Senior Citizens Attend Medicare Seminar

This past week, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday senior citizens from AARP-Green Thumb-Nutrition Program and the RSVP service organization attended a school on Medicare at the Senior Citizen Center in Cisco.

Mr. Michael Klug, an attorney with the firm, Center for Public Representation out of Madison, Wisconsin, has been instructing the

senior citizens in the area on the pros and cons of the Medicare program. Topics covered were how to file Medicare claims, what Medicare supplement actually covers, how to analyze Medicare supplement insurance purchased from private firms, what the rights of senior citizens are in certain areas, and other related subjects.

Mr. Klug stated that he is

vitaly interested in senior citizens knowing all they can about their rights and services offered to them. "Especially people need to know that Medicare doesn't pay for everything; there are many costs not covered with this insurance," he said. "It is more important now than ever before that people need to be aware of what is covered and how to protect their interest," he continued. "How to file a Medicare appeal, (some items are not paid or only a little is paid), and how to evaluate private health insurance plans designed to cover gaps in Medicare." Mr. Klug stated are some of the most important areas.

Roy Cartee has spent many hours and days helping and planning for this event. There are only 4 or 5 such seminars in the state and we were fortunate to have one located here.

Participants in the seminar came from Weatherford, Eastland, Breckenridge, Albany, Cisco, Coleman, Abilene, Merkel, Dublin, Clyde and Cross Plains.

Mr. Cartee further stated that one of the areas of importance is learning to assist the older senior citizens in filling out and filing Medicare forms. He said, "This is to be done on a volunteer basis and no charge will be made for this assistance."

Police Department Investigating Burglaries

Cassandra Bradford of 601 East 14th Street reported the theft of \$48 in money and a loose diamond from a purse that had been left in a motor vehicle at the home between 4 p.m. Wednesday and 12 noon Thursday. Detective Risa Livingston was investigating.

Miss Livingston and Sergeant Frank Thunsden arrested Johnny Franklin Boykin, 18, of Cisco last Tuesday on charges of

Used Car offices on East 8th Street. He was alleged to have taken keys to a 1978 Olds Cutless and to have driven it without permission. The car was later recovered at Beech and East 18th Street.

Miss Livingston said that Boykin was placed in the county jail and was still there Friday after formal charges had been filed and pending bond.

The White Elephant Restaurant planned to file charges Friday against three Eastland men who ate dinner there Thursday night and left without paying for their meal. Miss Livingston reported.

A 1975 Olds driven by Billy J. Wyley and a 1976 Ford Van driven by Frank Schlaepfer were in a collision at 11:30 a.m. Wednesday on Franklin Street. There was minor damage to both vehicles and no injuries to the drivers. Mr. Rains, who investigated the mishap, reported that rain soaked streets contributed to the cause of the mishap.

Pre-Trial Hearing Set For June 25

A pre-trial hearing for three persons charged last December in the Garcia murder case will be held in the 91st District Court on Wednesday, June 25, according to a report by Special Prosecutor Bill Hart.

Named in the indictments were Brenda Gail Perry Andrews of Rising Star, Pat Dwayne Starr Ingram of Cisco and Richard Edward Hinton of Rising Star. An indictment was also returned against Joe Perry, Sr. who remains at liberty, and authorities are searching for him.

Mr. Hart said the pre-trial hearing was not unusual in

murder cases. Each of the trio was accused of being engaged in organized criminal activity of murder, committing murder, conspiracy to commit murder, robbery and conspiracy to commit robbery. The men were also indicted for aggravated rape.

The indictments resulted from investigations in the 1981 death of Donna Garcia in Cisco. Two brothers, Charles and Thomas LeFlore, are serving sentences of 60 years and 50 years, respectively, after pleading guilty to murder charges in the case.

Lake Cisco To Gain From Week's Rainfall

Rainfall measuring from 1.3 inches at the Lake Cisco dam to more than two inches south of town fell in this region last Wednesday night, according to reports Thursday. Rain fell intermittently most of Wednesday night.

The city's Battle Creek

pump station began operating last Monday afternoon and was still in operation early Friday, it was reported.

