

Watch for strange cars cru neighborhood and report anything that might make you suspicious, the chief "If you're leaving town for a day or more, don't make it obvious," Mr. Rains said. 'Arrange for somebody to pick up your newspapers. Leave a light burning.' The chief suggested that money should never be left in a home or unlocked in a business. "Money is what most thieves want and you can't trace it," he said. The Police Department has electrial engraving equipment for marking appliances and items in the home and it is available for use without charges, Mr. There has been quite a lot of cases of gasoline being siphoned out of auto tanks from cars parked in garages and carports or in front of homes, the chief said. Take steps to prevent this or make it hard for the thieves, he ad-"Don't give the thief any advantage. He will take it," said Mr. Rains. Making a list or inventory of items in the homes is good business, Mr. Rains said. "If you can identify items stolen from you, the investigator will have an advantage," he said. "Criminals don't want 'marked' items.' The police department's crime prevention unit works in cooperation with the Texas Crime Prevention Institute. Leaflets entitled "A Crime Prevention Guide to Home Security" is available at the department. Many communities have formed Neighborhood Watch groups to protect themselves from burglars, Mr. Rains said. Mr. Rains urged that valuables never be left in sight in a car "and don't hide spare keys - they can be found," he said. "Don't think it can't happen to you - act before, not after the crime." 'The Police Department is limited by manpower to maintain a constant patrol in all parts of town," Mr. Rains said. "We try very hard and our efforts will be more rewarding with the cooperation of our citizens. You are always welcome to visit or

auto body and frame repair, and auto painting for the past six years, but auto changes brought about a need for new methods. New cars are now often

made with unitized bodies using new and different metal alloys. They are also built with body parts that

fold or wrinkle to absorb the impact of a minor collision, and these parts can't be straightened or welded by the long used methods.

Since new cars are often quite an investment which ones does not want to dispose of in favor of a new model after a minor accident, and since such an investment deserves 'like new' restoration, machines have been developed to do the desired job. One such machine is

called a Chief EZ Liner. Mr. Whitson first expanded the work area used by him, his wife, and their two full time employees by building a new 40 ft. by 60 ft. metal building near the older 30 ft. by 80 ft. building. Since there were no local

An employee may also be sent to the school to learn to use the machine that reverses impact damage by pulling the damaged auto bodies back into the correct shape and precision aligns the frames.

Eastland County as well as most of the state will have a short peach crop this year due to unusual weather conditions. Our best guess is that the very warm January interrupted the normal rest pattern in many parts of the state and caused the peach and plum trees to drop much of their crop due to the lack of chilling.

Chilling (hours between 32 and 45° F) for most of the state was less than average this year and it could be seen in the strange growth and behavior of many of the state's peach and plum trees. Low chill varieties that were planted too far north bloomed early and were mostly left to frost while high chill varieties often had a very late and

prolonged bloom that did not set well. Unfortunately, both these problems resulted in two few fruit on many of our trees.

Fortunately, we have to go back to 1952 to find a year that was as bad as 1986 for lakk of chilling and we certainly hope that it will be that far in the future before this happens again. This year does give us the opportunity to look at how varieties performed in the various areas of the state and tells us why high chilling varieities like Ranger should not be planted too far South and low chilling varieties such as TexStar shouldn't be carried too far north. With good varieties available in almost all chill hour re-

quirements, growers should try to stay within 100 hours of either side of average to insure consistent cropping. We average about 900 chilling hours in Eastland County. When we plant a peach variety such as Sam Houston which requires 500 chilling

blossoms drop and poor fruit set of tomatoes any time during the growing season. The problem may be exhibited as a total or partial foilure of flowers to develop into fruit, or abnormal fruits which may be misshaped or catfaced.

The first category is the fruit set or blossom drop experienced most commonly in Texas. It is most common in tomatoes in plantings which bloom late. Generally, the unusual cause for poor fruit set is high temperature either night or daytime temperatures. Optimum nighttime temperatures for fruit set in tomatoes is about 60 to 70° F. in combination with daytime temperatures about 90° often results in heavy blossom drop in tomatoes.

