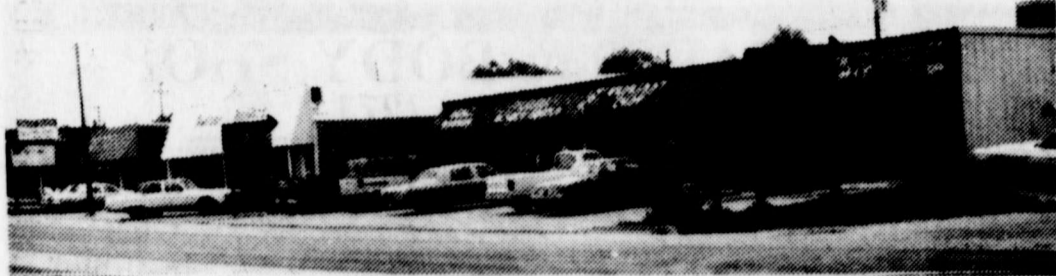

Lake Cisco Cains

3 Feet Of New

Water

Lake Cisco has gained more than three feet of new water from rainfall in the watershed area during the month of June, City Manager Mike Moore reported Thursday. Water was continuing to run into the lake via the Battle Creek Pump Station and Lake Bernie, he said.

Mr. Moore said that rainfall during the month has measured about 11 inches. The most rain came in a 2.5 inch deluge one day last week, he added.

"We have benefitted considerably," Mr. Moore said. "Another good rain would do wonders for us as tanks and ponds are full and the ground is full of water."

Suspects

In a statement issued by Chief Billy Rains Friday afternoon, Billy Escovedo and Randy Donahue (Hamilton) were cleared of charges of arson in the recent rash of fires in downtown Cisco.

Chief Rains said he wishes to extend his apologies to the two young men and their families for any embarrassment caused during the investigation of the fires. He said that Escovedo and Donahue had no knowledge of the fires or how they started.

Chief Rains further stated that state fire marshal will be in town Monday morning June 23, to begin investigation of the Wilcoxon house fire early Friday morning June 20.

Police Officer Cleared

Cisco Policeman R.D. Kirkland who had been suspended in connection with the suspected arsons was to have been totally exonerated by investigators at a 5:15 p.m. Friday press conference.

Investigation into the series of fires in Cisco is being investigated and citizens are being asked to assist.

A reward of up to \$4,000 is available for information leading to the indictment of those responsible, it has been announced.

Persons with information may contact either the Cisco Police Department, the

Eastland County Sheriff's Department of Texas Ranger Gene Kea.

All are working in cooperation on the investigation.

It was understood that Patrolman Kirkland agreed to a polygraph test Friday morning, the results of which showed that he knew nothing about the setting of the fires and had nothing to do with the fires, it was stated.

Patrolman Kirkland is now eligible to be returned to full status with the Police Department.

Investigators emphasized

the importance of any and all information which might shed light on the case.

Persons who wish to remain anonymous may do so and still be eligible for reward money should the information prove faithful.

The Crime-Stop Hotline telephone numbers could be used - they are 629-3161 or 629-3182.

Policeman R.D. (Rick) Kirkland, member of the Cisco police force since May 15, 1985, was suspended indefinitely by Chief Billy Rains after the chief had been advised by the state fire marshal's office that the

officer was under investigation.

Mr. Rains asked Sheriff Underwood and Ranger Kea to take charge of the local investigation. The two officers were in conference most of Thursday and Friday, questioning people about possible arson in the three major fires here during the week of June 8-14.

City Manager Mike Moore, confirming the "on going" investigation and suspension, reported that Chief Rains received a call from the state fire marshal's office with the first information about a possible

Kirkland involvement.

Fire Marshals Gill Harper and Larry Laney were here last week to investigate arson charges and they will return Monday to continue the investigation of local fires and the Kirkland case, Sheriff Underwood reported.

Chief Rains was called to Duncanville last Monday to meet with the fire marshals. The chief was advised that Officer Kirkland was a policeman at Electra before coming to Cisco and that there were arson suspected fires there.

Officer Kirkland denied any connection with the fires at Electra or in Cisco.

The Quilters Is Outstanding

The new season opened at the Roof Garden Dinner Theatre on two high notes last Thursday night - (1) A full house, and (2) An outstanding performance by the cast.