The water level at Lake Cisco was expected to have a substantial gain as a result

of more than five inches of rain falling in the area during the past week. City officials were not available for an official report on the lake's gain.

Forecasters called for continued thunderstorm conditions through the weekend.

Chamber Of Commerce Making Plans To Move Office

Plans for moving the Chamber of Commerce headquarters to the Mobley Hilton when the restoration work there is finished were discussed by the board of directors of the CofC at their monthly meeting last Tuesday afternoon.

The board decided to work closely with the board of directors of the Conrad N. Hilton Memorial Park and Community Center in effecting the move. Construction work was expected to be completed at the hotel sometime this month, it was reported.

The industrial committee discussed plans for organizing tours of local factories during June and July. Details of this promotion will be announced soon, Mr. Shepard reported.

of the county's sesquicentennial celebration in Eastland this weekend, discussed the plans of the sesquicentennial wagon train's plans to visit Cisco July 23rd, and asked President Shirley Hargrave to meet with Ivan Webb to help coordinate the July 4th celebration at City Park.

Plans for a Farmer's Market were discussed and it was reported to the board that Little Farmer's Market has been opened by Joe Baker at 1105 West 8th Street to buy and sell locally grown produce.

Attending the meeting were President Shirley Hargrave and board members Roy Dennis, Ayres Cermin, Linda Cozart, Patsy Hogan, Harold Reich, Bobby Smith, Emma Watts and Billy Wright.

Cisco Lions Club Hears About Weather

A large closet in the middle of your home would probably be the safest place in the house if a tornado struck, according to Weatherman Charlie Jordan of Abilene TV-32 (KTAB) in a talk at the weekly luncheon of the Cisco Lions Club last Wednesday noon.

Mr. Jordan, the guest speaker, reported that the theory that a window should be opened to minimize pressure damage has been disproved and that windows and doors of the home should be closed during storm conditions.

"If you see a tornado coming and have no storm cellar, go to an interior walk-in closet and cover your head," Mr. Jordan said. In most storm damaged homes, the interior walls remain standing, he said.

Mr. Jordan said that people caught outside in tornadoes should not lay down with their chest to the ground as electricity generated by lightning could damage their hearts.

"your chest off the ground," he said.

"Lightning does strike twice in the same place," Mr. Jordan said. He added that often, just before lightning strikes, a person will feel ill and the hair on his body will stand up.

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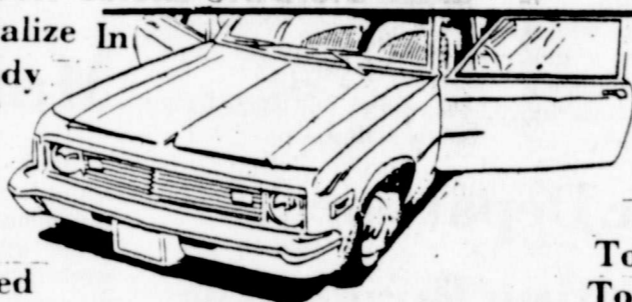

Savings Bond Sales In Grand Jury Indictments Texas Up 16% In March

During the first quarter of calendar year 1986, Texas sales of U.S. Savings Bonds amounted to \$94,802,245, an increase of over \$13 million over 1985 for 16.4 percent, T.J. Morrow, District Director for U.S. Savings Bonds Division in Dallas, announced today. These sales represent 25.6 percent of the state's 1986 assigned dollar goal of \$370 million. March 1986 sales of Series EE Bonds were \$33,634,254, an increase of 15.1 percent over March 1985.

Sales of Series EE Bond amounted to \$70,683 during March 1986 in Eastland County, Jim Wright, Volunteer County Chairman, said. Total sales in County during the period January-March, 1986 were \$97,835, which represents 38 percent of the County's 1986 assigned dollar goal.

CJC Accepting Applications For LVN Program

Cisco Junior College is now accepting applications for the September 1986 Licensed Vocational Nursing program at Cisco.

