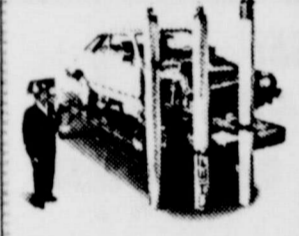

## Mail-Order Sales Tax Could Bring Millions To Texas

This year, large out-of-state mail-order companies will legally avoid collecting Texas sales tax on \$3 billion worth of merchandise.

The purchases are available to the tune of \$100 million, but Texas has no effective way to get to the money.

State efforts to collect the tax are stymied by the 1967 United States Supreme Court Ruling.

In that ruling, the court held that, while states can impose a tax on mail-order sales made by out-of-state companies, they cannot make the companies collect and remit the tax.

That 19-year-old ruling hobbles states like Texas which are trying to keep their tax structures in line with their changing economies.

The ruling also hurts local merchants—who must collect the tax—by giving an advantage in price to out-of-state mail-order companies. In Texas that works out to a four-and-an-eighth percent advantage. And that's before you even talk about local sales taxes or MTA taxes.

But help may be on the way.

A bill introduced in Congress by U.S. Rep. Jack Brooks of Beaumont would require large mail-order retailers to collect and remit

state sales tax. The bill would also give equal footing to local merchants struggling to keep the pace with rapid changes in the way Americans shop.

Mail-order sales are booming nationwide and in Texas.

According to mail-order industry analyst Arnold Fishman, national sales surged 10 to 14 percent between 1983 and 1984 to reach \$82.3 billion.

Texas sales in 1985 accounted for about seven percent of the national total.

The typical American spends between \$186 and \$228 each year buying mail-order goods. Most frequently purchased through the mail are clothing and footwear, magazines, gifts and books.

This boom in mail-order sales is expected to continue, fueled by technological advances such as electronic fund transfers, "800" toll-free telephone numbers and the looming potential of shopping by home computer.

The Marketing Science Institute expects mail-order sales of consumer goods to increase by nine percent a year until 1990.

The state's potential tax loss increases as the volume of mail-order sales grows.

The state's inability to collect sales tax on mail-order sales results from a 1967 Supreme Court decision in *National Bellas Hess v. U-*

linois Department of Revenue.

The court, citing the commerce clause of the U.S. Constitution, held that "states are prohibited from imposing the duty of use-tax collection and payment upon a seller whose only connection with customers in the state is by common carrier or by mail."

Simply put, states can tax sales, but they cannot make the retailers collect or remit the tax.

Except for a few narrowly defined exceptions, the court has not wavered from that decision, leaving states in a quandary as to how to collect sales tax on these transactions.

To remedy this situation, Brooks in June introduced a bill in Congress—H.R. 5021—that would require large, out-of-state mail-order companies to collect

and remit sales tax on transactions made in state that have such a tax.

Tax would be collected only by firms with national sales exceeding \$12.5 million or sales in a single state exceeding \$500,000. The bill would not require out-of-state mail-order firms to collect Texas local or MTA sales taxes.

National mail-order firms claim this would impose a harsh administrative burden on them, but several big companies who both own stores in Texas and conduct mail-order operations have been collecting the tax for years. There is no more burden on these mail-order operations than there is on any other multi-state business.

Passage of the bill would enable Texas to get the \$100 million in sales tax that goes uncollected each year...that Texas has to get them from someone else each year.

Representative Brooks' bill is before the House Judiciary Committee. Efforts to support the bill are being mounted by several Texas business, civic and trade groups.

# Area News Briefs

**CISCO**  
Nine members of the Pecos Little League Team were injured and the driver of the vehicle was killed in an accident near Putnam about 1:15 last Wednesday afternoon. Ambulances carried four boys to Graham Memorial Hospital in Cisco and three boys to Eastland Memorial Hospital. Others were transported to Hendricks Hospital in Abilene. The truck carrying the boys was in a construction area of the Interstate when the accident happened. The vehicle was traveling in the west-bound lane, but rolled over twice into the eastbound lane. The boys were returning home after playoffs and a trip to Six Flags.

Cisco got the rain this time! After a summer of watching the south side of the county get the heavy downpours, Cisco finally got up to three inches of rainfall in a thunderstorm on Aug. 2. The rain was confined largely to the Cisco area, with Lake Cisco measuring about 1.4 inches. Scranton measured about half an inch, with up to an inch falling at Pleasant Hill, Romney and Nimrod. Lightning hit the water department plant at Lake Cisco and burned out a motor protector. This was replaced by city crews Sunday. During the rainstorm Cisco Volunteer Fire Department had equipment and men out to help in three "high water" areas.

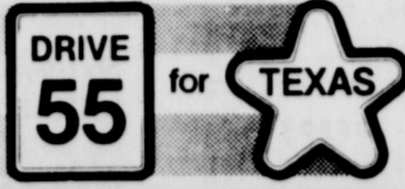
## Ranger's Wrecking Crew To Travel To State

## Manufactured Housing Makes One-Third Of Total Market

Almost a third of all new single-family homes sold in American last year were manufactured homes. The cost per square foot of new manufactured homes has decreased slightly in the last two years (from \$20.29 in 1983 to \$20.19 in 1985), while the average per-square-foot cost of a site-built home increased by nearly nine per-

cent (from \$41.65 in 1983 to \$45.18 in 1985).

Eastland County would be an excellent location for a manufactured home plant.

These are just a few of the statistics contained in the 1986 edition of "Quick Facts About the Manufactured Housing Industry," published by the Manufactured Housing Institute (MHI).

Some of the highlights contained in this year's compendium of industry facts are the following:

-Manufacturers sold 283,489 new homes in 1985.

-Of the new manufactured homes sold in 1985, 33 percent were multisection homes, up from 29 percent in 1984 and 27 percent in 1983.

-The average sales price of a manufactured home in 1985 was \$21,800, compared to \$80,720 for a site-built home (both excluding land).

-Ninety-five percent of manufactured homes are not moved once transported to a homesite.

-Some 72 percent of new manufactured home buyers are under age 40 and their median household income is \$19,800.

## Nutrition Program

When you put food in the refrigerator be sure it is always covered. Otherwise, the cold air will dry out the food and moisture will have to be handled by the evaporator.

If possible, be sure your refrigerator is located in the coolest spot in the kitchen. Heat from ranges, dishwashers, the sun's rays, and other heat sources will make your refrigerator work harder.

Be sure and clean your condenser coils regularly—at least twice a year—by

vacuuming them free of dust and lint. The coils are either on the back or behind the bottom grill of the refrigerator.

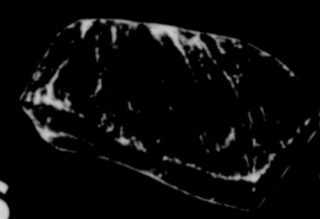

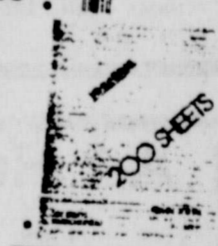

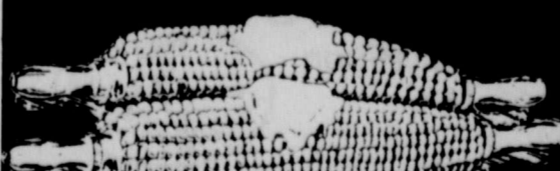