"The Quilters," a comedy by Barbara Damashek and Molly Newman, was presented for the "first time ever" in Cisco, and the capacity crowd expressed pleasure with sustained applause as the finale was especially appreciated.

Enacted by seven women, "The Quilters" was the story of a quilt that was typical of bed covering made by pioneer women in the nation's early days. The handmade quilt, obviously a labor of love, contained 17 blocks that composed the handsome cover.

The play's plot concerned each of the 17 blocks. A cast member holds up a single block as each sequence begins and then the story of the block is told - some with humor, others with pathos, nostalgia, heart breaking, love...

The 17 blocks of the quilt as shown and enacted included Rocky Road, Dug-out, Double Axe, Sunbonnet Sue, Windmill Pattern, Shadow Block, The Butterfly, School House, Four Doves in Window, Friendship Star, The Lone Star, Double Wedding Ring, Log Cabin, County Crossroads, Crosses and Losses, The Dandelion and Sea of Life.

In the various block presentations, there is frequent music with delightful tunes. The blocks deal with

virtually every aspect of pioneer life.

The finale has the cast raising the quilt with the 17 blocks - the Friendship Star as the centerpiece with the 16 smaller blocks surrounding it on four sides.

The attractive finished quilt, incidentally, was made by a group of Cisco ladies acknowledged on the program as follows: Mesdames Olga Fay Parker, Nona Stevens, Dorothy Barton, Fred Steffey, Jeffa Kitchens, Flora McCanlies, Lillian Fry, Ara Meyer, Jo Barrett, Kay Sitton, Sandra Woolley, Trixie Whatley, Marvis Thames, Sherry Kimbrough and Julia Worthy.

Members of the cast were Lou Jane Qualls, Claudia Waite, Toni Paul, Mary McGrew, Linda Dippel, Julie Hutchings and Tina Morris. The two-act play has Carol Brown of Cisco Junior College drama department as director and Scott Taylor as musical director and choreographer.

Musical accompaniment is provided by Scott Taylor at the piano, Nathan Urban, autoharp, and David Luna, percussion.

A delicious dinner catered by the CJC Cafeteria was served by students of the drama department.

"The Quilters" was scheduled for the second performance Saturday night, June 21, and for performances on June 26 and 28. It was understood that a limited number of tickets were available for the June 26 and 28 shows. -JWS.

Fire Destroys Home North Of Cisco

The three-bedroom brick

home of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Wilcoxon on the Breckenridge Highway was destroyed by fire that broke out at 1:15 a.m. Friday. Cause of the blaze was not immediately determined but firemen did not think it was related to the series of fires in town the previous week.

The fire was in the area of a doublecar garage and a bedroom when firemen arrived, Fireman David Gill reported. The Cisco Volunteer Fire Department took three trucks, each with 500-gallon water tanks, to fight the blaze outside the city limits in an area without

fire hydrants.

Firemen said they did not have sufficient water to bring the fire under control. HTH Trucking brought in a tanker truck with 5,000 gallons of water but the house was too far gone to save it, firemen said.

Fire Marshall Billy Rains, who was on the duty during the fire and Friday morning, reported that the initial investigation led them to believe that blaze started from an electrical short. He said that to say that there was any connection between the Wilcoxon fire and others this month would be speculation.

Sheriff Don Underwood said his department was assisting with an investigation as the Wilcoxon home is outside the Cisco city limits. He said that two state fire marshals are due in town Monday from the Duncanville headquarters on another matter and that they would be asked to assist in an effort to determine the cost.

The Wilcoxon home, of 3800 sq. feet, built several years ago, was in the \$100,000 price range, firemen believed. The Wilcoxens, long-time residents of the community, were not at home when the fire alarm was turned in.

Mistrial Declared In Murder Trial

A mistrial was declared in the murder trial of Mary Goode Thursday morning.

The recent suspension of Cisco Police Officer R.D. Kirkland for suspicion of arson led to the mistrial.

Officer Kirkland testified Tuesday in the trial as the investigating officer in the Goode case. He was to have returned to the courtroom Thursday morning but did not show up. He met with Judge Jim Wright about 1 p.m. Thursday and reportedly told the judge "a misunderstanding" kept him from returning to the courtroom on Thursday morning.

He said it was his understanding that unless he uncovered more evidence in the case, he did not need to be present on Thursday.

