Holiday For Students

Teachers To Take TECATT Tests Monday

Students of Eastland County schools will have a holiday Monday as their teachers and administrators, some 250 strong, gather at the high school gym in Cisco to take the Texas Examination of Current Administrators and Teachers as mandated by House Bill 72.

Dr. George Ewing, professor of education at Abilene Christian University in Abilene, will be the test administrator for the T.E.C.A.T. examinations at the county center in Cisco. Mary Bailey and Shirley Darr of the Cisco High School staff will serve as clerks.

Teachers of the various schools in the county, including Cisco, Eastland, Gorman, Carbon, Ranger

and Rising Star, will have been assigned hours to take the test in groups. The first group will take their test at 7:30 a.m., the second at 11:30 a.m. and the final group at 4 p.m.

The tests have been prepared by a professional company that will handle the grading of the papers, and it will be some time before the results are reported to the various schools. Part of the test will have questions with multiple choice answers, and the second part will be composed of composition (writing).

Grading will be done mechanically on the multiple choice part of the test. It was reported that two persons would read the composition part of the test and,

if deemed necessary, a third person will be called in.

An announcement from the Region 14 Education Service Center last Wednesday said as follows:

"Among the many changes brought about by House Bill 72 is the requirement that all certified and currently employed professional employees of Texas public schools will take the TECAT examinations March 10. In order to maintain an active teacher's certificate, all current and non-current teachers must pass this examination.

"Additionally, certified persons who do not take the TECAT on March 10 may take the exam at open administration for a fee of \$30. Administrations are

scheduled for the following dates: March 1, April 12, May 17, June 28, May 31, July 12, Aug. 23 and Oct. 4.

"For information on the TECAT and registration materials please contact Richard Crowell or Region 14 Education Service Center, Abilene."

Junior college teachers are not affected by the House Bill 72 test requirement, according to Carroll Scott, vice president of Cisco Junior College. He added that college teachers would be able to take the test if and when they ever want to teach in the public schools.

Students of the schools will resume regular scheduled studies on Tuesday, March 11.

Rex was over at the Racquet Club in Eastland last Monday late and he was lifting weights when someone came in and inquired for a qualified CPR man. When nobody else said anything, Rex volunteered. Mr. Joe Crutcher, Sun Oil Company employee from Odessa, had suffered a heart attack at the club.

Rex was able to keep Mr. Crutcher alive until an ambulance arrived and rushed him to Eastland Memorial Hospital. Mr. Crutcher, who had suffered two previous heart attacks, died an hour or so after entering the hospital.

Rex told us that "CPR really works... I was glad that I had had the training and was able to do something in the emergency."

Missionaries to Uganda

Garvin's Home Destroyed

Continuing strife in Uganda has caused heartbreak and hardship for at least one Ugandan Baptist church and a Southern Baptist missionary couple.

Some members of the Baptist congregation in Soroti have taken refuge in the church building from forces opposing new Ugandan leader Yoweri Museveni. The associate pastor, his wife and their four children are among those taking refuge there. The pastor and his family are in hiding. The pastor's father, a schoolteacher, was killed in mid-January. And the Soroti home of missionaries Harry and Doris Garvin has been gutted, the third missionary home lost in Uganda in a year.

The Garvins have been on furlough in Cisco, Texas, since August. Garvin learned of Soroti's plight through telephone contacts Feb. 7 and 8.

Museveni and his National Resistance Army are fighting forces loyal to the military government that was ousted in late January. Museveni opponents still control more than a third of the country, Garvin said, and looting is their basic means of survival.

The Garvins, who have six children, had lived in their Soroti home during most of their 16-year missionary career. It had been

purchased by the Foreign Mission Board.

"We had steeled ourselves to be ready to lose our goods," Garvin said, "but for the house to burn down, that was a terrible shock. It was so full of memories. It was where we raised our children, where we started a church and over 100 people had come to the Lord as Savior."

Last July, a Foreign Mission Board-owned house where Paul and Kay Eaton lived near the town of Lira and a house rented for Walter and Billie Allen in Lira were destroyed in violence following the overthrow of civilian Ugandan President Milton Obote. The home of George and Doris Berry in Kampala also was looted.

Garvin is not sure how his home was destroyed, whether opposing groups were battling to loot it or attempted to open a locked door with a grenade.

The Eatons are on furlough in Florida; the Allens and Berrys are on temporary assignments in Kenya.

