Three Arrested For Suspicion Of Arson

Ciscoans Invited To Run With Olympic Torch

Men, women, boys and girls of Cisco have been officially invited to participate in relaying the Olympic Torch through Cisco when the famous torch visits here on Sunday afternoon, June 29, Hilton Board President Eris Ritchie has announced.

The torch, which was carried across America for the Olympic Games in Los Angeles in 1984, is being relayed across Texas for the U.S. Olympic Festival to be held in Houston July 25-August 3, and Cisco is one of towns chosen by the Olympic Festical to host the torch run, Mr. Ritchie stated.

The torch run will stop for a few minutes in front of the Mobley Hotel for ceremonies hosted by Mayor Joe Wheatley. Wheatley is handling all arrangements for the Mobley stop, at which time the historial significance of the Mobley and Conrad Hilton will be emphasized as a part of the theme of the torch run, "A Run Through Texas History.'

Cisco Junior College Athletic Director Harold "Ace" Prescott will be local chairman of the torch run itself. Prescott stated that a minimum of 30 to 35 runners would be needed June 29, and as many as 65 to 70 could ners will begin relaying the torch on the far west side of the city, near the White Elephant Restaurant and Motel, and will relay it down West Eighth Street to Avenue E, from there north to Third Street, then east on Third, around behind the Mobley, stopping in front of the Mobley for Cisco's official ceremonies hosted by Mayor Wheatley. Following the ceremonies, the torch will be carried south on Conrad Hilton Avenue on Eighth Street, then east on U.S. 80 to the Kendrick Farm, where runners from Eastland will receive the torch to relay it to and through their city.

Each runner will carry the torch from 1/8 to 1/4 of a mile, Prescott said. "If we have about 30 to 35 runners, each leg will be about 1/4 mile; if we have 65 to 70 runners, each person will go about 1/8 mile," he pointed out. All runners will be given free U.S. Olympic Festival T-shirts, and will be required to wear the shirt during the run. Also, each participant will be asked to sign a release form then they sign up for the run, and any runner under 18 years of age will


Alarms Thursday

Thursday as I watched, not only during the day, but all night as neighbors became watchmen to see that another incident doesn't happen. I saw a feeling, a spirit, a love, that comes out of respect for ones fellowman.

About 4 a.m. Friday morning as several of us were standing in front of this office, a stranger walked up with blood on his face and arms. He asked directions to the police department, his

Dixon Auto Supply

Three Cisco young men, all 18 years old or older. were in the Eastland County jail Thursday afternoon after their arrest on charges of arson as authorities investigated fires that occurred Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday nights.

Jim Bob Cozart, who was charged with arson in a 91st District Court case filed Thursday, I was denied bond and was in the county jail. He was arrested by Sergeant Larry Jernigan and Detective Risa Livingston who saw him running from the scene of the Wednesday night fire that destroyed Dicon Auto Supply and White's Auto Store at 615 and 617 Hilton in downtown

Officer R.D. Kirkland reported that Cozart confessed to police that the fire was set in the White building, which had not been open but which was full of merchandise. He implicated two other young men, Randy Dunahoe and Billy Escovedo, who were arrested by Mr. Kirkland. They were placed in the county jail for investigation of arson, he said.

Mr. Kirkland reported that

evidence of arson was found in the White Auto Store building and in the Red Front Mini Mall where fire broke out Tuesday night. Investigation of suspected arson in the Cisco Lumber and Supply warehouse that burned Monday night was still underway, Mr. Kirkland said. Larry Lavery and Gill

Harper of the Duncanville office of the Texas Fire Marshall's office arriver in town Wednesday to assist Billy Rains, Cisco fire marshall and police chief, and Fire Chief Richard Connell with the investigation of suspected arson.

The investigators had fingerplrints and footprints from the burned building areas and also from business firms where break-ins occurred during the time of the blazes, Mr. Kirkland said. The prints were being pro-

During the Monday night fire, burglars broke into Dean Drug Store and were "scared off" by a burglar alarm that sounded.

