Mr. Walton said the 91st Court followed the same procedure as other courts in denying a motion for change of venue for Lundstrom. The convicted man's counsel. Bill Hart, claimed in asking for a change of venue that pre-trial publicity in Eastland County was such that his client could not receive a fair trial.

Lundstrom was given a life sentence by a 91st Court jury after his trial in Eastland.

Mr. Walton said that Lundstrom would remain in the state prison throughout the re-hearing process, which might take years.

Few Cite 'Publicity' Excuse In Jury Selection

A review of the excused jurors in the Lundstrom jury selection shows that "too much publicity" had little to do with the number excused from

service. During the two weeks of individual voir dire (ordered as an extra precaution by the presiding judge) 64 persons were individually questioned. The defense struck eight of their own choosing, which is their

Fourteen were excused because they indicated on the stand that they could not consider probation.

Only eight were excused because they "had fixed opinions" which would include having read or heard too much about the

Four were excused

because they said that they could not allow the law on burden of proof.

Three were excused because they said they couldn't follow the law or minimum punishment in the murder case.

Two were excused because they said they could not follow the law in regard to maximum punishment. Six were excused

because of other reasons. including health, family and/or business reasons,

The state eliminated seven, and 12 were chosen. This type of informa-

tion apparently will be provided to the State Prosecutor to be used in requesting a re-hearing on the Lundstrom case before the State Criminal Appeals Court.

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

It is apparent from the historical record that William M. Eastland was a leader. He was a Lieutenant in the first volunteer company he served in after arriving in Texas and was a Lieutenant at

the battle of San Jacinto. In just three months after enlisting in the Texas Rangers he was promoted to Captain.

Of course, there are trying times for all leaders and it is their ability to adjust to adversity that distinguishes the real leaders

Noah Smithwick, who had arrived in Texas in the late 1820's, served in a company from Bastrop County and on occasion served with Captain Eastland, whom he knew

He relates a story about Captain Eastland taking command of a company after the previous Captain retired. The previous Captain was not a military man but had been successful in command even though his company had lacked strict military discipline.

Smithwick described Eastland's assuming







If you're counting on canning some of the extra produce from your garden this summer, plan now to do it the safe way.

Some canning methods, equipment and procedures are not safe and can result in food spoilage and even serious illness or death.

Canning a microwave oven, for example, is dangerous. Microwave ovens do not allow even heat penetration in the closed canning jar and the metal lids interfere with heat distribution. The use of metals in a microwave can also damage the oven's magnatron tube, requiring costly repairs.

Canning in a convention oven is not advisable, because oven temperatures vary as the heat goes off and comes on again. The dry heat may not penetrate the food thoroughly either.

Trying to can in a conventional oven is also a safety hazard. Pressure can build up in jars causing them to explode, or jars may break as drafts of cooler air hit them when the oven door is
