Citizens Organize Downtown Fire Watch

Approximately 200 interested Cisco Citizens attended a meeting Sunday afternoon June 15, at 3 p.m. at the Cisco Fire Department. Fire Chief Richard Connell announced the formation of a volunteer citizen watch. The watch was to be a minimum of 17 people (men or women) who will be stationed at 14 strategic points in the downtown Cisco area to begin a fire watch network.

A call for volunteers to sign up for watches was made. Even though some 120 volunteered Sunday afternoon, Mr. Connell said, "we need 40 more volunteers so that we may extend the watch area." A request for C.B. radios that could be used by the volunteers was also

The watches were broken down into two shifts, set for 9 p.m. until 1:30 a.m. and then from 1:30 a.m. until 6 a.m.

Fires Cause Wide Spread **Alarm In Cisco**

Fire sirens that had caused widespread alarm in this small West Central Texas city were silent during the past weekend and through Monday night as a volunteer corps of citizens began assisting police authorities in night-time patrol ac-

tivities. Some 150 Cisco business men and concerned citizens attended a meeting Sunday afternoon at the fire station with Fire Chief Richard Connell and a group of firemen to formally organize the volunteer patrol. Assisting Mr. Connell with coordinating the patrol are Assistant Chief Vandell Weathers and Training Chief Gerald Jackson. Billy Rains, fire marshal and police chief, also was assisting.

Groups of volunteers have been reporting to work in shifts since the Sunday night meeting. A number of business men had already begun spending nights at their stores and offices. Mayor Joe Wheatley announced Sunday that the emergency curfew that was ordered at a special City Council meeting last Thurs-

day was being extended until 6 a.m. Wednesday. The mayor reported early Tuesday that he would exuntil 8 a.m. Friday. Under terms of the curfew, no one will be allowed on downtown

streets between 12 midnight

and 6 a.m. The volunteer patrol groups were "keeping in touch" by CB Radios. Firemen said there was a need for additional portable CB equipment and anyone wishing to loan the radios was asked to call the fire department.

The patrol has been paying particular attention to the downtown area and to public buildings, firemen reported. A number of business firms and building owners and

managers have received anonymous telephone calls with threats of fire.

Cheif Rains reported Monday that Jim Bob Cozart, 19, who has been charged with arson in the Dixon Auto Supply and Webb Auto Store fires, was released from the county jail late Saturday after making a \$25,000 bond. The bond was set by Justice of the Peace J.V. Heyser after formal charges were

Billy Escovedo, 18 also arrested for investigation of arson and drug possession, was released under a \$1,000 bond Monday. Arson charges were not filed against him, but he will face a drug possession charge, the chief said. Randy

(Hamilton), 18, who was also arrested on suspicion of arson and for possession of a controlled substance, remained in the county jail early Tuesday.

Alarm On I 20

A large truck hauling an oil well drilling rig went out of control and turned over in a ditch on the I-20 access road near the 329 mile post some two miles west of town last Friday morning, according to a report by Fireman David Gill.

Cisco firemen took a truck to the scene to stand by in case of fire as deisel fuel was leaking from a fuel tank on the truck. A tire blew out on the big truck, causing the mishap, Mr. Gill reported. Damage was extensive to the equipment, he believed.

Firemen took equipment to the city landfill last Saturday morning when a bulldozer seat was found to be burning. Damage was confined to the cab, including the seat and betteries and cables under it, Mr. Gill reported. Arson was expected as the cause of the blaze, he added.

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
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



Some papers have a "This Day in History" column. Maybe only history buffs and those looking for something specific read it.

What is no maybe is that the Letters to Editor columns is one of the most read

So when I saw no mention

of the June 8, 1967 Israeli assault on the USS Liberty I wrote a letter to the thilene Reporter Year, asking why that disgraceful incident and its cover-up have never become "newsworthy". I wrote that it seemed his paper was also guilty of participation in the conspiracy of silence which annual reunions of Liberty's crew have tried unsuccessfully to break. As if to emphaticly confrim my charge, the letter was never printed. Since the new editor, Glenn Dromgoole, took over it seems that he has tightened the screws ever tighter on thought control. Several regular letter writers no longer are printed though I know for fact that they still write.

Briefly, the Liberty incident was thus: The ships flag was standing out frm the mast in a fair breeze as attested to by James Ennis who was Officer of the Deck that day. This he states in his book ASSAULT OF THE LIBERTY in direct contradiction to the report put

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out by the Navy court of inquiry headed by an American-Jewish admiral. That the inquiry was a disgraceful cover-up becomes frightenly clear from reading his book.

