CISD To Build New School Building

Architect Tommie Huckabee was authorized to prepare plans and specifications for a new building to replace the present Intermediate School structure at a called meeting of the board of trustees last Thursday night.

Replacement of the existing building was designated as Phase II of an improvement program for the school last year. Phase I, which is under construction and which will provide classrooms and facilities for the primary grades and kindergarten, is expected to be completed in time for the 1986-87 school year.

Architect Huckabee was directed to prepare plans to tear down the present building and to erect a new building for contractors to

use in building. It was indicated the initial project of Phase II would be tearing down the office area and three class rooms to make way for eight new classrooms to be built with the other part of the building to be replaced when the eight rooms are finished. Officials said they would enable classes to use the eight old rooms while the new area was being prepared.

The board heard estimates that the new work would likely cost in the neighborhood of \$500,000 and that financing plans would be made after contractors submit bids.

Mr. Huckabee was asked to report back on his work at the regular May 5th meeting.

CJC Ranch Day Parade Saturday April 26

Ranch Day at Cisco Junior College on Wednesday, April 23, and a big downtown street parade at 10 a.m. Saturday, April 26, will be the opening events of the opening events of the 13th annual Frontier Jubilee and Folklife Festival week in Cisco April 21-27.

Mayor Joe Wheatley signed a proclamation last week formally designating the week of April 21-27 as Folklife Festival Week in Cisco.

Plans are complete for the Ranch Day program at Cisco Junior College on Wednesday. The event will include the annual "battle of the sexes" volleyball game at 10 a.m. and the student-faculty chili cook-off at 11:30 a.m.

Following the annual barbecue lunch at noon will be the judging of the best dressed cowboy and cowgirl, most typical cowboy and cowgirl, the ugliest, longest and most handsome beard and other events for students. At 1 p.m. activities will move to the CJC rodeo arena for such events as egg tossing, tow sack races, rescue races, girls' goat tying and a tug-o-war.

At 8 p.m., the annual Ranch Day western dance will be held at the Student Union Building.

The Saturday program will open with the College's annual "world's shortest trail ride" breakfast at Lake Cisco City Park. After the breakfast, horsemen will

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County Program Builders Committee Meeting




Ronald C. Wooley, District 8 Director of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, gave a talk and slide presentation before the crowd divided into groups.

A special Eastland County citizen study group began mapping a program for the future of the county during a meeting Tuesday night at Siebert Elementary School in Eastland.

Forty five county leaders

participated in the meeting. Study group leaders and recorders are Jay Lafferty and Don Mauney, Agriculture and Natural Resources, Delton Ake and Ron Butler II, Community Development, Mary Webb

and Oleta Moseley, Home Economics, Loys Allmand and Joe Housson, 4-H and Youth.

The four task force groups were formed to identify and discuss broad issues of concern, said Eastland County Extension Agents. DeMarquis Gordon, Janet Thomas and Crystal Akers Wilbanks are Eastland County Extension Agents with the Texas

Extension Service, the Texas A&M University System.

Similar study groups have been organized to represent all 254 counties of Texas. More than 10,000 leaders are contributing their ideas, as well as those of their neighbors, to assist in identifying critical concerns. Many of the problems have been triggered by rapid

changes in the state economy and population.

Besides the task force discussions, the Eastland County leaders heard talks by Charles Walker, Chairman of the Eastland County Program Builders Committee, Ronald C. Wooley, District 8 Director of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, and County Judge Scott Bailey.

In his opening remarks, Charles Walker stated that the first step in a study is to identify crucial local issues, and then work out a plan on how to deal with these needs into the 1990's. The recommendations from the people gathered here would determine the educational programs conducted by the Extension Staff of Eastland County and its volunteers, he said.

Ron Woolley told the group that the difference between a problem and an opportunity is a person's point of view. Eastland County, he said, has always been supportive of the Agricultural Extension programs, realizing that education helps solve problems.

"We are asking you to continue to work with us, to improve lives, homes and communities," he continued.

"The issues you identify will give us direction."

Woolley showed a film which detailed the two most critical state-wide issues identified in recent years. The first was Water, its lack and use, and the second problem was Rural and Urban relationships. A lot of work is being done on these and other problems, and some progress is being made, the Extension Director stated.

County Judge Scott Bailey gave a "Charge to the Troops". He thanked the people for "coming out to do something for your fellow man."

"Our nation is at peril," the Judge said. "If ever we needed good, solid citizens to put their shoulders to the wheel, it is tonight."

