Shawn Alsup Chosen One Of Two Outstanding Cymbol Players

Twenty-year-old Shawn Alsup, one of two outstanding cymbol players in the nation, is looking forward to a long-hard summer during which he'll be banging cymbols almost the length and breadth of the United States.

Shawn, a 1984 graduate of Eastland High School and Friday night graduate of Cisco Junior College, has been accepted as one of some 128 members of the Casper Troopers Drum and Bugle Corps, a non-profit youth organization, chartered by the State of Wyoming. It'll be an encore event for the talented musician. He toured with the Troopers last season, and as section leader of the six-man cymbol section, helped propel the Troopers to a high rating in the final, nationwide competitions. Corps are "big activities" across the northern part of the nation and the competition is stiff for participation.

Son of Mr. and Mrs. Herman Alsup, Shawn got his first drum set at 2 years of age, and drummed his way through seven years of public school music and two years at CJC, but filled a vital spot with the Troopers on the cymbols. And those cymbols are big: he and another youth play the 20-inchers, there are two on the 18 inchers, and one on 22 and another on 24-inchers.

The Avedia Zildjian Co. manufactures cymbols and named Shawn as one of two Outstanding Cymbol Players for his work last year. The other winner was from the Madison (Wisconsin) Scouts.

He'll leave May 22 to attend the Trooper Camp at Lariuma, W.V., and will leave Casper on June 18, for a tour that will include Toledo, Saginaw, Rochester, Indianapolis, Can-

ton, Erie, Rochester, Pittfield, Meadowlands, Malden and Boston, where the Corps will be treated to a clam bake on the beach. Hooking up again, the Corps will have dates in Racine, New Berlin and Rockford before returning to Casper for the final preparations for the competitions ahead.

After performances in Lander, Sheridan and Casper, the Corps will be in Eastland for a rehearsal performance at Maverick Stadium on July 30, then go to Dallas, Jackson, Birmingham, Columbia, Sevierville, Evansville, St. Charles, Whitewater, Stillwater, Minneapolis, before hitting Madison for a week of competitions which will result in the semi- and finals for the nation's best.

It's hard work and a lot of fun, Shawn says, and he's gained weight. The 15-minute routines takes hours, days and weeks to bring to perfection.

Shawn will enter Texas Tech in the fall with a degree plan for commercial physical education and a minor in business. Will he play with the Famous Red Raider Band? Well, yes.

Music, drums and cymbols are very much a part of his life, but he may elect to confine his musical work in the long run to clinching and maybe lessons.

He'll be one of some ten to 15 Texans with the Troopers this year.

Another neighbor, Amber Berryman of Knox City who also graduated CJC last Friday, will join the Corps as a flag this season.

Shawn started band in Eastland with James McCleskey, had Tim Jones at CJC and his Corps director is Jim Jones.