No missionaries remain in the area held by Museveni's opponents, where more than 50 Baptist churches are located.

Included in the Garvins' loss were new appliances, his library and college and seminary notes. (BP)

Lubbock Firm Is Low Bidder For Waste Plant

The firm of Wardrout Associates of Lubbock was the low bidder for a contract to build a new waste water treatment plant for the City of Cisco at a bid opening at 1:30 p.m. Tuesday in the Council Chambers of City Hall.

The Lubbock firm's bid was \$579,710.00 and it was one of six bids submitted for the project. Rhode Pipe Company of Lubbock was the next lowest bidder with a bid of \$587,671.00. The highest of the six bids submitted was by a San Angelo firm in the amount of \$809,430.00.

City Manager Mike Moore said the bids would be analyzed and the appropriate certification of the bidders would be checked and submitted to the Texas Water Commission and the

Environmental Protection Agency for approval before a contract can be finalized. Final approval is expected by mid-April, Mr. Moore said.

Engineers Billy Jacob and Scott Hibbs of Jacob and Martin, Inc., Abilene, presided at the bid opening. City Councilmen Joe Besselaar, Linton Batteas and Bill Roberts were in attendance along with the city manager and representatives of the contracting firms and the Farm and Home Administration.

The delay in awarding a contract is the usual case where federal contributions to the financing is involved, Mr. Moore pointed out.

The contract calls for a new intake lift station for sewage, for a pipe line to the treatment ponds, and for

building a legume and two ponds on property the city purchased last year in the northwest part of town. The plant will occupy some 30 acres of more than 40 acres the city owns in the area.

The contract calls for 210 calendars days for the construction work to be completed.

Approximately 50 percent of the total cost will come to the city in the form of a grant of federal funds channeled through the Texas Water Commission and the Environmental Protection Agency. The balance of the money will be from a Farm Home Administration loan at about 7 1/2% interest.

Two Men Released After No Prosecution

Two men were released last Thursday from custody after being held in Eastland County Jail after a woman age 60, requested an affidavit of non-persecution. Emory Walton, District Attorney, reported that the woman said she picked up the two hitchhikers in Oklahoma. One of the men was headed to Dallas but decided to ride with the other man to Odessa. She had offered to give them a ride as far as Abilene where she lived.

The Cisco Fire Department responded to the fire call, but the woman's van was a total loss. The men were arrested on I-20, about one mile west of where the incident occurred. The woman said that at her age she did not want to go through the stress of a trial.

Efforts Under Way To Inform Texas Property Owners Of Their Rights

HOW TO GET TAX RELIEF

A statewide effort is underway to inform Texas property owners of their rights, remedies and responsibilities as taxpayers.

State Property Tax Board is working with appraisal districts and local news media to help make taxpayers aware of property tax filing deadlines and methods to obtain exemptions or other forms of tax relief.

The first priority for property owners is to file renditions by March 31 and apply for tax relief by April 30 this year. Taxpayers should file all exemption applications and property rendition forms with the central appraisal district office.

A rendition is a report a property owner makes listing taxable property owned or managed on January 1, 1986. A rendition also gives a taxpayer the opportunity to record an opinion of the property's value. By rendering the value for property, the owner makes the appraisal district responsible for sending a notice if the district places a higher value on the property.

Certain property owners must render their property. Anyone who owns or manages income-producing personal property on January 1 is required by state law to file a rendition statement with the appropriate appraisal district.

There are special rendition procedures for property when an exemption applies on January 1 but ends during the tax year. In such a case, the person who owns or acquires the property when the exemption ends must render the property for taxation within 30 days.

The chief appraiser may also require rendition of other taxable property upon notice to the property owner or manager. Rendition

forms are available from appraisal district offices. Property owners must file renditions before April.

Steve Thomas is Eastland County Chief Appraiser. The office is on the second floor of the courthouse. Phone number is 629-8597.

For homeowners, tax relief is usually in the form of exemptions. An exemption lowers tax payments by deducting part of a property's value from taxation. Homestead exemptions are available for all qualified homeowners, and additional exemptions are available for disabled people and for those aged 65 or over. Elderly homeowners who apply for the over-65 homestead exemption also get a cap, or ceiling, on taxes they pay to the school district. All taxing units offer exemptions to disabled veterans, survivors of deceased disabled veterans and survivors of those who died on active duty.

