# **Enrollment At CJC Will** Equal That Of 1985

An enrollment that will equal or exceed that of 1985 was in prospect as Cisco Junior College prepared to begin the new school year with enrollment Wednesday and Thursday and the first classes on Friday of this week. Enrollment on all campuses exceeded 1,600

last year. College officials reported Tuesdday that more that 300 students enrolled at Clyde campus this week, and this figure was a little higher than on opening day last year. At least 100 more students are expected to enroll at Clyde before the deadline next month.

There will be an all-school convocation at 10 a.m. Friday as the first event of first class day. Dr. John Muller, dean of student services, was in charge of the program, which will include welcome talks by Dr. Henry McCullough, college president, and Mayor Joe Wheatley of the City of Cisco.

Students will meet classes as scheduled throughout the day, it was announced.

Freshman students were on campus Monday and Tuesday to meet their faculty advisors and to complete their class schedules in preparation for formal enrollment Wednesday and Thursday.

The dormitories opened Sunday afternoon as some 50 students arrived to begin Wrangler Band practice. Thirty-three members of the Wrangler Belles also reported to begin work on their routines. The two groups are preparing for their first outing Sept. 6th in

# Boys Ranch To Open Near Cisco

A boys ranch for juvenile delinquents is being established here by two brothers from Weatherford. They are Mel and Wade Matthews.

The brothers are building log houses, two to be exact. One is to have about 3,600 square feet and the other about 5,000 square feet. The smaller one is nearing completion and will be able to house eight boys. The Mel Matthews family and boys are expected to move into the home in September. The smaller house will house eight boys while the larger one will accommodate up to 12 boys.

Boys, ages 12 to 16 who have been in trouble with the police and who have been referred to the Matthews brothers by the Texas Youth Commission are the ones that will be living on the ranch.

During their stay at the home, which is an average of six months, the boys will be on a rehabilitation program. Then they will be returned to their own homes.

With 525 acres of rugged terrain to roam, the boys will get a taste of cowboy life. They will be able to ride horses, tend cows, and even swim in the swimming hole nearby.

Boys that are assigned to Mel and Wade's care are being housed in Weatherford where Mr. and Mrs. J.O. Matthews, parents of Mel and Wade, have a boys ranch. The J.O. Matthews have been operating a boys ranch for the past eight years and are helping their sons get this one started. One of the boys is at the home for a second time, another says he likes riding the horses and going swimming, a third has been there for a month and another only about two

Mel and Wade purchased

the 525 acres from an Abilene man, Wayne Austin. They stated that they had been looking for a location for some time and Cisco is

Mel and his wife, Vera, plan to move into their log home in the next few weeks, but Wade and Belinda and their two daughters, Bar-bara 3 and Crystal 18 months, are looking for a place to rent until their log house is ready.

In these hard economic times, many Texans are looking for new ways to make money. My consumer protection attorneys tell me they are fraudulent activities.

#### WHAT A PYRAMID IS

A pyramid, or illegal multi-level distributorship, is defined by the Consumer Protection Act as a sales plan for goods or services in which people are promised payment based on recruitment of other persons to assume sales positions in the operation, and payment is not exclusively conditioned on proceeds from retail recruit other people into an organizasales of goods.

Many people find this definition confusing. Put more simply, an organization which promises you money based on how many people you bring in, or how many people are eventually brought in by the people you have recruited, is probably illegal. If you are promised money or other remuneration based upon how much a multi-level or pyramid organization, you and your recruits actually sell in or any other consumer problem, you goods or services, then the plan is may get help from the Attorney probably lawful.





# Bill and Paula Oxford **Restore Family Home**

A young woman who grew up in Eastland, Paula (Lund) Oxford, and her husband, Attorney William H. "Bill" Oxford of Stephenville have opened a beautifully restored Victorian home as a "Bed and Breakfast" Inn. A special "Open House" will be announced soon.

This two-story house, located at 563 North Graham in Stephenville, was built by Bill Oxford's grandfather, Judge W.J. Oxford, in 1898. Judge Oxford used the house as the family residence until after the death of his first wife, Elizabeth, in 1904. Later he married Lula Oxford, who died thirty days after the marriage.

The home was then used as a bank and later as a boarding house until Judge Oxford married Myrtle White in 1911. They lived in the home from 1920 until the Judge died in 1923, then she remained in the property until her death 40 years later in

Myrtle White Oxford will Bill Oxford's grandmother, and his father, W.J. Oxford Jr., grew up in the house. So preserving this charming old residence is much more than a business venture for the Bill Oxfords.