In accord with certification requirements, applicants must make application in advance and pass a pre-entrance physical examination. Prospective students must be 17 years of age and must be in good physical and mental health. Students must be high school graduates or have successfully taken the GED examination establishing high school equivalency.

Satisfactory completion of the 12 month course entitles the student to a certificate from the college, and qualifies him/her to take the State Board of Vocational Nurse Examiner's examination.

The pre-test for the September class will be given on June 30, 1986 at 9 a.m. in the Vocational-Technical Building 1, room No. 30. Cost of the test will be \$12.50.

Nationally, March sales of U.S. Savings Bonds totaled \$600 million, 40 percent above March a year ago and the highest sales for any March since 1979. One retaliation on a public employee.

The foreman of the Grand Jury was Weldon Tankersley and the secretary was Mike Siebert. District Attorney Emory Walton said that it was the largest number of cases in a single session of a Grand Jury in several years.

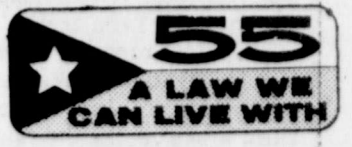

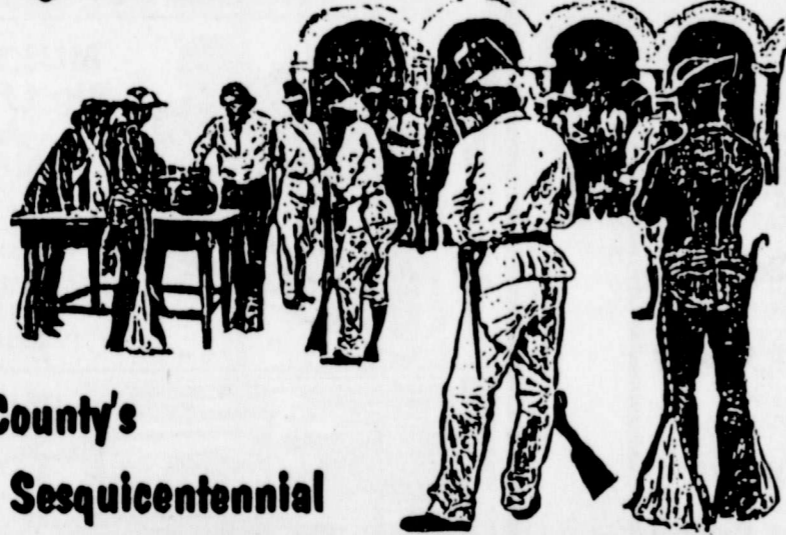

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Weather Makes News Again

Eastland County is drying out this weekend after some of the heaviest rain since 1981. Unlike 1981, the heaviest portion of these rains hit along the South Fork of the Leon River in Rising Star, Carbon, Gorman, Desdemona, and the Lake Leon area.

The latest round of storm clouds began late Wednesday afternoon, June 4, just when it looked like the rains were beginning to break away. Three small systems formed on the west side of Eastland County, with wind and clouds rotating around them.

Rising Star and the Carbon area got heavy rains at this time, with the rest of the county receiving lighter amounts.

Late that night, a line of clouds rolled in which made the other look small indeed.

Tanning Salons & Sun Can Take Toll On Skin

The tanning season has arrived and you may find yourself complaining about not having enough time to lie out in the sun. You even may have considered buying a membership to a tanning salon.

Before you do, the Texas Medical Association warns that salons and excessive exposure to the sun can be harmful to your skin and eyes.

Tanning salons use ultraviolet light, the same as that emitted by the sun. Ultraviolet light may either be short-wave (UVB) or long-wave (UVA).

Experiments on animals have linked artificial tanning with UVB to sunburn and long-term skin damage. UVB also can damage the eye, so protective goggles should be worn.

Artificial tanning with UVA has been found to be more suitable and safer than UVB, but this does not mean it is safe. UVA also may damage the eyes if protective goggles are not worn. In addition, your skin may be overly sensitive to UVA if you are taking medication such as antidepressants, oral contraceptives, antihistamines, and a variety of other drugs.

