Olympic Torch Run In Cisco Sunday

Men, women, boys, and girls of Cisco have been officially invited to participate in relaying the Olympic Torch through Cisco when the famous torch visits here on Sunday afternoon, June 29, Hilton Board President Eris Ritchie has announced. The torch, which was carried across America for the Olympic Games in Los Angeles in 1984, is being relayed across Texas for the U.S. Olympic Festival to be held in Houston July 25-August 3, and Cisco is one of the towns chosen by the Olympic Festival to host the torch run, Mr. Ritchie stated. The torch run will stop for a few minutes in front of the Mobley Hotel for ceremonies hosted by Mayor Joe Wheatley. Wheatley is handling all arrangements for the Mobley stop, at which time the historical significance of the Mobley and Conrad Hilton will be emphasized as a part of the theme of the torch run, "A Run Through Texas History."

Cisco Junior College Athletic Director Harold "Ace" Prescott will be local chairman of the torch run itself. Prescott stated that a minimum of 30 to 35 runners would be needed June 29, and as many as 65 to 70 could be accepted. The Cisco runners will begin relaying the torch on the far west side of the city, near the White Elephant Restaurant and Motel, and will relay it down West Eighth Street to Avenue E, from there north

to Third Street, then east on Third, around behind the Mobley, stopping in front of the Mobley for Cisco's official ceremonies hosted by Mayor Wheatley. Following the ceremonies, the torch will be carried south on Conrad Hilton Avenue to Eighth Street, then east on U.S. 80 to the Kendrick Farm, where runners from Eastland will receive the torch to relay it to and through their city. Each runner will carry the torch from one eighth to one fourth of a mile, Prescott said. "If we have about 30 to 35 runners, each leg will be about one fourth mile; if we have 65 to 70 runners, each person will go about one eighth mile," he pointed out. All runners will be given free U.S. Olympic Festival T-shirts, and will be required to wear the shirt during the run. Also, each participant will be asked to sign a release form when they sign up for the run, and any runner under 18 years of age will need a parent or guardian to sign their release, Mr. Prescott said. The releases are at Coach Prescott's office at CJC, and participants may go there to sign up between 8 a.m. and 4 p.m. through Thursday noon. All who are interested in participating are asked to sign up by Thursday, June 26. Mr. Prescott said, "More runners are needed." More information regarding running or signing up may be obtained from Coach Prescott at CJC (442-2567) or his residence (442-3883).

A Volkswagen caught fire at the back end and was engulfed in flames when Police Chief Billy Rains arrived, he extinguished most of it with a fire extinguisher before fire trucks could arrive. The car received extensive damage.

New Treatment Plant

Sewer Rates To Increase July 1

On April 15, 1986, the City of Cisco awarded a contract for the new waste water treatment plant, and according to City Manager Mike Moore, sewer rates will be increased July 1 to help retire the debt involved with the construction of the new facility. A contract in the amount of \$579,771 was awarded to Wardrup and Associates of Lubbock. It is expected that construction work will begin by June 27, and completion date is set for January 27, 1987, Mr. Moore stated. Cisco will incur other expenses in connection with the construction, such as site cost, engineering fees, inspection fees, legal and financial fees, and other charges. These are expected to total some \$207,000, according to the city manager. The City has also received a construction grant from the Environmental Protection Agency in an amount not to exceed \$301,218, which is 52 per cent of the contract

amount. Cisco officials met June 10 in a pre-construction conference with representatives from Farmers Home Administration, the contractors, EPA, and city engineers. Then on June 17, the city closed its loan with the FHA and the contractor was given notice to proceed on the project at that time. The city can borrow up to \$550,000 from Farmers Home Administration at an "excellent rate of 6.125 percent interest for this wastewater facility project," Mr. Moore said. "We hope not to have to borrow the full amount," he added, "but it is available if we need it." The revenue to pay the debt service on all bonds will be generated from a sewer rate increase, he said. There will be no tax increase to pay for the bonds as was originally anticipated in the bond election. As a condition to receiving a construction grant for this