These conditions usually occur during June, July and August in most areas of Texas. Under these temperature conditions, fruit set may be very light but may change dramatically with the onset of more favorable nighttime temperatures (below 72°). A somewhat similar condition





The data were collected through observation studies still underway by the Texas Transportation Institute under contract with the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation (SDHPT) and released by SDHPT today, according to Gustafson.

HAWKINS, Texas - They were young, vibrant and intelligent.

Today, they are dead and the residents of the East Texas community of Hawkins are searching for answers.

In an effort to assist in finding the answers to who killed Suzanne Harrison, 18, Bryan Boone and Gena Lee Turner, both 20, the Texas Crime Stoppers Advisory Council announced today it was joining forces with Wood County Crime Stoppers and the Upshur County Sheriff's Department. A reward fund of up to

\$5,000 has been established by the Governor's Office and Wood County Crime Stoppers for information leading to the arrest and indictment of the offender or offenders in the tragic case.

In addition, the citizens of Hawkins have announced a \$5,000 reward for information leading to the conviction of the offenders.

Wood County law enforcement authorities said the three young people had gone to nearby Lake Hawkins to enjoy a warm Sunday. When they failed to return Sunday evening, Boone's brother grew concerned and went to

search for them. He found their abandoned pickup at the lake. The truck was unlocked, the windows were open and inside the vehicle were the women's purses,

undisturbed on the floorboard. Miss Harrison's partially clad body was discovered at Barnwell Mountain Park, located about five miles north of Gilmer in neighboring Upshur County. The park is located on a steep, heavily wooded hill on State Road 155. The victim's body was about five or six feet down the side of the hill.

Detectives say Miss Harrison had been sexually assaulted, beaten with a blunt object and strangled. The bodies of Boone and Miss Turner were discovered Saturday in a ditch beside FM 1649, north of Ore City and about a mile west of Barnwell Mountain Park. They both had been shot Investigator James

Turner of the Wood County Sheriff's Office said it appears the three young people were abducted around 11:15 a.m. on Sunday, May 4.

Authorities are asking that anyone who might have seen the youngsters after that time to please contact Wood

County Crime Stoppers at (214)763-2274, the Texas Crime Stoppers Advisory Council toll-free at 1-800-252-8477, or the Upshur **County Sheriff's Department** at (214) 843-2541.

In order to reach Barnwell Mountain Park from Lake Hawkins, the offender or offenders could have taken

several routes - FM49 or 1795 to Gilmer, or State Highway 154 to Gilmer, or U.S.80 to Big Sandy and then State Road 155 north to the park.

Citizens who might have observed a vehicle containing the three young people are urgently asked to come forward with this information. Investigators described Bryan Boone as a white male, 5-8, 160-170 pounds, with medium hair, hazel eyes, wearing a blue shirt and turquoise colored shorts. Gena Turner was a white female, 5-2, 110 pounds, with long brown hair and brown eves and was wearing a black top and black and white striped shorts. Suzanne Harrison was a white female, 5-4, 120 pounds, with long brown hair, green eyes and had on a red pull-over sweater and red shorts.

In 1985, Texas experienced its lowest recorded death rate of 2.6 for every 100 million miles traveled. This low rate is in spite of a significant increase in vehicular miles traveled.

Members of the safety and law enforcement communities recognize that a large contributing factor was the increased usage of safety belts due to the new law and public education of the lifesaving and monetary benefits of belt usage.

Fatalities in the seating positions covered by the law decreased an average of 14 percent in September through December, the first four months after the law's effect date, compared to the same period in 1984.

The 101 days of summer are days which include happy leisure time travel for young and old alike across Texas and across the nation.

Historically, the safety community in Texas and throughout the country has participated in public awareness campaigns to increase safety belt usage to help keep those 101 days happy travel times.

The Texas Coalition for Safety Belts is comprised of more than 40 public and private sector organizations which through their state offices, local entities and local projects are working to increase public awareness of the benefits of safety belts.

Member groups of the Texas Coalition will be joinging safety advocates in other states in an "All American Buckle-Up" to remind travelers to use their safety belts for themselves and their belts and child safety seats for their young passengers.

Therefore, I, Mark White, Governor of Texas, do hereby proclaim May 22-29, 1986, as


