





"We had steeled ourselves to be ready to lose our goods." Garvin said, "but for the house to burn down, that was a terrible shock. It was so full of memories. It was where we raised our children, where we started a church and over 100 people had come to the Lord as Savior.'

Last July, a Foreign Mission Boardowned house where Paul and Kay Eaton lived near the town of Lira and a house rented for Walter and Billie Allen in 1 ra were destroyed in violence following the overthrow of civilian Ugandan President Milton Obote. The home of George and Doris Berry in Kampala also was looted.

Garvin is not sure how his home was destroyed, whether opposing groups were battling to loot it or attempted to open a locked door with a grenade.

The Eatons are on furlough in Florida; the Allens and Berrys are on temporary assignments in Kenya.

No missionaries remain in the area held by Museveni's opponents, where more than 50 Baptist churches are located.

Included in the Garvins' loss were new appliances, his library and college and seminary notes. (BP)







Lubbock Firm Is Low **Bidder For Waste Plant**

The firm of Wardroupt Associates of Lubbock was the low bidder for a contract to build a new waste water treatment plant for the City of Cisco at a bid opening at 1:30 p.m. Tuesday in the Council Chambers of City Hall.

The Lubbock firm's bid was \$579,710.00 and it was one of six bids submitted for the project. Rhode Pipe Company of Lubbock was the next lowest bidder with a bid of \$587,671.00. The highest of the six bids submitted was by a San Angelo firm in the amount of \$809,430.00.

City Manager Mike Moore said the bids would be analyzed and the appropriate certification of the bidders would be checked and submitted to the Texas Water Commission and the **Environmental Protection** Agency for approval before a contrct can be finalized. Final approval is expected by mid-April, Mr. Moore said.

Engineers Billy Jacob and Scott Hibbs of Jacob and Martin, Inc., Abilene, presided at the bid opening. City Councilmen Joe Besselaar, Linton Batteas and Bill Roberts were in attendance along with the city manager and representatives of the contracting firms and the Farm and

building a legume and two ponds on property the city purchased last year in the northwest part of town. The plant will occupy some 30 acres of more than 40 acres the city owns in the area.

The contract calls for 210 calendars days for the construction work to be completed. Approximately 50 percent

of the total cost will come to the city in the form of a grant of federal funds channeled through the Texas Water Commission and the Evironmental Protection Agency. The balance of the money will be from a Farm Home Administration loan at about 712% interest.

Efforts Under Way To **Inform Texas Property Owners Of Their Rights**

HOW TO GET TAX RELIEF A statewide effort is underway to inform Texas property owners of their rights, remedies and responsibilities as taxpayers.

State Property Tax Board is working with appraisal districts and local news media to help make taxpayers aware of property tax filing deadlines and methods to obtain exemptions or other forms of tax relief.

The first priority for property owners is to file renditions by March 31 and apply for tax relief by April 30 this year. Taxpayers should file all exemption applications and property rendition forms with the central appraisal district office.

A rendition is a report a property owner makes listing taxable property owned or managed on January 1, 1986. A rendition also gives a taxpayer the opportunity to record an opinion of the property's value. By rendering the value for property, the owner makes the appraisal district responsible for sending a notice if the district places a higher value on the property.

Certain property owners must render their property. Anyone who owns or manages income-producing personal property on January 1 is required by state law to file a rendition statment with the appropriate appraisal district.

There are special rendition procedures for property when an exemption applies on January 1 but ends during the tax year. In such a case, the person who owns or acquires the property when the exemption ends must render the property for taxation within 30 days.

The chief appraiser may also require rendition of other taxable property upon notice to the property owner or manager. Rendition forms are available from appraisal district offices. Property owners must file renditions before April.