For several months the work of restoration occupied Bill and Paula Oxford, craftsmen they hired, and volunteer part-time workers such as Dr. and Mrs. Fehrman Lund of Eastland, Paula's parents. Add to that the inside wiring and outside construction work of Brian Lund of Fort Worth, and other special projects by family members.

The results are appealing, inside and out. The walls of the house are ice blue, trimmed in blue of a deeper shade. Screens around the numerous windows are trimmed in marcon."

The structure is all original, except for the posts around the porches. These had to be replaced. The stained glass and gingerbread trim, however, was in very good condition. The main floor has eight rooms, each featuring beaded ceilings and high carved wainscotting. The second floor has five bedrooms and a wide hallway which runs between the rooms and a balcony on the front.

Each room has distinctive period furnishings, although some of the pieces are not as old as the house. The living room, for example, has the white wicker furniture Dr. Lund found in his office at 204 Exchange Building when he bought his practice in Eastland in 1950. Mrs. Lund (Helen) and daughter Paula "restored" those pieces with coats of white paint.

A recent article in the Stephenville Empire-Tribune reprints some historical material columnist Autis McMahan gathered on the Oxford House. McMahan is quoted as saying that before the turn of the century and before he became Judge of the 29th Judicial District in 1900, Attorney W.J. Oxford Sr. won a lawsuit centered in the boomtown of Thurber and brought back to Stephenville #3,000 in silver in a buckboard for the purpose of building a house.

On the construction of the home, McMahan wrote: 'Made of cypress, it featured porches which reached three quarters around the home, which had hand-turned gingerbread trim, carved wooden ridgerows and a large cupola topped with a copper eagle weather vane."

The columnist added that in 1920, because of water damage, Judge Oxford had the cupola removed. He replaced it in a building, where it remained for several years before it disappeared. The Bill Oxfords have not restored the cupola at this time, although they

may do so later. The restoration of the house promises to mean a lot to the community as well as to travelers who want a special place to spend the night. For besides the owners offering "Bed and Breakfast", they plan to

keep the dining room open for special occasions, such as catered luncheons, birthday dinners, rehearsal dinners, bridal showers, and business meetings. This room will accomodate up to 30 guests, and is certain to be a favorite spot for the people of Stephenville.

The Oxfords, too, plan to spend a lot of time in the house, although they and their four children will con-

tinue to live in another home. Paula will assist the Manager of the Inn by baking homemade bread for breakfast, and by offering other personal touches.

All who have worked on the house agree that it has been a very rewarding experience. They hope Eastland County friends will stop by and enjoy the atmosphere of the place.



#### **Homemaking Hints**

The popular Rotation Diet, through which residents in many cities in the Soiuth and now in Texas hope to drop one million pounds may let dieters drop weight too fast.

The Texas Agricultural **Extension Service nutrionist** state that one of the problems with the Rotation Diet is that it claims you can lose up to a pound a day. Health professionals at the USDA recommend losing only one to two pounds a week. Dropping food intake to lose seven pounds a week threatens to disturb the dieter's nutritive balances.

To lose a pound, dieters must reduce their calorie intake by 600 calories each day for an entire week. This is 3,500 calories a week. So to lose seven pounds in a week the dieter would have to eliminate 24,500 calories from their weekly food intake.

The body needs a certain number of calories for basic metabolism. More calories are needed for work. Women usually need 1,800 - 2,000 calories a day and men about 2,700 depending on build and activity level.

The Rotation Diet drops calories for women to about 600 calories for the first three days, 900 calories for the next four days, then 1,200

for the next week and on the third week repeats calorie intake of week one. For men the diet contains 1,200 calories for the first three days, 1,500 calories for the next four days, and about 1,800 calories for the second week and then repeats week

A woman should not reduce calories below 1,200 a day unless under the regular care of a physician. Men are less vulnerable to nutrient deficiencies than women on weight control diets, since they are allowed more food, but weight loss should average only one to two pounds a week.

In general, the Rotation Diet menus for women are low in calcium, iron, some of the B Vitamins and in Vitamin A. For men, the menus are low in calcium and Vitamin A. Obtaining enough of the micronutrients on a low calorie diet is also a problem for both men and women.

