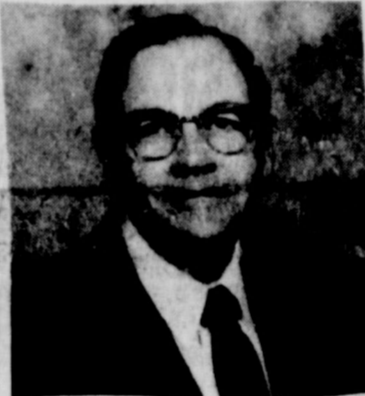
Area Gets 5" of Rain

Lake Cisco had caught some two feet of new water and was still gaining Tuesday after this region received approximately five inches of rain from Friday, Oct. 3, through Monday, according to reports by city officials and north shore residents of the lake.

Lake Bernie, which is connected by a creek to Lake Cisco, was full and running over into the creek, and the pumps at Battle Creek were in operation, sending approximately one million gallons of water per day to Lake Cisco, City Manager Mike Moore reported.

The rainfall was general over West Central Texas as well as Eastland County. Eastland reported 4.2 inches, Ranger 4.5 inches, Baird 8.4 inches, and Moran 9.3 inches. The area south of Cisco received some five inches.

Lela Lloyd's book, "Cisco: Cradle of Hilton's Empire," will be reviewed Tuesday, Oct. 14, at 7 p.m. in the First United Methodist Church Fellowship Hall.

The review is sponsored by Singles and Doubles Sunday School classes and refreshments will be served following the book review.

Gordon reported that the rain would be helpful to Eastland County peanut acreage that was planted late. He did not believe the rain would damage peanuts now in harvest, particularly if good weather prevails the next week or two.

Mr. Gordon said the county has prospects for the best peanut crop since 1981. Dry land peanuts are particularly good, he added. Peanuts planted on irrigated land have been somewhat disappointing, the county agent said.

The cooler weather will halt the spread of southern blight in the peanut fields, Mr. Gordon said. He

reported that this has been a problem recently in some county areas.

Small grains and dry pastures will benefit materially, according to the county agent. Most landowners had completed planting small grains before the rains came. The moisture will enable the pastures to "green up" for winter grazing.

Mr. Gordon said the past weekend's rainfall was the first of significance in the county since last June 5th. July rain gauges register 1.8 inches, and less than an inch fell during August and September.

The rain was too late to

benefit the pecan crop as trees have already started shelling, Mr. Gordon said. The 1986 crop will be short. The pecans, however, are of good quality, he added. Prices are expected to be at least as high as last year as the Texas crop forecast calls for 40 per cent of normal.

Forecasters called for "a good chance" of more rain this week. Temperatures dropped into the mid-50s at night and in the upper 60s and low 70s during daytime over the weekend.

Police Chief Billy Rains reported that West 9th Street at Avenue M and Beech Street were the only "high water" problems in Cisco.

Cisco Police Search For Vandals That Destroyed Equipment

Cisco police are searching for vandals who damaged several tractors and vehicles used by Fred Keith Construction Company in telephone line cable burying work last Wednesday night, according to Chief Billy Rains.

