Saturday May 3, Is Primary Election

Residents of Cisco will join voters of Eastland County and all of Texas on Saturday, May 3, to cast ballots in the Democratic Party's first primary election. Ciscoans will vote at the Laguna Hotel Corral Room and some 1,200 persons are expected to cast ballots.

Chairman Dorothy Thomas of Precinct 8 will be the presiding official for voting in Cisco, and she reported that 12 assistants will be on hand to handle vote counting and election details. Voting will be from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

The official ballot, which appears elsewhere in The Press, lists Democratic party candidates for governor, lieutenant governor, attorney general, comptroller of public accounts, state treasurer, land office commissioner, agriculture commissioner, railroad commissioner and seven supreme court and appeals court posts on the state level.

In the district, voters will choose between Incumbent Jim Parker and Challenger Joseph B. Swanner for state representative in the 65th district. Bob Dickenson is unopposed for a position on the 11th district, court of appeals.

On the county level, candidates are as follows:

District attorney - Emory C. Walton and Leslie B. Vance.

County judge - Scott Bailey (unopposed).

District clerk - Dorothy J. Pyke and Mary Jane Rowch-Brown.

County clerk - Sherry Staggs Johnson and Joann Johnson.

County treasurer - Ruth Pugliese, Betty Cross and

Rita Reid Byrd.

County surveyor - Richard L. Johnson, Jr. (unopposed).

County Democratic Chairman - Mrs. Scott J. Bailey.

In the precinct, Cisco voters will elect a county commissioner (precinct 4) and a justice of the peace (precinct 4). Candidates are:

County commissioner - Billy C. Cozart, Billy Bacon Jr., Reggie Pittman Sr., Harold Nelms Pippen and Danny Claborn.

Justice of the Peace - Bruce Speegle, Willard L. Johnson and J.V. Heysler.

Mrs. Thomas is unopposed for re-election as precinct Democratic Party chairman.

Some 120 persons had cast absentee ballots at the county clerk's office Monday. Absentee voting was scheduled to end at 5 p.m. Tuesday.

Elsewhere in the county, voters will cast ballots in Eastland at the courthouse, in Olden at the community building, in Ranger at the community clubhouse, in Desdemona at the school, in Gorman at the fire hall, in Carbon at the school, in Rising Star at the city hall, and at Lake Leon at the Morris Newnham home.

Republicans will hold primary voting at the city hall in Eastland, at the new

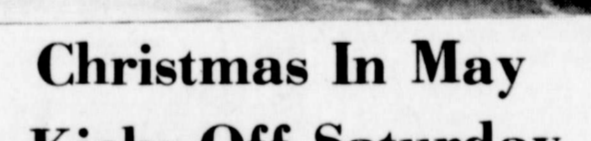
fire station in Gorman, at the school tax office in Rising Star and at 1010 W. 7th Street in Cisco.

Democrats have announced that precinct commissions will be held on Saturday, May 3. In Cisco, the precinct meeting will be at 8 p.m. Saturday at the Corral Room, Mrs. Thomas announced.

Both Democrats and Republicans will hold their county conventions on Saturday, May 17. Mrs. Scott Bailey has announced that Democrats will meet at 2 p.m. May 17th at the district courtroom in Eastland. Convention delegates will be named at the May 3rd precinct gatherings.

Jim Keffer, county Republican chairman, reported that the Republicans convention will be held at 10 a.m. May 17th at the county commissioners courtroom on the second floor of the courthouse in Eastland.

The Republican primary ballot lists candidates for governor, lieutenant governor, attorney general, commissioner of the land office, agriculture and railroad, three supreme court places, state representative (John Ed Nevill and Joe Branham), county commissioner (Jammie Fry), and county chairman (James L. Keffer).

