Memorial Day Services To Be 10:00 A.M. Monday

A program honoring the community's war dead will be held at 10 a.m. Monday at Oakwood Cemetery as the feature of Memorial Day activities in the Cisco area.

Financial institutions, the post office, the city hall and approximately half of the city's business firms have announced plans to be closed Monday for the holiday. Others will be open for business as usual. Eastland County offices at the courthouse will be closed.

The Rev. Harry Gervin, pastor of the First Baptist Church, will be the speaker for the Oakwood cemetery service. There will be song services. Brad Kimbrough, commander of the John William Butts Post 123 of the American Legion will preside. The program will be concluded with "Taps" being played by Stephanie Kimbrough on the trumpet.

There will be a tent and chairs available for those attending the cemetery ceremonies. Miniature flags will be provided by the Legion Post for use in decorating the graves of deceased military veterans.

A survey conducted by the Chamber of Commerce showed that offices and firms planning to close Monday included City Hall, West Texas Utilities, First Na-

tional Bank, Cisco Lumber and Supply, Olney Savings, Austin's Furniture Co., Sidelines, Commercial Printing Co., and the CofC offices.

President Anton White of the Cisco Cemetery Association reported that Memorial Day visitors would be welcome to tour the cemetery after the service.

Dr. Harris Moves To New Office

There is a waiting room, business office, private office for Dr. Harris, rest rooms, laboratory and other quarters in the new building.

Dr. Harris, who has been practicing general dentistry in Cisco for three years, is a native of the community. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Weldon Harris. He is a graduate of Cisco High School, Cisco Junior College, the University of Texas at Austin and the UofT Dental

School in Houston. During his senior year at Cisco High School and two years at CJC, Dr. Harris worked as a laboratory assistant for Dr. Robert Blackstock. After his graduation from dental school, he purchased the office and equipment and home of Dr. Blackstock in Cisco.

The staff in Dr. Harris' office includes Linda Williams, dental assistant; Darla Harris, his sister, who is the receptionist; and Gerald Harris, his brother, who is a laboratory assistant and who plans to enter medical school next fall.

Dr. Harris has two brothers who are dentists, including Dr. Larry Harris, practicing in Eastland, and Dr. Leland Harris, orthodontist at Pasadena. Another brother, Dennis lives at Priddy and is a student at Howard Payne University.

Dr. Harris and his wife Marty, a native of Odessa, are the parents of two children, a son, Christopher, 3, and a daughter, Nicole, 1. They own their home at 708 West 9th Street.

Sears Plays Leading Role In Texas Economy

As it celebrates its 100th anniversary, Sears, Roebuck and Co. credits much of its success to a healthy balance of trade developed within states like Texas.

The company Richard W. Sears started when he sold his first watches from a North Redwood, Minn., railway station in 1886 has become the world's largest retailer and a major provider of financial, insurance and real estate services.

Sears said its growth reflects its commitment to the cities and communities in which it does business.

By helping create strong, vibrant local economies, we can develop a unique balance of trade that not only benefits the community but also our company," said Edward A. Brennan, chairman and chief executive of Sears, Roebuck and Co.

Last year, 90 percent of goods and services sold by Sears Merchandise Group were produced by U.S. companies. "This encourages

the growth of local companies, which in turn provides employment, produces increased consumer purchasing power and leads to increased tax revenues for community services—all of which benefit the manufacturer, community residents and Sears," he said.

In Texas, 246 companies provided \$822,022,000 worth of merchandise for Sears in 1985.