project, the EPA requires sewer rates be charged on a "user" basis, that is part of the sewer rate is billed on the water that is actually metered for each customer, Mr. Moore explained. The new sewer rates will be reflected on the July 1 water bills. New sewer rates for residential customers will be \$8.75 for the first 4,000 gallons of water, and then 50 cents per 1,000 gallons for the next 8,000 gallons. The \$8.75 is the minimum to fund existing collection operations and retire the debt. The 50 cents per 1,000 gallons is designed to pay for operation of the treatment facility. Commercial customers will have the same initial cost as residential customers--\$8.75 for the first 4,000 gallons, and then 50 cents per 1,000 gallons over 4,000 gallons. Mr. Moore furnished the following chart for comparison of the old and new sewer rates.

Downtown Fires Still On Citizens Mind

According to City Manager Mike Moore, the Curfew enacted here in Cisco after the rash of suspected arson fires is still in effect. Events over the last weekend were quiet, and seemingly normal. Cisco has been plagued with a series of fires over the last several days. The first of which was at Cisco Lumber and Supply on Tuesday morning June 10. It is believed that it was set to cover a burglary at Dean Drug. The fire destroyed a warehouse containing paneling, sheetrock, cement and other building supplies. An estimate of \$150,000 was given as the amount of loss. On Wednesday morning June 11, an alarm was turned on as the Red Front Mini-Mall was burning. Extensive damage to the inside of the building was caused. The two offices in the Mini-Mall received some damage to furniture and fixtures, but escaped serious damage. The Red Front Mini-Mall is an historic building in Cisco, as it was the old Red Front Drug Store.

On Thursday morning June 12, the White Auto Store building was discovered to be on fire. The fire apparently was started in the rear of the building. As the fire raged through the second floor, an outside wall was weakened to the point that it collapsed on to the roof of the Dixon Auto Supply building. Already hot from the fire, it also began to burn. In moments it was completely engulfed in flames. A suspect was apprehended close to the scene of this fire and was taken into custody. He was later charged with arson. He is now free on bond. Citizens have reacted to the emergency, by setting up a series of watches for the downtown business. Watches are during the evening and early morning hours when there is very little activity. Early Tuesday morning, two state fire marshalls from the Dallas office were in town to continue the investigation of arson. They were spending time with Frank Wilcoxon, searching

the ruins of his house to determine the cause of that fire. Cisco Police Department reports that the investigation is continuing. They are following leads and questioning people about the fires and burglaries. A \$5,000.00 reward is being offered to anyone who has information that will lead to the arrest and conviction of those involved in the burglaries or arson.

Kiwanis Club Helps Establish Fund

The Cisco Kiwanis Club during their regular weekly meeting endorsed the effort to establish a permanent Crime Stoppers Fund. They voted to initiate the fund by contributing 100 dollars and challenging all other clubs and organizations to match the contribution.

Cisco Loses To Breckenridge

The Lobos lost a tough one to Breckenridge last Friday night in Breckenridge. The game went 7 innings. The Lobos jumped out an early 4-run lead in the 1st inning, only to go hitless in innings 2, 3, 4 and 5. They came back to score 2 runs in the 6th and 7th innings, with Breckenridge rallying to score 6 in the 6th inning.

Robert Wages, the losing pitcher, had 9 strike outs and allowed 2 hits. Shelby Nixon relieved Robert in the bottom of the 6th.

The loss brought the Lobos record to 4 wins and 2 losses.

CISD Rejects Bids For Classroom Construction

Bids for a contract to build 12 classrooms, elementary school offices and rest rooms at Intermediate School were rejected by the board of trustees of the Cisco Independent School District at a called meeting and planning session last Tuesday afternoon.

Supt. Ray Saunders reported that the board decided that \$50.48 per square foot or \$625,562 for the project was too high and beyond the district's means in rejecting the bids. The board will re-consider the project at a later date, he indicated.

The bids were opened about two weeks ago. Construction work is due to be finished this summer on the building project at the school, and the new project was to replace some of the quarters at the old building now being used.

In other action, the board heard a report on the results

of student skills tests given in the final weeks of the 1985-86 school year. They voted to leave decisions regarding the teachers' career ladder as provided by HB-72 to the administration.