The equipment was parked between Avenues F and H in the West 9th Street area,

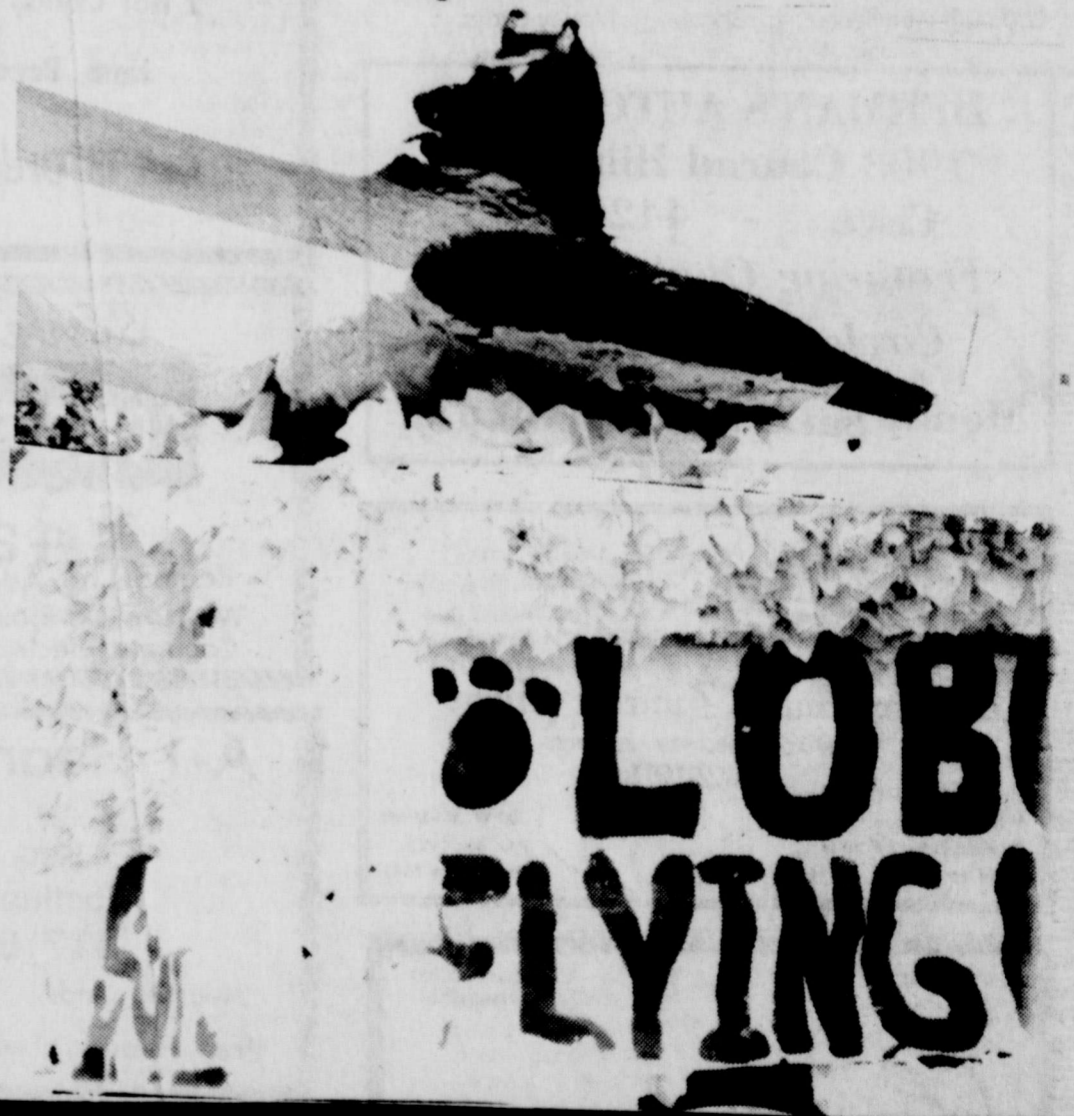
Mr. Rains said. The vandalism took place between Tuesday night and Wednesday morning, he added. Damages were estimated at \$129.

A sharp instrument was used to make holes in fuel filters and electric wiring. The damaged filter allowed hydraulic fluid to drain from the machines. Mr. Rains

said an investigation is underway "and we have some suspects."

A local man paid a \$69 fine Monday on a charge of Class C misdemeanor in a reported window breaking incident at a residence. Another man paid a \$63 fine for passing a hot check at Coleman.

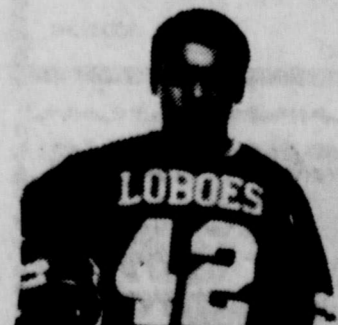
Over-All Float Winner Cisco Sophomore Class

October School Attendance Is Critical in Cisco School For State Monies

Local school students and parents have a unique opportunity during the month of October to provide maximum financial support to the local Independent School District.

Students may do this at no cost to themselves - providing only their bodies in a classroom. This goal may be achieved simply by assuring that each student attends school each day during the period of Oct. 6 through Oct. 30.

"State funding for the 1986-87 school year will be based on average student attendance during the first four weeks in October," said a local school official. "The district will receive state support in the amount of \$1,465 per student for the average number of students who attend school Oct. 6-30.

"Conversely, the district will lose a minimum of \$73.25 per day for each student absence during this enrollment period."

The official roll call at each school will be held at 10 a.m. Parents who have medical, dental or other appointments that require the presence of their children are encouraged to make those appointments after 10 a.m. on school days, and to have students attend school until 10 a.m.

"Each effort will create a financial advantage of \$73.25 for the school district and will have the effect of local tax requirements by that amount. Regular school attendance is always important for the student, but it also becomes important for the taxpayer during October."

