City And School Elections To Be Saturday, April 5

Cisco area voters will elect a mayor, two councilmen, three public school trustees, three college regents and three hospital district directors in an election Saturday, April 5, at the Laguna Hotel. Voting in the four elections will be held at the same time and place. Polls will open at 7 a.m. and close at 7 p.m., and the regular rules governing elections in Texas will be enforced.

M.L. Bailey will serve as judge for the City Election and for the Cisco Hospital District election, with Mrs. Margaret Torres as the alternate judge. Mrs. Freddy Anderson will serve as election judge for voting in the election of trustees of the Cisco Independent School District and for the election of regents for Cisco Junior College. The ballot for the city elec-

tion lists only one candidate for each vacancy—Joe Wheatly for mayor and Allen Masters and Arlie Whitley for council places. Mr. Wheatly is the owner of Cisco Lumber and Supply Co., Mr. Masters is a vice president of the First National Bank and Mr. Whitley is in the oil business. Candidates for the three vacancies on the hospital board of directors are: Dr. C.M.

Cleveland is a local optometrist, Mrs. Donovan and Mr. Morgan are bank vice presidents, and Mr. Wright is a local attorney. Those running for the three vacancies on the board of trustees of the Cisco Independent School District are listed on the ballot as follows: Place 1—Jackie Witt, Kenney Bell, Harold Davies, Rick Roark and Rena Midkiff.

Place 2—Bruce Stovall. Place 3—Dick Wages, Marcia Adams, and Dr. Allen McGinness. All of the board candidates are well known school patrons and are active in community affairs. There was a public forum for the school board candidates to meet the public at the high school Monday night. Running for the three

vacancies on the board of regents of Cisco Junior College are the following: Place 7—Charles Preston. Place 8—L.D. Woolley, Raymond Whitley and Owen King. Place 9—Brad Kimbrough and David Gill. Candidates for the college board vacancies are also well known in the community. A large turnout of voters has been forecast as there are contests in three of the elections.

Woolley And Kimbrough Announce For College Board

Lee D. Woolley and Brad Kimbrough announce their candidacy for the Board of Regents of Cisco Junior College.

Mr. Woolley is currently the President of the Board of Regents and Mr. Kimbrough is Vice President.

During our tenure as board members, funds received from the State has increased 98% from \$1,384,615 to \$2,742,438. The value of the college property has increased 60% from \$3,144,879 to \$5,015,833. Indebtedness of the college has decreased 41% from \$965,000 to \$572,000. Endowment funds have increased 39% from \$445,695 to \$618,529. Total payroll has increased 73% from \$1,502,560 to \$2,586,614.

Spotlights and Sidelights

ID, EGO, or SELF-ESTEEM

It has been a fact of our lives that cartoons are quick ways to get a few "home truths" across.

"That he who runs may read," probably developed from cartoons. Or the reverse may be true.

A recent "Trudy" by Jerry Marcus goes in my scrapbook. The kid is standing up to his ma, and the caption reads, "Yeh, well, if you wanna bring me up right, stop putting me down!"

Aside from the fact that this kind of remark in my day, from me, would have been considered "sassy" and dealt with accordingly, there wasn't much basis for my making it.

Our parents were sure we could do anything they thought we could.

This didn't mean we did not get firm guidance and solid corrections. We did. But there was no "put down" about it.

As I recall, the main idea was that everyone does make mistakes sooner or later. Children make them more often than adults. Punishment was not as much a retribution

as it was a deterrent to prevent future mistakes of a like nature.

Papa "explained things." He developed my conscience, a troublesome thing that has cost me a lot of otherwise carefree hours. I am not unappreciative. It's just that I've missed smelling a lot of flowers while peeling onions.

Mamma was less given to chit-chat, no matter how character-building it might have been. She'd snatch me, usually on the run, but I was a slow runner—I had to hit a home run to get to second base. After she informed me I was not to run away, she applied the heft of her hand to the seat of the problem and said, "Don't ever do that again!"

The prescribed reply was, "yes, ma'am." I never did—still don't—understand why. "No, ma'am" would not have been right as in, "No, ma'am, I won't do that again."