Sale of the downtown building used for many years as the school's tax office was approved to Mrs. Ann Williams of the Pat Maynard Real Estate Agency. Mrs. Williams, whose office was in the Red Front Mini Mall that was extensively damaged by fire recently, plans to re-locate her offices to the old school building, she told the board. The building had been advertised for sale, and Mrs. Williams submitted the winning bid.

Mr. Saunders reported that the board also decided that junior and senior high schools would have separate principals next year and that a new high school principal would be hired. Applications

for the post, which had been a combination for the past year, will be accepted for action at a future board meeting, Mr. Saunders said. Jim Puryear, who served as principal of junior-senior high school during the past year, will be the junior high principal as he prefers that job and has been doing an outstanding job, Mr. Saunders said.

Mr. Saunders told the board that progress is being made on remodeling and painting work at the high school building this summer. Contractor Benton Lacy was hired to work-over the rest rooms, including new plumbing fixtures, new ceilings and painting, he said.

Summer plans also include a new roof for the high school building, which has several leaks, the superintendent said. A number of high school students have been employed to assist the regular maintenance staff with much of the work, he added.

Johnny McDaniels Shows Train Slides To Cisco AARP

Johnny McDaniels, CJC math instructor, took all Cisco AARP members on a train ride down Memory Lane on the three lines that operated here from 1881-1950.

With pictures showing the first steam engines to the latest diesels, McDaniels showed the first train that came through on the Texas Central more than 100 years ago. He pointed out that the line of the Texas Central formed the eastern boundary of Cisco. Later, the Central sold out to the "Katy" which operated passenger and freight trains through Cisco until 1950. The old freight depot still stands on East Sixth but "Katy" tracks and the viaduct that bridged it on East Eighth are gone.

The Cisco and Northeastern (Cisco to Throckmorton) was a child of the oil boom days and the "Roaring Twenties." Pictures of the C&NE and their workhouse (now known as

the Boss Glove Factory) are also gone save for a bridge which still stands in Breckenridge.

The Texas and Pacific, the M&T, and the C&NE all used the union depot. McDaniels had pictures of that station, also gone now, showing it from every side. One of those highlights was the Royal Blue and Antique White Sunshine Special coming in with its many passengers loading and unloading. The Katy had black and gold stripes for its locomotives. Those for the C&NE were all black.

"I have loved trains from the time I was a little boy in Carbon. Collecting pictures and stories about them has been a life-long hobby of mine," McDaniels explained as he concluded his program. "As you know, we have only freight trains now but the person who has never ridden a train has been cheated. Maybe some of you know some of these train crews and can help with their identification. I have only a few names."

The crowds gathered around him so thick that this reporter finally heard, "Yes, we had three depots. The

first was destroyed by fire; the second, by a train wreck; and the third was torn down after passenger service was discontinued."

As the questions continued to come, he said, "One of the last major freight services of the 'Katy' was hauling rock that was quarried and crushed in Carbon to Whitney for the building of the Whitney Dam."

Reports by the treasurer, secretary, and all committee chairmen present were accepted. The decorating chairmen were thanked, and a delectable dinner was served to some 60 people.

Quilters - Quilt - Quilts

If you were to see any of these people individually on the street they might not strike you as ministers or missionaries. However, if you were to see them on any given Tuesday between 9 a.m. and 5 p.m., you would be convinced that they were surely toting halos. These people are a group of ladies from First Christian Church in Cisco who have shared their quilting talents not only with people all over the world, but also with Cisco Junior College in its upcoming production, "The Quilters".

Several ladies from First Christian Church decided to form a quilting circle around 1971 before the church built its present facility on 8th street, and since then have assimilated uncountable numbers of quilts. They sell their work from \$20 on up, and all the profit goes to their church, Texas Christian University, missionaries, or any other charitable work that may present itself. In this way, the buyer gains a valuable and lovely quilt, the ladies have a good time making it, and the Lord's work is furthered.

In this article the four ladies from this group who have pieced blocks for "The Quilters" will be highlighted.

Mrs. Olga Fay Parker has quilted most all of her life. She learned the art of quilting by example from watching her mother and church ladies who gathered to quilt. Since Christmas 1985 Mrs. Parker has completed 12 quilts with the ladies from the church and has just finished a quilt of the United States flag on her own at home.