Farmers and ranchers who qualify may have their land taxed on its productive value instead of its market value, which also results in a lower tax bill. Productivity valuation comes in two forms, often referred to by the section of the Texas Constitution that provides them: open space or "1-d-1" valuation and agricultural or "1-d" valuation.

Property owners who last year received homestead exemptions, disabled veterans' exemptions and open-space land (1-d-1) valuation need not reapply in 1986, unless the chief appraiser requests a new application to confirm the owner's current qualification.

Applications must be filed in 1986 by property owners who have not previously received tax relief on their present homesteads or land. Farmers and ranchers

who receive agricultural use (1-d) valuation must apply for it each year.

People whose property is in more than one county appraisal district have an additional responsibility. These property owners may have to file for exemptions and productivity valuation in each appraisal district in which their property is located. Failure to do so could result in one or more taxing units taxing the property on its full market value. An example is where a taxing unit has territory in two counties, but only one of the appraisal districts appraises all the property in the taxing unit.

Applications for exemption and special valuation must be in the appraisal office before May 1.

Complete information on tax exemptions and rendition requirements is in a pamphlet produced by SPTB, "Taxpayers' Rights, Remedies, Responsibilities." The pamphlet also tells how taxpayers can challenge the values placed on their property by protesting to the appraisal review board. The pamphlet is available free from the appraisal district offices or from SPTB in Austin.

The property tax is the primary source of local government revenue in Texas. It will generate out \$9 billion this year to help fund public schools, cities, counties and special districts like hospitals, local colleges, fire protection, water and utilities.

All property owners are urged to become familiar with the tax process, to file renditions and to apply for all exemptions or other tax relief they are entitled to.

GOLDEN BUTTER

We had a big gray stone churn that sat on a sunny shelf in the kitchen. When we had collected enough milk to churn we poured it into the churn and placed it in a warm place near the stove until it "turned". When it was ready to be worked I always volunteered (or was appointed,) liking the job if I had a good book to read.

Most churners draped a towel around the top to prevent spattering, but that always got in my way so I didn't use one. You are supposed to churn kind of fast at first, then, when little golden speckles appear and grow bigger, you slow down so it can all "gather."

If my reading got very exciting I would churn slower and slower and finally stop to read those good parts. Papa called these books "Ten cent novels."

When Mama came in she would say, "You'll never get the butter done until you put that book down." She was right. I would drop that book

and churn until the butter grew and formed a big solid mass.

To make the butter I first washed my hands, then took the gold chunk up with a wooden spoon and put it into a bowl. Then I gave it a good beating till all the water was out, washed it and gave it another beating.

When the butter was soft but fairly solid I spooned it into our wooden butter mold, the one with the hand carved design. When the butter hardened a bit I turned it out, a perfect, round mound, with a pretty blossom on top.

Sometimes, instead of using the mold I put the butter into a bowl, smoothed it on top with a knife dipped in hot water, and showed off my finest artistic skill, with drawings of flowers, fish or animals. I thought my best creation was an unusual long-legged chicken. Did that every surprise the family? I wouldn't say it was bad or good, but they never let me forget it!

Cisco Women Turn Lumber Yard Into Folklife Festival Center

Tumbleweeds and trash were blowing about their feet in 1984 when a small group of Cisco Civic League members first surveyed the historic, abandoned Rockwell Lumber yard as a prospective site for their Big Country celebration, the 12th Annual Cisco Folklife Festival.

Once a vital part of the bustling, early Texas oil, coal, railroad and agricultural community, the lumberyard had long been closed and was falling victim to neglect, disuse, and vandalism. Gigantic trumpet vines had invaded several buildings, producing distorted walls and floors, and prompting the naming of a "de-vine" window.

With the blessing of the property's new owners, Cisco Junior College, a steering committee planned and schemed to find ways to make the property safe for public use, restoring it within its character, while keeping it functional for active community use...all within minimally budgeted funds.

An immediate priority was to clean up weeds, vines, rotting wood, and litter. Volunteers consisting of members, husbands, children, and friends were quickly enlisted. During one cold, rainy workday, upright 2x4's were removed from the lumber sheds to make convenient booths which could be used by craftspeople to display their wares, or by anyone interested in

few days preceding the Festival could be found nailing up chicken wire fencing to keep people from those hazardous places, and relaying plank floors to try to prevent slips and falls. Women who had never before handled a circular saw found themselves cutting 2x4's to brace bannisters, or to build new railings. Only when time became available were cosmetic touches such as painting even considered.

