Charges May Await Adult Determination

A guardian has been appointed for the 15-year-old youth who is being held on an extended order, in connection with the murder of another 15-year-old Olden youth this week.

Deterination of whether the youth will be handled as a juvenile or adult will be made before formal charges are filed.

Consideration is being given to asking that the youth be tried as an adult. Attorney Jim Farrar was appointed guardian.

Procedures differ between adult one and youth cases.

The Sheriff's Dept. was still continuing evidentual searches and evidence was being taken to laboratories in Abilene and Dallas at week's end.

Assistant District Attorney Bill Dowell represented the state in requesting the extended hold on the youth who was on a 30-day furlough from a youth detention center.

Preliminary charges indicated by the investigation are aggravated assault with a deadly weapon by the youth on the deceased youth's father, Bill Jones, who said the two youths left his house about midnight Monday. His son did not

The elder Jones said that the suspect did return, attacking him and robbing him inside his home. The boy reportedly took his wallet and car keys, and even though the father received two bullet wounds about the head, was able to knock the gun from the youth's hands. The father was treated and released.

A railroad crew found the body of Charles Jones by the railroad tracks west of Olden early Tuesday morning. The body was sent for an autopsy and a preliminary report indicated that the younger Jones was shot three times, two facial wounds and one wound in the back.

The suspect was taken into custody at a relative's home in Olden and taken to Taylor County Juvenile Detention Center Wednesday on orders of the 91st District Court.

Investigators were in Dallas Wednesday setting in motion ballistic and firearms reports and other evidence was being forward for examination by experts.

New Computerized Fueling Station To Open In Cisco

A computerized fueling station operating 24 hours a day will open here soon at 12th and Conrad Hilton. The system is being in-

stalled by Pride Marketing of Texas, Inc., a subsidiary of Pride Refining, Inc. of Abilene, and will operate under the name Pride Fleet Fuel. A grand opening of the

facility-the first of its kind in Cisco-is planned for the end of July.

The Cisco outlet will be the first of several such operations planned for this area, although Pride has numerous similar facilities throughout West Texas.

Cisco's facility will serve both the general public and commercial customers, with or arote fuel island with high volume pumps for large

diesel accounts The system will be com-

pletely automated with an on-site computer relaying sales information back to Pride's Abilene offices.

Customers will purchase fuel by using a plastic credit card similar to those used by 24-hour banking facilities. The computer will "read" the magnetic strip on the card to determine ownership and any restrictions that a customer might want placed on a particular card. Among the restrictions available are limitations on the amount of purchases and on the types of fuel that could be purchased. This option has proven to be of great interest to businesses in their attempts

to better manage fuel cost. Fuel provided at the site will come from the refinery owned by Pride Refining, Inc. and located eight miles

north of Abilene. Pride has operated a crude

Cisco for several years and has three trucks and drivers located here. Pride purchases on an average 50,000 barrels of crude oil a month from local owners and operators. Pride Marketing of Texas.





Fleas are abundant this summer in Eastland County. They attack both humans and animals. I have been receiving calls each day requesting information on flea control.

The tiny pests cause annoyance and discomfort and can also spread certain disease, a major one being bubonic plague.

Adult fleas cause the most problems as they have piercing sucking mouthparts and suck blood. Adult fleas may live from two months to two years. After each blood meal females lay four to eight eggs, which hatch in two to three weeks. They may deposit as many as 500 eggs in their lifetime.

Flea control may be difficult due to the circumstances under which the pests occur. Home infestations are often discovered a short time after a pet has been taken out of the home. Immature fleas have completed development and. with the absence of the normal host, turn to man for their life-sustaining blood meal.

Satisfactory control of fleas for any length of time depends on these factors:

. Both adult and immature fleas must be

eliminated from the home and yard by proper chemical control and sanitation measures, such as replacing infested bedding materials and cleaning carpets and stuffed furniture.

2. Pets must be rid of fleas by using registered chemicals. In the case of rat or mice fleas, these hosts must be eliminated.

3. Reinfestation must be prevented by protecting pets with flea collars other preventative chemicals during times of likely infesta-

Chemicals registered for indoor flea control include Baygon, DDVP, Dursban. Malathion, Methoprene. Ronnel and SBP-1382. Use a coarse spray on floors and baseboards. Treat one foot up the walls and under the house where possible. Check product labels prior to use.

Chemicals registered for outdoor flea control include Baygon, Cygon, Diazinon, Dursban, Malathion and Sevin. Treat animals' bedding or remove and replace with new material. Good coverage is necessary for good control

To control fleas on host animals, use Dursban, Lindane, Sevin or Vapona on dogs and Korlan, Lindane, Malathion, Phosmet and





John & Matilda Rose -They Have A Way With Plants

You can't miss the John and Matilda Rose home out on the highway to Carbon. South of Eastland there is a large young pecan orchard beside the road, and a brick house which fits comfortably on the hill behind it.

What seems to pull the house into the terrainis more than an acre of landscaping all around it - lush sloping lawns, curving driveways and varicolored flowerbeds. Young trees bank the sides of the hill - Mondale pines, Black pines and Slash pines for windbrakes, with Arizona ash, mulberry and maple for shade.

Pampas grass, hawthorne. crepe myrtle and honeysuckle punctuate the brilliance of the flowers: vellow marigolds, purple and scarlet petunias, mums, red geraniums, dahlias, and enormous orange and gold cannas. There are also roses, periwinkle, and even azalias in pots.

Things weren't always like this on the hill. Mr. and Mrs. Rose have a "before" picture showing their home and acreage when they bought it in 1980. This was "before" a lot of hard work, planning, consultation with the Extension Service, and everything else that goes into successful horticulture. The same charming house is in the 1980 picture, but the hillsite around it is about the same color as the tan brick walls.

Mrs. Rose likes homemaking and cooking, and has





Homemaking Hints

From Janet Thomas, County Extension Agent-

From the time our children are born, we are concerned about their health, growth, and personal development. Every mother has given her children vitamins. The children's chewable vitamins are designed to appeal to youngsters with bright colors, animal and cartoon character shapes and a candy-like taste.

They're so appealling, in fact, that last year more than 8,500 children under six swallowed large number of pills at one time.

The greatest danger of vitamin pill overdosing is iron toxicity. The symptoms include bloody diarrhea and vomiting, which can occur in a 30 pound child after eating 15 to 20 tablets of a children's multivitamin-plus iron.

Parents need to treat children's vitamins as though they are a prescription medicine. The childproof cap should be tightly fastened and the vitamin

reach. Since children may still get access to vitamin pills in spite of these precautions, parent should teach their youngsters that vitamins may look like candy, but they are not.

Parents may also want to consider if they even need to be giving children vitamins. After infancy, most children do not need routine vitamin supplementation.

According to nutritionists, children who eat a balanced diet containing protein foods such as meat, poultry, fish and peanut butter; cereals and grains: dairy products: and fruits and vegetables should not need vitamins.

Preschoolers often do have spells of not eating well, or wanting to eat only certain things. But over the course of several days the nutrient needs are likely to be met.

Parents who are particularly concerned about children getting enough iron should be sure to include red meats in meals. Iron fortified breads and cereals are another good source of this

When a child has an extremely poor appetite or does not seem to be growing. parents should consult a physician who can then prescribe vitamins or another nutritional supplements if needed.

Bring to a boil. Place 1 garlic clove in each hot pint canning jar: fill with hot vegetables. Pour boiling brine over vegetables, 1 jar at a time. Soil with canning lids and process in beiling water bath for 30 minutes or eliminate water bath but store in refrigerator for crisper pepper product.
