here and becoming a part of the community." The family attends the Baptist church.
