

COLLEGE STATION --Regardless of your alma mater or college loyalty, you'll be proud of our state's outstanding educational facilities and opportunities after a tour of the campus of Texas A&M University.

The A&M campus was on the itinerary of our travel trailer caravan, and it was a very interesting tour. The A&M complex is spread over 5,142 acres and represents a physical plant valued at more than \$500 million dollars. The school's enrollment is approximately 36,000 students, including 14,000 women.

Texas A&M University is one of the 10 largest schools in the nation. It includes 11 colleges that offer both under-graduate and graduate training in virtually every field of endeavor. Its Veterinary Medicine school is the largest in the country, and the College of Agriculture is the second largest in the nation.

The Texas A&M faculty numbers some 2,700 men and women and some 80 per cent of them hold doctorate degrees. A&M has produced three Rhodes Scholars in recent years, and three Nobel Prize recipients are affiliated with the university. Texas A&M leads the state's public institutions of higher learning in research budgets, spending some \$138 million last year. The research park of A&M includes 318 acres with assorted buildings and facilities.

Water Treatment Plant

Contract Awarded On

Waldroup & Associates, Inc. of Lubbock was awarded the construction contract for the new Wastewater Treatment Facility by the City of Cisco in a special called meeting last Tuesday.

Mike Moore, city manager, said the above named contractor submitted a bid of \$579,771.00. He also said Waldroup & Associates appears to be a good contractor. The project will take approximately 180-210 days.

The old sewer plant was built in 1925 and is old and dilapidated, Mr. Moore said. It was not designed to carry the amount of sewage that is being forced on it now. He also added that it is not the City's idea to get into this problem this soon, but the State of Texas has brought a suit against Cisco and the problem has to be fixed. Cisco has been mandated by the State of Texas and there is no choice but to comply with them. The City is going through the cheapest and easiest way the State will allow, Mr. Moore said.


The councilmen also voted and approved to let the First National Bank of Cisco hold \$390,000 in Utility System Revenue bonds and \$150,000 general obligation tax bonds in an escrow agreement for the City of Cisco.

In other action the councilmen approved an amendment to increase monthly sanitary sewer rates.

Manager Mike Moore stressed that he regrets the increased sewer rate but it has to be done. He also said he is very happy taxes do not have to be raised at this time. Tax Plan Benefits Nation's Small Business

WASHINGTON,

D.C.--America's small businesses, which create more than 70 percent of all the nation's new jobs, stand to reap many benefits from a tax reform plan now being considered in the U.S. Senate.

Drafted by Oregon Sen. Bob Packwood, chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, the proposal contains several pluses for small firms ranging from cuts to simpler filing methods.

"Senator Packwood's efforts to help American small business grow are evident in this plan," National Federation of Independent Business President & CEO John Sloan Jr. said. "While many tradeoffs were necessary to provide a revenue-neutral tax reform bill, the chairman has shown his commitment by offering a proposal which will stimulate economic expansion

Tax reform has long been a priority of the half-millionplus members of NFIB, who see the present tax code as too complex and biased in favor of big business. In surveys of its memebership, the federation found that 51 percent of those responding thought Congress should lower taxes and eliminate deductions and 87 percent viewed the current tax code as too complicated.

New Social Security rules for deciding whether a mentally impaired person is disabled and unable to work are now in effect. The first such changes since 1979, they were developed as part of the Social Security Disability Benefits Reform Act of 1984.

The Social Security Administration began revising the rules prior to the legislation in close cooperation with leading public and private mental health experts. Many recommendations of this working group were incorporated into the 1984 law, and later into regulations published in August 1985.

The changes in the new rules reflect evolving knowledge of mental illness and the latest advances in diagnosis, evaluation, and treatment. They help to ensure that mental impairments will be judged fairly, accurately, and uniformly at all decision

levels, nationwide. The revised medical evaluation criteria for mental impairments clearly outline when an individual's condition is so severe that he or she can be presumed disabled. If a presumption cannot be made based on these revised criteria, but a severe impairment exists, a






Connie Gosnell Receives Scholarship

1940-50. One of his cases as district attorney was the successful prosecution of a Taylor County man for the murder of Merkel constable Chester Hutcheson.


Walter was a partner in private practice in the law firm of McMahan, Springer, Smart and Walter.

Last week we were talking about the many causes of ear problems. Well, tinnitus has many causes, and that is what we will be discussing in this article.