ORDINANCE NO. 0-864 AN AMENDMENT REVISING SECTION 20-24, SUBSECTION (a) AND (b) OF THE UTILITY RATE ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF CISCO, TEXAS INCREASING MONTHLY SANITARY SEWER RATES AND USERS CHARGE; ENACTING PROVISIONS RELATING TO THE SUBJECT AND PURPOSES OF THIS ORDINANCE; PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

WHEREAS, the City of Cisco is in the process of providing and constructing a new wastewater treatment facility as mandated by the State of Texas; and

WHEREAS, it is now proper and necessary to increase certain sanitary sewer system charges and rates to fund the operating and debt expenses for said new wastewater treatment facility; now, therefore,

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CISCO, TEXAS THAT:

PART I: Section 20-24, Subsection (a) and (b) of the City's Utility Rate Ordinance be amended as follows:

(a) All sewer usage charges shall be based upon the total water usage registered on the customer's water meter. Along with the "base charge" established in this ordinance, there shall be a user charge to fund operation and maintenance cost of the treatment facilities.

(b) The monthly rates for sanitary sewer service shall be as follows:

(1.) RESIDENTIAL

a. First 4,000 gallons metered.....\$8.75

b. First 4,000 gallons metered for persons over sixty-five years of age; totally disabled persons, city employees and volunteer firemen \$7.25

c. Next 8,000 gallons, per 1,000 gallons metered.....\$0.50

(2.) COMMERCIAL

a. First 4,000 gallons metered.....\$8.75

b. Over 4,000 gallons, per 1,000 gallons metered.....\$0.50

(3.) PUBLIC SCHOOLS

a. First 4,000 gallons metered.....\$8.75

b. Over 4,000 gallons, per 1,000 gallons metered.....\$0.50

(c.) The "base charge" for a sewer user as defined herein shall apply to each sewer user individually as a residence, mobile home, commercial building, or other dwelling; and in instances where more than one user is served by one master meter, the "base charge" shall be multiplied times the number of apartments, dwelling units or mobile homes being served by a master water meter.

(d.) Any sewer user located outside the city limits shall pay a monthly charge of \$17.00.

PART II: The City administration shall review the rates and charges established under this ordinance on at least an annual basis and make adjustments to said rates as necessary. The City shall notify each user at least annually, in conjunction with regular a sewer

bill, the sewer service rates and that portion of the user charges that are attributable to the operation and maintenance of the wastewater treatment system.

PART III: Effective Date - These revised rates and charges shall be effective as of May 15, 1986.

PART IV: Any portion of any ordinances in conflict with the rates and charges established by this ordinance, but only insofar as the provisions are in conflict herewith, are hereby repealed.

PART V: Due to the fact that this amendment in sanitary sewer system rates and charges is effective May 15, 1986, and must be a part of the ordinances issuing the Revenue and General Obligation Bonds for the new wastewater treatment facility approved on April 15, 1986, the City Council hereby declares an emergency and that the provision of the Charter of the City of Cisco calling for two readings of an ordinance be dispensed with, and that this ordinance take effect as an emergency measure immediately upon its passage and approval and upon publication thereof in accordance with the requirements of law.

The county government and I also assisted her in projecting the budget for that office. While in this position I attended the schools and seminars given in order to stay current with the changes in the laws that effected that office. I left my job at the County Clerk's office to go to work for Sun Exploration and Production Company as an Abstractor and Title Analyst. I have been employed in this position for almost five years. While working for Sun I have had the opportunity to learn how to operate two different computer systems. This experience would help me because as your County Treasurer I would like to put all the Treasurer's records on the computer system that is already available and which the other county offices are presently utilizing. 

Edsel: Not just another lemon

CISCO — People driving through Cisco may think they have entered the Twilight Zone when they pass the green-and-white Edsel car dealership sign atop Herman's Auto Parts on Conrad Hilton Avenue.

The sign is the latest acquisition of Herman Eaker, a self-described "Edsel nut" who has been collecting the classic cars for two decades.

Eaker (pronounced Aker) bought the sign recently in Fort Worth.

His Edsel mania is not inexpensive. He would not disclose what he paid for the sign, saying, "People would

think I am crazy! Eaker started collecting and restoring Edsels in 1966. Now he has 14 of the cars made in 1958-59 by the Ford Motor Co. Seven are in running order, with three (two convertibles and a 2-door hardtop) in excellent condition.

