## Cisco Junior College Is Set To Begin School Year

The 1986-87 school year was scheduled to begin at Cisco Junior College during the coming week with the registration of students Wednesday and Thursday, Aug. 27 and 28, and the first classes on Friday, Aug. 29.

Some 200 students were scheduled to check in over the weekend as football practice was due to begin Saturday, Aug. 23, and members of the Wrangler Band and Wrangler Belles were to report Sunday, Aug. 24.

Approximately 125 candidates for the football team checked in Friday and a few others were expected during the weekend. Coach Rick Frazier and his staff issued

equipment Friday night and the first workouts were set for 8:30 a.m. and 2:30 p.m. Saturday. The same schedule was planned for the coming week.

Director Nikki Harle of the Wrangler Belles expected some 35 girls to report Sunday to begin practice. Director Tim Jones of the Wrangler Band expected some 55 musicians to check in Sunday. Both groups will be larger than they were last year.

Mr. Harle said the girls drill team would begin practicing Monday and that uniforms would be issued later in the week. Many of the girls took part in a summer camp program that

covered the basic maneuvers and routines used by the Belles.

Two events on the schedule will receive attention during the early fall drills, Mrs. Harle said. The Belles have accepted an invitation to appear in the West Texas Fair Parade in Abilene and in the opening of a new headquarters store by Macy's in Houston.

The Macy store opening is scheduled for Sept. 23 and the firm has invited the Belles and Band, who appeared in several Macy parades in New York City, to appear in Houston for the ribbon cutting and official opening ceremony. Macy's will pay the expenses of the

Cisco group, Mrs. Harle said.

Gina Klose of Lomita and Patty Toler of Stephenville, both sophomores, will be co-captains of the 1986-87 Belles, Mrs. Harle said. They were elected last spring.

The first two weeks of work for band members will cover marching and parade routines as well as playing. Selection of a drum major was on the program.

The CJC faculty held a meeting at 9 a.m. Friday to go over plans for the new school year. Carroll Scott, vice president for instruction, was in charge of the meeting, which was followed

by a reception for faculty and staff at the cafeteria. Dr. Henry E. McCullough, president, welcomed faculty members.

Freshman orientation was scheduled at 9 a.m. Monday, Aug. 25, at Harrell Fine Arts Auditorium and again on Tuesday morning, Aug. 26. Sophomore students were requested to check in with their assigned advisors on Tuesday, Aug. 26.

Students registered during the past week at the Abilene CJC Center. Late registration will continue through Sept. 10th.

Dormitories were scheduled to open at 2 p.m. Sunday, and the cafeteria will open for breakfast Monday morning.

## Lions Benefit Game To Be November 15

The annual Lions Benefit Bowl football game will be played this year late in the season--on Nov. 15th--at Breckenridge, it was decided at a zone meeting of area Lions Clubs in Eastland on Thursday night, Aug. 14, Secretary Willard Johnson of the Cisco club reported at the noon luncheon last Wednesday.

The game, which matches the Cisco and Ranger junior college football teams in a conference contest, normally has been played in September.

Mr. Johnson said that Lions would begin selling program advertising in the near future. Ad prices will be unchanged from last year, he said. The deadline for ad sales in Sept. 29th when a zone meeting will be held in Cisco to make final plans for the benefit bowl.

Lions clubs of the area use proceeds from the game to finance crippled children's work and club charitable ac-

tivities, Mr. Johnson said. Each club is allowed to keep 100 per cent of the money received for program advertising sales. The clubs share in profits from ticket sales.

Mr. Johnson said tickets would go on sale in mid-September at \$3 for adults and \$2 for students. Each ticket will cost \$1 more if purchased at the gate. Children in the 6th grade and under will be issued free tickets.

The Cisco club will operate the food concession at this year's game, Mr. Johnson reported. Each club has agreed to contribute \$50 to pay pre-game expenses. This money will be refunded. Club members will be asked to help with cleaning the stadium after the game, he added.

Vice President Roy Dennis presided in the absence of President Olin Odom. Claude Jessup and James Cotton were guests in the luncheon.

## County Law Enforcement Banquet To Be Tuesday

The fifteenth annual Eastland County Law Enforcement Association Banquet will be held Tuesday night at 7 p.m. at the Siebert Elementary School in Eastland. Guest speaker for the banquet will be State Senator John T. Montford of Lubbock, Texas.