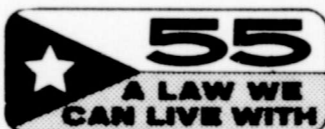

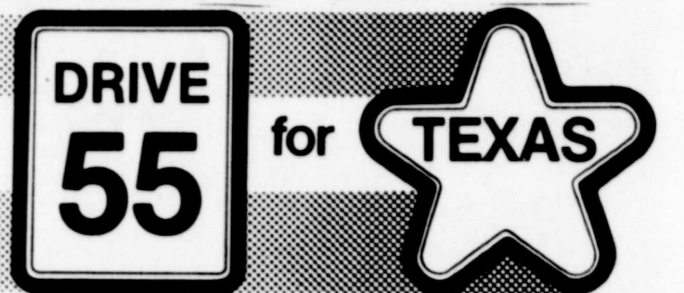
Celebrates 90th Birthday

GORMAN

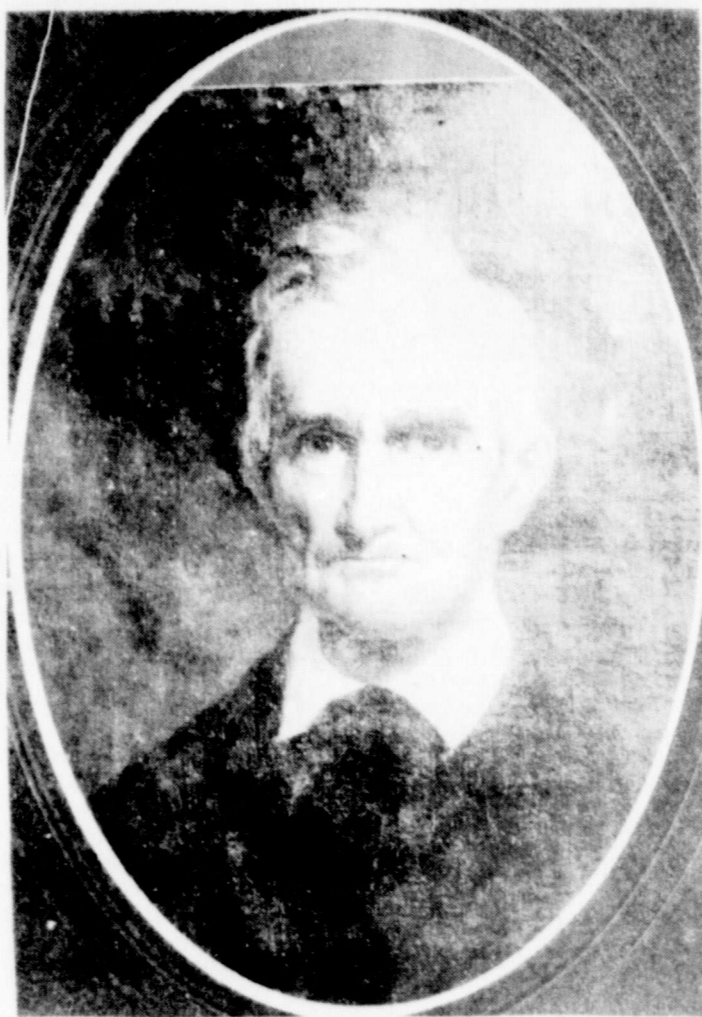

no injury, except one man killed and two wounded. We then proceeded to break open the doors of the stone houses which led up to the square, and fortunately found a crobar, which enabled us to break our way through the walls. We got possession of the houses on each side of the street, which the canon was raking before day, and took our position.

As soon as day made its appearance the rifles began to crack, and the only chance we had for some time was at their heads, and at canon. It was not long before it was bared, but as fast as we could shoot them down from behind the aparapots on top of the houses, they would fill up the vacancies. They, after keeping up a fire for about 12 or 14 hours, attempted a charge though they were beat back; yet they made the second and third trial, but were repulsed with such loss that they sent in a flag of truce, offering to treat us as prisoners of war if we would surrender; at the same time bringing out their forces in sight, which had the desired effect upon some of the men who became intimidated at their numbers and surrendered. This threw us into confusion, yet Capt. Pierson and some others attempted to get 100 men to stand, but we could not. We were therefore compelled to lay down our arms. We were then put in prison until the 30th, when we took up the line of march for Matamoras; marching from 20 to 25 miles per day until we reached here, which was on the 8th of January, 1843, where we were again thrown into prison with the common felons of the land. How long we stay, God only knows, but it is supposed that we take up the line of march in the morning for the city of Mexico, via Monterey.

Our total loss was nine killed, twenty-seven wounded; that of the enemy between 5 and 6 hundred killed and wounded. Those from our section of the country that were wounded were Frank Hugs, who had his arm broke; N. Scott, wounded in the shoulder and jaw; Elijah Porter, wounded on the right side, though slightly. He is here and well.

Hughes, Scott, and all the wounded that were not able to travel were left in Mier. If we should go to Mexico write as soon as you get the information. I had some idea of writing to some of my relatives in the U.S. for some money, and if possible have it forwarded from Texas; for if ever I needed money it is now, let the sacrifice be what it will.

Mr. Asa Hill (James Monroe Hill's father) begs to be remembered to you all. Excuse my letter. Give my regards to all near and dear friends.

Adieu, my dear brother, J.N.M. Thomson. The tone of the letter is that money might help the

sent situation, but for fear he does not receive it, I deem it proper to risk one to you.

You have no doubt, ere this, received information respecting us by our friends who were fortunate enough to make good their escape. Yet, I will proceed to give you a brief history of our adventures, though I shall be quite short, as Capt. Erath has no doubt given you a history of the campaign previous to our crossing the Rio Grande on the 25th, PM with about 262 men, leaving a guard of about forty men with the horses, though previous to the main body crossing, some twelve men mounted on the best horses were sent in our advanced as spies. They had not proceeded far before they came in contact with some thirty of the enemy, and they succeeded in taking two of our men prisoners, and one of our men came back to the river to inform us of their loss. By this time, 4 o'clock P.M., we had accomplished our crossing and took up the line of march for Mier.