Mrs. Parker has lived in Cisco since she was 4 years old, and has been a member of the First Christian Church since she was 9. She went to West Ward School and graduated from Cisco Junior College where she taught English and was Department Chairman. She retired in 1977, and since then has had much more time to spend on quilting. She pieced the Double Wedding Rings block for "The Quilters" and did a lovely job on it.

Mrs. Nona Stevens, the sister of Mrs. Parker, has made the Robbing Peter to

Pay Paul block for "The Quilters", and it too is superb handwork. Although her sister managed to pick up quilting from her mother and friends, Mrs. Stevens did not quilt until she moved back to Cisco after living in Lubbock and Garland. When she left, Cisco was a thriving town with many department stores and car dealerships. The high school was AAAA and Mrs. Stevens was even on the pep squad herself. The church was a two story building, and she and her relatives would fill up a whole side of the church on any given Sunday. When she returned, she still found Cisco a thriving town, but with new stores, buildings and faces. However, she is quick to say, "You don't find better people anywhere than in Cisco."

First Christian Church has a bazaar every year during the first week in November, and Mrs. Stevens had 217 pieces in last year's function, all of which sold. She has pieced three quilts on her own, and numerous baby quilts. All the money earned is profit as all the supplies and scraps for the quilts are donated.

Mrs. Fred Steffy has also quilted all her life. She was raised in a family of 10 children, 8 of which were boys, and she learned to quilt out of necessity for covers. Her sister never cared for housework, and since Mrs. Steffy enjoyed it her mother set her to quilting as soon as she was big enough to hold a needle. She now has four children, 2 boys and 2 girls, and quilts for them. However, these quilts are "fancy quilts" and are keep-

sakes. One of her daughters has picked up her craft and she too pieces quilts. Mrs. Steffy has one quilt her mother made in 1916 named "The Puzzle Road to Texas." Her own personal favorite is "The Flower Garden" pattern. Mrs. Steffy has lived in Cisco since 1926 and has pieced around 200 quilts. She gets around 8 stitches to the needle, and has pieced the Lone Star block for "The Quilters". Mrs. Steffy says of quilting that people who have never done it "have no idea about the work that goes into making one (a quilt) or just putting it on"

Mrs. Dorothy Barton pieced the Baby Blocks block for "The Quilters". She enjoys quilting now, but this has not always been the case. Around 12 years ago Mrs. Barton tried quilting with a Methodist Church group in San Antonio, but could never seem to be able to put it together. Then, after moving to Eastland in 1981, a friend encouraged her to join the First Christian Church ladies and with their encouragement she has conquered the art of quilting and is now trying masterfully to make her stitches smaller.

Mrs. Barton's mother did not quilt, but did do other handwork. Mrs. Barton has four children of her own, all boys, and eight grandchildren. Her handwork is beautiful, and also can be seen in "The Quilters". Dates for the play are June 19-22, 26-28. 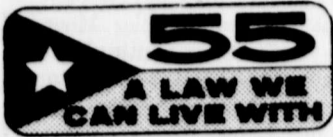

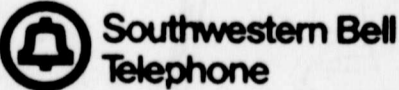

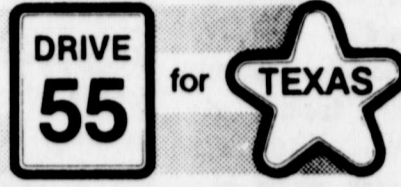

County Commissioners Meet And Discuss Various Topics

Varied topics were discussed and some action taken when Eastland County Commissioners held a regular meeting in the Courtroom on Monday, June 23.

Present were Commissioners Richard Robinson, Pct. 1; Bill Riddell, Pct. 2; L.T. Owen, Pct. 3; and C.B. Dill, Pct. 4. County Judge Scott Bailey presided, and County Clerk Joann Johnson recorded minutes.

In one of the first items, John Davis and Jerry Dunlap of Jedco Design Co. of Clyde returned to the Court to discuss the placing of signs on all county roads and bridges, and the mapping of county roads.

