

The Council approved a five-year lease agreement with the Texas Teenage Baseball League of Cisco for use of the City Park baseball field through April 30, 1991, with an option for an additional five years. The league will pay the city the sum of \$1 per year. Dick Wages appeared as the league representative.

The bids for the sale of a 1965 Ford pickup, two 1982 Dodge sedans, and a 1975 boat and trailer were opened and rejected as too low. City Manager Moore said the city would probably keep the pickup and seek to negiotate the sale of the two cars and the boat.

Chief Rains Requests **Additional Manpower**

Police Chief Billy Rains requested the City Council to authorize the employment of one additional policeman at this time and another when the next fiscal year begins in the fall at the regular semimonthly meeting last

Tuesday night. Mr. Rains also asked for permission for city police to patrol the I-20 stretch of some three miles through the south city limits. He said that speeding fines from I-20 traffic would probably provide the money needed to hire an additional officer.

The Police Department is composed of the chief and six officers at the present. City Manager Mike Moore reported that over-time work by policemen has cost the city some \$6,500 this

The Council voted to table the request for further study until after a budget work session to be scheduled soon.

Councilman Bobby Ingram expressed concern that an I-20 patrol would give the city a "speed trap" image and he doubted that the revenue generated would be worthwhile.

Chief Rains said such a patrol might stop some of the drug traffic through this region. His suggestion was supported by three citizens who made short talks. They were Jim Puryear, high school principal; Joe Cooper, active in the Parents Against Dangerous Drugs organization; and Rev. John

Clinton, local minister. Mayor Joe Wheatley commended the Cisco Police Department on their work.

Mr. Rains submitted a report on the Police Department's activities during the first four months of 1986. His report showed that there was the sum of \$66,464 in property losses in 154 offenses during the period. Of that amount, some \$37,193 was recovered.

During the period, the department made 65 arrests for felonies, handled 17 juvenile cases, filed 40 cases with the disrtrict attorney, presented 21 cases to the grand jury, filed 28 cases at the justice of the peace office, wrote 228 traffic violation tickets and issued 195 verbal warnings.

Shawn Alsup Chosen One Of Two **Outstanding Cymbol Players**

Twenty-year-old Shawn Alsup, one of two outstanding cymbol players in the nation, is looking forward to a long-hard summer during which he'll be banging cymbols almost the length and breath of the United States.

Shawn, a 1984 graduate of Eastland High School and Friday night graduate of Cisco Junior College, has been accepted as one of some 128 members of the Casper Troopers Drum and Bugle Corps, a non-profit organization, chartered by the State of Wyoming. It'll be an encore event for the talented musician. He toured with the Troopers last season, and as section leader of the six-man cymbol section, helped propel the Troopers to a high rating in the final, nationwide competitions. Corps are "big activities" across the northern part of the nation and the competition is stiff for participation.

Son of Mr. and Mrs. Herman Alsup, Shawn got his first drum set at 2 years of age, and drummed his way through seven years of public school music and two years at CJC, but filled a vital spot with the Troopers on the cymbols. And those cymbols are big: he and another youth play the 20-inchers, there are two on the 18 inchers, and one on 22 and another on 24-inchers.

The Avedia Zildjian Co. manufactures cymbols and named Shawn as one of two Outstanding Cymbols Players for his work last year. The other winner was from the Madison (Wisconsin) Scouts.

He'll leave May 22 to attend the Trooper Camp at Lariuma, WY., and will leave Casper on June 18, for a tour that will include Tolodeo. Saginaw, Rochester, Indianpolis, Can-

After performances in Lander, Sheridan and Casper, the Corps will be in Eastland for a rehearsal performance at Maverick Stadium on July 30, then go to Dallas, Jackson, Birmingham, Columbia, Sevieville, Evansville, St. Charles, Whitewater, Stillwater, Minneapolis, before hitting Madison for a week of competitions which will result in the semi- and finals for the nation's best.

It's hard work and a lot of fun, Shawn says, and he's gained weight. The 15-minute routines takes hours, days and weeks to bring to perfection.

Shawn will enter Texas Tech in the fall with a degree plan for commercial physical education and a minor in business. Will he play with the Famous Red Raider Band? Well, yes.

Music, drums and cymbols are very much a part of his life, but he may elect to confine his musical work in the long run to clinicing and maybe lessons.

He'll be one of some ten to 15 Texans with the Troopers this year.

Another neighbor, Amber Berryman of Knox City who also graduated CJC last Friday, will join the Corps as a flag this season.