Both ultraviolet types can damage the skin. Three com-

mon types of skin cancer that can occur are basal cell carcinoma, squamous cell carcinoma, and the worst kind, malignant melanoma. These occur most frequently on continuously exposed parts of the body such as hands, face and neck.

In basal cell carcinoma, cells just below the skin's surface become cancerous. A tumor may develop and become ulcerated. Caused by long-term exposure to ultraviolet light, this cancer will not spread to other parts of the body.

Squamous cell carcinoma attacks underlying skin cells that have been damaged by continuous exposure to the sunlight. With this type of cancer, a malignant or life-threatening tumor will develop.

Malignant melanoma is the most serious form of skin cancer because it may spread. A cancerous tumor develops from cells in a mole or sometimes from pigment cells in what looks like ordinary skin. Many years of exposure to strong sunlight seem to play a part in the development of the disease.

For these reasons, it is advisable to avoid long-term exposure to ultraviolet light whether in a tanning salon or on a beach.

almost full. Water is running 3 feet over the first spillway, reports Jess White of the Eastland County Water District. It has about 4 foot to the emergency spillway, with both forks of the Leon running bank full. The South Fork is out over lowlands and at least one bridge southeast of Cisco, so considerably more water is due to run into the Lake.

Several homes are flooded at Lake Leon, including 2 foot of water in the home of George B. and Wanda Hull. Snakes are coming out of lowlands around the lake, and have been found in the Hull home and others.

For awhile the Staff Bridge was under water, but that is clear now. In this area, however, as well as across the south part of the county, oil tanks and pump jacks can be seen sticking up out of water.

The lowlands in the southwest side of Eastland, next to Highway 6, are presently flooded. One home in the south part of Eastland has been reported flooded, with others near high water.

Terry Edwards of the Eastland Volunteer Fire Department was out on flood patrol Wednesday night, and he reports there was flash flooding around Carbon. Two

ladies were evacuated from their home just west of Carbon on Road 2526. There was four feet of water at their front door, with a stream running swiftly down and across the road.

There was also a lot of high water south of Carbon, Edwards says. He also noticed a lot of damage to the fields south of Punkin Center, with heavy runoff.

In the south and southwest part of the county the Sabanno River has flooded out over the lowlands. This would have been a great time for that flood control project the county worked at for 20 years and was turned down in Washington. The whole Sabanno watershed, as well as the Rising Star area, is saturated to the critical point.

In Rising Star, the nursing home has water around it, but is not flooded. Some homes, however, have received heavy flood damage. The Albert Starkey home east of Rising Star was flooded Monday night, even before the latest rain. Copperas Creek went out of its banks and over a bridge just east of Rising Star. At that time water was also over Highway 183 at places on the south side of town.

The sun is coming out presently, and things are looking better. A few dry days can make a lot of difference. We need them!

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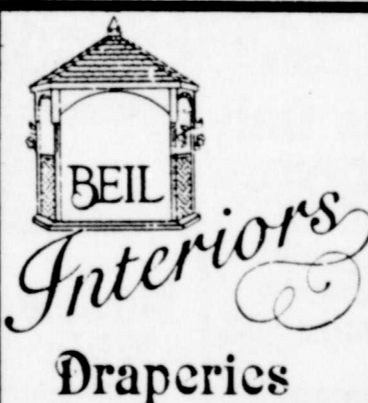
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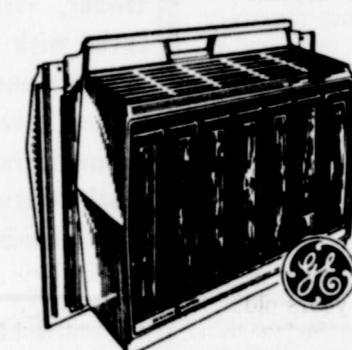


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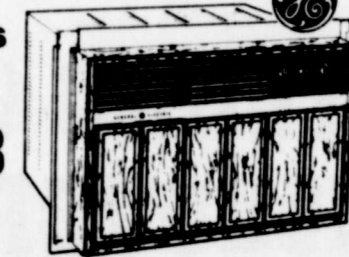
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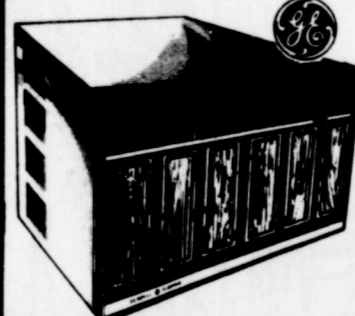