Some are "junkers" used for parts. Eaker is restoring two cars — a 1959 yellow four-door sedan and a 1959 pink-and-white four-door hardtop.

Eaker said he always restores the cars to their original colors. He added that the Edsel was produced in a lot of wild colors and his ultimate goal is to own a turquoise convertible.

But Eaker, in high school at the time, said he always liked the car, even though most comments made about its grille "were unprintable."

After graduating from Cisco High School in 1969, Eaker worked as a mechanic for Charlie Graham Ford Co. He and Evelyn Sublett were married in 1961.

Their two children, Herman and Barbara, were toddlers in 1966 when their dad bought his first Edsel.

From the Cisco Press of November 11, 1965, was an Editorial commemorating Veterans' Day and a list of the Eastland County military personnel who gave their lives in WWI, WWII and the Korean War.

Other exhibits were a copy of the Texas Revolution song, "The New Yankee Doodle" written in 1836; an early-day potato slicer, brought by Mrs. Pearl Carson; the Texas Monthly's Centennial Collector's Issue, January, 1986; and a number of Texas Highway magazines, published by Texas Highway Department, and containing fabulous pictures of Texas scenery and wildflowers, and stories of the State's past and present.

The refreshment table was centered with an antique blue and white pitcher and bowl holding an arrangement of pink blossoms. Another floral arrangement was of yellow roses. A beautifully decorated cake, in the shape of Texas, had colors of red, white, blue and yellow, with icing that spelled "Happy Birthday, Texas-150th." The cake was made by Mrs. Marie Kurklin. Table cloth was blue-checked, reminiscent of old-time, every day table coverings. Punch, cookies and candies were served. Cisco Garden Club was responsible for decorations and flower arrangements.

"...ONE NATION, UNDER GOD..."

It's just as well May Day is National Prayer Day. With Khadafy and his ilk setting off fireworks, inciting unrest and rebellion, and plotting vicious misdeeds, it's time for local, national and international prayers—not to mention individual.

My cousin, George, taught me early that the best defense was a good offense. He teased. He grabbed my books and ran; he buried my rag doll—Sally never was the same after a resurrection and trip through Mamuna's lye-soaped tub.

Yep, my "other" cheek got a frequent workout until I came to recognize the signals that George was on a tear. I suppose he would be considered hyperactive now. I was hyperslow. But I knew his teasing would go on and on and on if I didn't take action at once when he started one of our battles.

He started the wars that I finished when I caught him. I took some pretty rough treatment, and lots of times I held on because I didn't know how to turn loose. But once I got my arms locked around his waist...both of us usually got a spanking, just to relieve Mamuna's nerves. I didn't give up until I caught him, either, though I knew the spanking was coming and both of us were tired,

hot, cross, and wishing we'd never even heard of each other.

A major maxim of my childhood was, "Always finish what you start." Rebellion against this idea may account for the unfinished afghans, pieces of needlepoint, half-done embroidery and other "shot" projects I keep around.

But I kept at it until I nailed George because it was the only guarantee I had that hostilities wouldn't break out as soon as I relaxed.

Sometimes peace would reign for two or three months after I'd squeezed his stomach into his backbone. No, we couldn't "tell on" each other—that's the reason we both got spanked: neither one of us ever admitted "Who started it?"

Our backyard tussles were much like the international situations today.

My own thinking says that action (war) escalates if we (U.S.) do not take the offensive. It is almost a certainty that it will anyway.

The sympathy for Khadafy's adopted baby strikes me as maudlin. What about the baby, mother and grandmother that got blown to glory through the hole in the side of that plane? Of course, babies will die. So will many other people. Are lives more expendable because they are adult?

to my knowledge, admittedly incomplete, everyone is some mother's baby. I believe it will continue this way for some time yet.

No, I don't like warfare. I didn't like teasing, either. But if warfare or teasing is forced on you, get in there and win. This pacifist business can get you killed, too. Terrorists love pacifists. They know exactly where to plant the next bomb.

It probably takes something like Khadafy to flush out our friends. Do't have many, do we?