He details how for over two hours the Israeli planes and torpedo boats pressed the attack until 34 American seamen were dead and over 70 wounded. The first two requests for help were "misrouted" having been sent over regular secret Navy channels but the assault was broken off when a "May Day" distress call went out over open channels by the only radio still operative.

The favored Israeli propaganda version is that the attack was a mistake and lasted only five minutes. Naturally they studiously avoid mention of the torpedo boats which caused the most deaths. Strange too that unless you read Ennises book you don't know that those torpedo boats also machinegunned life rafts (a violation of international law) when the crew would have abandoned ship. Obviously there were to be no survivors. The old pirate addage that "Dead men tell no tales". Then the sinking could have been pinned on Egytp and probably gotten us in a war against the Arabs sooner. (The U.S. has been engaged in a low key,

undeclaired war for some time now.

The depths of that disgraceful affair is reached when the captain of Liberty was given his Congressional Medal of Honor. He received that highest military decoration from a Navy official in a navy yard low key ceremony instead of the usual White House Rose Garden and pinned on by the President. Maybe Lynden Johnson was ashamed to face the man after what he had done and would continue to take part in against Liberty's crew. If not ashamed, he should have been.

Of our "honest and free media", there can only have been and still is a great effort to hide rather than present the facts. Politicians also serve the public ill by only questiong the Liberty incident when as Adali Stephenson, they are days away from leaving D.C. for good. If you don't think so just write Congressman Charles Stenholm or your senators requesting that a complete investigation be made. You will get, "I will support any move to bring out the truth." But none will say they will sponsor or demand an investgation.

Recently the news carried a story of a Civil War hereo exhumbed from a paupers grave and reburied in a place of honor. Will all of Liberty's crew be 100 years dead before their truth is

But where has honor gone anyhow? The Congressional Medal of Honor (strictly military) was disgraced by agitation to give it to Leon Klinghoffer (a civilian) for being stupid enough to provoke ship hyjackers. Above and beyond the call of duty or risking life to save comrads in arms becomes no better than shooting off your mouth in the face of an

automatic rifle. The Purple

ing to find heros in our present undeclaired war, that medal was given to those injured in the Berlin disco bombing.

No, money does not always mean good parents with happy children. As a teacher I saw "neglected" children who were well-fed and welldressed. It has happened, and it will happen again.

A teenage Ashley may not have a philosophy that will enable her to ignore materialistic aspects. True, she may never need that philosophy. Money is a minor consideration in so many areas, but it does help with creature comforts and college costs.

Both sets of parents were technically at fault on the paper work, but it's too easy to blame "the courts." The child is not a piece of antique furniture or a silver urn to remain static while the court dockets are cleared. Did this matter call to mind a decision Solomon is alleged to

Did the Readys give any thought to the chilren who will not be adopted because of the Hughes' bitter experience? Legality has little to do with the emotional factor here. No matter how much assurance adoptive parents get on "no loophole" papers, the unease generated by this suit will not go away quickly.

Well, this second-guessing could go on, even as the fall out from the case will. I suppose I think neither man was as careful a father as he might have been.

U.S.D.A. Is Now Mailing

Executive Director, of the Eastland County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, said that producers will be asked if they favor imposition of mandatory limits on production of wheat which will result in wheat prices that are now lower than 125 percent of the cost of produc-

tion. "Response by wheat producers is voluntary,' said Mr. Martin, "and the poll is non-binding upon the Secretary of Agriculture. It's not a referendum, but it is a way for wheat producers to express their desires about a farm program."

Wheat poll ballots will be mailed to each producer on June 25. Responses must be postmarked by July 7.

To be eligible to vote, farmers must have produced at least one crop of wheat during 1981 through 1985 on a wheat acreage base of at least 40 acres.





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One county official, Rising Star Constable Gene Hicks. was the only audience besides the news media. He held a brief discussion with Commissioner L.T. Owen about a bridge on the Sabanno River which had become so undermined with recent high water that it collapsed.

Commissioners present at the meeting were: Bill Riddell, Comm. Pct. 2, L.T. Owen, Comm. Pct. 3, and C.B. Dill, Comm. Pct. 4. Richard Robinson, Comm. Pct. 1, was absent due to illness in the family. County Judge Scott Bailey presided, and Jolene Needham, Deputy Clerk for the County Clerk's office, took minutes of the meeting. Joann Johnson, county clerk was at a state-wide county clerk's meeting in Brownsville, Texas.