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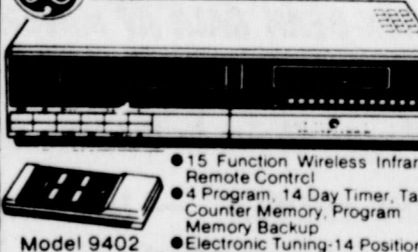
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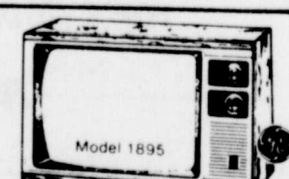
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Area News Briefs

Texas Water Commission

Enters Lawsuit Debate

The Texas Water Commission sought to intervene as a neutral party in a landmark lawsuit against the federal government and its administration of Texas water quality standards.

"We are entering this lawsuit for the people of Texas," said Water Commission Chairman Paul Hopkins. "After several months of careful thought, we have decided that too much is at stake for the

principal authority in Texas on water matters to go without a voice in this deliberation."

Water Commission Executive Director Larry Soward formally requested that Attorney General Jim Mattox intervene in the lawsuit on behalf of the Commission.

"The Commission firmly believes that the broad spectrum of interests that exist in the State relating to water should be represented in this suit," Soward said.

The Sportsmen's Club of Texas, the Sierra Club and the Environmental Defense Fund filed the suit against the federal Environmental Protection Agency, challenging the method by which the EPA approved Texas Water Quality Standards.

Hopkins and Soward said that by intervening as a neutral party, the Commission hopes to act as a catalyst to bring the two sides of the suit - as well as the multitude of other Texas agencies and organizations with an interest in water quality - to a resolution of

their differences that will benefit the people of the state.

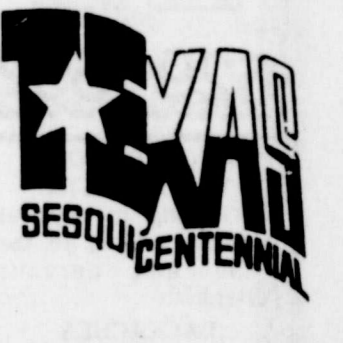

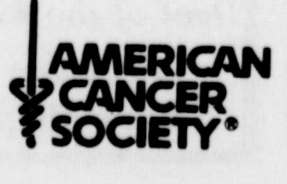

Formal vs Informal Mortgage

FORMAL VS. INFORMAL MORTGAGE ASSUMPTIONS--Dr. Jane Berry, a housing specialist with the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service (TAEX), says that homeowners with assumable VA or FHA mortgages can be victimized by their ability to sell their homes through a simple rather than a formal assumption. She explains that in a formal assumption, the person buying the property assumes responsibility for any nonpayment of the loan. For a simple assumption, however, the original mortgage holder remains responsible for any default which might occur on the

loan. Simple assumption of FHA and VA loans can be accomplished between buyer and seller without HUD, VA or the mortgage company's approval. "Not all buyers in this circumstance are out to defraud homeowners," she remarks, "but it is up to the homeowner to determine whether the prospective buyer is legitimate and intends to meet the mortgage commitment." The housing specialist advises making every effort to check out the credit record of a prospective buyer. If you have any doubts, she recommends sticking to a formal assumption, where liability for any future default would rest with the new buyer.

Park Passports Are Available To Qualified Individuals

Golden Age Passports and Golden Access Passports, free lifetime entrance permits to federal parks for certain U.S. citizens or permanent residents, are available at U.S. Army Corps of Engineers' offices throughout Texas.

Golden Age Passports, issued to persons age 62 or older, and Golden Access Passports, for blind or disabled persons, reduce or eliminate use fees charged at federal parks.