For homeowners, tax relief is usually in the form of exemptions. An exemption lowers tax payments by deducting part of a property's value from taxation. Homestead exemptions are available for all qualified homeowners, and additional exemptions are available for disabled people and for those aged 65 or over. Elderly homeowners who apply for the over-65 homestead exemption also get a cap, or ceiling, on taxes they pay to the school district. All taxing units offer exemptions to disabled veterans, survivors of deceased disabled veterans and survivors of those who died on active du-

Farmers and ranchers who qualify may have their land taxed on its productive value instead of its market value, which also results in a lower tax bill. Productivity valuation comes in two forms, often referred to by the section of the Texas Constitution that provides them: open space or "1-d-1" valuation and agricultural or "1-d" valuation.

Property owners who last year received homestead exemptions, disabled veterans' exemptions and open-space land (1-d-1) valuation need not reapply in 1986, unless the chief appraiser requests a new application to confirm the owner's current qualification.

Applications must be filed in 1986 by property owners who have not previously received tax relief on their present homesteads or land.





GOLDEN BUTTER

We had a big gray stone churn that sat on a sunny shelf in the kitchen. When we had collected enough milk to churn we poured it into the churn and placed it in a warm place near the stove until it "turned". When it was ready to be worked I always volunteered (or was appointed,) liking the job if I had a good book to read.

Most churners draped a towel around the top to prevent spattering, but that always got in my way so I didn't use one. You are supposed to churn kind of fast at first, then, when little golden speckles appear and grow bigger, you slow down so it can all "gather."

If my reading got very exciting I would churn slower and slower and finally stop to read those good parts. Papa called these books "Ten cent novels."

When Mama came in she would say, "You'll never get the butter done until you put that book down." She was right. I would drop that book and churn until the butter grew and formed a big solid

To make the butter I first washed my hands, then took the gold chunk up with a wooden spoon and put it into a bowl. Then I gave it a good beating til all the water was out, washed it and gave it another beating.

When the butter was soft but fairly solid I spooned it into our wooden butter mold, the one with the hand carved design. When the butter hardened a bit I turned it out, a perfect, round mound, with a pretty blossom on top.

Sometimes, instead of using the mold I put the butter into a bowl, smoothed it on top with a knife dipped in hot water, and showed off my finest artistic skill, with drawings of flowers, fish or animals. I thought my best creation was an unusual long-legged chicken. Did that every surprise the family! I wouldn't say it was bad or good, but they never let me forget itl.

Eastland County's 512 reporting outlets for sales and use tax reported gross sales of \$50,165,061 during the third quarter of 1985, compared to \$52,680,025 for the same period in 1984, according to the State Comptroller of Public Accounts.

Use tax purchases totaled \$197,163, and the amount subject to tax was \$16,292,992.

These amounts recorded a 4.8 percent decrease from the 1984 figures.

Cisco Women Turn Lumber Yard Into Folklife Festival Center

Tumbleweeds and trash were blowing about their feet in 1984 when a small group of Cisco Civic League members first surveyed the abandoned historic, Rockwell Lumber yard as a prospective site for their Big Country celebration, the 12th Annual Cisco Folklife Festival

Once a vital part of the bustling, early Texas oil, railroad and agricultural community, the lumberyard had long been closed and was falling victim to neglect, disuse, and vandalism. Gigantic trumpet vines had invaded several buildings, producing distorted walls and floors, and prompting the naming of a "de-vine" window.

With the blessing of the property's new owners, Cisco Junior College, a steering committee planned and schemed to find ways to make the property safe for public use, restoring it within its character, while keeping it functional for active community use...all within minimally budgeted

An immediate priority was to clean up weeds, vines, rotting wood, and litter. Volunteers consisting of members, husbands, children, and friends were quickly enlisted. During one cold, rainy workday, upright 2x4's were removed from the lumber sheds to make convenient booths which could be used by craftspeople to display their wares, or by anyone interested in

demonstrating or displaying. Fill dirt was hauled in by truck to attempt to solve a standing water problem present under most of the outbuildings. On several workdays it was not unusual to see lady volunteers swinging shovelfuls of dirt to properly distribute it. Assisted by heavy equipment provided and manned by En Re Corporation several ditches were cut which were design-

ed to relieve future drainage

could be accomplished.

As time for 1985's Festival drew nearer, the ladies were troubled by several potentially dangerous exhibit areas, and even during the