It was unknown at press time as to whether Kirkland would be cited for contempt of court. Judge Wright said he would take the matter under advisement.

Mrs. Goode was freed from Eastland County Jail Thursday after posting two \$3,500 bonds.

Testimony began Tuesday in 91st District Court, for the 1985 murder of Herschel Goode of Cisco. Goode 58, died from a gunshot wound to the head, on Nov. 9, 1985, and his wife, Mary Goode, was charged with the shooting death.

According to Cisco Police Officer R.D. Kirkland, who investigated the shooting, Mrs. Goode repeatedly told him "I killed my husband, I shot Herschel." He testified

that Mrs. Goode continued after he warned her of her rights and her arrest.

Kirkland said the arrest was made after her confession, her stepson's eyewitness account and because the defendant had blood on her hands.

James Goode, the stepson, testified that he and his stepmother had argued over chores of his. His father intervened and told James to go for a walk and for Mrs. Goode to go to her room.

James said that while he was outside he heard his stepmother threaten his father and then he heard three shots. He said he looked through a window and his father told him to run.

When his stepmother came outside, Goode testified that he took a pistol from her and then ran to a neighbor's house for help.

Defense attorney Leslie Vance questioned James about an argument between he and his father over his father's refusal to fix him with girls.

Vance asked James twice, "Isn't it really true, James, you really shot your dad?" James replied each time, "No, sir."

During testimony Wednesday medical witnesses testified and Vance tried to show that Mrs. Goode was too hysterical to realize what she was saying after the shooting.

Dr. Charles Petty, of the Dallas Forensic Institute, called by the prosecution, testified that Goode died from a gunshot wound above the right eye.

Eastland physician, Dr. H.J. Bulgerin testified for the defense, stated that he had examined Mrs. Goode on November 29 in an attempt

to determine whether she would be able to assist an attorney and to stand trial.

Dr. Bulgerin said she was schizophrenic and was unable to perform rational acts.

District Attorney Emory Walton, during his cross-examination of Bulgerin, asked if Mrs. Goode could be putting on an act. Bulgerin answered that it was possible, but if so, it was over a long period of time.

A witness called by the prosecution testified that Mrs. Goode has a personality disorder, but is not mentally ill. Dr. George Parker, a clinical psychologist from Austin also told the court that Mrs. Goode's four marriages and of her resentment of having to care for James and not being able to see her own daughters.

Vance, in cross examination, asked Dr. Parker about his ability to form opinions by himself. Parker said he was furnished background information on Mrs. Goode by the District Attorney.