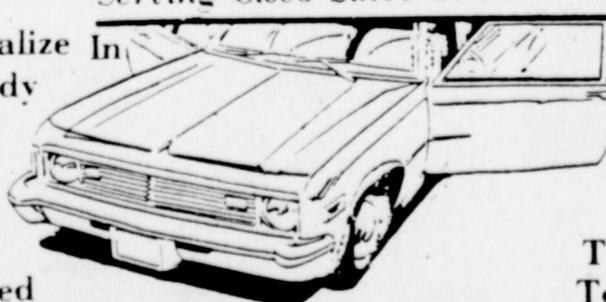

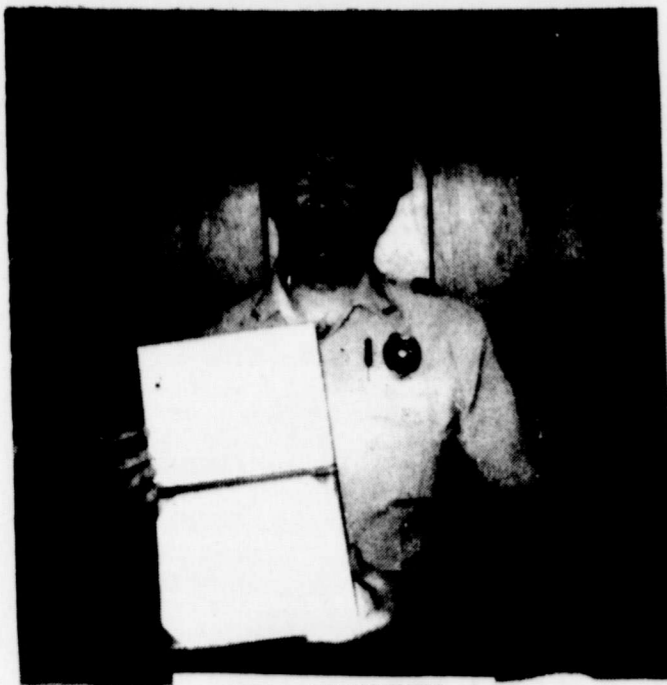

Absentee Voting To Begin May 28

Social Security Direct Deposit

It is easy for people living in the Big Country area who receive Social Security checks to arrange to have the deposited directly into an account in a financial organization, such as a commercial bank, savings bank, savings and loan association, Federal or State credit union, or similar organization, Glyn Hammons Social Security manager in Abilene said recently.

All a person has to do to arrange direct deposit is complete a direct deposit form SF 1199. The form is available at any financial organization. A monthly benefit check contains all the information needed to complete the form.

Some advantages of direct deposit are:

No worry about a check being lost or stolen.

No need to be home when the check arrives. The money is available in an account even if the person is out of town.

Time and transportation costs are saved and there is no standing in line to cash the check.

It is safer to keep money in an account than carrying a lot of cash.

A check book provides a written record of spending.

Chief Appeals For Help In Stopping Burglaries

An appeal for assistance in stopping thefts and burglaries that have occurred in increasing numbers in Cisco was issued Friday by the Cisco Police Department.

Chief Billy Rains asked home owners to take extra precautions to protect their property, including their homes and automobiles, and to assist police in efforts to

apprehend those responsible for the crimes.

Chief Rains said that thefts and burglaries have been occurring more in the south part of town at residences along 15th, 16th and 17th and 18th Streets. Break-ins have been taking place. In a good many instances, property has been reported missing from unlocked homes and unlock-

ed cars, the chief said.

Residents were asked to always lock doors and windows. Leaving a light on in the yard or house is a good idea, he said. Watch for strange cars cruising your neighborhood and report anything that might make you suspicious, the chief said.

"If you're leaving town for a day or more, don't make it obvious," Mr. Rains said. "Arrange for somebody to pick up your newspapers. Leave a light burning."

The chief suggested that money should never be left in a home or unlocked in a business. "Money is what most thieves want and you can't trace it," he said.

The Police Department has electrical engraving equipment for marking appliances and items in the home and it is available for use without charges, Mr. Rains said.

There has been quite a lot of cases of gasoline being siphoned out of auto tanks from cars parked in garages and carports or in front of homes, the chief said. Take steps to prevent this or make it hard for the thieves, he added.