John T. Montford was first elected to the Texas State in November, 1982, taking office January 11, 1983. Prior to his service in the Texas Senate, Senator Montford was the Lubbock County Criminal District Attorney from 1979 through 1982. Senator Montford was in private law practice in Lubbock before holding public office.

Senator Montford is a Democrat and represents the 28th Senatorial District which consists of 14 counties occupying a vast expanse of the Texas South Plains and Permian Basin.

As a member of the Texas Senate, Senator Montford serves as Chairman of the Subcommittee on Water, Vice Chairman of the Senate Committee on Natural Resources, and a member of the Senate Finance Committee, Jurisprudence Committee, and the Economic

Development Committee. Senator Montford also serves as one of the ten members of the Legislative Budget Board which drafts the proposed state budget and presents those recommendations to the Legislature for approval. He also is a member of the Sunset Commission of Texas, the Texas Legislative Council, the Texas-Israel Exchange Program and is one of three Texans serving on the Western States Water Council.

Senator Montford is married to the former Debra Kay Mears of Friona, Texas. They have three children: Melinda, Melonie and John Ross.

Senator Montford attended the University of Texas at Austin where he received a Bachelor of Arts degree in 1965, and a Doctor of Jurisprudence from the University of Texas Law School in 1968. He also attended Northwestern University School of Law in Chicago.

I Corinthians 4:2 says, "Now it is required that those who have been given a trust must prove faithful", NIV.

My child seems unwilling to take responsibility for his books, his jacket, completing projects and doesn't seem to know how to follow through with assigned tasks. How do I correct this?

Answer:  
The irresponsible child can be retrained but it is easier to work with the young child before behavior

patterns are set.

1. Confront the irresponsible child, without anger. Tell him you see in him irresponsibility but you would like to help him. Tell him you have a plan that will help him.

2. Construct with the child a "ladder of do's" that will help him to experience satisfactory behavior.

3. Give bite-sized lessons or tasks and expect acceptable completion.

4. Reward with honest verbal praise.

**THE NUTRIENT AGE**

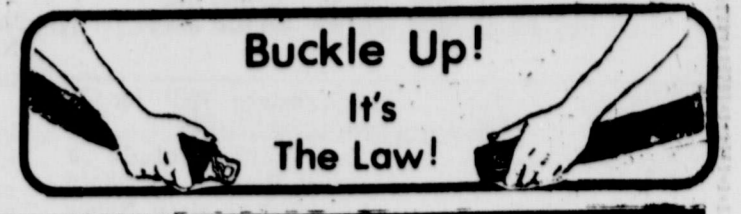

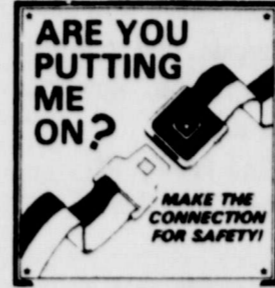

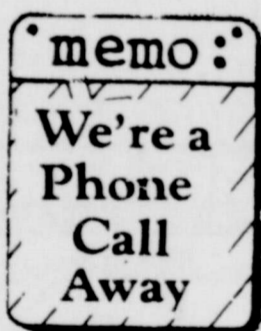

Vice-President John Nance Garner, known as "Cactus Jack,"  
Gave us the FDIC to protect depositors when bank money was gone,  
Had already retired to Uvalde which was his beloved home.  
Representative Sam Rayburn, gave us the Truth-in-Securities Act,  
The REA, the FCC, and was "Mr. Speaker" with tact.  
Senator Tom Connally gave the resolution for our nation to be in UNO,  
To promote unity among nations, and men wherever they would go.  
Senator W. Lee O'Daniel, known as "Pappy," left his aura  
As governor with his platform of the Ten Commandments,  
And his song, *Beautiful, Beautiful, Texas*, ringing in the land.  
Representative Lyndon Baines Johnson's day had not fully come,  
His wide expanse of civil rights as president, was yet to be done.  
Governor Coke R. Stevenson brought fiscal responsibility to the state,  
And through his legislation sought to make her great.  
A few lines cannot tell the greatness of the Lone Star State,  
Neither can one year on the calendar of time make her rate.  
Only in the mind, the heart, and the deeds of her people,  
Stretched across the years of history, recorded in time,  
Will we find her greatness this sesquicentennial, in the rhyme  
Of our state song, *Texas Our Texas*, "So wonderful! So great."