At the moment I am in favor of sending the Statute of Liberty back to France, freight collect.

We could get this boiling war pot off the front burner much sooner if we, (1.) clamped down on all foreign aid, (2.) slapped a tax on all OPEC oil, and (3.) pulled out our military bases out of countries giving aid and comfort—to terrorists.

Hit the pocketbook. Make them understand we no longer support their illusions of grandeur.

How that fits into a prayer, I am not sure. But in considering the situation, our lack of specific knowledge as individuals, man's fallibility and God's infallibility, I believe the best way to observe National Prayer Day is a simple, "God, help us. Amen."

Owen, Pct. 3 and C.B. Bill, Pct. 4. County Judge Scott Bailey presided, and County Clerk JoAnn Johnson recorded minutes.

A request was approved for North Ridge Corporation to cross a County Road in Pct. 3 with a gas pipeline. This is five miles N.W. of Rising Star.

Also approved was a Service Contract with Kirb's Office Machines of Mullin, Texas for maintenance of

typewriters and office machines in the Courthouse.

There are 23 machines to be cleaned and served, and the bid for next year is \$2203.50. This same company has held the Service Contract for 15 years, and the work has always been reported as satisfactory.

There was a brief discussion of pending litigation against the county. Among other items were budgetary and appropriate matters. Bills, claims and accounts were approved.

The next meeting of Commissioners Court will be May 12.

Who Was Eastland?

A few months after the battle of San Jacinto, William Eastland enlisted in the Texas Rangers. He was promoted to Captain on December 14, 1836.

law and regulations. They would ride great distances along the Texas frontiers to repel or destroy raiding parties; towards the southwest to oppose the Mexicans and towards the west and northwest to oppose the Plains Indians.

It was one of these in-

ursions to the northwest that Eastland would visit the land that would eventually bear his name.

Historian John Henry Brown addressed the Texas Veterans Association at their reunion in Dallas, on the semi-centennial of San Jacinto Day, April 21, 1886:

"Forty-nine years ago, in the autumn of 1837, when all this country, known as North and Northwest Texas, was an unpeopled wilderness, excepting in its occupancy by roving tribes of hostile savages, a company of about fifty volunteers, under the command of Capt. William M. Eastland, left LaGrange, on the lower Colorado, on an expedition against the savages in the upper country, the commander being a soldier of San Jacinto, and the same Christian prisoner who

draw a black bean in the lottery of life and was one of the seventeen martyrs shot unto death as malefactors, by the order of Santa Anna, at the hacienda of Salado, in the interior of Mexico, March 25, 1843. In due time this company reached the highlands, now in Eastland county, dividing the waters of Pecan bayou, the Leon and the

Clear fork of the Brazos. There they divided into two parties - the larger under Capt. Eastland, returning south on the Colorado side of the country - the other, consisting of twenty men, under Lieuts. Van Benthuyzen and Miles, move northeasterly.....

The Cisco Folklife Festival drew a big crowd this year. Visitors flocked downtown to the Old Rockwell Lumber Yard, and circled around all the booths and demonstrations. There was continual entertainment under the big tent, with dance routines and

a number of different kinds of music. The Fiddler's Contest draw a large number of entries Sunday afternoon, especially in the Under-60 Division. This Folk Festival had a special "First" - this was the first time a Chamber of Commerce sponsored Art Exhibit was held. This showing was in a building at 1108 Conrad Hilton, and a number of visitors stopped by.

Saturday, May 3 is the date set for the "Christmas in May project." There are several small projects and one large one scheduled, and it will take a number of workers to complete them in one day. This community service project helps the ill, handicapped and seniors each year with home repairs. Lunch will be served to the workers on the job locations, and Coca Cola will furnish the drinks.

Joe Besselar, member of the City Council for more than two years, has resigned his office. Besselar said that he was resigning because he was moving to Cottonwood to live, and did not feel he should remain in city government when not a resi-

dent. City Manager Mike Moore said the City would probably act on the resignation at the May 13 meeting.