Some are due to diseases of the inner ear (The Cochlea) and are accompanied by hearing loss. Medication (for example aspirin in high doses), tumors (rarely), metabloic disorders (for example metabolic diabetes) disorders (for example otosclerosis) poor movement of bones in the middle ear and other causes. In addition, tinitus may come from the arteries in the brain, especially if there is a bulge (aneurysm) in one of them

Oil And Gas Association Shows

Concern About Oil Prices

AUSTIN, Texas - Richard C. Hudson, chairman of **Texas Mid-Continent Oil and** Gas Association, expressed his concern about the valuation of oil and gas properties by local jurisdictions in light of the dramatic drop in crude oil and natural gas prices.

"These dramatic declines in oil and gas prices are unprecedented in the last 50 years that the Texas oil and gas industry has been supporting our state and local governments through severance taxes and local property taxes." Hudson said, "This economic condition was recognized by the State Comptroller in May of 1985, almost a year ago, when he gave his estimate for revenues for the current biennium, and there have been many other factors that have heralded this dramatic event.'

Never before in history has the oil and gas industry experienced such an economic downturn. Drilling operations and the workover of older wells have been curtailed or in many instances abandoned. Oil and gas exploration projects are being postponed or totally scrapped as companies restructure their organizations to survive.

"The property tax law provides that valuations be on a fair market value," said Hudson. He urged that 'local taxing jurisdictions make their valuations based on market conditions that have existed for well over a year and currently exist in the values of oil and gas."

And the wooden building where the meeting was held stands there today for you to see and photography and contemplate. It is known as Independence Hall.

The park includes the original home of Anson Jones, the fourth and last president of the Republic of Texas - the man in office when the state became part of the United State. The Jones home is remarkably well preserved with much of the original furnishings, including his eye glasses and Bible.





Texas Army: According to official reports, 783 soldiers took part in the battle; between 200 and 250 men were left in camp at Harrisburg either because they were sick or were detailed to guard the army's baggage. About 900 men later claimed to have taken part in the battle. Commander in Chief: Samuel Houston.

Among the Texans were Capt. William M. Eastland and William Pike Tindell. Capt. Eastland is buried at LaGrange and Hero Tindell died in 1901 and is buried at Eastland Cemetery.

Benjamin Rice Brigham, 19, of Massachusetts, killed at San Jacinto, was an ancestor of the late Jim Horton of Eastland.

Mexican Army: The Mexican force present for the engagement numbered between 1,300 and 1,600 men. Commander in Chief and President of Mexico: Antonio Lopez de Santa Anna Perez de Lebron. Events Leading up to the

Battle Oct. 02, 1835 - First shots of

the Texas Revolution are fired at Gonzales. Oct. 11, 1835 - Texas's first

revolutionary government, the Permanent Council, meets at San Felipe de Austin.

Nov. 03, 1835 - A.new Texas government, called The Consultation, meets at San Felipe de Austin and sets up a temporary government. The Consultation adjourns November 14, 1835, and agrees to meet again on March 1, 1836.

Dec. 4-10, 1835 - Texas forces capture San Antonio and force General Martin Perfecto de Cos's army to leave Texas.

Jan. 17, 1836 - Sam Houston sends Jim Bowie to San Antonio with orders to blow up the Alamo.

Jan. 25, 1836 - Santa Anna and his army leave Saltillo. Mexico, bound for Texas.

Feb. 02, 1836 - Bowie writes to the head of the Texas government that he and Col. James C. Neill had decided to defend the Alamo rather

March 19, 1836 - Texas men owned land in Texas. forces under James W. Fannin are defeated in the Battle of the Coleto near Goliad.

March 26, 1836 - Houston continues his retreat; colonists east of the Colorado panic and begin fleeing for Louisiana in the Runaway Scrape.

March 27, 1836 - Fannin and his troops are executed at Goliad. Houston reaches San Felipe de Austin.

March 28, 1836 - Houston leaves for Groce's plantation. Moseley Baker and 120 men remain to guard San Felipe and the crossing on the Brazos. Wylie Martin and 100 men go to hold the crossing at Fort Bend (Richmond). Moseley Baker's scouts mistake a herd of cattle for an approaching Mexican army, and they burn San Felipe to the ground.

March 31, 1836 - Houston's army reaches Groce's plantation, where they are to remain for almost two weeks. Houston uses the time to train the men to fight as an army

April 06, 1836 - Thomas J. Rusk, Secretary of War, joins the army.

April 07, 1836 - Santa Anna reaches the ruins of San Felipe. Finding the crossing guarded by Baker and his men, Santa Anna moves downstream to Fort Bend, where he takes the crossing

on April 10. April 11, 1836 - The "Twin Sisters," two 6-pound cannon given to Texas by the citizens of Cincinnati, Ohio, are received by Houston.