Richard Robinson, Pct. 1, replied that roads in his precinct were totally washed out, and four bridges were gone. He didn't know what it would take to get his area back in shape.

L.T. Owen, Pct. 3, stated that roads in his precinct were in very bad shape too, due to heavy flooding from the Sabanno and creeks in the area. All of the bridges in this locality were destroyed, he said.

The Commissioners indicated a possibility of looking into the matter of road signs at a later date.

Jerry Mathews, Department of Public Safety Sergeant, brought a request for a new copier for DPS work. He advised the Court that he could obtain a good XEROX machine for \$1340.45, and full-service maintenance would cost \$55.55. The money for this purchase could come from \$4,000 budgeted to his office for a radar unit, which is now being paid for by the state.

The Commissioners approved the purchase of the copier, and the \$55.55 service policy.

Alford Bush of Ranger, who won the Democratic

Primary runoff June 7, for Justice of the Peace, appeared at the Court. He told the Commissioners that, as far as he knew, he would have no Republican opponent in the election in November. Therefore, if the Court should see fit to appoint him, he would be willing to assume his duties immediately. His regular term would begin Jan. 1, 1987.

Bush also said he had located some suitable office space, which would cost \$75 per month with water paid.

Judge Bailey discussed several aspects of the matter with the Court, stating that any appointee would be operating under a budget that is already set. The Judge also mentioned that in the case of an appointment the Court is not obligated to appoint Mr. Bush.

Mention was made of office furniture, and that some of the books from the Pct. 2 J.P. office might still be impounded.

Alford Bush was advised that the subject would be placed on the agenda for the next meeting, July 4.

Emma Morris, county auditor, discussed basic housekeeping in the Courthouse. She noted that paper goods from the civil defense had been stored for a number of years in the basement.

She said that arrangements were being made for heads of the road crews and other County departments to work with her on damage control and general upkeep.

C.B. Dill noted that repairs still needed to be made to the Courthouse, especially in the southwest area of the basement.

There was also a discussion on the Courthouse air conditioners. Dill said members of a jury had complained to him recently on the heat in the jury box during a trial. Some reported that the temperature was so high they felt like they were going to faint.

This brought a reminder that two county lawsuits are still pending in the courts. The Commissioners expressed a need to find out when these cases could be scheduled.

In other business, the Court authorized the County Auditor to destroy obsolete and outdated records.

Other action concerned a request by Christie Gas and Transmission Inc. to cross County Rds. 355 and 534 in Precinct 3 with a pipeline. The company was represented by Doyle Rouse.

L.T. Owen, Pct. 3 Commissioner, pointed out to Mr. Rouse that this portion of Rd. 534 no longer belongs to the county - it has been deeded to the state. It is now part of Highway 6 which is being reworked 2 miles northwest of Gorman.

The Commissioners approved the crossing on Rd. 355, but advised Rouse to return to the Highway Department for permission to cross the other road.

The next regular meeting of the Commissioners Court will be held July 14, and budgetary matters will undoubtedly be on the agenda.