The chimes or carillon bells are ringing again at the First United Methodist Church. Thanks to Dickie Seider and Russ Williams. The bells had been silent for several years - but these young Church members decided to see what they could do about it. Seider studied the bells and the book and determined the problem. He ordered some parts and installed same, along with a good cleaning job. He was assisted by Williams. Now the chimes ring on the hour and half hour. They also occasionally play hymns.

The City Council has directed City Manager Mike Moore to prepare plans and specifications for a metal ground storage tank to replace the concrete storage basin at College Hill. This is considered the most economical way to solve the problem, for such a reservoir can be obtained at 40 to 50 percent less than the cost of building a new roof on the present 500,000-gallon reservoir. The cost of rebuilding a roof on the present reservoir would cost more than \$100,000 Moore said. State Health Department regulations require such reservoirs be covered.

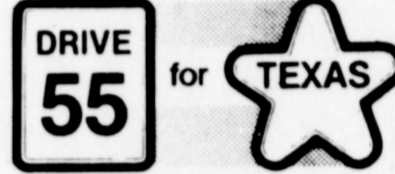

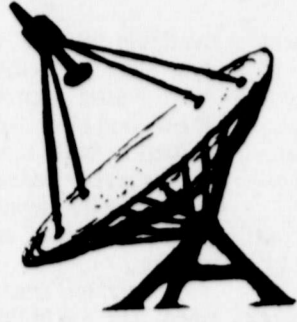

CJC Regents Canvass Runoff Votes

Returns of last Saturday's runoff election were canvassed and certified, board officers were elected for the coming two years and matters affecting next year's budget were studied at a called meeting of the board of regents of Cisco Junior College Monday night.
 A recount of the 249 ballots cast in last Saturday's runoff election showed that L.D. (Dick) Woolley, president of First National Bank, won a 4-vote victory over Raymond Whitley, local auto body shop owner. The results had been initially announced as 125 for Woolley and 122 for Whitley.

A committee composed of Lloyd McGrew, board secretary, and M.L. Bailey, Thelma Smith and Garl Gorr conducted a re-count of the ballots. After the re-count results were announced, the board voted to certify the election.

Mr. Woolley, who had been serving as board president, was reelected to that office. Brad Kimbrough was named vice president, and Mr. McGrew was re-elected board secretary. Election of regents, who serve six year terms, takes place every two years.
 Dr. Henry E. McCullough, college president, told the board that in view of prospects for a substantial cut in state funding for next year, the administration had been seeking ways to cut expenses as work gets underway to prepare a budget for 1986-87.

A suggestion that tuition fees be raised from the present \$6 to \$10 per semester hour for students who live in

the college district was approved by the board. Out-of-district students will pay \$10 per semester hour plus \$4 additional in fees, effective immediately.
 The increase in tuition and fees is expected to bring in some \$200,000 in additional local income next school year. Dr. McCullough said. More than three fourths of the students live out of the district. State funding is expected to drop as much as \$300,000 next year, the board was told.

Salaries paid part-time instructors, mostly at Clyde and Abilene campuses, were set at \$250 per semester hour, a cut from \$300 per hour, on recommendation of the administration. The board previously had frozen other salaries.
 Dr. McCullough, who emphasized that "we are endeavoring to keep all of our employees," said that they were recommending substantial reductions in non-essential spending in next year's budget. The recommendations include eliminating budget items as follows: tri-colleg program, \$10,000; opera, \$2,300; yearbook \$10,377; high school basketball classic, \$3,800; drill team competition, \$810; faculty meeting (Abilene-Clyde), \$611; drive-in band camp \$728; Christmas reception, \$839; band and belle pre-school camp, \$1,400; Ranch Day \$3,000; summer theater pay for professionals, \$30,820; employee appreciation dinner, \$1,230; and, Washington Trip, \$18,706.

A committee of regents composed of Mr. Woolley, Bill Reynolds and Mr. Kim-

brough was named to meet with the administration to study the proposed non-essential spending cuts and to report at the regular monthly meeting of the board on May 12th.

County Judge Scott Bailey administered the oath of office to Mr. Woolley for a new term as a member of the board.