My sister, Lu, came along about eight years later than I, so I can vouch for the accuracy of the formula on two counts: Memory and Observation. Lu

was a trial. She was a "sickly" baby, a highly fertile breeding ground for all the germs I brought home from school. She slept all day and cried all night. She was my favorite sister only because I had no other.

However, once both of us had cultivated every germ school could offer, she grew into a lively, cute, curly-headed piece of curiosity who certainly got her share of parental attention. I don't believe I was jealous; relieved, I think. With Lu's diversionary tactics, many of my borderline projects were ignored.

On the whole, Mamma and Papa expected us to "behave," and we did. They expected good grades, so we got them.

There were times when we didn't, of course. The best I can explain this is that they were sorry if we didn't come up to their expectations, but we weren't reduced to sackcloth and ashes if we slipped. They did not dwell on the minus past but on the plus future. We were expected to do "well," we were to strive for "better," and "best" was an open-ended

term. We could hit "best," but somehow it was clear that a "better best" was possible.

So, although I frequently felt that it was impossible to please Mamma and Papa, I can't say put-downs were part of our up-bringing, and I am grateful.

From teaching experiences, I am wholeheartedly with the kid bawling the put-down.

The youngsters who overcome every obstacle, who advance with determination, who need only a hint, are few. Most of us need all the encouragement we can get—a pat on the head usually does more for us than a swat on the seat.

In all my teaching years, the difficult pupils had heard, "Stupid" and "Dummy" so often that by the time they reached me in junior high school, they were stupid dummies. Some of them I helped turn around. They may not have learned much about syntax, but they learned about self-respect. Some of them I mourned...I still do.

Consider your children. Accentuate the positive. They'll get enough put-downs elsewhere.

'Spectacular' Year For Texas Tourism

AUSTIN -- The rapid decline of oil and gas prices, the falling dollar and mild weather have set up what tourist officials are calling a "spectacular" year for Texas tourism.

Continuing low inflation is expected to keep the cost down on Texas vacations, along with economical air fares, favorable interest rates on vacation loans and package bargains on motels and hotels.

Also wholesale prices in general are coming down and are expected to continue to drop in the next few months. "This will give the consumer more discretionary money to spend and we think tourism will get a boost from that opportunity," says Larry Todd of Austin, executive director of the Texas Tourist Development Agency.

People are finding reasons to travel, says the national magazine dealing with tourism. "Americans have restocked on major durables and are now ready to spend more discretionary income on leisure travel."

The results of all this are already being noted. The State Department of Highways and Public Transportation reports the Visitor Information Bureaus it operates are showing an average 22.7 percent increase in visitors with the office in the Rio Grande Valley up to 59.6 percent. More than 555,000 people have stopped at the Visitor Information Centers so far this year.

Travel officials are predicting a 20 to 25 percent increase in the number of

visitors from Germany to the United States, with Texas expected to derive its full share. Increases are also being noted in visitors from England, Japan, Canada and Mexico.

Many visitors are combining business with pleasure.

A banner year is forecast for tourists coming to the U.S., and Texas expects to get a large number of these along with many people from other states and from within its own borders. This is the Sesquicentennial or 150th anniversary of the winning of Texas' independence. More than 7,000 events have been planned throughout the state during 1986.

"These travelers have a direct effect on the state's economy," Todd says. "The money they spend goes directly into the pockets of Texas business and creates more jobs."

"Part of that money comes back to benefit our state and communities a second time as additional revenue for the hotel/motel tax, sales tax, alcoholic beverage tax, motor fuels tax and others," according to Todd.

The amount of help from visitor spending is significant. Tourism brings more money into Texas businesses and communities than another other industry except oil, and the state is third in the nation, behind only California and Florida, in the number of visitors it draws.

State tourism officials estimate 40 million out-of-state visitors will come to Texas during 1986, and the Texas tourist industry is expected to exceed \$16 billion in overall spending if that number is met.

Agricultural Briefs

EXTENSION PROGRAMS

BENEFIT CATTLEMEN-

Educational programs by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service of the Texas A&M University System are aimed at helping cattlemen "gain an edge" for economic survival. Interdisciplinary programs dealing with all phases of beef cattle production and management have helped producers increase calf crops, weaning weights and net returns, points out an Extension Service specialist in animal reproduction. On-site demonstrations have focused on treating hay with anhydrous ammonia, prescribed range burning, controlled breeding and calving seasons, performance-tested bulls, growth implants in steers and heifers, estrus synchronization, artificial insemination and pregnancy determination, and use of mineral mixes to reduce phosphorus deficiencies.