We advanced about three miles when the pickets squad began firing on us, though we moved on as though they were not there; yet the balls whistled over heads pretty constantly. We moved up to the bank of the Alcanthe, a small stream which runs through the suburbs of the town. Our advanced was ordered to commence to fire on the enemy below to draw their attention until we could cross above. The order was promptly obeyed by Capt. Baker, and we made the crossing without any loss through under a heavy fire of musketry from the enemy. We then proceeded in perfect order into the town. We marched up in about 100 yds. of the public square. The canon was turned loose on us, accompanied with volleys of musketry, though we received

no injury, except one man killed and two wounded. We then proceeded to break open the doors of the stone houses which led up to the square, and fortunately found a crobar, which enabled us to break our way through the walls. We got possession of the houses on each side of the street, which the canon was raking before day, and took our position.

Texas Supreme Court Rules Against Board

The Texas Supreme Court has ruled that the Austin School Board must give proper notice when holding a closed meeting and that a majority of trustees must be present in the board room when a closed meeting is called.

The ruling came in a five-year-old lawsuit filed against trustees of the Austin Independent School District by the Austin American-Statesman under the Texas Open Meetings Law.

In a unanimous decision, the justices held that the

school board provided inadequate notice when posting closed session items in general terms such as "litigation," "personnel" and "real estate matters."

"The Supreme Court's decision is a significant victory for open government in Texas," said Jeff Bruce, managing editor of the American-Statesman. "The court has served notice that elected officials must fully disclose the purposes of executive sessions before they close the doors to the public," he said.

If they do not get rain soon (and there is no appreciable rain in the immediate forecast) the crop could be seriously affected by as much as 40 percent.

The export prices have really strengthened the past week, increasing from .30

cents per pound to .50 cents per pound for jumbo runners. Mediums were .42 cents per pound.

Since the Southeast usually grows 65 percent of the U.S. peanut supply, such a shortage will put a big demand on peanuts from the Southwest.

The Texas Peanut Producers Board advises peanut growers in the Southwest to pay very close attention to the weather in the Southeast for the next 10 to 15 days. It could be profitable to plan the acres needed to fill the gap.

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Fishing Outdoors

Saturday, May 10th the Eastland County Bass Club shall be holding our inercub tournament on Lake Cisco. This will be our first trip to Lake Cisco since January of last year. Tournament hours will be 6 a.m. until 4 p.m. Contestants must be in line prior to 4 p.m.

Most of the anglers who plan to attend are anticipating fishing to be slow. But from reports of those gentlemen who have been staying in contact with this impoundment are calling for the largest weigh-in of pounds of fish this year. Many anglers are reporting fish in the 2-4 pound range and some good numbers as well. There seems to be 2 main bait colors which are producing the best; these being orange or white. Most of the fish have been coming from shallow water in the shade of the larger rocks. The Eastland County Bass Club would like to invite everyone out to weigh-in, and bring those youngsters, they'll get a kick out of selling those big old bass.

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission meet May 1st and a few changes were passed. Effective September 1st the new state minimum for black bass will be 14 inches. This meaning it will be unlawful to retain any black bass under 14 inches in length. Also a bag limit of 25 crappie per day statewide except on reservoirs with special limits.

Also our white-tailed deer hunting season shall now be a statewide uniformed time.

There can be little doubt that the tailrace area below Mansfield at the Lake Travis Dam is the best spot in the state for catching a state record striped bass.

Austinite Wayne Savoie erased any doubt when he caught a 43 pound 8 1/2 ounce striper from this area.

The late Harry Lamb did not live to see his record of 38

pounds 4 ounces broken, but he predicted at the time that much larger fish were there for the taking.

Lake Reports: Leon, Crappie slowing, we did hear of 3 crappie taken on a trotline which went 10 pounds 3 1/2 ounces, but most crappie buffs are reporting slow action. Black bass slow to 3 pounds on buzz baits.

Lake Cisco, black bass good to 4 pounds on grubs and crankbaits.

Brownwood: Water clear, 5 feet low; black bass good to 5 1/2 pounds in shallow water; striper slow; crappie slow; white bass fair to 15 fish per string on slabs and small jigs; yellow catfish fair to 13 pounds on live bait; channel catfish good to 2 1/2 pounds on shrimp and minnows.

Gibbons Creek: Water fairly clear, 70 degrees, 6 inches low; black bass a fair number in big end of slot on spooks, black worms dark lizards, spinners; crappie fairly good to 25 fish per string on minnows; catfish fair to about 2 pounds on shrimp and jigs; fairly good crows on weekends, no turnaways so far.