Both provide a 50 percent discount on fees charged for services provided at Corps camping sites, such as electrical hook-ups, camping, boat launching and parking. A card admits the permit holder and a carload of accompanying people. If entry into the recreational area is not made in a private vehicle, the passport admits the permit holder, his or her spouse, children and parents.

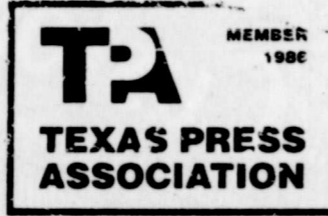
Eligible persons must obtain Golden Age or Golden Access Passports in person. For a Golden Age Passport, proof of age must be shown in the form of a state driver's license including date of birth, a birth certificate or a Medicare card. For a Golden Access Passport, a statement proving applicant has been medically determined to be blind or permanently disabled must be shown.

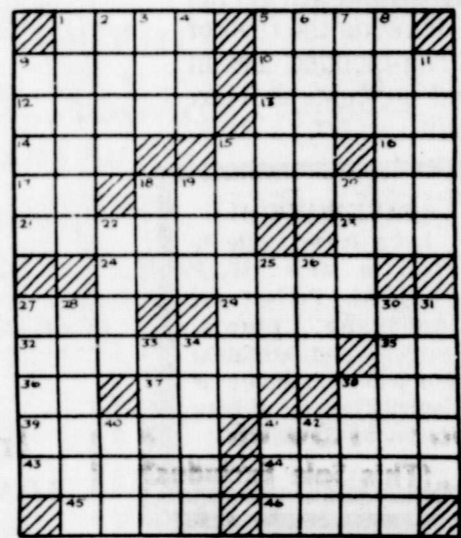
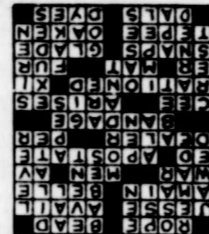

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Don't Let The Size Of A Spider Mislead You

Most spiders are small, inconspicuous and harmless to humans. Only two groups, the recluse spiders and the widow spiders, are considered dangerous to people. These two groups make up a very small percentage of the nearly 3000 species of spiders that live in the United States.

Spiders are important because they play a vital part of the predator and prey relationships that keep insect populations in check. This beneficial aspect far outweighs the hazard posed by the few spiders that occasionally bite humans.

Many people have a phobia of spiders. Tarantulas, jumping spiders and wolf spiders are mistaken frequently for poisonous species. These spiders are often large, hairy and formidable, but their bite is less harmful than a bee sting. Some people, however, are extremely allergic to spider venom and react severely to any spider bite.

BROWN RECLUSE
The brown recluse spider, *Loxosceles reclusa* Gertsch, inhabits many southern and

midwestern states, including Texas. It often lives around human dwellings and is found in bathrooms, bedrooms and closets; as well as under furniture, behind baseboard and door facings or in corners and crevices. It also likes cluttered cellars and garages. People are often bitten while they sleep, when they roll on a spider in bed. Others may be bitten by spiders trapped in the folds of clothing that has hung undisturbed for a long time.

DESCRIPTION AND LIFE CYCLE

The brown recluse is a nonaggressive spider that spins white or grayish, non-descript webs. Its body and legs together cover about the same area as a quarter. The coloring of the recluse varies from an orange-yellow to dark brown or almost black.

The most distinguishing characteristics are the spider's eyes and back markings. It has three pairs of eyes arranged in a semicircle on the forepart of the head. The eyes also form the base of a violin-shaped marking on the back. The

neck of the "violin" is formed by a distinct, short median groove (see Figure 1). The spider's eggs are deposited in dark, sheltered areas in off-white, round silken cases approximately 1/3 inch in diameter. After 24 to 36 days, 40 or more spiderlings emerge from the egg case. Their development is slow and is influenced greatly by ecological conditions and nutrition.