BARROW FUTURITY, SWINE JUDGING CLINIC

SET-Texas pork producers

will be able to see how their top barrows fare by entering them in the Texas Barrow Futurity at Texas A&M University Aug. 18-19. Purpose of the futurity is to demonstrate to Texas swine producers the criteria for selecting top market hogs and to compare the placings of live animals with their carcasses, says a swine specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System. The futurity will be limited to 40 barrows each weighing between 200 and 260 pounds. A producer may nominate only one barrow and must include a \$100 fee. Those registering for the judging clinic will place the barrows in the futurity and will also hear discussions on swine selection, barrow shows and related topics.

PROTECTING TREES FROM LIGHTNING--

Lightning is often a companion of Texas thunderstorms and can be a deadly force to

people and property, particularly tall or isolated trees. Certain systems are available for protecting valuable trees from lightning but they are expensive, says a forester with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System. Trees that should be considered for lightning protection are the tallest ones in a given area and those within 10 feet of a building as well as those of historical interest.

4-H EYE CARE PROJECT TOUCHING THOUSANDS--

Through the 4-H Eye Care Project being conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, thousands of Texas school-age children are learning about the precious gift of sight and how to care for their eyes. In its second year, the project is part of the school enrichment program for third and fourth graders in selected schools across Texas, says an Extension 4-H specialist. Supported by the Texas Optometric Association Auxiliary and a \$1,500 grant from the National 4-H Council, this project reached more than 20,000 youngsters during the past school year and will reach 100,000 during the current school year.

Venerable Sam Houston Elected President Of The Republic Of Texas

Many people in the crowd have tears in their eyes. That was quite a moment just now as the hero of the battle of San Jacinto, General Sam Houston, presented his sword. "I have

worn it with some humble pretensions in defense of my country," he said with deep emotion, "and should the danger of my country again call for my services, I expect to resume it and respond to that call, if needful, with my blood and life."

Today, October 22, 1836, with that salute, the finale of his inaugural address, General Houston begins his two-year term as the first president of the Republic of Texas here in the capital city of Columbia. He has only recently returned from New Orleans where he had been recovering from serious wounds suffered at San Jacinto (the crucial victory in our long war for independence from Mexico). The General has been elected by an overwhelming majority of 5,119 votes out of 6,640 votes cast.

The people here listening to this address feel much like the soldiers at San Jacinto did just six months ago when, after their victory, the wounded General pulled from his pocket an ear of partially chewed corn—his only food for the last four days. He instructed his men to divide the kernels

amongst themselves to take back their lands to be planted. One who was there reports that the General exhorted them to be as fine farmers as they had been soldiers. There is no doubt that Houston is a leader of men—a quality sorely needed in this new, wild, fractious frontier republic.

Even before he came to Texas, Houston had a life most men would envy. As a young man he ran away to live with the Cherokee Indians, preferring the freedom of the red man to a farmer's lot. Adopted by a chief and named Sam Colonneh, meaning Raven, he learned the language and folklore of the Indians. Indeed, some people grumble that Houston's sympathies lie too much with the Indians, as he spent many years before coming here championing their causes as their representative to Washington.

But Houston's most valuable friendship has been that with President Andrew Jackson, who was his commanding general in the War of 1812. He got himself elected to Congress from Tennessee, and then became the state's governor in 1827 because of his loyalty to Old Hickory.

But, as with many a great man, it's women-trouble that early defeated Houston. His young wife left him only a few months after marriage and the resultant scandal forced him to resign as

governor. He went back to the Indians, but his personal fortunes sunk lower and lower until even the Cherokees made fun of Houston: gossip said they gave him a new Indian name meaning "Old Drunk."

But instead of being down and out, Houston headed to Texas, arriving just four years ago. Some say he came to help secure this land for Jackson and the United States.

Indeed, his reputation preceded him to Texas and because of this and his friendship with Jackson, he became a leader in the fight for independence, emerging as the natural one to lead Texas' army and win our freedom from Mexico.