Situated on an approximate 2 acre site, the lumber yard with its buildings and outdoor sheds is a natural local for community activities. Following the erection of two large colorful tents in the center of the complex, the arrival of all the craftspeople with their wares, the Civic League's pioneer displays, and the aromatic foods being prepared on the grounds, the area indeed took on a Festival atmosphere and probably every person had to indeed agree it was a Super Festival.

With last year's festival now history, the club ladies are actively planning the next work days to prepare the historic site for its next phase of revitalization in order to be ready by April, 1986.

For a west Texas family festival that you won't forget, plan to visit Cisco's Folklife Festival April 26-27, 1986. The Festival opens immediately after a 10 a.m. downtown parade on Saturday, April 26, and will be

open also on Sunday, April 27 from 12 noon to 5 p.m. Cisco is located approximately 100 miles west of Fort Worth on I-20, and 45 miles east of Abilene. For more information, contact the Cisco

Foremost among the items on the agenda will be consideration of a successor to O.E. (Jack) Blackwell, deceased, Commissioner of Precinct 2. This Precinct begins at Olden and takes in the eastern part of the County. It includes the Ranger, Desdemona and Lake Leon areas.

Comm. Blackwell died on March 6. His term of office will end on Jan. 1, 1987, and an appointee will serve until that time.

Although five Democratic candidates have filed for the office, the primary will not

be held until May. There will possibly be a run-off for the office in this Precinct.

Other items on Monday's

lengthy agenda include a Resolution on Vocational Education, which is being threatened by cuts in state funding.

The obstruction of a road in Pct. 2 is one item which will be coming before the Court.

An important pre-budget

consideration is also on the agenda, as well as changes in the Extension Department Budget.

A number of County Road pipeline crossings will be considered, as well as bills, claims and accounts.

This session will be open to the public.

assault with a deadly weapon and aggravated kidnapping.

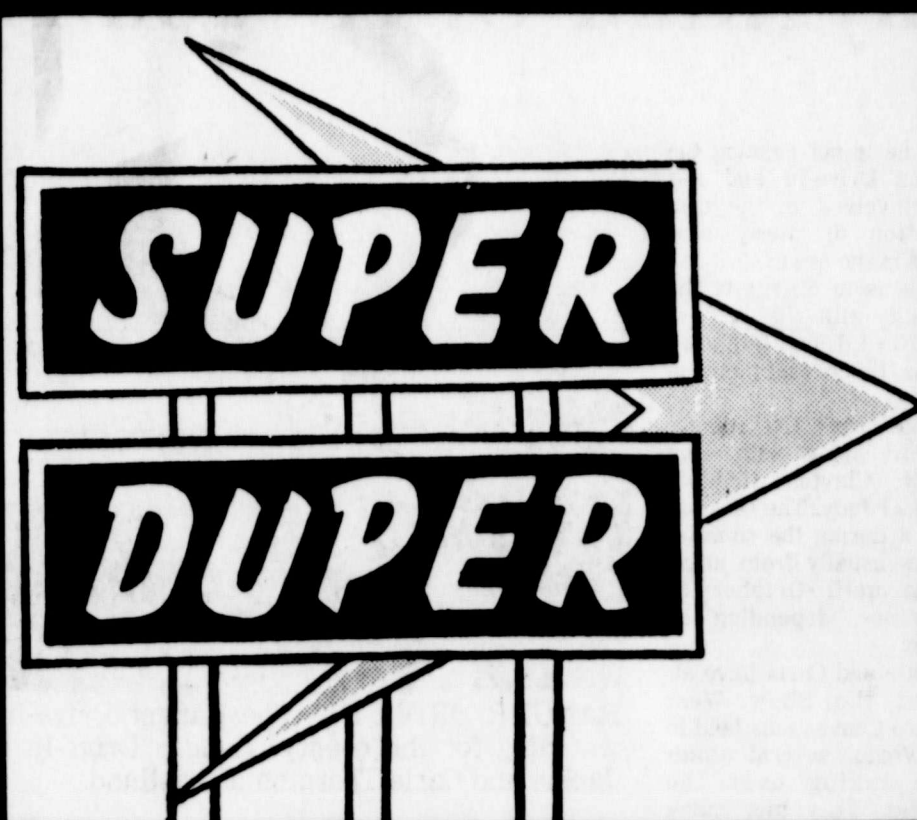
Two indictments named a Grand Prairie man for burglary.