Burglarized Tuesday night were Taylor's Grocery and Cisco Lumber and Supply Co. Mr. Kirkland said the Taylor building was entered through a window in the coin laundry and thieves took cigarettes, snuff and a small amount of money from a cash register. At Cisco Lumber, the building was entered through a broken skylight and missing was an electric saw and other items not immediately determin-

Mr. Kirkland said that police determined that the three young men arrested in the arson investigation had attended a "drinking party" Wednesday night at the point on the south shore of Lake Cisco. He added that some of them "had been drinking when arrested." Twenty or more young people attended

Thursday Morning Fire Destroys Two Businesses

Cisco volunteer firemen fought a raging blaze that destroyed Dixon Auto Supply and White's Auto Store early Thursday morning as the third night of serious fires in downtown Cisco. The Wednesday night fire loss

Tuesday night, the Red Front Mini Mall, a two story building at 508 Hilton, had extensive fire damage. Monday night, a warehouse and its contents were destroyed at Cisco Lumber and Supply

The alarm for the early Thursday (Wednesday night) fire was sounded at 3:10 a.m. Firemen could see flames in the White Auto building, a two-story structure, and before they could bring it under control, the second story wall collapsed and crushed the roof of the Dixon building, adjoining to

Dan Dixon, owner of the auto store, said he was summoned by telephone at about 3:30 a.m. As soon as he arrived at the store, he want in and picked up his accounts receivable ledger, an inventory record and other about to open a safe to take out more records when the ceiling caved in and firemen ordered him out.

Cam Webb of the White store said that his company had no insurance on their building and contents and that the loss would be considerable. He expresses the hope that a "fire proof" safe in the store really was fire proof as it contained property deeds, birth certificates and assorted papers of value. He said they would have some salvage from the ruins. The White fire was still smoking and smouldering late Thursday.

Mr. Dixon expected his

building and contents, a complete loss, would amount

to \$200,000 or more. He was uncertain Thursday about his future plans. He said his loss was partly covered by insurance.

The Chamber of Commerce, first door south of the White building, had extensive water damage. Water came down the walls and through holes in the ceiling caused by falling brick from the White second story collapse. Manager Don Shepard of the CofC spent most of Thursday cleaning the water and debris from the building. The front door was broken. The CofC has been making plans to move soon to the Mobley Hilton.

Eastland and Ranger firemen sent men and equipment to Cisco to help fight the blaze. There were no injuries to men or equipment. firemen reported.

Three Day State Of Emergency Declared

A three-day state of emergency was declared at a special meeting of the City Council Thursday afternoon after the third devestating fire in three days destroyed two buildings in downtown Cisco early Thursday morn-

Under the state of emergency, Cisco police were directed to enforce a curfew from 12 midnight until 6 a. m. daily through Monday. Mayor Joe Wheatley was empowered to extend the curfew for two additional three-day periods if deemed necessary.

City Manager Mike Moore reported that the loss of property and danger to life gives the Council authority to order a state of emergency by the city charter. Citizens of Cisco

volunteered to assist police with patrol work Thursday night and later, if needed, the city manager said. "Our people are angry and rightfully so, for arson is the worst kind of vandalism," he added.

The Council was informed that one young man has been charged with arson and two others have been arrested to be held for investigation of arson. All three were in the county jail with bond being denied by the 91st District Court Thursday.

Mr. Moore said the Council probably would meet again in special session on Monday to take another look at the

The city manager said steps would be taken soon to employ another policeman to bring the department to full strength. He said citizens were planning to institute a neighborhood watch plan to assist police with security in the business district.

The sheriff's office and Eastland police department sent men to Cisco after the Dixon-White fire broke out to assist with patrol and security, Mr. Moore said. "And we sincerely appreciate their

District Attorney Emory Walton was in town early Thursday to help with the ar-

Red Front Mini Mall Has Extensive Fire Damage

The Red Front Mini Mall, a restored building that was erected in downtown Cisco in the year 1883, had extensive damage by fire that was set by arsonist last Tuesday night. The blaze was reported to the Cisco Fire Department at 5:20 a.m. Wednesday.

Owned by the Moran National Bank, the building was occupied by Caloco Energy,

Inc., and by Ann Williams of the Pat Maynard Real Estate Agency. Other spaces in the building were unoccupied.

The Caloco Energy com-

pany's office equipment was virtually ruined by water, reported Mike Wallen of the firm. Their files were saved he added.

Mrs. Williams reported that furniture and plants

were moved from her offices

with minor damage. The Mini Mall was restoration of the old Red Front Drug Store that has long been a Cisco landmark. The building had extensive water and smoke damage,

firemen reported.