The Republic has no economy, no banks, no money—just a group of 40,000 optimistic settlers—mostly farmers—in this huge, wild land. But we're hopeful, if nothing else. As the General-now-President said today: "As yet our course is onward. We are only in the outset of the campaign of liberty. Futurity has locked up the destiny which awaits our people."

Underground Storage Notification Underway

AUSTIN - March 21, 1986 - Thousand of Texas owners of underground storage tanks containing gasoline or other regulated substances will soon be receiving forms that they must use to notify the Texas Water Commission (TWC) of details regarding their tanks. This notification program, which must be completed by May 8, is part of the amendments to the federal solid waste act passed by Congress in 1984.

Concern about contamination of the nation's ground water, widely used for drinking and other domestic purposes, and environmental damage caused by leaks of petroleum products and other hazardous chemical substances prompted the legislation. The Environmental Protection Agency was required to develop the notification forms, which are being distributed and collected by the TWC.

Under the new law, storage tanks are defined as "underground" if 10 percent or more of the tank, including piping, is beneath the ground. Farm and residential motor fuel tanks are exempted unless they are larger than 1,100 gallons. On-site heating oil storage tanks, septic tanks, and certain other tanks are also exempted. The new law applies

to liquid petroleum products and all substances defined as hazardous under the federal Superfund program. This includes almost all chemicals, including industrial solvents. The notification requirements apply not only to underground storage tanks currently in use, but also to tanks taken out of operation after Jan. 1, 1974 but still in the ground.

To enforce the notification requirements, Congress provided for a penalty not to exceed \$10,000 for each tank for which notification is not given or for which false information is submitted.

An underground storage tank owner who has not received his notification

form by April 5, or needs additional information, should call TWC at 512-463-7786, or write the Underground Storage Tank Program, Texas Water Commission, P.O. Box 13087, Austin, Texas 78711-3087.

We have been very busy here building a 30' by 60' concrete block building on a slab with a slab with a tin roof to be used for jeep and truck repairs, workshop, storage, and for wood hard way."

Most of the people here are very poor, poorly educated, often unemployed, and have heathern customs. Plans are to teach some of the people a trade in exchange for their studying the Bible.

The young people here are searching for answers and ready for the gospel. Some are regularly being saved and the missionaries and Christians here are respected. There are Baptist, Pentecostal, Presbyterian, Methodist, and Catholic churches or missions in the area, but much more is needed as "the harvest is ripe" here. Some ranking people and army officers here are Christians and I was told that the new President publicly stated that he was not a Christian, but that he realized that Christianity was the only answer for the problems of his country.

Several more buildings need to be built as soon as possible here on land that has been

donated for a missionary compound. A water well, house, schoolhouse, chapel, and guest house are among items on the list.

Honduras is a very beautiful country with huge mountains and pine trees and a mild climate, but the surface water is polluted and parasites are a problem. It is also hard to buy many things here.

Seven men from Houston churches spent a week here helping us and we worked as much as 16 hours a day, but when you are working for the Lord, it is fun and we are happy.

I plan to stay here a while longer and help with more of the projects. We are finishing the first building now.

We feel quite safe here and the people are strongly opposed to communists. We are living in a rented house on a large ranch with cattle, sheep, chickens and etc. The house was in use well before the battle was fought at the Alamo. It is hard to find time to write and to get mail routed to Texas. I don't know how much gets there.

Enough light and water is a problem here too.

It got cool here. Is it cold there?

Absentee Voting Schedule And Instructions

Absentee voting will be held from April 14 thru April 29, 1986, at the County Clerk's office during regular office hours, Monday thru Friday, from 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Grounds for voting absentee:

If you are a qualified voter, you may vote absentee if you:

1. Are sick, physically disabled or pregnant. (A doctor's certificate is not necessary.)
2. Have religious beliefs which prevent you from going to the polling place on election day.
3. Are or will be 65 years of age or older on election day.
4. Are confined to jail. (under certain conditions)
5. Expect to be absent from the county of your residence on election day.
6. Have been appointed to work as a poll watcher or election officer outside the precinct of your residence on election day.
7. Participate in the administration of the election by reason of your employment.