"Volunteerism is what made this country and the State of Texas great," he added.

"One example is Davy Crockett, who was in Texas only two days when he volunteered for the Alamo."

After these remarks the crowd of volunteers divided into their four groups. The discussion which followed lasted about two hours, with various topics under consideration.

This is far from the end of the meetings. Each task force will meet during May to continue identification of issues and develop background material or the problems related to the issues.

A final county meeting of task forces is planned for June 24 back at Siebert Elementary School. There the groups will present findings and establish priorities of the greatest concern.

Pastor Accepts Call To First Baptist Church



The Rev. Harry Garvin, interim pastor of the First Baptist Church since mid-January, accepted a call to take the pulpit on a permanent basis after the congregation voted to offer it to him last Sunday morning.

The political unrest in Uganda is such that Rev. Garvin and other missionaries had been given home leave. He reported that officials of the church advised him of the situation and left the decision of returning to him.

"Some 100 persons have

been killed in the area where our home was in the last ten days," Rev. Garvin said. "Our home there has been destroyed and we felt that a decision to return would be unwise at this time."

Rev. Garvin served in African missionary posts for 16 years, going there in 1970. He is a native of Luaders as is his wife Doris. He is a graduate of Howard Payne University and the Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary.

Rev. Garvin and his family resides in their farm home some 10 miles south of Cisco. He said they would be moving to the church parsonage on Primrose Street soon.



Most of us know Eastland County was named for William M. Eastland, one of the men who drew a black bean of death in Mexico. But, who was he and would our county have been named for him had he drawn a white bean instead?

We hope to answer these questions in the next several editions of the newspaper.

William Mosby Eastland, the son of Thomas B. and Nancy Mosby Eastland, was born in Woodford County, Kentucky on March 21, 1806.

When he was a child, the Eastland family, persuaded William to come

to Eastland (Burleson later served as Vice-President of the Republic of Texas and Caldwell is the County seat of the county that bears his name).

In 1834, William, in company with two of his brothers and Nicholas Mosby Dawson, arrived in Texas. They settled near present LaGrange, Fayette County, where they intended to engage in the sawmill and lumber business.

Spotlights & Sidelights

REFLECTIONS
The folks who were in Texas in 1836 had pledged allegiance to another country and another religious faith to get the land such promises gave them. Unlike many of the people of the thirteen colonies, most of the people who came to Texas came because they wanted to. Of course, they may have wanted to come because they were convicts, religious fanatics, or social outcasts—even as many of the colonists who made up the American Revolutionary forces were. It is doubtful if a halo was hidden under many sombreroes any more than under the fashionable tricorns. It is

even more doubtful if anyone cared for survival was the name of the game. Regardless of why they were here or there, many of the 1836 Texans were feeling that a fairly stable government (U.S.) was to be preferred to the musical chairs game going on in Mexico City and independence from either was even more desirable. Urgent business with the government? Fine! Wear out yourself and a couple of horses evading hostile Indians and conquering an equally hostile travel route. Get to Mexico City and the government has changed—again. Texans may have reason-

ed that the Mexicans weren't overly interested in us anyway. Mexico hadn't been independent from Spain as long as the United States had been free from England. The Mexican government—whichever one was current at any given moment—had a lot of homework to do in coping with Indians and climate south of the Rio Grande. There was little time for extra-curricular activity such as keeping open safe trade routes to Mexico City and preventing the Indians from attacking settlers in the far-flung area that was Texas. However, when the Texans took decisive action to create a government for

themselves, Santa Anna hit the trail north to put the quietus on such a revolting development. With all the power at his command, Santa Anna should have had a piece of cake, even if he was operating a long way from home base. The Texans were somewhat like the bumblebee is. Aerodynamically, it is a proved fact that the bee can't fly. The bumblebee, unacquainted with the theory of aerodynamics, flies anyway. Texans were outnumbered, outgeneralized (Santa Anna was a regular Whiz Kid on military strategy), and outsupplied. As with the bees, the Texans didn't have a feather to fly with. If the mixed bag that was Houston's army considered

the facts at all, they brushed them aside with remembering the Alamo and Goliad—and were determined not to become a like statistic. What did weigh with them was how long they had already been away from home; it was late for spring planting for some of them; and the unsettled ones had feet just itching to pull out from this war where they had only stopped by to lend a hand. Probably what routed Santa Anna was that the Texans played to win the war instead of by the rules of the book. It is hard to win any kind of game when your opponent makes the rules as he plays. For one reason or another, Santa Anna neglected to convince Sam Houston that he was already whipped. So Houston, not much of a rules player himself and pretty much irritated by the situa-