When people go on crash diets, they may not only lose fat but protein as well and when weight is regained it is regained first as fat. Quick weight loss rarely has any permanent effect and often sends dieters into a cycle of quick weight loss and rebound weight gain when normal eating is resumed, and

# **Drivers Reminded of School Bus Safety Laws**

Last year in Texas there were 1,228 accidents involving school buses, with seven fatalities and 323 non-fatal injuries. Schools are about to open again, and drivers are once more being cautioned to be unusually attentive in and around school zones and school buses.

An increasing problem in recent years has been drivers who either ignored or were unaware of the law restricting vehicles from passing a school bus while the bus is loading or unloading children. Children often cross the street in front of the bus, and a car that's trying to pass may not see them coming.

The problem became so bad two years ago that the Texas Legislature considered requiring buses to have mechanical arms at the

driver's window that would extend into the traffic lane while the bus is stopped. At present, buses in Texas have flashing lights at the front and back of the vehicle when stopped, as well as signs noting that vehicles are required to stop for the buses.

To emphasize the importance of stopping for these buses, the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation has produced public service announcements with Texas singer-songwriter Jerry Jeff Walker as its spekesman.

Walker, the 44-year-old author of the classic, "Mr. Bojangles," believes in the message he offers in the television commercial.

'It's important to note that stopping for those flashing red lights is not just a courtesy, it's the law,"

# **Commissioner Court Approves Two More Voting Places To**

# Be Accessible To Handicapped

Eastland County Commissioners held a regular session in the Commissioner's Courtroom on Monday, Aug. 25. County Judge Scott Bailey presided, and County Clerk JoAnn Johnson recorded minutes. The Commissioners from all four Precincts were present.

The first item on the agenda was consideration of an ordinance for the closing of a 20 ft. alleyway (Norwood Addition) east of the Highway Department on the north side of East Main Street, Eastland.

This request was brought by Attorney Bill Hoffmann. Jr. on behalf of Bob and Lucille Carroll, who own property on both sides of the alleyway.

Hoffmann also requested that the title of the property revert to the Carrolls. The attorney stated that all proper legal procedure for the closing of the alley had been followed, such as the filing of a petition, and giving notice to all affected property

Judge Bailey asked those in the courtroom if there was anyone in opposition to this move. He noted that the Norwood Addition was set up in 1919, but was still out of the city. The alley had never opened and had never been used.

When no one stated opposition, the Commissioners voted to close the alleyway and relinquish the title to the Carrolls.

Jo Ann Johnson, County Clerk, then brought a request to the court that the commissioners consider bringing two voting precincts up to meet Federal Laws of Accessibility for the handicapped. These precincts, she said, were Ranger, at the Community Building in City Park; and Carbon, in the Homemaking Cottage at the school.

"The law does not allow the county to put permanent improvements on property it does not own," Mrs. Johnson said, "yet it is the court's responsibility to see that the voting places are accessible. Portable ramps have been suggested as the best solu-

Mrs. Johnson stated that the other eight election places in the county were already in compliance with the Federal Law.

The commissioners agreed to obtain equipment for the Ranger and Carbon polling places, and have a commissioner meet with local officials and get the equipment set up before Nov. 4 general election.

A Mr. Martin from the State Highway Dept. in Austin was supposed to meet with the commissioners and discuss maximum load limit signs for the county bridges. Since he did not appear, this discussion was tabled. One commissioners said that 19 bridges in the county needed to be posted.

Also deferred was consideration of the 1986 County Tax rate. Judge Bailey stated that the Commissioners Court would need to confer further with Steve Thomas before coming to a decision.

Rena Midkiff, from the County Auditor's office, brought further information about the Indigent Health Care plan, which will go into effect Sept. 1. She and Emma Morris, county auditor, and Jean White, Judge Bailey's secretary, have attended several seminars on this plan recently.

# October 1 Deadline For Pre-Registration For Cen-Tex Sale

Cattlemen have until Oct. 1 to preregister cattle for the Cen-Tex Stocker Feeder Sale to be held at the Milano Livestock Auction on Oct. 21.

Producers can preregister stock to be offered at the sale by contacting any Ralston Purina dealer in the Central Texas area or offices of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service in Bell, Burleson, Falls, Lee, Limestone, Milam and Robertson counties.