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

We Tend To Forget

Just What Mother

Nature Can Do

Recent rains have shown us o once again that you "Can't fool Mother Nature". Ron Bailey, Soil Conservation Service, says, "It is dry in Eastland County most o of the time and we all have a tendency to forget what floodwaters can do."

"When selecting a homesite we look for an area that has large beautiful trees. Some of the most beautiful trees are located in floodplains. In looking for a homesite in a dry July or August it is hard to imagine that these floodplains overflow every few years," Bailey said.

"If you are looking for a new homesite and are not sure whether or not it is in a floodplain, please check with us at the Soil Conservation Service. We have a published Soil Survey that covers all of Eastland County. It shows the areas in the county susceptable to flooding. The Soil Surveys are free to the public. So stop by and talk with us when you are considering building a new home," Bailey says.

The Soil Conservation office is located in the Farm **Bureau Building on Highway** 80 East in Eastland, telephone 6 629-1480.

Remember all the publicity when students failed tests, the no pass-no play concernall the hornets stirred up by

Inside last Sunday's paper, with the Obituaries, the Hospital Reports, and a gripping account of "Texas Water Commission Enters Lawsuit Debate," there are fourteen lines that are headed, "Eastland County Teachers Fare Well in Examinations.'

(The lead sentence probably mean to use "complimented" instead of "complemented," but I understand I get "unduly upset" about "typos," so I will say no more about that.)

It does seem to me the fact that only one school in Eastland County did not have 100% passes on the teacher competency tests

would not be out of place on the front page. Student failures made headline; shouldn't teacher successes?

Isn't it possible that the low percentage of student failures just might be attributed to the competency of the teachers the youngsters had?

Might failures be considered the responsibility of the pupils and their parents every bit as much as the teachers'? Teacher-caused failures are rare, or so I believe.

It is my theory, contention, position -- perhaps 'conviction' is a better word choice-that a teacher cannot instruct anyone who does not want to learn.

I am equally convinced that it is impossible to prevent a person's learning as much as s/he's interested in learning.

But this is not to present my philosophy of education. It is to recognize that of the six schools in Eastland County, five of them had 100% passing scores in the teacher competency test. The sixth

school scored 96.8%. As I don't know the body or set this represents, I don't have whether that 3.2% who blew it represents one person or two. I'd guess not more than

Also, keep in mind that this test was not geared to subject matter and the 100% scores assume greater significance.

A major point is that parents should keep a close check on grades, though this may not be a popular activity with Sonny or Sister. A youngster who can score a 95 should not be content with 75.

However, 75 may represent the top effort for some children.

Try to be realistic about ability. After all, hordes of youngsters are now kept in school by law instead of by choice. In our parents' dayeven in my own-the pupils who did not do well in school were long gone before graduation day.



Judge Bailey accepted the Charter, assuring Mr. Pate that it would be preserved. George Pate appeared to be in good health that day, and Judge Bailey little realized that he would never

see him alive again. For the news came on Thursday, June 12, even as this story was being prepared, that George Pate died at his home in Ranger.

Mr. Pate was not a Charter Member of Ranger Barracks No. 1871, but he was certainly a long and valued member.

The Barracks was involved in Veterans affairs and patriotic and community events for many years. There were other such organizations in the county at Cisco, Eastland, Gorman and Rising Star, but they all disbanded before the Ranger group.

The Charter for the Ranger Barracks was granted on April 30, 1959, and was signed by National Commander Fred J. Hollenbeck. It was also signed by the National Adjutant, Charles Kindley.

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
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A Guide to Area Dining & Entertainment

Captain Eastland's Descendents themselves according to the laws of a demonstration of the laws of t Attend "Discovery-Fest" June 7

(ED. NOTE: A number of descendents of Nicholas Washington Eastland were in Eastland Saturday for the Discovery-Fest '86 which honored William Mosby Eastland, the man for whom Eastland County and Eastland City are named. Nicholas Washington was a brother to William Mosby and this is a family chronicle which deserves to be preserved here).

NICHOLAS WASHINGTON EASTLAND

This is an occasion to reexamine, reaffirm, appreciate, and rededicate ourselves to the preservation of a portion of our Texas heritage. Especially is this true in regard to the members of a family group such as you, who assemble here today as descendants of an early Texian patriot - Nicholas Washington Eastland.