City Manager Mike Moore appeared before the board to request that a strip of land measuring some 45x75 feet adjoining the present site of the city water reservoir on college hill be made

available for use in expanding storage facilities. The board voted approval. Mr. Moore said plans were being studied to build a new half-million gallon storage tank in place of the present facility that requires expensive repairs.

Present for the meeting were Mr. Woolley, Mr. Reynolds, Charles Preston, J.D. Yardley, Rudolph Schaefer, Wm. E. (Bill) Austin, Mr. Kimbrough, Roy Dennis and Mr. McGrew along with Dr. McCullough, Attorney Billy Wright, Secretary Emma Watts, Raymond Whitley, Ralph Glenn and others.

Many of us have already made up our minds— and join in urging others to think about it in advance and be ready to vote when the time comes.

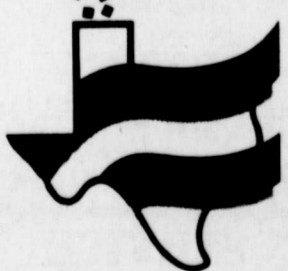
Not to vote at all is the worst vote of all.

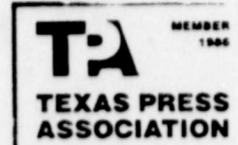

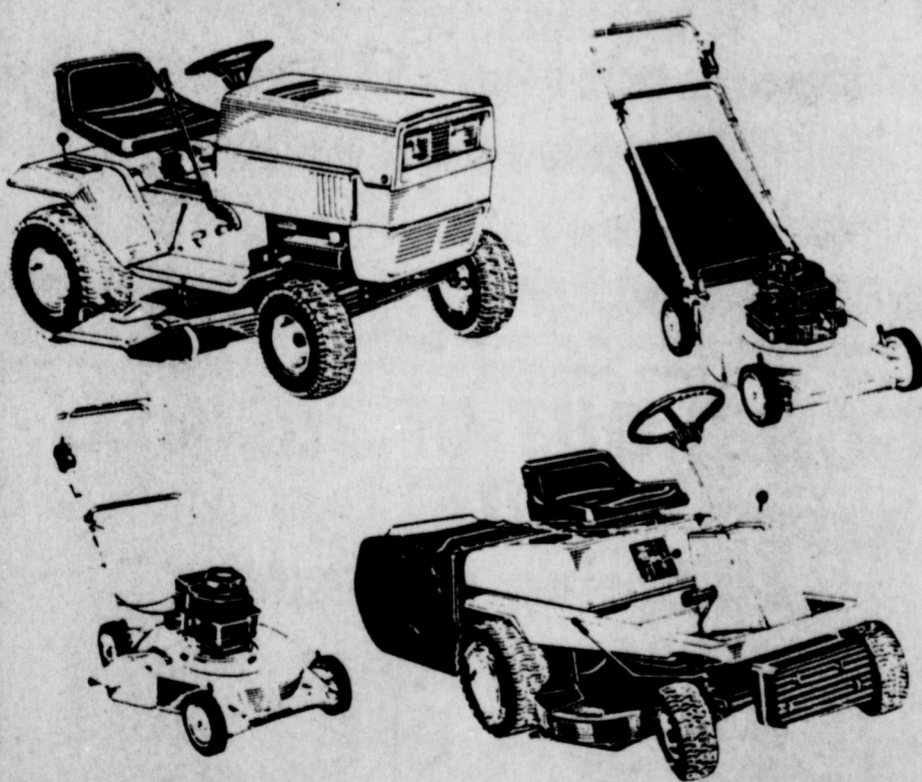

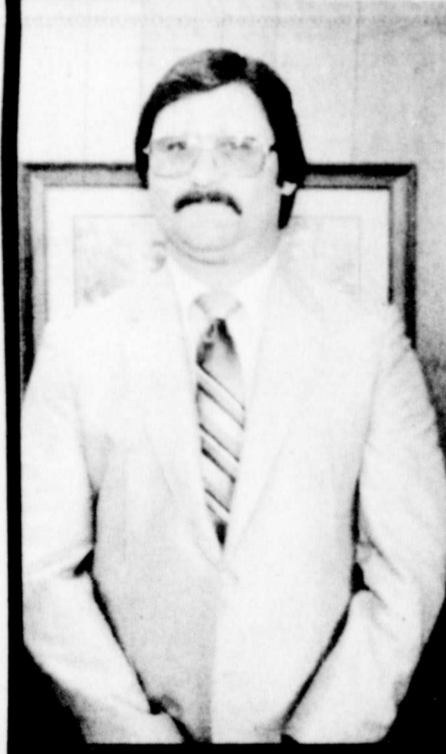

For Over 4 Million Acres

Bids on only 31,298 acres of land in Texas were accepted by the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service in the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Conservation Reserve Program for 1986. Bids were accepted from 155 farmers.

The state was divided into seven bidding pools. The highest bid accepted for pools 1, 2, and 3 were \$35.00 per acre on 26,251 acres. These three pools made up the western half of the state. Bids of up to \$40.00 per acre were accepted for pools 4, 5, and 6 on 3,511 acres. This area includes South Texas, the Texas Blacklands, and East Texas. Bids up to \$50.00 per acre were accepted for pool 7 on 1,536 acres; this pool covers the Coastal Prairie and the Lower Rio Grande Valley.

Nationally, bids were made by 44,480 farmers on 4.8 million acres. Some 10,307 bids were accepted on

838,356 acres. Accepted bids ranged from \$5 to \$90.

Cropland that is in Land Capability Class VI, VII, and VIII or land that appeared to be eroding at greater than 3.5 times the tolerance level at sign-up time is automatically accepted. Land that appeared to be eroding between 2.5 to 3.5 times the tolerance level was declared questionable; Soil Conservation Service personnel will determine final estimated erosion rates on a field by field visit to this land.

Any questionable land that is determined to be eroding at an estimated rate of more than three times the tolerance level with an acceptable bid will be placed in the reserve.