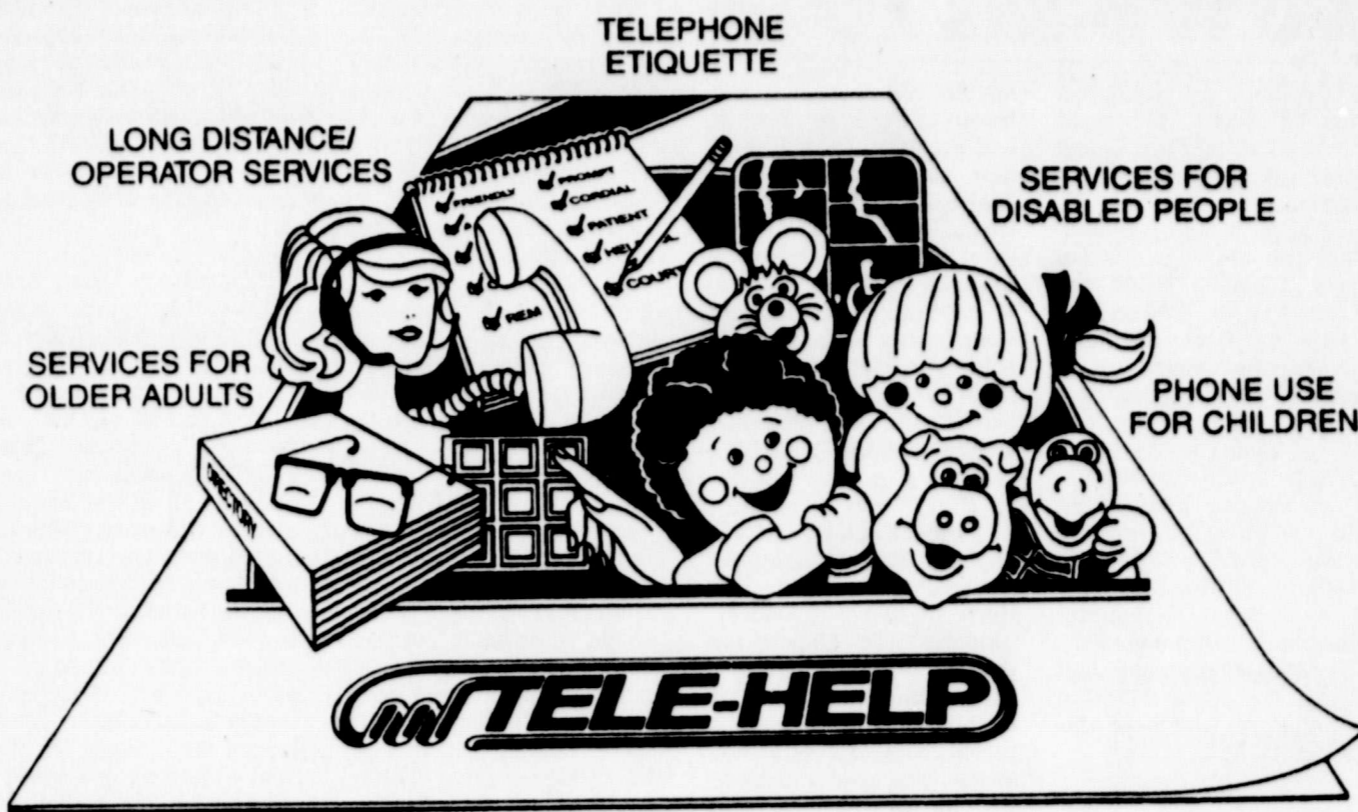
"Don't give the thief any advantage. He will take it," said Mr. Rains.

Making a list or inventory of items in the homes is good business, Mr. Rains said. "If you can identify items stolen from you, the investigator will have an advantage," he said. "Criminals don't want 'marked' items."

The police department's crime prevention unit works in cooperation with the Texas Crime Prevention Institute. Leaflets entitled "A Crime Prevention Guide to Home Security" is available at the department. Many communities have formed Neighborhood Watch groups to protect themselves from burglars, Mr. Rains said.

Mr. Rains urged that valuables never be left in sight in a car "and don't hide spare keys - they can be found," he said. "Don't think it can't happen to you - act before, not after the crime."

"The Police Department is limited by manpower to maintain a constant patrol in all parts of town," Mr. Rains said. "We try very hard and our efforts will be more rewarding with the cooperation of our citizens. You are always welcome to visit or call us."