Each of the school campuses will have special activities to promote high attendance during the month. Patrons of the local ISD are encouraged to join with the personnel of the school district in effort to assure maximum attendance.

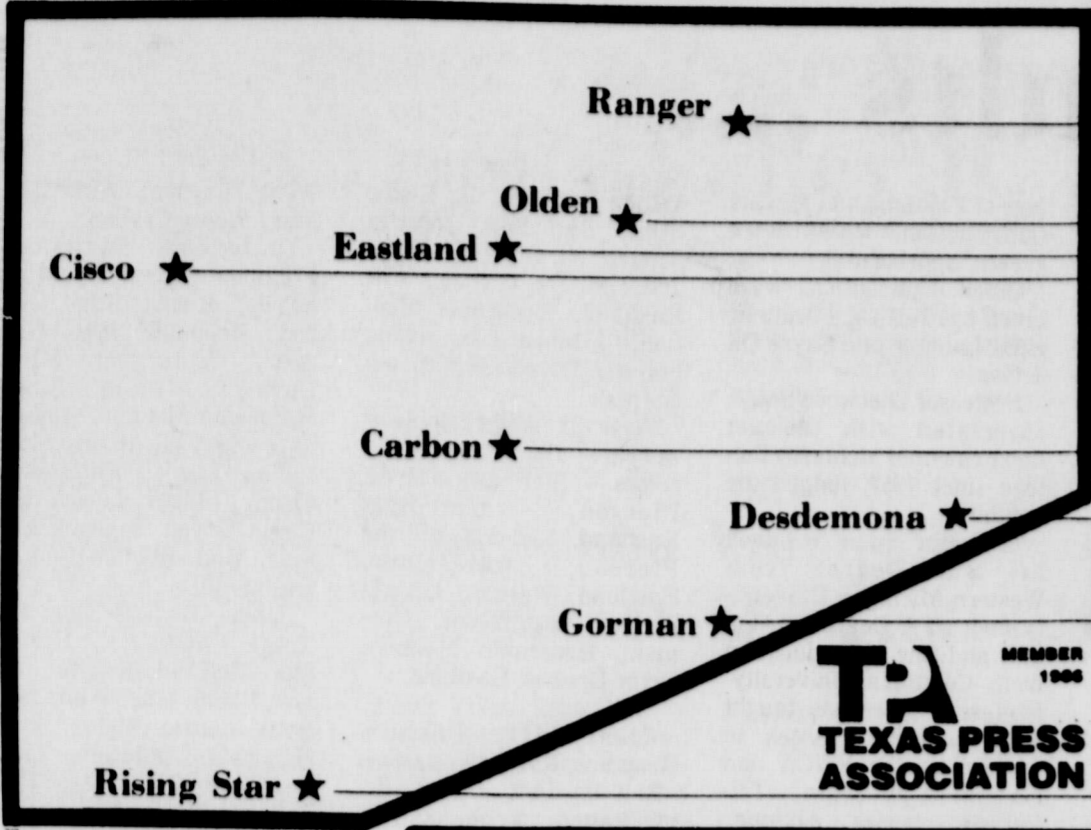

EASTLAND

Two County Youths Selected To Attend NYL Conference

Two Eastland County young men have been selected to represent their school, city, county and state as Congressional Scholar in the National Young Leaders Conference to be held in Washington, D.C. this fall. Billy Grumbles and Dean Ishmael, seniors at Ranger High School will be traveling to our nation's capitol city this fall as Congressional Scholars.

These two students are ranked 1 and 2 in their class and Ismael serves as Student Body President at R.H.S. Both are members of the R.H.S. Bulldog football team.

During their 6 day stay in Washington Congressional Scholars will be given a tour of the city, see the white house, the Pentagon, the President's cabinet, Air and Space Museum, and other historical sites. The Congressional Youth Leadership Council is a privately funded, non-profit, non-political organization guided by a bipartisan honorary board of 185 U.S. Senators and Representatives and directed by a staff of professional educators. The goal of the C.Y.L.C. is to allow a select group of exceptional high school students the opportunity to witness history in the making; to meet the leaders who fundamentally affect the workings of the government; and to bring to life the American Constitutional process.

The National Young Leaders Conference is an outgrowth of the highly ac-

claimed election '84 Youth Inaugural Conference, which brought young leaders from 181 schools and 41 states to Washington to experience the Presidential Inauguration in an educational and civic context.

During a meeting of the Eastland County Fraternal Order of Police, Grumbles and Ishmael explained that the school paid for the housing, meals, tuition, admissions and transportation while in Washington, D.C. But they must pay for their own air fare to and from Washington plus any other expenses.