How to Vote Absentee:

1. In Person.
If you are eligible to vote absentee under any of the 7 qualifying grounds, you may vote absentee by personal appearance at the absentee voting clerk's office during designated office hours.
2. By Mail.
If you are eligible to vote

absentee for any of the first four reasons, you may vote absentee by mail.

3. Expected absence.
If you are eligible to vote absentee because of an expected absence from your county of residence on election day, you may vote absentee by mail only if you also expect to be absent from county of residence during regular hours for conducting absentee voting by personal appearance remaining after your absentee ballot application is submitted to the absentee voting clerk. Your ballot must be mailed to you at an address outside of your county.

4. Application forms:
An application for a ballot by mail is available from the County Clerk's Office. Call the office at 629-8622.

5. Informal application.
You are not required to use an official application from if your application states a. Your name and residence address.
b. The address to which your ballot is to be mailed and the date after which you can receive mail at that address.
If you are voting absentee by mail because of absence from the county, you must state that you expect to be absent from the county during the remainder of the period for absentee voting by personal appearance as well as on election day.
c. You must state why you

are eligible for which you wish to receive a ballot.

d. You must indicate the election for which you wish to receive a ballot. In a primary election, you must state in which political party's primary you wish to vote.

6. How to Submit an Application.

An application for a ballot by mail may be submitted in person or by mail if the period for absentee voting by personal has not begun. During the period for absentee voting in person, an application for a ballot by mail must be submitted by mail.

7. When to Submit an Application.

Applications should be submitted now, and must be received by the eighth day before election day.

8. Deadline for return of mail ballot.

If you are voting absentee by mail, your marked ballot must be returned by mail and received by 7:00 P.M. on election day by the absentee voting clerk. A mail ballot returned by any other method will not be counted.

Home Economics Briefs

YOGURT COATED SNACKS ARE CANDY-- Consumers may be buying yogurt coated raisins and nuts under the misimpression that they are "health" snacks, says a Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service (TAEX) nutritionist. Marilyn Haggard says the yogurt coating used in these snacks usually has sugar as its major ingredient. A .9 ounce serving of yogurt raisins provides only 2 percent of the recommended dietary allowance for calcium, less than 2 percent of the RDA for riboflavin and one gram of protein. These products should be considered in the same category as candy coated nuts or raisins, says Haggard. For a real high-nutrition snack she recommends putting some raisins in a cup of plain yogurt and adding a non-nutritive sweetener to taste.

sumers are finding that the clothes and household textiles they buy in one color may fade or develop spots and streaks after just a few uses. This color change and loss can be traced to the fabric manufacturers, the consumer or the cleaning procedures used, says a Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service (TAEX) textile specialist. According to Dr. Ann Beard, International Fabricare Institute figures indicate half of the color change problems are due to manufacturing failures. "Some of the dyes may not be colorfast to light, others are not colorfast to water and some are not colorfast to drycleaning solvent," she says.

COLLEGE STATION-- Through the 4-H Eye Care Project being conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, thousands of Texas school-age youngsters are learning about the precious gift of sight and how to care for their eyes.



ants ye are to whom ye obey; whether of sin unto death, or of obedience unto righteousness?"





How To Protect Your Trees From Lightning

COLLEGE STATION--Lightning is often a companion of Texas thunderstorms, and it can be a deadly force to people, animals, trees and other property. One the main targets of lightning is tall or isolated trees, and certain devices are available to protect these trees, points out Lanny Dreesen, forester with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

"These systems protect not only the trees but also people, animals and buildings around trees," says Dreesen. "The system

work on the same principle as a lightning rod by providing a path of least resistance for a lightning bolt to follow. A metal conductor grounds the electrical current into the earth where it is safely dispersed." Cost of establishing such a system is quite expensive, notes the forester, since expertise is required to properly install it without undue damage to the trees. Certain firms specialize in lightning protection, and local county Extension agents may be able to provide information on these.

"Trees that should be considered for lightning protection are the tallest ones in a

given area and those that are within 10 feet of a building," says Dreesen. "Also, certain trees in parks and those of historical interest should be protected."

In addition to destroying trees, lightning kills thousands of animals each year. Also, 1,500 to 2,500 people are either killed or injured annually from lightning, Dreesen points out, referring to figures from the Lightning Protection Institute.