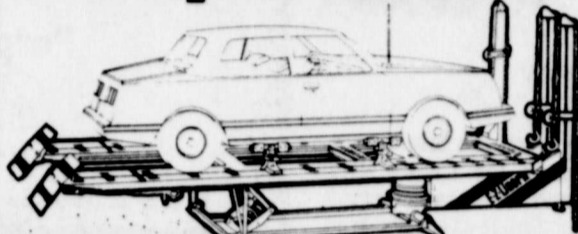

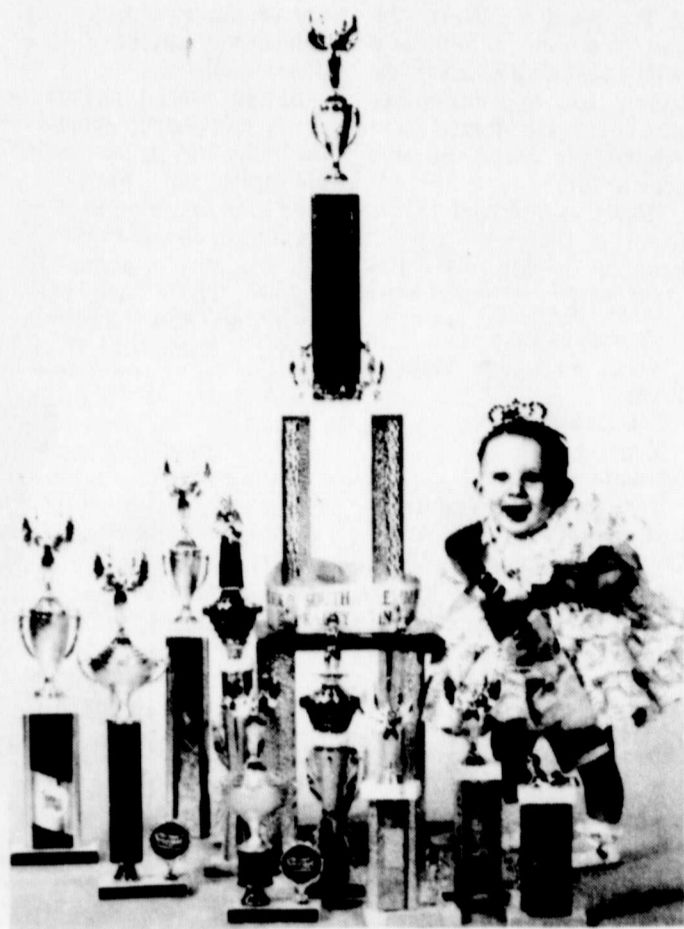

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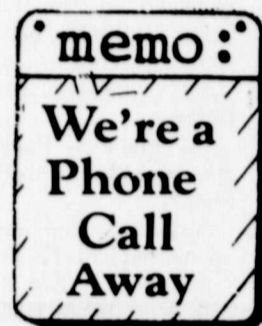

Second Mis-Trial In Two Weeks

The second mis-trial in two weeks was the verdict when jurors were considered "hung" during a recent aggravated assault case in 91st District court in Eastland this week.

Mary Gaiter Wade, of Dallas, was on trial for the aggravated assault of Eastland County D.P.S. Officer Robert Ralls.

The assault came about when Trooper Ralls stopped the vehicle in which Wade was riding in on July 6, 1985. The driver of the vehicle was arrested for D.W.I. When Trooper Ralls proceeded to search the vehicle for alcohol Wade became violent and struck, hit and shoved Trooper Ralls.

torney Bill Dowell was the prosecutor in the case.

The case consisted of brief testimony with Trooper Ralls and Deputy Sheriff H.T. Fillingham testifying for the prosecution and with the defendant testifying for the defense.

The jury went into deliberations about 11:30 and took a break at noon for lunch. They returned to their deliberations at 1:30. They reported to the judge that they were unable to reach a 12-0 consensus and at 3:30 a "hung jury" was declared at 7-5.

Assistant D.A. Dowell stated that he is currently evaluating the feasibility of a successful prosecution if the case is re-tried.

County Reappraisal Work Is Completed

The reappraisal or review of taxable property within Eastland County has now been completed. The Eastland County Appraisal District has previously advised the property owners of Eastland County that this review work was being conducted in compliance with the requirements of the State Property Tax Code. The field work has taken several months to complete.

As of June 23, 1986 property owners within the County will be receiving reappraisal notices. The notices will advise the property owner of the proposed 1986 taxable value of the described property. It will also give information pertaining to Appraisal Review Board hearings.

Property owners who will receive notices will be only those falling into one of the following categories.

1. 1986 proposed value higher than rendered value for 1986.
2. 1986 proposed value higher by \$1,000 or more than the 1985 taxable value.
3. New Improvement (house, barn, etc.) added for 1986 that was not previously on the tax roll.

Property owners not in one of those above categories will not receive an appraisal notice for 1986. For additional information concerning any notice that you might receive, please contact the Eastland County Appraisal District at 817-629-6597.

The notices mailed out June 23 will be received primarily by property owners within the Gorman, Carbon and Rising Star school districts. Notices for the three remaining school districts will be mailed within the next two to three weeks.