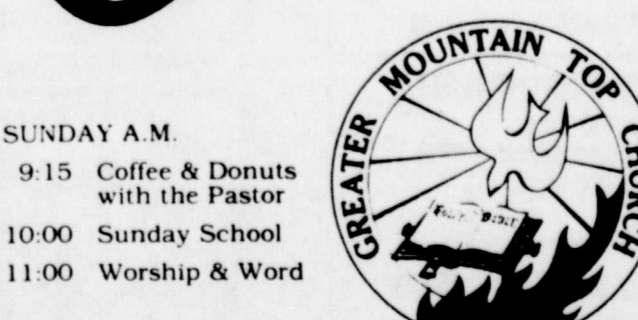
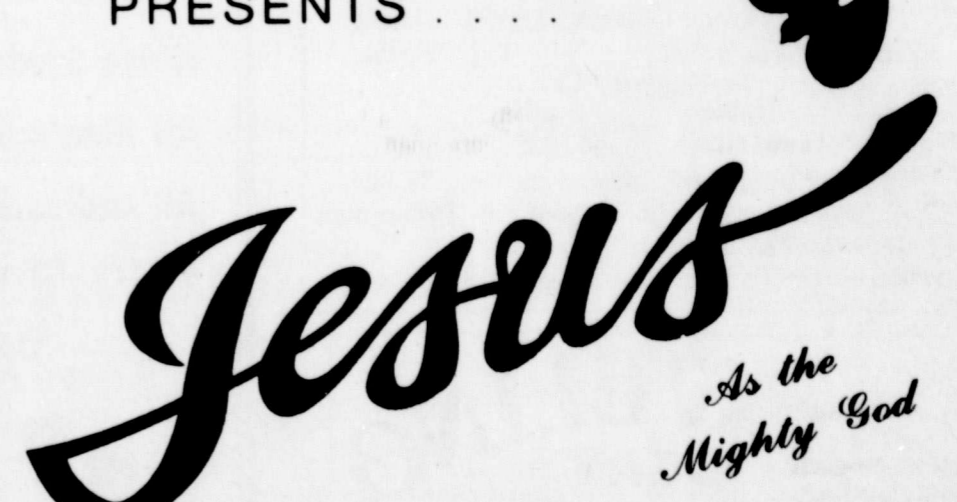

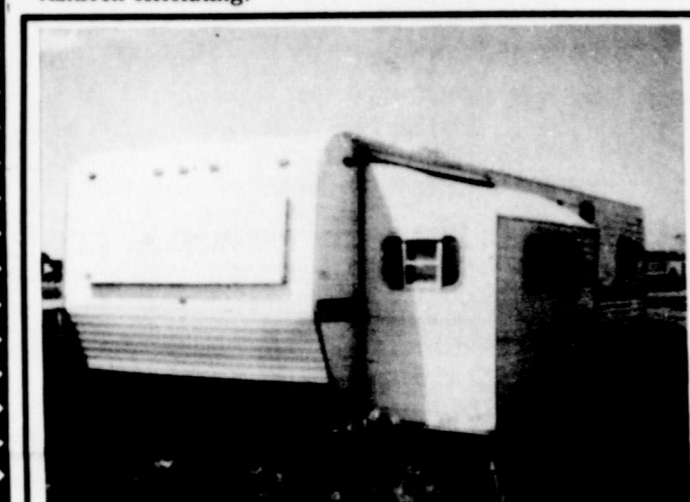

Cucumbers Make Good Progress, 145 Acres Contracted For Pickles

Commercial cucumbers for pickling are making good progress in Eastland County. Best Maid Pickle Co. has contracted to buy cucumbers from about 145 acres in the county.

County Agent De Gordon says high winds and blowing sand has greatly damaged about 40 acres near Rising Star, but cucumbers in other fields are making good progress.

The cucumbers were planted from April 7 to April 18. Harvest will begin late next week. The crop requires about 50 days to mature.

Bees are being rented to pollinate the crop. From one to two bee hives are used per acre to insure a good crop.

The cucumbers will be mechanically harvested at the rate of 15 acres per day.

New Service Helps Business During Economic Slump

While many local and area businesses are hurting from a reduction in customer spending due to falling incomes in both agriculture and the oil patch in our agriculture and petroleum based economy, one local businessman seems to have found the solution at just the right time.

Ike Whitson, owner of Ike's Paint & Body on Hwy. 6 between Eastland and Carbon, was thinking of how to better serve his customers this past year, and decided to expand his services. A new service was added that is not available elsewhere in the area, the resulting increase in new business is offsetting much of the slowdown from the economy.

Ike's has been offering auto body and frame repair, and auto painting for the past six years, but auto changes brought about a need for new methods.

New cars are now often made with unitized bodies using new and different metal alloys. They are also built with body parts that

fold or wrinkle to absorb the impact of a minor collision, and these parts can't be straightened or welded by the long used methods.

Since new cars are often quite an investment which ones does not want to dispose of in favor of a new model after a minor accident, and since such an investment deserves 'like new' restoration, machines have been developed to do the desired job. One such machine is called a Chief EZ Liner.

Mr. Whitson first expanded the work area used by him, his wife, and their two full time employees by building a new 40 ft. by 60 ft. metal building near the older 30 ft. by 80 ft. building.