Shawn started band in Eastland with James Mc-Cleskey, had Tim Jones at CJC and his Corps director is Jim Jones.

Southeast Drought May

Cause Peanut Shortage

Great-Uncle Of R.P. Haun Was Black-Bean Victim

Eastland County and Eastland have another vital link to the historic Mier Expedition and the tragic Black-Bean Drawing which followed, in addition to the link with Capt. William M. Eastland, for whom both are

named. An ancestor of long-time county resident R.P. (Buddy) Haun was also one of the unfortunates who drew a black bean for death as did Capt. Eastland.

The Hauns have collected a great deal of information from family histories and both the Haun children, Ann (Haun) Folsom and Brian have done extensive research and written detailed papers on their ancestors. particularly their distant uncle who died at Saledo.

Mr. Haun's distant grandfather, Alexander S. Thomson Jr. was born in 1785. He married in 1805 and moved from S. Carolina to Tennessee. Their first two sons were William Dowsing Thomson, (Haun's greatgreat grandfather) and J.N.M. (Mack) Thomson, who was born in 1819, and died on March 25, 1843 by Mexican firing squad after being one of 17 who drew a black bean.

The elder Thomson and his family came to Texas in 1831 and settled in Austin Colony at Hidlago and founded the town of Nashville. The fated son Mack was 12 years old when they came to Texas, so would have been 24 at the time of his death.

Among the treasures the Hauns have in their collection is a letter from Mack to his brother (their distant grandfather), written Jan. 13, 1843 from Matamoras. (The Mier expedition had surrended, on Christmas Day of '42, and the Mexicans were marching them toward Mexico City.)

Dear Brother: I have written to Father since I have been in any present situation, but for fear he does not receive it, I deem it proper to risk one to you.


You have no doubt, 'ere this, received information respecting us by our friends who were fortunate enough to make good their escape. Yet, I will proceed to give you a brief history of our adventures, though I shall be quite short, as Capt. Erath has no doubt given you a history of the campaign previous to our crossing the Rio Grande on the 25th, PM with a bout 262 men, leaving a guard of about forty men with the horses, though previous to the main body crossing, some twelve men mounted on the best horses wer e sent in our advanced as spie's. They had not proceeded far before they came in coritact with some thirty of the enemy, and they succereded in taking two of our men prisoners, and one of our men came back to the river to inform us of their loss. By this time, 4 o'clock F'.M., we had accomplished our crossing and took up the line of march for Mier.

We advanced about three miles when the pickets squad began firing on us, though we moved on as though they were not there; yet the balls whistled over heads pretty constantly. We rnoved up to the bank of the: Alcanthe, a small stream which runs through the suburbs of the town. Our advanced was ordered to cornmence to fire on the energy below to draw their attention until we could cross above. The order was promptly obeyed by Capt. Baker, and we made the crossing without any loss through under a heavy fire of musketry from the enemy. We then proceeded in perfect order into the town. We marched up in about 100 yds. of the public square. The canon

was turned loose on us, ac-

We then proceeded to break open the doors of the stone houses which led up to the square, and fortunately found a crobar, which enabled us to break our way through the walls. We got possession of the houses on each side of the street, which the canon was raking before day, and took our position.

As soon as day made its appearance the rifles began to crack, and the only chance we had for some time was at their heads, and at canon. It was not long before it was bared, but as fast as we could shoot them down from behind the aparapots on top of the houses, they would fill up the vacancies. They, after keeping up a fire for about 12 or 14 hours, attempted a charge though they were beat back; yet they made the second and third trial, but were repulsed with such loss that they sent in a flag of truce, offering to treat us as prisoners of war if we would surrender; at the same time bringing out their forces in sight, which had t'ne desired effect upon some of the men who became intimidated at their numbers and surrendered. This threw us into confusion, yet Capt. Pierson and some others attempted to get 100 men to stand, but we could not. We were therefore compelled to lay down our arms. We were then put in prison until the 30th, when we took up the line of march for Matamoras; marching from 20 to 25 miles per day until we reached here, which was on the 8th of January, 1843, where we were again thrown into pri son with the common

via Monterey. Our total loss was nine killed, twenty-seven wounded; that of the enemy between 5 and 6 hundred killed and vyounded. Those from our section of the country that were wounded were Frank Hugs, who had his arm broke; N. Scott, wounded in the shoulder and jaw; Elijah Porter, wounded on the right side, though slightly. He is here and well.