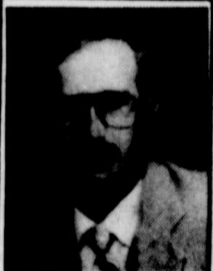
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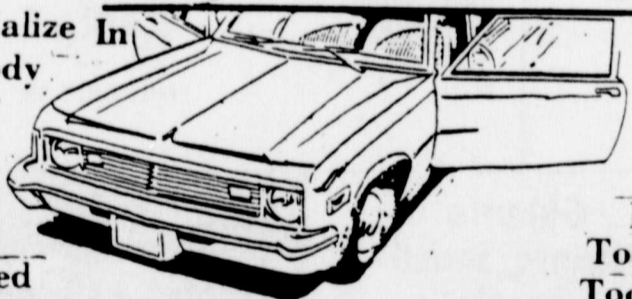

RESTORING CISCO like it was when her dad was growing up here in the 1940s and 1950s is the goal of Sharon Watkins of 1706 Bullard. And she is doing her part with the help of her husband Randy and their seven children.

Mrs. Watkins is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Homer (Spec) Tompkins, Irving, and her grandparents were the late Mr. and Mrs. H. H. Tompkins, who were business and civic leaders here for many years. Spec is in real estate, is doing well, and visits here often.

THE TOMPKINS home was built by the late Mr. HHT at 1500 Bullard. It is a two story home with a large greenhouse and was a showplace back in the years Spec Tompkins, who was a football star at CHS and TCU, was growing up. Mr. HHT also had the Tompkins Broom Factory here for years along with the Cisco Locker plant that he built. He was behind the development of the Park Drive area in west Cisco.

After his passing, the Tompkins home began running down and the greenhouse was in shambles with glass shattered and scattered. Last August, Randy and Sharon Watkins acquired the place. They moved their seven children to Cisco. Mr. Watkins, a data processing plant manager in Los Colinas near Dallas, commutes to his job from Cisco, spending several nights a week there.

RESTORATION work at the residence is very noticeable. And the yard and garden and greenhouse are a source of pride for the whole family, including Michael, 18, who finished at CHS last month; twin sons, Matthew and Marcus, 13; daughters, Michelle, 16, and Molly, 9; and twin daughters, Misty and Mitzi, 5.

Many of the original pots have been found and restored and in use. Some of the plants put out by Mr. HHT, including grapes and berries, have been nursed back to health and production.

SEVERAL WOMEN and one man, all senior citizens, have volunteered to help and advise Mrs. Watkins. They are folks who worked for Mr. HHT in his greenhouse years ago and remember how things were.

Mrs. Watkins, who attended NTSU at Denton, hopes eventually to have a lot of things for sale at the greenhouse, which already is turning out plants in a limited number. She wants to provide greenhouse jobs for young folks to give them summer and part-time employment in the years to come.

"We're 'city people' who are loving every minute of living in this small town," Mrs. Watkins said.

THE WATKINS garden, like a few others, is now in full production with all kinds of vegetables. They'll soon have watermelons and cantaloupes and tomatoes. They've planted every seed they got their hands on, she said.

The restored greenhouse is covered with plastic. More than 1,000 plastic bags were used in picking up shattered glass and debris from the property during the restoration period.

Mrs. Watkins has the original papers that were filed to designate the property as the "Belmont Greenhouse," and she has renewed the name at the courthouse.

THE SIMPLE LIFE that the Watkins family enjoys includes a hand cranked ice cream freezer that they use regularly.

"There's so much good about Cisco that I can't imagine living any place else," she said. "Having lived in a big city makes us really appreciate our life here." She and the children are involved in various community activities.

Marcus, one of the 13-year old twins, is a junior varsity cheerleader, along with several girls. Mrs. Watkins believes he is the "first ever" boy cheerleader at junior high.

A FEW YEARS ago, the Watkins and others of Dallas collected a lot of toys and sent them to Cisco and the late Jim Sauls and his wife Nan distributed them to area needy folks, she reports.

Mrs. Watkins' enthusiasm is contagious. Drive by the greenhouse and listen to her. It will do your civic pride some good.