In determining estimated

erosion, SCS personnel use the Universal Soil Loss Equation for water erosion and the Wind Erosion for wind erosion.

SCS conservationists are now in the process of preparing conservation plans on land accepted in CRP. Cropland will be planted in grasses and legumes, wildlife plantings, windbreaks, or trees.

For land accepted into CRP, farmers will receive their per acre bid annually shortly after October 1 for ten years. They will also receive 50 percent cost-share assistance for establishing permanent vegetation or trees.

The sign-up period for the 1987 reserve is scheduled to begin May 5.

New Booklet Tells Elders How To Protect Rights To Quality Health Care

In response of growing evidence that the quality of health care may be threatened by recent measures to curb costs, the American Association of Retired persons has published a free booklet describing ways Medicare patients can protect their rights to quality care.

"Knowing Your Rights" describes Medicare's prospective payment system, designed to cut costs by paying hospitals a predetermined amount based on the average cost for treating particular diagnoses. If a hospital spends more for a Medicare beneficiary's treatment than Medicare will pay, it loses money. If the hospital spends less, it still receives the designated payment and can keep the difference.

"While AARP supports the concept of Medicare's prospective payment system to contain costs, we are concerned about the way it is currently being implemented. We have evidence that older people are being discharged from hospitals prematurely under this system", said Cisco's Chapter leader, Johnie Jeffcoat.

Mrs. Jeffcoat also said that patients have an impor-

tant role to play in assuring that the prospective payment system is not used as an excuse to skimp on treatment.

"Our booklet, 'Knowing Your Rights', is designed to help Medicare beneficiaries and their families make wise health care decisions and to use the appeals process built into the system their rights and their access to quality medical treatment," the chapter leader added.

The 16-page free booklet is arranged in a question-and-answer format. It describes the prospective payment system and its impact on hospital and physician care and coverage. To help beneficiaries get the treatment they need and control out-of-pocket hospital costs, it explains steps to take before and during hospitalization. In addition, a patient checklist on the booklet's back cover lists key considerations when hospitalization becomes necessary.