Texas Supreme Court Rules Against Board

The Texas Supreme Court has ruled that the Austin School Board must give proper notice when holding a closed meeting and that a majority of trustees must be present in the board room when a closed meeting is

The ruling came in a fiveyear-old lawsuit filed against trustees of the Austin Independent School District by the Austin American-Statesman under the Texas Open Meetings

In a unanimous decision,

school board provided inadequate notice when posting closed session items in general terms such as "litigation," "personnel" and "real estate matters."

The Supreme Court's decision is a significant victory for open government in Texas," said Jeff Bruce, managing editor of the American-Statesman. "The court has served notice that elected officials must fully disclose the purposes of executive sessions before they close the doors to the public," he said.

Since the Southeast usually grows 65 percent of the U.S. peanut supply, such a shortage will put a big demand on peanuts from the Southwest.

The Texas Peanut Producers Board advises peanut growers in the Southwest to pay very close attention to the weather in the Southeast for the next 10 to 15 days. It could be profitable to plan the acres needed to fill the

Fishing Outdoors

Saturday, May 10th the Eastland County Bass Club shall be holding our inerclub tournament on Lake Cisco. This will be our first trip to Lake Cisco since January of last year. Tournament hours will be 6 a.m. until 4 p.m. Contestants must be in line prior to 4 p.m.

Most of the anglers who plan to attend are anticipating fishing to be slow. But from reports of those gentlemen who have been staying in contact with this impoundment are calling for the largest weigh-in of pounds of fish this year. Many anglers are reporting fish in the 24 pound range and some good numbers as well. There seems to be 2 main bait colors which are producing the best; these being orange or white. Most of the fish have been coming from shallow water in the shade of the larger rocks. The Eastland County Bass Club would like to invite everyone out at weigh-in, and bring those youngsters, they'll get a kick out of selling those big old bass.

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission meet May 1st and a few changes were passed. Effective September 1st the new state minimum for black bass will be 14 inches. This meaning it will be unlawful to retain any black bass under 14 inches in length. Also a bag limit of 25 crappie per day statewide except on reservoirs with special limits.

Also our white-tailed deer hunting season shall now be a statewide uniformed time. There can be little doubt

that the tailrace area below Mansfield at the Lake Travis Dam is the best spot in the state for catching a state record striped bass.

Austinite Wayne Savoie erased any doubt when he caught a 43 pound 81/2 ounce striper from this area.

The late Harry Lamb did not live to see his record of 38

pounds 4 ounces broken, but he predicted at the time that much larger fish were there for the taking.

Lake Reports: Leon, Crappie slowing, we did hear of 3 crappie taken on a trotline which went 10 pounds 31/2 ounces, but most crappie buffs are reporting slow action. Black bass slow to 3 pounds on buzz baits.

Lake Cisco, black bass good to 4 pounds on grubs and crankbaits.

Brownwood: Water clear, 5 feet low; black bass good to 51/2 pounds in shallow water; striper slow; crappie slow; white bass fair to 15 fish per string on slabs and small jigs; yellow catfish fair to 13 pounds on live bait; channel catfish good to 21/2 pounds on shrimp and minnows.

Gibbons Creek: Water fairly clear, 70 degrees, 6 inches low; black bass a fair number in big end of slot on spooks, black worms dark lizards, spinners; crappie fairly good to 25 fish per string on minnows; catfish fair to about 2 pounds on shrimp and jiglines; fairly good crows on weekends, no tur-

Purifying Water If there is doubt about the purity of your water use one

of the methods mentioned below. Regardless of the method chosen, use only clear water.

1. Boil vigorously for 10 minutes; or, 2. Add four water purifying tablets per gallon of

water; or, 3. Add 12 drops of tincture of iodine per gallon of water;

4. Add 8 drops of common household chlorine laundry bleach per gallon of water. Be sure the bleach contains sodium hypochlorite as its only active ingredient. Avoid those containing soap, detergents, or ammonia.

Water treated by methods 2, 3, or 4 must be mixed thoroughly and allowed to stand for 30 minutes before using. To improve the "flat" taste of purified water, allow it to stand for approximately 3 hours, or pur it back and forth from one container to another several times.

Be very careful entering buildings that have been subjected to tornadic winds. The walls and overhead structures may be weakened by the tornado. Watch for fire hazards such as damaged wires and short circuits, and

falling debris such as ceiling materials.