BITE SYMPTOMS

The effects of a brown recluse spider bite may be immediate or delayed, depending upon the amount of venom injected and the victim's sensitivity. Usually, the bite causes a stinging sensation and then intense pain. Within 24 to 36 hours, a systemic reaction may occur, characterized by restlessness, fever, chills, nausea, weakness and joint pain. The bite also produces a small blister surrounded by a large congested and swollen area. The venom usually kills the affected tissue, which gradually sloughs away and exposes underlying tissues. The edges around the wound thicken, while the exposed center fills with dense scar tissue. Healing may take 6 to 8 weeks, leaving scars of various sizes.

CONTROL OF SPIDERS
As a precautionary measure, become familiar with the appearance and habits of poisonous spiders. Since spiders nest in quiet and undisturbed areas, frequent cleaning in closets, cellars and other such areas helps keep the spiders away. Where possible, use a water

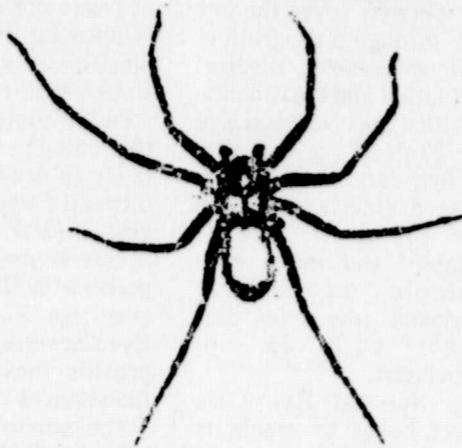
horse to wash off outside areas, particularly under roof eaves. When chemical control is necessary, use products containing diazinon, Dursban, Baygon, pyrethrins, Sevin, resmethrin, Vapona or malathion.

Spray or dust outside under roof eaves, window ledges and porch and patio roofs. Inside, spray around windows, door facings, baseboards, basements, attics and storage places.

FIRST AID

Relieve local swelling and pain by applying an ice pack or alcohol directly to the bite area. Other forms of local first aid are considered ineffective and unnecessary.

In case of severe reaction, consult a physician immediately and, if possible, take along the biting spider for positive identification. Specific antivenin is available for black widow bite treatment.

All members are urged to attend this meeting.

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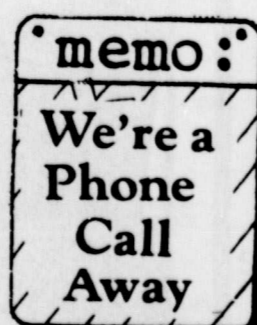
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Vacation Bible School To Begin At Mangum

Medical Eye Care Now

Available To All Elderly

The American Academy of Ophthalmology has recently launched an ambitious program to provide eye care to older persons (over the age of 65) through a program of public awareness, medical information and treatment.

Entitled the "National Eye Care Project", it will provide eye care to the disadvantaged elderly where no other source of care is available, and make care available to elderly Americans who have lost contact with an ophthalmologist.

The National Eye Care Project hopes to reach its goal by conducting a multimedia information campaign with emphasis on eye diseases of the elderly, and by maintaining a national toll-free "Helpline" number (1-800-222-EYES). Callers over 65 years of age can receive medical information about eye diseases from this number and a referral to a participating ophthalmologist.

The Academy has recruited a network of 443 ophthalmologists who have agreed to provide medical services to those referred by the helpline, regardless of ability to pay. This means that in the case of an individual with no Medicare coverage or other supplemental insurance, the services are free of charge. For the individual with Medicare coverage, the ophthalmologist has agreed to accept assignment.

The Helpline is being phased in gradually nationwide.

It became active in this area of Texas on Feb. 10, 1986, and is open for calls. It will be phased in all across the United States by July, 1986.

Ophthalmologists realize that older persons are more likely to develop vision problems than any other age group. Fifty percent of all severely visually impaired persons in the country are over age 65. The National Eye Care Project is a way to provide these elderly with the services they need.

The public will no doubt approve of this Project set up by the American Academy of Ophthalmology, and hope that this type of outreach will be carried forward into still other areas of human services.

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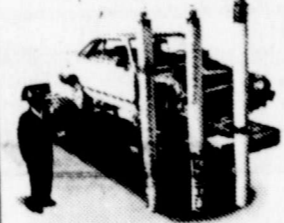