April 13, 1836 - Houston crosses to the east side of the Brazos and begins, on the 14th, to concentrate his forces at Donoho's, a fews miles to the east. Santa Anna leaves Fort Bend for Harrisburg, trying to capture the official of the Texas government.

April 15, 1836 - After a forced march, Santa Anna reaches Harrisburg at about 11:00 p.m. but finds the city abandoned except for three printers in the office of the newspaper "Telegraph and Texas Register." The printers tell Santa Anna that

Many had come to Texas in the weeks just before the battle in order to assist Texans in their struggle for the right to govern themselves. The nature of Houston's army was recorded by a recuit

from the United States who arrived on the morning of the battle: "We found the Texian force under Gen'l S. Houston encamped in the timber near Lynch's ferry over the San Jacinto River. A scene singularly wild and

picturesque presented itself to our view. Around 20 or 30 campfires stood as many groups of men: English, Irish, Scots, Mexicans, French, Germans, Italians, Poles, Yankees, all unwashed and unshaved, their long hair and beards and mustaches matted, their clothes in tatters and plastered with mud. A more

savage looking band could scarcely have been assembled. Yet many were gentlemen, owner of large estates. Some were distinguished for oratory, some in science, some in

medicine. Many had graced famous drawing rooms. Their guns were of every size and shape. They

When the fighting finally stopped, 630 Mexicans lay dead, 208 were wounded, and 730 were cap-

As a result of the Battle of San Jacinto, Texas won its independence from Mexico. Ten years later, Texas was annexed by the United States. In 1846 the United States and Mexico went to war over the disputed boundary between Texas and Mexico. As a result of this war, the United States acquired almost one million square miles of land: the states of New Mexico, Arizona, Nevada, California, and Utah, and parts of Colorado, Wyoming, Kansas, and Oklahoma.

Erasmo Seguin, a wealthy rancher near San Antonio, turned over his resources to the colonists during the

revolution and contributed huge amounts of food, horses, and mules to the fight for freedom. Others of Houston's army had only recently arrived in Texas. Fewer than 200 of his

had fallen to Mexican troops. Houston realized that his small force of 374 men, no matter how determined, was no match for Santa Anna's army. He ordered Gonzales to be burned and moved his force east to the Colorado River, where he intended to drill the men and make a stand. But

In April, the Mexican troops followed Houston across the Brazos at San Felipe, about 60 miles west of Fort Houston. Santa Anna thought that Sam Houston would escape to the safety of the United States, but that it still might be possible to capture President Burnet and the Texas government, which had been moved to Harrisburg. But he arrived there too late and decided to have Harrisburg burned. As historian Archie P. McDonald

tells it, when Sam Houston learned that Santa Anna had burned Harrisburg, he moved his men due east without conferring with anyone. Many felt they were being led away from battle. but he wrote to his friend Henry Raquet two days before the final confrontation. "We go to conquer. It is wisdom growing out of necessity to meet the enemy now; every consideration enforces it. No previous occasion would justify it.

On April 20, McDonald recounts. the Texans reached a field east of Fort Houston and a Mexican force faced them a mile away across a rolling prairie. An indecisive skirmish occurred that afternoon. Then sometime during the night. General Martin Perfecto de Cos arrived with 500 men. making Santa Anna's force the larger army-"upwards of 1500 men" in Houston's words. On the morning of April 21, the armies faced each other, the Texans anxious while their leaders

shouted for his men to hold their fire while a fife played "Will You Come to the Bower I Have Shaded for You?," a popular song of the time, to provide a marching cadence. His artillery-the "Twin Sisters," gifts from Cincinnati-opened a hole in the Mexican line and the Texans poured through. They had caught the Mexicans by surprise.

The battle lasted only eighteen minutes, McDonald says, but the carnage lasted for hours. The Texans lost two men in the action and seven of their thirty-some wounded later died. The Mexicans lost about 600 men and more than 700 were captured, including Santa Anna, who was discovered trying to escape the next day.

Houston's leg had been shattered during the battle and he lay under an oak tree when Santa Anna was brought to him. He soon left for New Orleans for medical treatment, leaving the task of negotiating with Santa Anna to Burnet. Santa Anna ordered all his troops to return to Mexico, which, surprisingly, they did. He conceded Texan independence in return for his safety. His government later repudiated these concessions.

From the Battle of San Jacinto, the new republic of Texas emerged. permanently changing and separating its fate from Mexico's.
