Pastor Rocky Maugh of the Eastland County Christian Center gave the Invocation. Mrs. McCracken then expressed appreciation to various people who had helped her obtain the

Marker for her home. "This includes R.J. and Helen Manchen, who purchased the home in 1972 and restored it so beautifully," she said. "The Manchens

sold the house to me in 1977.' "I want to give special thanks to Joe and Betty Comingore, now of Seguin, who first encouraged me to get this Historic Marker." Mrs. McCracken continued.'

Then there is Evelyn Bailey, who did a lot of research and wrote a fine history of the house. Without this work we would not have the Marker today."

"I am very grateful to County Judge Scott Bailey, Chairman of the Eastland County Historical Commission, for his assistance on the matter. His wealth of knowledge in history and his interest in such projects was great encourgement."

"I also want to thank Patty Gorr, who typed the manuscript for the application in precise form, ant the Cisco Press, which gave publicity to the project."

The next to speak was Lela Latch Lloyd, a long-time friend of Kitty McCracken and her late husband, James McCracken. Mrs. Lloyd was also a pupil of Mrs. Everett (Ann) Kean, a Cisco teacher who lived in this house. She recounted a number of interesting details of these was made of black taffeta "We remember the vesterdays in order to enrich the tomor-

rows," the Cisco author said. County Judge Bailey followed with a review of the history of the era in which the Kean home was constructed, and what the house and its owners had meant to the town. He pointed out special details of construction, such as the twelve-foot high ceilings, and noted that the house was built of

cypress wood. He said that obtaining a Historic Marker was a "complicated process", and that "such an emblem can

be neither bought or sold." "Once obtained, the building is marked forever. The marker preserves what has been built for the future."

He concluded by telling of the value of preserving historic landmarks. This is not only because of their value as a community heritage, but also in the added number of visitors who come to historic sites.

After this talk the crowd moved to the front of the house. There Dr. Ayres Cermin, President of the Cisco Historical Society, unveiled the Medallion and Marker. He commended Mrs. Mc-Cracken and daughters Shasha and Elizabeth of Abilene, Mr. and Mrs. C.H. LaMontagne and daughter Rebekah of Abilene, and Diego Alvarado of Orense, Spain. Other relatives were Elizabeth Donica and Standlee and Durene Mc-Cracken of Cisco, Novella Bigby of Eastland, and Lorne and Betty Williams of

The inscription on the marker reads as follows: THE KEAN HOME

Construction on this home began soon after the destructive Cisco tornado of 1893. Orginially built for George and Carrie Langston, it was purchased in 1899 by Edward Everett Kean(1857-1942). A dry goods merchant, Kean had come to Cisco in 1889 and was active in community affairs. This house, which features Eastlake influences, particularly in the decorative woodwork, remained in the Kean family for more than 70 years.

Special Issues Face Agriculture

and Natural Resources

By Viola Payne

After the first meeting on April 15 the Program Builders Task Forces met a number of other times while deciding on the most critical issues facing Eastland Coun-

Although this program was sponsored by the Extension Service, these were citizens' meetings - and it was the Task Force members opinions which counted.

By time for the public announcements on June 24 the four Task Forces -Agriculture and Natural Resources, Community Development, Home Economics, and Youth - had named 26 issues.

The first Task Force to report was the Agriculture and Natural Resource group, with Jay Lafferty as Discussion Leader and Don Mauney the Recorder. Lafferty is an employee of Perkins Implement Co. in Eastland, and Don Mauney of Gorman is the Manager of Production Credit Association in Eastland.

Besides Lafferty and Mauney, other people from around the county had worked on this report. They included Arlin Bint, Ernest Reich, Charles Walker, Joe Taylor, Bob Green, George Steel, Bob Shults, Richard Robinson, Mrs. Don Mauney, Roy Johnson, and Cecil Self.

Lafferty, the spokesman for the group, began by speaking of Issue No. 1. Water. "There is a need," he said, "to assure an adequate, safe, high quality water supply agricultural production in the county and for domestic use by the citizens of the county. Approximately 12,500 acres of crops are irrigated in the county. Most of this water comes from shallow wells. It is necessary to maintain an adequate supply of good quality irrigation water to continue the level of agricultural production we leader continued by saying that Underground pollution of irrigation and domestic water is occuring from improperly plugged oil wells, and there could be pollution from underground flood activity which is being done to recover oil. Frequent droughts cause water shortages for livestock and farm use and reduction in yields of crop and livestock products.

No. 2 On Financial Management Lafferty said There is a need for farmers and ranchers to keep better records to make wise financial management decisions. Few producers budget their crop and livestock enterprises and most are not able to present their credit agency with sufficient records to show borrowing needs and plans for paying the loans. Producers need financial records to determine which crop and livestock enterprises are profitable and which are not.

No. 3 Profitability. "Profitability in agriculture has declined because prices received by producers have not kept up with increasing production costs," the speaker continued. "This is compounded when losses build into carry over debts from year to year, adding to interest costs without generating additional income. Some producers have been forced out of agriculture because of little or no profits from their operations."

No. 4 Marketing "Agricultural producers are not making reasonable profit on goods they deliver to the market. Consumption patterns have changed markedly in the past decade, making market information and coordination even more critical. More cooperative efforts need to be made in marketing as well as efforts to control the commodity closer to its final consump-

tion form." Lafferty stressed Item No.

Agricultural Enterprise Diversification -"Peanuts and beef cattle bring in the majority of the agricultural income to Eastland County. Peanuts account for about 65% of the total agricultural products sold from county

farms. Reductions of peanut quotas imposed by the USDA Peanut Program have resulted the reduction of 10,000 acres of peanuts since

Other crops need to be developed in the county so that producers may choose among sufficient alternative enterprises to increase profits or to reduce the risk associated with producing one commodity," he

A special mention was made of issue No. 6 Soil Conservation Most of the crop land in Eastland County is


vulnerable to wind and/or water erosion. Native grasses and trees have been removed from sandy land so that peanuts and other crops can be grown. This has exposed the soil making it vulnerable to wind and water erosion.

Lafferty concluded by talking about item No. 7 Wildlife Management -Eastland County has an abudance of wildlife including white tail deer," he said. "The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department

Named To Mark

Sesquecentennial

WASHINGTON-The U.S. Navy has agreed to name its next Aegis cruiser the U.S.S. San Jacinto in honor of the battle through which the Republic of Texas secured independence from Mexico, U.S. Sen. Phil Gramm has announced.

"The San Jacinto is a Ticonderoga-class guided missile cruiser. It is to be christened in December of this Texas Sesquicentennial year and commissioned in December of 1987," Gramm

"Needless to say, I am proud that the Navy has chosen-in this special way and at this special time-to pay tribute to the valor of those who won our independence against overwhelming odds on the battlefield at San Jacinto," Gramm said.

The San Jacinto will be 563 feet long, 55 feet across the beam and will displace 9,600 tons under full load. It will be powered by four gas turbine engines which generate a total of 80,000 horse power.

The ship will be capable of traveling in excess of 30

San Jacinto will carry an array of armament, including two helicopters, Tomahawk, Harpoon and Standard missiles, antisubmarine rockets and two five-inch guns.

The ship will rely on the highly sophisticated Aegis air defense system for detection, tracking and destruction of enemy aircraft and

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