At a time when want, woe and misery are stalking through the earth, when it appears that peace and personal liberty have abdicated from the affairs of man, and hope seems to have bidden the earth farewell, it is appealingly proper that we pause and consider the necessity for a faithful record of the deeds of this man under the peculiar and trying circumstances which have made him a man who should be remembered as having played a part in early Texian history by helping to mold its affairs into a pattern now known as the Texan way of life.

What is there we could say that has not been said concerning Nicholas W. Eastland? It seems that no biographical sketch has been written of this early Fayette-Bastron County pioneer. In the past, information regarding him has been fragmentary and disjointed. He was born on a plantation in Kentucky known as "Woodland" the son of Thomas Butler Eastland, a brother of that well-known and gallant Captain William Mosby Eastland. Thomas B. Eastland was a lieutenant in the U.S. Army, and in 1800 was quartermaster General of Kentucky. He served in the War of 1812 under General William Henry Harrison, and following the war he removed to White County, Tennessee. In 1801 he was married to Nancy Mosby, a relative to Major J.S. Mosby, famous scout and cavalry officer in the Confederate Army. Their children were, in addition to Nicholas W., William Mosby, Thomas, James, Robert, and a daughter. A few years after the death of his wife, Thomas B. Eastland married a Miss Swan. Their children were Edward, George, Cumberling, and another daughter.

The Eastland family, along with the Dawsons, with whom they were related by marriage (Mrs. Dawson was a sister to Mrs. Eastland), remained in their native state of Kentucky until after the War of 1812, in which the fathers of Nicholas W. Eastland and Nicholas M. Dawson participated. The fact is evident that "Old Hickory" Jackson made grants of land to these two veterans of the War of 1812 for services rendered at the Battle of New Orleans. Their lands were located near the town of Sparta, White County, Tennessee. Land records still show that Thomas B. Eastland was granted land in December 1824, again in

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October 1828 and in December 1838, a third grant

was made to him. From the above facts we know that the Eastland and Dawson families were in White County, Tennessee, and had emigrated from Kentucky prior to December 1824, and here they remained until Nicholas W. and his brother William M. decided to go west. The first member of the family to reach Texas was William M., who came in 1833 with his family, but was soon followed by Nicholas W. in 1834 along with his family. Both settled at LaGrange, Texas. A sketch of Nicholas W.

Eastland's life would not be complete without telling the part he played during the struggle of early Texas colonists with the Indians. In July 1835, Captain Robert M. Coleman was almost defeated by the Indians in a hotly contested fight in present Limestone County. He was forced to fall back on Fort Parker and from there sent messengers to the settlements asking for reinforcements. He was soon joined by four companies of volunteers, one of which was from the vicinity of LaGrange under the command of Colonel John H. Moore who was elected to command the combined force. Among the volunteers were Nicholas W. Eastland, William M. Eastland, and their cousin, Nicholas M.

They pursued the Indians as far as the forks of the Trinity River, then across the upper Brazos, but failed to contact them. They did encounter several roving bands whom they killed or dispersed, and prevented their raiding the settlements. A few were captured and taken to the settlements and sold as slaves. This is said to be the only recorded instance of attempted Indian enslavery in Texas. The experiment proved a failure.

The Indians having been defeated or dispersed, and the area about LaGrange having been made safe for settlers to come in and establish themselves, it was a natural thing for the people to form their own county government and assume their place in the Texas scheme of government. This was done by an Act of the Congress of the Republic of Texas in December 1837. Among the first county officials was Nicholas W. Eastland who was appointed an Associate Member of the first Board of Land Commissioners of Fayette County. In 1840, at the first election held for county officials, he was elected the Chief Justice (County Judge) - the first chief Justice having been Andrew Rabb who was also the first as such of Bastrop

Strange to say, few at the present time know that Nicholas W. Eastland through fate missed being in the Goliad Massacre. While the major portion of Fannin's command was made up of volunteers from the United States, still we have been able to identify at least one man from Favette County who was there, - Nicholas W. Eastland. He was in the cavalry company of Captain Albert Clinton Horton, who upon seeing Fannin surrounded by the Mexican forces, realized that his small force could not extricate his comrades from their perilous position. There was no other alternative but

Nicholas W. Eastland did not participate in the battle of San Jacinto although his brother William and his cousin, Nicholas M. Dawson, were veterans of this battle. The tradition in the Eastland family, however, is that he was a member of the Harrisburg Camp Guard.