Lightning is also responsible for more than 30,000 fires in the United States each year. In areas of average electrical storm activity, one-half to three-fourths of the fire damage claims reported by insurance companies are attributable to lightning, adds the forester. Often lightning first strikes a tree and then skips or flashes to a nearby house.

Care Cleaning Can Cause Color Loss In Clothing

COLLEGE STATION--More consumers are finding that the clothes and household textiles they buy may fade or develop spots and streaks after just a few uses. This color change and loss can be traced to the fabric manufacturers, the consumer or the cleaning procedures used, says a Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service (TAEX) textile specialist.

"Some of the dyes may not be colorfast to light, others are not colorfast to water and some are not colorfast to drycleaning solvent," she says.

Beard points out that some manufacturers may use less expensive dyes to cut costs, and some imported clothes are made with dyes which

are not colorfast.

In addition, currently popular fibers, such as 100% cotton, are somewhat harder to dye, especially in the reds and blues. Some fashion colors may also be achieved with vegetable dyes which are more likely to fade, she adds.

Problems are also likely to arise when manufacturers place incomplete or incorrect care instructions in the item.

The TAEX specialist notes that industry figures show spilled household or hair bleach and incorrect use of bleach are the most common causes of color loss and fabric damage in the home. Incomplete or incorrect removal of food and beverage stains or other spots is another major problem.

two-tier system to exempt these products when they are purchased with food stamps or totally exempt taxes on candy, soft drinks and diluted juices.

He said the state has until September 30, 1987, to exempt the items or be forced out of the food stamp program.

"It's a real dilemma for the state and another financial headache that will face the Legislature when the session starts next January," Bullock said.

Bullock said that there are some 1.3 million persons in Texas eligible for federal food stamp assistance and that in 1986 an estimated \$714 million in food stamp payments will be made.

He said that unless Congress is willing to bend on the issue and make changes in the law before the deadline the state's food stamp eligibility will be threatened and another source of state tax revenue will be cut off at the knees.

County Extension Service Programs Benefit

COLLEGE STATION—The cattle industry, like all of agriculture, is under economic pressure, but strides are being made to help cattlemen "gain an edge" for economic survival.

The Texas Agricultural Extension Service of the Texas A&M University System is working with the state's beef cattle industry in this effort.

"Yet, many of our educational programs will be affected by decreased resources should budget cuts proposed at the federal level take place," says Dr. Zerle L. Carpenter, Extension Service director. "While the Extension Service will continue to focus its efforts on high quality educational pro-

grams aimed at meeting the needs of clientele, budget restraints will definitely limit the scope of these programs," Carpenter adds.

The following report of a successful educational effort clearly demonstrates that public funding for Extension is an investment which returns economic benefits in excess of funds committed to the Extension system, Carpenter emphasizes.

Through informal educational programs and result demonstrations, the Extension Service has helped cattlemen adopt new technology and proven practices that have helped them stay "afloat" during these tough economic times.

A key effort by the Extension Service in the past several years has been the development of regional integrated programs in beef production and management, points out Dr. John Beverly, Extension Service specialist in animal reproduction and animal science project leader.

These programs deal with the entire beef cattle picture—an interdisciplinary approach that includes all phases of production and management, ranging from forage production to health programs and marketing.

These regional efforts have involved surveys of producers to identify specific problem areas which, in turn, formed the basis for county and regional educational programs and

result demonstrations on individual farms and ranches. This grassroots approach has led to a sharp increase in participation by cattlemen, Beverly notes. In South Central Texas alone, Extension educational activities increased by 65 percent during the past year and attendance at these events was up 85 percent over the preceding year.

Efforts implemented by Extension specialists and county agents that have been particularly effective in improving beef production and returns to cattlemen included the following:

—Increased use of anhydrous ammonia in treating baled hay to improve its quality and value by some \$29 per ton and boosting cow weight gains by as much as 40 percent.

—Increased use of prescribed burning of native pastures and ranges to increase forage quality, thereby leading to a 17 percent increase in calf crop, a 32-pound increase in weaning weight, and a net return of \$13,500 or a \$6.75 return on every dollar invested.