To preregister, cattlemen will need to pick up ear tags for calves to be sold in the special sale, says Norval Haile, Falls County Extension agent, who is assisting with sale arrangements. Yellow tags will be used on cattle that are to be preconditioned and red tags will be for non-preconditioned cattle. Producers must follow requirements for preconditioning as outlined on a preconditioning certificate which will be turned in on sale day.

All cattle to be sold at the special sale must be delivered to the Milano Livestock Auction by midnight Oct. 20. The sale will begin at 11 a.m. on Oct. 21.

According to Haile, all cattle must weigh between 300 and 600 pounds per head and will be sold in uniform graded lots of three to ten head. Cattle from different operations will not be co-mingled unless requested by producers. However, all cattle will be graded to insure uniformity on the basis of sex, breed, conformation and weight. Cattle that do not fit uniformly into the

group pattern will be sold individually at the end of the special sale.

"Through this special sale, we hope to bring together cow-calf producers with top quality calves and stocker cattle operators looking for topnotch animals to put on a fall and winter grazing program," says Haile.







# CISD Issues Policy Concerning Meals

The Cisco Independent School serves nutritious meals every school day. Students may buy lunch for \$1.00 and breakfast for 35 cents.

Children from families whose income falls within the level shown on the attached scale are eligible for either free meals or reduced-price meals priced at 40 cents for lunch and 30 cents for breakfast.

To apply for free or reduced-price meals, please fill out an application as soon as possible. Please answer all question on the form. An application which does not contain the following information cannot be processed by the school: (1) the total household income must be listed by the amount received by each household member receiving income and the type of income it is(such as wages, child support, etc.) or your food stamp case number if your household is on food stamps, (2) names of all household members, (3) social security numbers of all household members 21 years old or older or the word "None" for any household member who does not have a social security number, and (4) the signature of an adult household member.

Verification: The information on the application may be checked by the school or other officials at any time during the school year.

Reporting Changes: If your child is approved for meal benefits, you must tell the school when your household income increases by more than \$50 per month (\$600 per year) or when your household size decreases.

Reapplication: You may apply for benefits at any time during the school year. If you are not elibible now but have a decrease in household income, become unemployed, or have an increase in family size, fill out an application at that time.

Foster Children: If you have foster children living with you, they may be eligible for these benefits. If you wish to apply for these benefits for them, please contact the school and they will help you complete the application.

Nondiscrimination: Children who receive free or reduced-price meal benefits are treated the same as children who pay for meals. In the operation of child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, color, national origin, age, or handicap. If you believe you have been discriminated against, write immediately to the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D.C. 20250.

Fair Hearing: If you do not agree with the school's decision on your application or the result of verification, you may wish to discuss it with the school. You also have the right to a fair hearing. This can be done by calling or writing the following official: Ray Saunders, Superintendent, Box 1645, Cisco, 76437, Telephone 442-3056.

Confidentiality: The information you provide will be treated confidentially and will be used only for eligibility determinations and verification of data.

Help With Application: If you have any questions or need help in filling out the application form, please contact Brenda Jarrell, Counselor, at Cisco High School. You will be notified when the application is approved or denied.

# Drinking Age Will Raise Monday, September 1

On Sept. 1, the legal age for drinking alcoholic beverages in Texas will go from 19 to 21.

The Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission reminded Texans that the change will cover several laws.

Beginning Sept. 1, possession of an alcoholic beverage by a person under 21 will be a misdemeanor with a possible fine of \$25 to \$200.


Sale of alcoholic beverages to underage people is the most serious offense, the commission noted. The penalty for a first viola-

# Col. Jepson Speaks On **Emergency Management**

By Lela Latch Lloyd "Civil defense is obsolete," said Wayne Jepson to Cisco's AARP last Thursday evening at the Corral Room. "By the decree of the Disaster Act passed by the Texas Legislature in 1975, every town and city is required to have either a voluntary or paid Emergency Management. Cisco's is voluntary. Abilene's has one and one half paid workers in that area. I share my secretary half-time with another city official."

Some 75 members and guests listened as Col. Jepson said in part: "Although we cannot control tornadoes, hail storms, floods nor icing conditions, it is our job to be able to direct activities when those things hit. Especially when a crisis strikes such as the Sweetwater tornado or the Abilene flood of some 4 years ago. We went in person, knocked on doors, and warned the people the flood was coming and asked them to leave their homes. Even then, some would not believe and we had to evacuate some 600 in boats. It was my job to have a place of shelter for them with dry clothes and hot food. Depending on the location, we usually use