Since there were no local facilities with the equipment to give the correct, quality service demanded by the new cars, according to Mr. Whitson, he purchased a new Chief EZ Liner and went through an intensive training program in its use at the factory school in Grand Island, Neb.

An investment around sixty thousand dollars was re-

quired, but the resulting increase in business is making it pay off.

An employee may also be sent to the school to learn to use the machine that reverses impact damage by pulling the damaged auto bodies back into the correct shape and precision aligns the frames.

A good reputation and the desire to please are important to Mr. Whitson, who says, "We will work on most anything."

And another business person reaps the reward for investing in himself and his community.

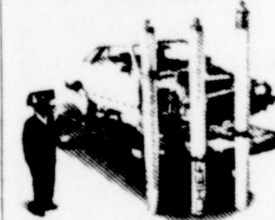

Senior Citizens To Elect Their Representatives

On May 30, older Texans across the State will go to their local Senior Citizens Centers to elect 116 delegates to the first Texas Silver Haired Legislature. Those elected will meet at the State Capitol in Austin, September 29, 30 and October 1, 1986.

The Silver Haired Legislature, which was authorized by the 69th Texas Legislature, is an elected, nonpartisan body of citizens 60 plus years of age elected by persons 60 plus years of age. They will meet to discuss and debate issues concerning senior citizens and establish legislative priorities from these issues for the Texas Legislature to consider when it convenes in January of 1987.

Delegates to the Silver Haired Legislature will be elected through the 28 Area Agencies on Aging in the State. The Texas Legislature developed this project to provide older persons in Texas the opportunity to make our governments more knowledgeable on the issues and concerns of senior citizens. It will also provide older Texans an avenue to become more aware of the legislative process through involvement, to develop a forum to discuss senior citizens' issues, and allow

them to serve as a public resource to their communities.

Texas will become the 23rd state involved in such a project with the ultimate goal being a National Silver Haired Congress. The success in other states has been very encouraging to those helping to implement this project in Texas. Between 70-90% of the issues presented in bill form to the State Legislators have been received favorably; therefore, the value of this project can be measured. The cucumbers were planted from April 7 to April 18. Harvest will begin late next week. The crop requires about 50 days to mature. Bees are being rented to pollinate the crop. From one to two bee hives are used per acre to insure a good crop.

The cucumbers will be mechanically harvested at the rate of 15 acres per day.

New Service Helps Business During Economic Slump

While many local and area businesses are hurting from a reduction in customer spending due to falling incomes in both agriculture and the oil patch in our agriculture and petroleum based economy, one local businessman seems to have found the solution at just the right time.

Ike Whitson, owner of Ike's Paint & Body on Hwy. 6 between Eastland and Carbon, was thinking of how to better serve his customers this past year, and decided to expand his services. A new service was added that is not available elsewhere in the area, the resulting increase in new business is offsetting much of the slowdown from the economy.

Ike's has been offering auto body and frame repair, and auto painting for the past six years, but auto changes brought about a need for new methods.

New cars are now often made with unitized bodies using new and different metal alloys. They are also built with body parts that

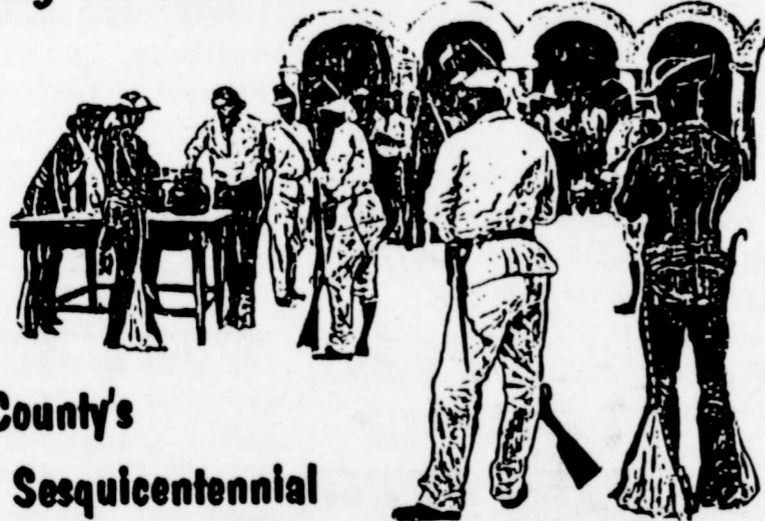

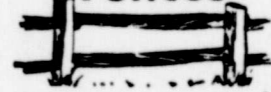

Who Was Eastland?