—Demonstrated that lack of cow condition before calving and during breeding can reduce pregnancy rates to 52 percent and that exten-

ding the breeding season for two additional months did not increase pregnancy rates in thin cows.

—Demonstrated the economy of using small grains (wheat, oats and ryegrass) as winter pasture to improve the diet of late fall calving cows, thereby resulting in a 91 percent pregnancy rate at a total feed cost of 55 cents a day over a 120-day period.

—Assisted producers with controlled breeding and calving seasons that resulted in up to a 75-pound increase in weaning weights and up to a 35 percent increase in the number of calves weaned.

—Helped promote the use of performance-tested bulls, resulting in increased weaning weights of more than 100 pounds and a net value increase per calf of \$60 to \$80.

TSTA President Charles Beard Says Perot & White "Dead Wrong"

HOUSTON - TSTA President Charles Beard today said Governor White and Ross Perot were "dead wrong" about public confidence in the Texas teaching profession.

At a news conference today in Houston at the 107th Annual Convention of the Texas State Teachers Association, Beard announced the results of the Texas Poll which showed that over 70 percent of the people who responded to the survey rated teachers' competency "good" to "excellent." Only four percent felt teachers were doing a poor job.

TSTA commissioned cer-

tain questions as part of the Texas Poll that was conducted by the Public Policy Resource Lab at Texas A&M University and Harte-Hanks Communications.

"The politicians were off the mark when they said that teacher testing was absolutely necessary because the public has lost confidence in the teaching profession," Beard said. "Our poll indicates to us that the public in general has a high regard for the ability of the individual teachers in their local schools."

Beard said there wasn't a politician in the state with that kind of approval rating. According to TSTA, the

vote of confidence came from a broad base in all age categories, ethnic backgrounds, incomes, occupations, and regions.

"This proves that TECAT was enacted as a political excuse for raising taxes and not as a means to satisfy a disenchanted public," Beard added.

The TSTA leader said that the poll is good news to the teaching profession because it follows a most devastating week for teachers—the week of March 10 when the TECAT was given.

"On behalf of the teachers of Texas, TSTA expresses extreme gratitude for this overwhelming show of sup-

port," Beard said. "Teachers needed to hear from the public and the message is loud and clear."

"We encourage the public to let your teachers know that you appreciate them and the good efforts they are making on behalf of the children of Texas. We encourage parents and other groups to work with their teachers to assure that our children get the best education possible," he concluded.

Barrow Futurity, Swine Judging Clinic Announced

COLLEGE STATION - Texas pork producers will be able to see how their top barrows fare by entering them in the Texas Barrow Futurity at Texas A&M University Aug. 18-19. A Swine Judging Clinic will be held in conjunction with the futurity.

The futurity is being conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service in cooperation with the Texas Pork Producers Association and Texas Pork Producers Board.

Purpose is to demonstrate to Texas swine producers the criteria for selecting top market hogs and to compare the placings of live animals with their carcasses, points out Dr. Bill Thomas, Extension swine specialist.

"We have had a lot of interest by producers on what a top market hog should look like, both on the hoof and on the rail," Thomas explains, "and we expect this futurity to get a lot of attention."

The futurity will be limited to 40 barrows each weighing between 200 and 260 pounds. A producer or family may nominate only one barrow, and the nomination must include a \$100 fee.

Live placings will be handled by Dr. Lauren Christian of Iowa State

University and Harold Hodson of Swine Genetics International, Inc., Cambridge, Iowa.

Placings in the futurity will be based on both live and carcass evaluations, with each worth 50 percent. Cash awards will be given to first and second places in each of five weight classes, with the overall champion getting \$1,000 and the reserve champion, \$500.

Barrows accepted in the futurity will be checked in on Aug. 17 from 5 to 8 p.m. Registration for the judging clinic, which is for adults only, will be from 6 to 9 p.m. that evening and from 6:30 to 7:45 a.m. the next morning.

Clinic registrants will judge the barrows in the futurity that morning, with an afternoon session on swine selection, barrow shows and related topics.

The second day's program will feature a carcass evaluation of the futurity barrows, followed by results of the futurity and the judging contest.

Individuals interested in nominating a barrow for the futurity or in preregistering for the judging clinic can obtain forms at their local county Extension office, notes Thomas.