Thus, I have given you a brief review of the life of a Texian patriot and pioneer, and I believe it is now proper to tell you something about the peculiar Texas way of life, our very own heritage, which was shaped by men such as Nicholas W. Eastland. Especially is this true in view of the fact that this is the month that has a special significance to all Texans. It marks the anniversary month of the Battle of San Jacinto - April 21, 1836. This date for the people for our Texas Republic created a new nation by the force of arms - a new nation in the all comprehensive meaning of that term. It was a new nation in that it would bring a renewal to the human spirit, a renewal of faith and courage, a renewal that would go forth on expanding waves and touch all the lands extending from the Gulf of Mexico to the extreme north in the Panhandle. In the minds of those who laid the foundation for a Texas Republic there was the thought of building a shrine, not simply a place

laws of a democracy, but a society of people believing in all that is sacred, in all that is basic to human life at its

And the image they have created of Texas has been one of the most powerful influences in the shaping of American men and women. We sometime speak of it as the Texan dream - the Texan way of life - the Texan promise, for deeply embodied in the very cornerstone of that Texas Republic was the great aspiration of its people to make a society in which shall be incorporated high values and noble deeds. One perfect example is the property protection given to the widow and orphans in the Homestead Law. This image of a good and free society of people must never be lost by the present and future generations of Texans. This image of Texas must be carried on knowning that Texas is more than a great and rich segment of the United States. This image of Texas as something more than a land of power and wealth should be cherished by every

One of the problems we face is that too many Texans no longer see this image of themselves and of their state with vividness and consecrated loyalty. Another pathetic fact is that the image of Texas is misunderstood; that wherever you go throughout American the picture which impresses itself upon the minds of others when the TEXAS is mentioned, and it is mentioned and talked about everywhere, is an image flase to the truth; that distorts, perverts, and FORGETS the spiritual and solid human values established as our birthright by our Texas pioneers.

There are people in many places who regard Texas as something primitive - for we are so very young. There are many states in the Union who trace back their history much farther than we, and so we appear as a kind of brash and unpredictable adelescent, - as a people who have a surface cleverness, a superficial ingenuity that

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matured, that hasn't developed a culture that is redolent with the ripe wisdom of ages. We are somewhat primitive, powerful, vigorous, curious, enterprising, yet - but also vouthful in our ideas. Read some of the estimates of Texas culture and you will find that they do not treat us as if we were an adult and

mature people. We are looked upon (and sometimes we look upon ourselves) as being bereft of maturity, of that assurance that comes from having lived long and on intimate terms with time and destiny. Consequently in parts of our nation our proposals, our books and literature, our thoughts and ideas, our procedures, are not given attention and respect because we are so youthful. We came into being as an entirety only the other day!

To overcome this image, it seems to me we Texans must begin to live more intensely and become more conscious of our glorious Texas heritage (not participate in a continual Texas brag), in terms of the true image of Texas. And what is that image? First, Texas began as a revolt - that most important single struggle or event in our early history, the event which preceded our organizing ourselves into a Republic among the nations of the earth. We began with a revolution. We began by rebelling against tyranny. We began by opposing the inherited and entrenched privileges of a system of government by the high and powerful - a fight against oppression, and the whole world must know that the Revolution of 1836 has not yet ended in 1958. There is still in the Texas spirit a rebelliousness against all tyranny; a revolt against

president, or court who abridges the inalienable rights of the people, who curtails their personal liberties, who deprives men under the cloak as the supreme law of the land through court decisions their freedoms and liberties which were meant for every human being who draws the breath of life. And lastly, Texas is pro-

mise. We here in Texas are

engaged in an unfinished enterprise. Ours is an experiment unique among the states of the Union. Beyond the present is another horizon. Beyond our attainment of today there is a beckoning tomorrow and beyond the twilight and darkness there is a dawn. If we could live in terms of this image, there would be built in many other places an equal image emulating ours and there would be eradicated from the minds of misguided people their misconception about Texas. And they would see us as we see ourselves. In the fullment of an ancient Hebrew saying "and they shall build into Me a sanctuary and I will surely abide in their midst", then shall we have built into God a sanctuary for His people and He will surely abide in our midst. Surely you who are gathered here today as members of the Eastland family as descendants of Nicholas W. Eastland will ever remember that he built upon an image such as this.