BRIDGEPORT: Water clear, 70 degrees, normal level; black bass picking up to 3 pounds on artificials; striper slow; crappie good to 30 fish per string on minnows and jigs; white bass good to 3 1/2 fish on slabs; yellow catfish picking up to 3 1/2 pounds on trotline with live

bait; channel catfish slow; blue catfish slow.

FORK: Water clear, 68 degrees, normal level; black bass fairly good to 5 1/2-6 pounds on topwaters and lizards; crappie excellent to 20 fish to 3 pounds on minnows and jigs in 6-8 feet of water; catfish good to 14 pounds on bloodbait and liver.

Palestine: Water a little murky, 68 degrees, one foot high; black bass fairly good to 6 pounds on worms, cranks; striper fair to 6 pounds on RatLtraps; crappie slow; white bass slow; catfish very good to 25 pounds on trotline and rod and reel with live bait in shallow water.

Toledo Bend: Water clear, normal level; black bass good to 5 pounds on spinners, Rogues and worms; striper good to 17 pounds on Toledo Jigs, Redfins; bream good to one pound on crickets; crappie good on spinners and jigs; white bass slow; catfish slow.

Choke: Water clear, 73 degrees, normal level; black bass fair to good on plastic worms to 5 1/2 pounds; striper slow; crappie fair on minnows and jigs; white bass slow; catfish real good to 12 pounds on rod and reel on stinkbait, shrimp, shad.

Fort Phantom Hill: Water murky, 15 feet low; black bass fair to 2 1/2 pounds on cranks in 5 1/2-6 feet of water; striper fair to 9 pounds mostly Model A Bombers; crappie good to 10 fish per string

on minnows and jigs; white bass real good with fairly good strings to 2 1/2 pounds each on jigs and Model A Bombers; catfish slow.

Hubbard Creek: Water murky, 64 degrees, 8 feet low; black bass fairly good to 6 pounds, 12 ounces on spinners; hybrid striper fairly slow; crappie good to 18 fish per string on minnows and jigs; white bass fairly slow; catfish good to 26 pounds on live bait; blue catfish good to 12 1/2 pounds.

Possum Kingdom: Water clear, 70 degrees, 4 1/2 feet low; black bass slow to 3 pounds on topwater chugger; striper fairly good to 4 pounds on slabs while fishing for white bass; crappie fair to 25 fish per string on minnows and flea fly jigs; white bass good to 30 fish per string around Costellos, most still full of eggs; catfish good on trotline to 12 pounds with strings to 12 fish; channel catfish fairly good to 5 pounds.

Spence: Water clear, 65 degrees, 32 feet low; black bass real good to 4 pounds on artificials, mostly worms; striper real good to 24 pounds drifting with live perch as well as trolling; crappie fair on minnows in shallow water to 20 fish per string; white bass real good on topwaters to 30 fish per string to 2 pounds each; catfish good to 2 1/2 pounds average; Wildcat, Paint Creek, boat ramps open; Humble Crossing shallow but still usable.

Tornado Tips

No. 3 in Series
Emergency Supplies

To improve your chances for survival, in a tornado, keep the following items on hand for emergency use:

1. A portable radio with spare batteries. (In an emergency you can also use the car radio.)
2. First aid items, such as bandages, antiseptics, special medicines, blankets, and a first aid handbook.
3. Candles and a flashlight with fresh batteries.
4. Tools which may be necessary to escape from your shelter area and help make emergency repairs; hammer, nails, screw drivers, crow bars, ropes, wire, saw boards, and plywood.

You may wish to keep a supply of drinking water in your shelter. Commercially-prepared emergency water will last indefinitely. If you attempt to store emergency water yourself, there are several things to keep in mind:

- store water in plastic bottles or jugs because metal containers can corrode.
- sterilize storage containers.
- purify the water unless it comes from a treated public supply.
- seal containers. Improperly sealed containers

can become a breeding place for many disease-causing organisms.

Purifying Water

If there is doubt about the purity of your water use one of the methods mentioned below. Regardless of the method chosen, use only clear water.

1. Boil vigorously for 10 minutes; or,
2. Add four water purifying tablets per gallon of water; or,
3. Add 12 drops of tincture of iodine per gallon of water; or,
4. Add 8 drops of common household chlorine laundry bleach per gallon of water.

Be sure the bleach contains sodium hypochlorite as its only active ingredient. Avoid those containing soap, detergents, or ammonia. Water treated by methods 2, 3, or 4 must be mixed thoroughly and allowed to stand for 30 minutes before using. To improve the "flat" taste of purified water, allow it to stand for approximately 3 hours, or pur it back and forth from one container to another several times.