The Federal Revenue Sharing money was only one of several topics discussed during the morning. Judge Scott Bailey also brought the first items on the proposed 1986-87 budget before the court. The fiscal year begins Oct. 1, and a workable budget needs to be approved by Aug. 1.

On the General Revenue Sharing, Judge Bailey repeated what he had said before - that this source of revenue is expected to end shortly. The county has been getting around \$100,000 per year in four payments - three payments are expected on the current year instead of

Revenue Sharing money can be used only for stipulated things - Public

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Safety, Rural Firefighting, Libraries, Civil Defense, and the like. Each library in the county is paid \$25 per month from this source. Judge Bailey called the Court's attention to how Revenue Sharing Funds had benefited the handicapped and elderly by providing ramps to make the Courthouse more accessable.

The Court agreed to use these funds in the same manner as in the past - as long as they are available

The Judge presented some of the proposed 1986-87 budgets from various county departments and offices, and requests on expenditures from the non-office,

general funds. Judge Bailey said he was not certain just how the indigent care recently mandated by the state would be managed. Under this plan the county will be held financially responsible for a number of items for indigent people. Hospital benefits will run up to \$30,000, and the county will also be responsible for burial.

The Commissioners gave a decided statement that they wanted "local people to run this department," not state

The proposed Department budgets for next year appeared to be within the same general area as those of the current year. The salary requests were deferred from some departments, however, leading to the thought that some rasies may be requested.

District Attorney Emory Walton had requested a salary increase for his Assis-

tant during the last Commissioners meeting. In his proposed budget the District Attorney requested that this increase be \$6,000 annually, bringing the salary of the Assistant D.A. up from around \$21,000 annually to

\$27,000. County Sheriff Don Underwood requested an additional Deputy for his Department. The Sheriff's Department is expected to run around \$389,000 for the upcoming year.

Other bits of news surfaced during the meeting - how the Central Appraisal District may need more space - how money to repair the courthouse may have to be budgeted from various departments. Bill Riddle, of Pct. 2, said his part of the County had suffered less than others from the recent rains. High water over the bridge at Staff was his only real problem, and that didn't last too long.

As the Commissioners questioned how they might

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

17-Year Old Arrested Over Weekend

A 17-year old boy was also arrested during the weekend for investigation of arson, the chief said. He was still in custody early Tuesday.

Chief Rains said that the crank calls received by police, firemen and building owners and managers have been numerous. The Eastland radio station received one call, and the Patterson Ambulance Service was called to investigate a drowning at Lake Cisco. All calls proved to be false, Mr. Rains said. Firemen received three false alarm reports last Friday. One church was reported to be on fire, and this was also false.

Mr. Rains said other youths have been questioned but not detained as police worked to solve the arson problem.

The City of Cisco's bulldozer at the landfill was

damaged by a vandalism fire last Friday night. A fire was lighted in the cab and a seat cushion was burned along with batteries and cables under the seat. The fire was discovered by J.C. McMillan, city employee,

early Saturday. Mayor Wheatley told this newspaper that "it is gratifying that so many concerned citizens have volunteered in this emergency. They report early for patrol duty and do a good job."

Authorities have requested patrol volunteers to leave guns and weapons at home and to use their eyes and ears and report anything suspicious to policemen on duty. Patrolmen are assigned watch stations throughout the business district and over town.

The first of the series of devestating fires occurred last Tuesday morning, June 10, when fire destroyed a warehouse at Cisco Lumber and Supply. The fire broke out at 4:50 a.m. Firemen needed an hour and a half to bring the \$150,000 blaze under control.

Early Wednesday, June 11. the Red Front Mini Mall building was damaged by fire that was reported at 4:50 a.m. The building was empty except for Caloco Energy Co. and Ann Williams of Pat Maynard Realty who had office equipment damaged.

At the same time that these two fires accurred, break-ins were reported at several business firms.

An alarm at 3:15 a.m. Thursday, June 12, summoned firemen to the Webb, Inc., and Dixon Auto Supply buildings. Both were destroyed with damages expected to amount to \$200,000 or more. The Chamber of Commerce building was damaged extensively.

The Chamber of Commerce has moved to temporary offices in the Hargrave Insurance building at 1112 Hilton. Plans call for the CofC to move permanently to the Mobley Hilton when restoration work is finished there.



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


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
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