Use your sense of smell only to check the house for gas leaks. Do not strike open matches, smoke, or carry open flames until you are sure there are no gas leaks. If yo smell gas, open doors and windows, cut off the main gas valve, notify the gas company, and leave until you are told it is safe to re-



Now Is The Time To Stock Fish Ponds

Ponds are catching new water from spring rains and temperatures are rising, which means now is the time to stock fish. By June, water temperatures are usually too warm to safely handle fish.

The Soil Conservtion Service normally recommends channel catfish in ponds less than one surface in size. A commercially available catfish ration can be fed, or fathead minnows can be stocked for the catfish to eat. If largemouth bass are already in your pond, stock catfish that are at least eight inches long and do not stock fathead minnows. You can feed your catfish with a commercial ration which your bass will not eat.

By Mary Crofts The first thing we noticed about New Zealand was how green it was, compared to Australia. But that's natural, as the climate is cooler and they have so much melting snow filling the rivers that run down into the valleys. It was really great to travel mile after mile with sheep and green pastures in the foreground and snowcapped mountains of the Southern Alps in the background. Speaking of sheep, New Zealand just has 70,000,000, but that's 20 times as many as they have people! So they'll never run out

Our first stop after Christchurch was lovely Lake Tekapo, and from there we went right into the heart of the high mountains.

We saw and photographed Mt. Cook and the surrounding lofty peaks in all their glory, and would have liked to linger longer, but there were so many buses taking so many people that we had to rush right on to Queenstown (no room at Wanaka) and spend the next three days there. That was all to the good, because we needed a rest, and there was so much to do.

Some of our crowd cruised the lake, some rode jet boats over rapids, and our foolhardy fellow-Texans went rafting, getting drenched to the skin. One of them went fishing, however, and brought home two big rainbow trout, which he had cooked and treated everybody at breakfast next day. We also rode the gondolas to the top of "Bob's Peak" for a gourmet dinner and dancing.

After Queenstown came Milford Sound, but all I got out of that was a cold, which I promptly passed on to Sut. Crisscrossing the state, we

reached the Scottish town of Dunedin. It has a fine university and many other assets. but next morning we hit the road again and followed the coast back to Christchurch, which seems to be the starting point for many a tour This was a 12-day tour, and super-scenic all the way.

From Christchurch to Picton, a town at the edge of an intricate archipelago at the tip of South Island, we had the most spectacular drive along the rugged seashore, where seals gamboled, and steep cliffs of the Kaikoura Mountains rose on our left.

For a change of pace, we had a 31/2 hour ferry ride from Picton across Queen Charlotte Sound to Wellington, the capital of N.Z. After the usual city tour and viewing the landlocked harbor from the highest point available, we settled into our hotel and asked, "What's for dinner?" It was always something good, but I can't say as much for our lunches, which were snatched at little 'sweetshops' with very little choice wherever it was convenient to stop.

Another Horizon Holidays bus was keeping pace with us, and we usually stayed at the same hotel, so we got pretty well acquainted with the passengers. One of them, "Jack", an Australian who was an ex-pro pianist with a band, became very popular, as he could play anything called for, including old American favorites. We'd all gather around after dinner for a singsong. Monday, April 21st, was

Queen Elizabeth's birthday, and as both Australia and New Zealand are still nominally protectorates of England, she was duly celebrated, but not until Friday, so the people could enjoy a long weekend (just as we treat our presidents, Washington and Lincoln. I doubt if any of them minds.)

I should mention the beautiful gardens we saw, not only in Wellington, but in all the cities of both countries. One whole park full of roses stands out in my mind - and it was autumn, yet! Now we are moving toward one of the main showplaces of New Zealand, Rotorua (sounds something like a plumbing tool, but it's a Maori name, like most of the names we encountered in this region, for this is the center of most of the Maori tribes). We went through Tongariro National Park, with its three active volcano peaks, Tongariro, Ngauruhoe and Ruapehu, which still spout steam, and then skirted N.Z.'s largest large, Lake Taupo, which yields an annual haul of 500 tons of rainbow trout. You

The geothermal region that surrounds Rotorua makes interesting hiking. Of course, their little geysers and boiling mud pools are just a toot in a teakettle compared to Yellowstone, but our Maori guide gave us a good rundown on the value of the thermal power to everybody but their own village - the land crust is too thin to dare to use it themselves. They do use hot pools to cook in and help in the making of grass skirts. etc. We were supposed to attend a "hangi" (much like a Hawaiian luau), but damp conditions forced it indoors. It was still good eating, and afterwards we were entertained with Maoris in costume singing and danc-