And so it is proper that you should dedicate the stone marking the grave of your Nicholas ancestor. Washington Eastland, erected by the State of Texas, loved and honored by his contemporaries and whose name is dear to Texas, especially the Texans of Fayette and Bastrop Counties, for whose freedom and liberty he did so much and labored so faithfully. any monarch, dictactor, This grave marker but out-

wardly typifies the gratitude that memory has painted in the mind and conscience of all patriotic sons and daughters of the Eastland family. In giving it a place in this little pioneer cemetery, you but honor yourselves for the honor of Nicholas W. Eastland is forever lodged in the rpository of faithful memory mind and heart of Texans. You make public recognition of your appreciation of the cardinal virtues of gallantry in the field, wisdom and fidelity in the council chamber, and patriotism in all the acts of his active and useful life.

The independence, prosperity, unity and glory of Texas furnished the goals of the ambitions of Nicholas W. Eastland and his compatriots, and to their ac-

complishment he gave all his effort. The monuments of the past are crumbling into decay as this one will some day in the future, but the feet of thousands are treading paths blazed through a wilderness by this hardy pioneer of a century ago. Here and there the present generation is gathering from fading memory something the historic beauty and truth to tell how valiantly their pioneer forefather lived, how like a Titan he did his part to wrought a new nation from the wilderness - the Republic of Texas, which is now one of the brillant stars in the galaxy of American states.

Look upon this grave, O ye Eastland, for here sleeps in honored glory Nicholas Washington Eastland, a true Texian, a true patriot.



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
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Area News Briefs

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

The Right Watermelon

Picking a ripe watemelon is not the easiest thing to learn, but there are certain indicators to look for, says a horticulturist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

Watermelons mature rapidly during hot weather. Most are ripe about 32 days after blooming," points out Tom Longbrake.

Deciding when to harvest a melon is most difficult early in the season when vines are green and healthy, says the horticulturist.

Some indicators of watermelon maturity are: tendrils or pigtails on vines change from green to brown, and the ground spot on the belly of the melon turns from white to yellow, and the thumping sound changes from a metallic rining when immature to a soft, hollow sound when mature.

Even experienced field cutters must cut an occasional melon to check flesh quality with their judgement of rind appearance," says Longbrake.

Watermelons should be handled carefully to avoid rolling, bumping or dropping and thus prevent internal bruising of the flesh.

Longbrake suggests storing watermelons at temperatures ranging from 60 to 70 degrees F. Temperatures below 50 degrees or above 90 degrees for extended periods will increase flesh deterioration. Once a melon is cut, it can be refrigerated in wedge form or in small chunks in plastic-

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





Emergency Resolution

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY OF CISCO, TEXAS DECLARING A STATE OF EMERGENCY: ESTABLISHING AND CURFEW; ESTABLISHING AN EF-FECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, over the last three days three acts of deliberate, senseless, arbitrary arson have resulted in the significant loss of property in the downtown area of the City of Cisco creating an unacceptable condition where the normal procedures of the municipal government are inadequate for the protection of persons or property; and

WHEREAS, Sections 18 and 19 of the Charter of the City of Cisco authorize the Mayor and City Council to exercise certain special powers in emergency situations; therefore, now,

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CI-TY OF CISCO, TEXAS:

That under the authority of Section 18 of the Cisco City Charter, a state of emergency exists in the City of Cisco and that said state shall continue until such time as the Mayor of the City of Cisco terminates the state of emergency.

of Cisco shall have the right and authority to exercise all special powers necessary as delinated in Section 19 of the Charter of the City of Cisco to Abate the state of

3. That a curfew shall exist for the business district of the City of Cisco for all unauthorized individuals. Said curfew shall be from 12 midnight through 6:00 A.M., commencing on Thursday June 12, 1986 and continuing for the next three (3) days: terminatilng on 6:00 A.M. Monday, June 16, 1986.

4. The Mayor shall be authorized to extend said curfew as necessary, not to exceed two 3-day in-

5. That this resolution and its provisions shall become effectgive immediately upon its passage.

Loss At Cisco Lumber **And Supply Re-Evaluated**

The loss of Cisco Lumber and Supply in last Monday night's warehouse fire probably won't exceed \$150,000.00, owner Joe Wheatley reported Thursday. The building did not contain as much merchandise as had been reported, he