Be very careful entering buildings that have been subjected to tornadic winds. The walls and overhead structures may be weakened by the tornado. Watch for fire hazards such as damaged wires and short circuits, and

broken gas pipes. Watch for falling debris such as ceiling materials.

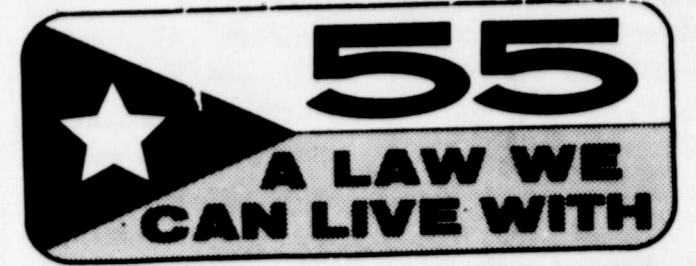
Use your sense of smell only to check the house for gas leaks. Do not strike open matches, smoke, or carry open flames until you are sure there are no gas leaks. If you smell gas, open doors and windows, cut off the main gas valve, notify the gas company, and leave until you are told it is safe to re-enter.

Dangers Outside Buildings
Do not touch downed or broken power lines. Carefully pick up all wire, glass, metal and other debris.

Glass, including spun glass insulation, can cause physical damage to hands and feet. Wear shoes and gloves during the cleanup process even though they get wet and muddy. Watch for fires in wet materials such as cloth and hay. This type of fire is known as spontaneous combustion and will sometimes smolder for several weeks before breaking out.

Stay clear of disaster areas. Sight seeing can be very dangerous and may hamper rescue operations.

Now Is The Time To Stock Fish Ponds

Ponds are catching new water from spring rains and temperatures are rising, which means now is the time to stock fish. By June, water temperatures are usually too warm to safely handle fish.

The Soil Conservation Service normally recommends channel catfish in ponds less than one surface in size. A commercially available catfish ration can be fed, or fathead minnows can be stocked for the catfish to eat. If largemouth bass are already in your pond, stock catfish that are at least eight inches long and do not stock fathead minnows. You can feed your catfish with a com-

mercial ration which your bass will not eat.

In larger ponds, several combinations of fish may be suitable. Species often recommended include largemouth bass, bluegill sunfish, channel catfish, and fathead minnows.

The Upper Leon Soil and Water Conservation District is presently taking orders for catfish fingerlings, bass, bluegills, hybrid bream, and fathead minnows. Delivery will be May 28th. Stop by the Soil Conservation Service office in the Farm Bureau Building or phone 629-1480 to place your order by May 21st.

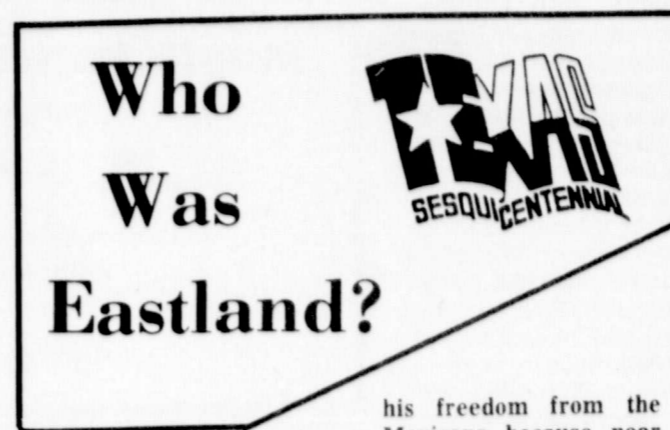

The Texans attacked the town of Mier on Christmas day 1842. Being outnumbered almost 10 to 1, the Texans fought until the afternoon of December 26th.

Becoming hungry, thirsty, and their powder being almost exhausted - their discipline began to break.

The Mexican commander sent a white flag to the Texans. Realizing the situation was hopeless and thinking they would be treated as prisoners of war, the Texans surrendered.

The able-bodied prisoners were marched through river towns until they reached Matamoros where they would be held until ordered to Mexico City.

J.N.M. (Mack) Thomson, one of the prisoners at Matamoros and who would eventually meet the same fate as William M. Eastland, wrote a letter to his brother back in Nashville, Texas. The letter, dated January 13, 1843, was written to William D. Thomson (W.D. Thomson was the Great Grandfather of R.P. Hawn of Eastland).

The letter describes the battle of Mier and the Texan's capture. He apparently thought there might be a chance to buy