tion, naturally did not tell his men that their cause was doomed. These Texans had "joined up" to fight; they hadn't had a good one yet. Time was pushing them: Indian threats, unplowed fields, and the whisper on the wind for the fiddle-footed ones. All these factors combined to get the Texan forces pumping adrenalin at such a rate that Houston okayed an afternoon offensive April 21 instead of the early morning attack planned for April 22. For Santa Anna, his siesta that day had to be the most ill-advised, expensive nap in history. Isn't it about siesta time for Khadafy? Thursday, April 24, 1986

Spotlights & Sidelights

REFLECTIONS
The folks who were in Texas in 1836 had pledged allegiance to another country and another religious faith to get the land such promises gave them. Unlike many of the people of the thirteen colonies, most of the people who came to Texas came because they wanted to. Of course, they may have wanted to come because they were convicts, religious fanatics, or social outcasts—even as many of the colonists who made up the American Revolutionary forces were.

It is doubtful if a halo was hidden under many sombreros any more than under the fashionable tricorn. It is even more doubtful if anyone cared when survival was the name of the game. Regardless of why they were here or there, many of the 1836 Texans were feeling that a fairly stable government (U.S.) was to be preferred to the musical chairs game going on in Mexico City and independence from either was even more desirable. Urgent business with the government? Fine! Wear out yourself and a couple of horses evading hostile Indians and conquering an equally hostile travel route. Get to Mexico City and the government has changed—again. Texans may have reason-

ed that the Mexicans weren't overly interested in us anyway. Mexico hadn't been independent from Spain as long as the United States had been free from England. The Mexican government—whichever one was current at any given moment—had a lot of homework to do in coping with Indians and climate south of the Rio Grande. There was little time for extra-curricular activity such as keeping open safe trade routes to Mexico City and preventing the Indians from attacking settlers in the far-flung area that was Texas. However, when the Texans took decisive action to create a government for

themselves, Santa Anna hit the trail north to put the quietus on such a revolting development. With all the power at his command, Santa Anna should have had a piece of cake, even if he was operating a long way from home base. The Texans were somewhat like the bumblebee is. Aerodynamically, it is a proved fact that the bee can't fly. The bumblebee, unacquainted with the theory of aerodynamics, flies anyway. Texans were outnumbered, outgeneralized (Santa Anna was a regular Whiz Kid on military strategy), and outsupplied. As with the bees, the Texans didn't have a feather to fly with.

If the mixed bag that was Houston's army considered the facts at all, they brushed them aside with remembering the Alamo and Goliad—and were determined not to become a like statistic. What did weigh with them was how long they had already been away from home; it was late for spring planting for some of them; and the unsettled ones had feet just itching to pull out from this war where they had only stopped by to lend a hand. Probably what routed Santa Anna was that the Texans played to win the war instead of by the rules of the book. It is hard to win any kind of game when your opponent makes the rules as he plays. For one reason or another, Santa Anna neglected to convince Sam Houston that he was already whipped. So Houston, not much of a rules player himself and pretty much irritated by the situa-

tion, naturally did not tell his men that their cause was doomed. These Texans had "joined up" to fight; they hadn't had a good one yet. Time was pushing them: Indian threats, unplowed fields, and the whisper on the wind for the fiddle-footed ones. All these factors combined to get the Texan forces pumping adrenalin at such a rate that Houston okayed an afternoon offensive April 21 instead of the early morning attack planned for April 22. For Santa Anna, his siesta that day had to be the most ill-advised, expensive nap in history. Isn't it about siesta time for Khadafy? Thursday, April 24, 1986

Most of us know Eastland County was named for William M. Eastland, one of the men who drew a black bean of death in Mexico. But, who was he and would our county have been named for him had he drawn a white bean instead?

We hope to answer these questions in the next several editions of the newspaper.

William Mosby Eastland, the son of Thomas B. and Nancy Mosby Eastland, was born in Woodford County, Kentucky on March 21, 1806.

When he was a child, the Eastland family, persuaded William to come


to Eastland (Burlison later served as Vice-President of the Republic of Texas and Caldwell is the County seat of the county that bears his name).

In 1834, William, in company with two of his brothers and Nicholas Mosby Dawson, arrived in Texas. They settled near present LaGrange, Fayette County, where they intended to engage in the sawmill and lumber business.



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
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