Part 10
By Ron Bailey

After drawing a black bean, Captain William Eastland behaved with the most patriotic dignity; he desired tht his country should not particularly avenge his death, but for her own honor, he implored her never to lay down her arms until the most ample reparation and her unconditional freedom should be secured. He said, "I know that some have thought me timid, but, thank God, death has no terrors for me."

The 17 men who had drawn black beans were taken into a separate courtyard from the other Texan prisoners.

Just previous to the firing they were bound together with cords, and being blindfolded, they were set upon a log near the wall, with their backs to their executioners.

It was at dusk on March 25, 1843. They all begged the officer to shoot them in front, and at a short distance; that they were not afraid to look death in the face.

This he refused and the firing continued for ten to twelve minutes.

The 17 victims were:

Cisco, Stamford, Coleman, Dublin, Cross Plains, Eastland, Albany, Breckenridge and Weatherford.

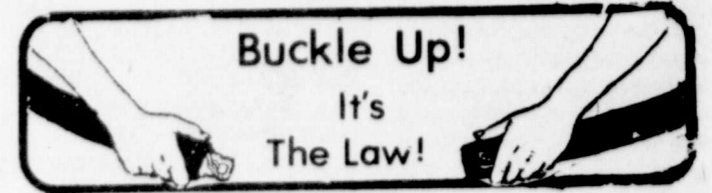

Eastland County as well as most of the state will have a short peach crop this year due to unusual weather conditions. Our best guess is that the very warm January interrupted the normal rest pattern in many parts of the state and caused the peach and plum trees to drop much of their crop due to the lack of chilling.

prolonged bloom that did not set well. Unfortunately, both these problems resulted in two few fruit on many of our trees. Fortunately, we have to go back to 1952 to find a year that was as bad as 1986 for lack of chilling and we certainly hope that it will be that far in the future before this happens again. This year does give us the opportunity to look at how varieties performed in the various areas of the state and tells us why high chilling varieties like Ranger should not be planted too far South and low chilling varieties such as TexStar shouldn't be carried too far north. With good varieties available in almost all chill hour requirements, growers should try to stay within 100 hours of either side of average to insure consistent cropping. We average about 900 chilling hours in Eastland County. When we plant a peach variety such as Sam Houston which requires 500 chilling hours, it usually blooms too

early and the fruit is killed by a late freeze. Gardeners are likely to have problems with blossoms drop and poor fruit set of tomatoes any time during the growing season. The problem may be exhibited as a total or partial failure of flowers to develop into fruit, or abnormal fruits which may be misshapen or catfaced.

The first category is the fruit set or blossom drop experienced most commonly in Texas. It is most common in tomatoes in plantings which bloom late. Generally, the unusual cause for poor fruit set is high temperature - either night or daytime temperatures. Optimum nighttime temperatures for fruit set in tomatoes is about 60 to 70° F. in combination with daytime temperatures about 90° often results in heavy blossom drop in tomatoes.

These conditions usually occur during June, July and August in most areas of Texas. Under these temperature conditions, fruit set may be very light but may change dramatically with the onset of more favorable nighttime temperatures (below 72°). A somewhat similar condition

may occur during extended periods of cold weather. However, under the cold weather conditions the problem may show up as blossom drop, but it may also be combined with abnormalities in those fruit which do not abort (misshapen, catfaced, etc.). There are many other causes for lack of fruit set or the development of malformed fruit in tomatoes. These include: 1. Unbalanced nutrition. 2. Extended periods of warm, windy weather with low humidity. 3. Extended periods of showery, cool, overcast weather during early spring. 4. Insects and disease.

Safety Belt Usage Saves Lives

Safety belt usage in seven cities varying from a high of 77% in Corpus Christi to a low of 57% in Waco is cause for celebration during "Texas Buckle-Up Week," May 22-29, according to George R. Gustafson, spokesperson for the Texas Coalition for Safety Belts.

The data were collected through observation studies still underway by the Texas Transportation Institute under contract with the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation (SDHPT) and released by SDHPT today, according to Gustafson.

"I understand that those preliminary data were collected in the period of December, 1985, to March. The seven cities were Austin (75%), Brownsville (63%), Bryan/College Station (70%), Corpus Christi (77%), Houston (69%), San Antonio (60%), and Waco (57%)," he said.