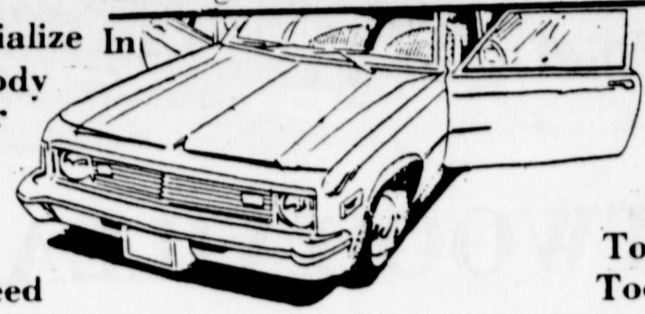

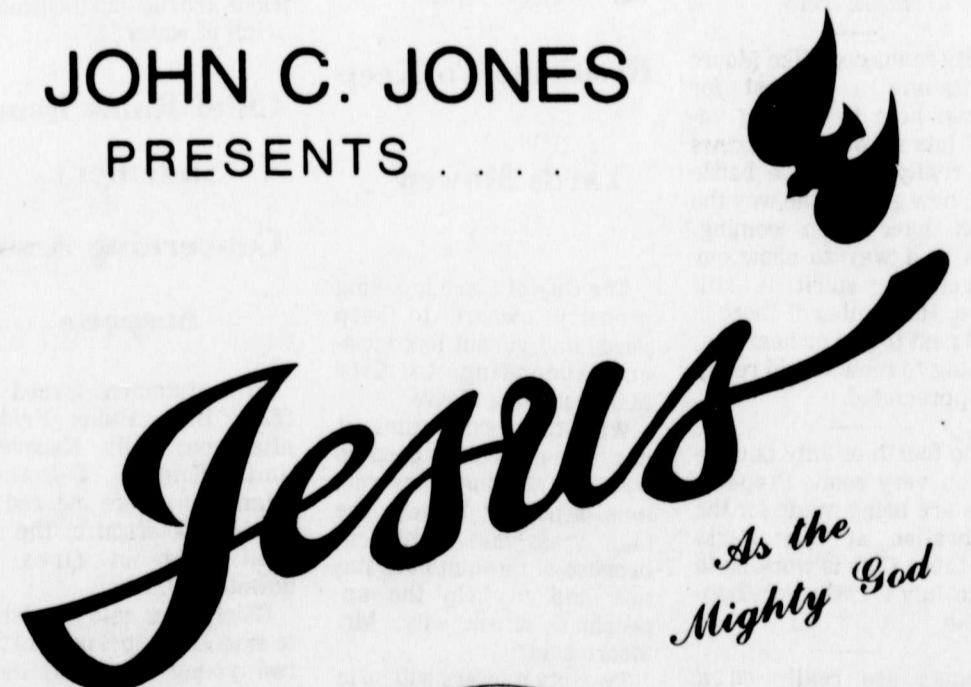

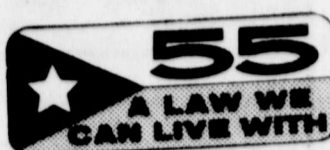

Runoff from recent heavy rains on the Sabana and Leon Rivers continues to cause higher than normal levels at Proctor Lake.
Proctor Lake is operated and maintained by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, Fort Worth District.
Even in the event of no additional rain, officials say Proctor will gradually reach higher levels by as much as two feet. This rise will affect all lands around the lake, causing potential danger for some people and property.
As soon as downstream areas permit, releases up to 2,000 cubic feet per second from Proctor will begin.
The public is warned to use caution when approaching low water crossings and adjacent lands to the Leon River, downstream of the dam. Periodic inspection of livestock and equipment confined to these areas is

almost 75 percent of the recreation facilities are not useable. Three group areas at Promontory Park and one at Sowell Creek Park are closed. Lake users, particularly boaters, should be careful of floating debris caused by the high water.
Proctor Dam and Lake was placed in operation in 1963 with a primary federal purpose of flood control. The

conservation pool level is 1,162 feet above mean sea level. As of June 11, the lake level was 1179.20. The top of the flood control storage pool is 1,197 feet above mean sea level.

Both of these friends of mine were dead by the time I took to sea in LST 461 for 40 some months in the Pacific. They were men cut down 30 years before their time.

"Are there any other unburied heroes of our town who have not even a gravestone to recall their memory?"

Mr. Spears grew up in Cisco and was president of First National Bank before moving some 35 years ago to Sherman where he has been in banking. He and family are occasional visitors here. We're sure you'll agree with him that a memorial is in order for these two young Cisco men who lost their lives early in WWII. If you know of any others, drop Mr. Spears a note or pass the word to us.

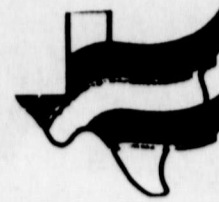

Area News Briefs

CISCO
A Cisco Police Officer is suspected of being involved in the recent arson fires in Cisco. R.D. "Rick" Kirkland was suspended without pay Wednesday pending an investigation. Jim Bob Cozart was charged with one count of arson in a fire last week at Webb's Enterprises, an uninsured business on Main Street which was totally demolished. Two other men were arrested for investigation in this fire, which also destroyed Dixon's Auto Supply. Police had said last week that they believed a group of youths might be responsible for all the fires, some of which were set to draw attention from nearby burglaries. Cisco Police Chief Billy Rains said Kirkland became a suspect after Rains was called to the State Fire Marshall's office in Duncaneville.

Cam Webb of Webb's Inc., which had a total loss in their store and building in the center of town, reports that the "fire-proof" safe in the center of the building wasn't "fire-proof" after all. The door burned off, and all the contents, including property deeds, birth certificates, social security cards, insurance papers and the like went up in flames. It was a loss of "many thousands of dollars", Cam reports.

school person comments on the paper work, and J.J. was no exception: "...last year, the worst yet."

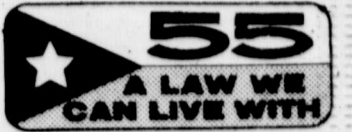