"We know that vigorous

enforcement by the Department of Public Safety and local police departments has played a key role in getting people into the buckle-up habit during this early period and that enforcement will continue to play a necessary part of helping citizens comply."

"Last fall the Texas Police Chief's Association passed a resolution in support of legislation requiring use of safety belts and support for strict enforcement. Again, the police chief's association has passed a resolution supporting "Texas Buckle-Up Week," May 22-29 and the continued public awareness campaign to encourage motorists to buckle up during the critical 101 summer-time driving days."

"As we kick off our summer-time buckle-up campaign, we want to remind citizens that it is important to buckle up on every trip—around the block or across the country," Gustafson said.

HAWKINS, Texas - They were young, vibrant and intelligent.

Today, they are dead and the residents of the East Texas community of Hawkins are searching for answers.

In an effort to assist in finding the answers to who killed Suzanne Harrison, 18, Bryan Boone and Gena Lee Turner, both 20, the Texas Crime Stoppers Advisory Council announced today it was joining forces with Wood County Crime Stoppers and the Upshur County Sheriff's Department.

A reward fund of up to \$5,000 has been established by the Governor's Office and Wood County Crime Stoppers for information leading to the arrest and indictment of the offender or offenders in the tragic case.

In addition, the citizens of Hawkins have announced a \$5,000 reward for information leading to the conviction of the offenders.

Wood County law enforcement authorities said the three young people had gone to nearby Lake Hawkins to enjoy a warm Sunday. When they failed to return Sunday evening, Boone's brother grew concerned and went to

search for them. He found their abandoned pickup at the lake. The truck was unlocked, the windows were open and inside the vehicle were the women's purses, undisturbed on the floorboard.

Miss Harrison's partially clad body was discovered at Barnwell Mountain Park, located about five miles north of Gilmer in neighboring Upshur County. The park is located on a steep, heavily wooded hill on State Road 155. The victim's body was about five or six feet down the side of the hill.

Detectives say Miss Harrison had been sexually assaulted, beaten with a blunt object and strangled.

The bodies of Boone and Miss Turner were discovered Saturday in a ditch beside FM 1649, north of Ore City and about a mile west of Barnwell Mountain Park. They both had been shot.

Investigator James Turner of the Wood County Sheriff's Office said it appears the three young people were abducted around 11:15 a.m. on Sunday, May 4.

Authorities are asking that anyone who might have seen the youngsters after that time to please contact Wood

County Crime Stoppers at (214)763-2274, the Texas Crime Stoppers Advisory Council toll-free at 1-800-252-8477, or the Upshur County Sheriff's Department at (214) 843-2541.

In order to reach Barnwell Mountain Park from Lake Hawkins, the offender or offenders could have taken several routes - FM49 or 1795 to Gilmer, or State Highway 154 to Gilmer, or U.S.80 to Big Sandy and then State Road 155 north to the park.

Citizens who might have observed a vehicle containing the three young people are urgently asked to come forward with this information. Investigators described Bryan Boone as a white male, 5-8, 160-170 pounds, with medium hair, hazel eyes, wearing a blue shirt and turquoise colored shorts. Gena Turner was a white female, 5-2, 110 pounds, with long brown hair and brown eyes and was wearing a black top and black and white striped shorts. Suzanne Harrison was a white female, 5-4, 120 pounds, with long brown hair, green eyes and had on a red pull-over sweater and red shorts.

In 1985, Texas experienced its lowest recorded death rate of 2.6 for every 100 million miles traveled. This low rate is in spite of a significant increase in vehicular miles traveled.

Members of the safety and law enforcement communities recognize that a large contributing factor was the increased usage of safety belts due to the new law and public education of the lifesaving and monetary benefits of belt usage.

Fatalities in the seating positions covered by the law decreased an average of 14 percent in September through December, the first four months after the law's effect date, compared to the same period in 1984.

The 101 days of summer are days which include happy leisure time travel for young and old alike across Texas and across the nation.

Historically, the safety community in Texas and throughout the country has participated in public awareness campaigns to increase safety belt usage to help keep those 101 days happy travel times.

The Texas Coalition for Safety Belts is comprised of more than 40 public and private sector organizations which through their state offices, local entities and local projects are working to increase public awareness of the benefits of safety belts.

Member groups of the Texas Coalition will be joining safety advocates in other states in an "All American Buckle-Up" to remind travelers to use their safety belts for themselves and their belts and child safety seats for their young passengers.