They asked the F.O.P. for any assistance the organization might offer. President John Mackey informed the two that the F.O.P. would make a donation of \$125.00 to their expense fund that will be established this week at 1st State Bank in Ranger.

Heavy Rains Fall In Eastland County Area Recently

Rains totaling 3 to 5 inches fell across Eastland County from Sat., Oct. 4 through Monday, according to reports across the area. This is the first time since June 5 the county has had more than 1 inch in one day, County Agent DeMarquis Gordon says.

It took the combination of moisture from a hurricane and a cold front from the Panhandle to finally drive the rain into the county.

Much heavier rains had been falling for several days from Abilene to the west, and for awhile it looked like Eastland County might be left completely out of the picture. High winds and temperatures up to 90 had left the vegetation here extremely dry.

The heaviest rain, 5 inches, fell west of Cisco and around Lake Cisco, which caught a small amount of water. The town of Cisco reported between 4 to 5 inches, the largest total for that vicinity in some time.

South of town the rainfall was reported around 3.2 in a wide area. Union Center, north of Rising Star, received 4 inches, as did most of the Nimrod area.

The totals in Eastland through the three-day period were 3.08, according to Ron Bailey of the Soil Conservation Service. Jesse White, Superintendent of the Eastland County Water District Plant, reported 3.3 inches at this location south of Ranger. The town of Ranger caught 4 inches, as did most of the country around it.

White also said that Lake Leon caught .2 of water from the rains, most of this from the North Fork of the Leon River. Lake Leon has held its water very well this year, he says, in spite of the hot weather. It now stands at 1.5 ft. below the spillway.

Although the Lakes could stand more runoff, especially Lake Cisco, the land was helped by the slow way in which the rains fell. It came

in a combination of soaking showers, and stayed in the ground. Small grains that had been dry planted now had a chance to come up and make a crop. Ranchers were happy about the prospects of some fresh grass in the pastures before frost.

County Agent Gordon says

that peanut production that is ready to harvest might be hurt if the damp weather continues. The cool weather, however, has helped the disease problem in the late maturing peanuts.

At press time Tuesday it appeared that the clouds and mist were breaking away for several days of sunshine.

October 5-11 is National 4-H Week. This week has been set aside for the purpose of publicizing and promoting 4-H throughout the nation.

Some of you may ask, "Just what is 4-H? What's it all about?" Well, 4-H is an exciting youth program that helps young people learn how to do new and interesting things through learn by doing projects.

There is no membership fee, but each member is usually responsible for financing his or her own projects. 4-H is the youth phase of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. 4-H is also a non-profit, educational program which is open to all youth regardless of race, color, religion, or national origin.

Boys and girls 9-19 take part in 4-H by joining a 4-H Club. A 4-H Club is a group of boys and girls who participate in 4-H projects, run their own club, elect officers, and develop their own program with the help of adult volunteer leaders. Improv-

ing leadership and citizenship are two of the greatest benefits of 4-H club membership. Above all, 4-H is educational. 4-H explores everything from rabbits to rockets, from canning to camping, from square-dancing to veterinary science.

To me, the most important aspect of 4-H is that 4-H brings the family together. 4-H involves the family in fun and in work. Members select and conduct their projects with the approval and support of parents. Parents provide encouragement and much of the resources needed by the 4-H'ers for project work.

The 4-H'ers represent the 4-square development of: Head to help you learn new and better ways of doing things - Heart to help you develop ideals and standards for living in society - Hands to give you the opportunity to develop useful skills and to apply them - Health to help you develop habits of good health.

Learn Microwave Cooking At Home

A home study course containing information and experiments to help you learn about microwaving with your own oven is now available from the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, says Eastland County Home Economist Janet Thomas.

"Research studies show that most people use their microwave ovens for simply reheating and defrosting foods, rather than actually cooking," she says. "So we're offering this course for people who want to get full cooking use out of their investment in a microwave."

Participants in previous Extension home study courses have reported significant changes in the way they use their microwave ovens after completing the course, she adds.

The course contains eight lessons for you to complete at your own pace. The first three lessons include information on the oven, accessories and utensils; factors that influence cooking, reheating and defrosting times; and meal planning and recipe conversions, says Mrs. Thomas.

The remaining five lessons cover microwaving breads and cereals; dairy products; vegetables and fruits; meats; jam, jelly and candy, as well as foods for children to cook. Although these five lessons follow a logical progression, each can stand alone so you can do them in a different order or skip over some, she notes.

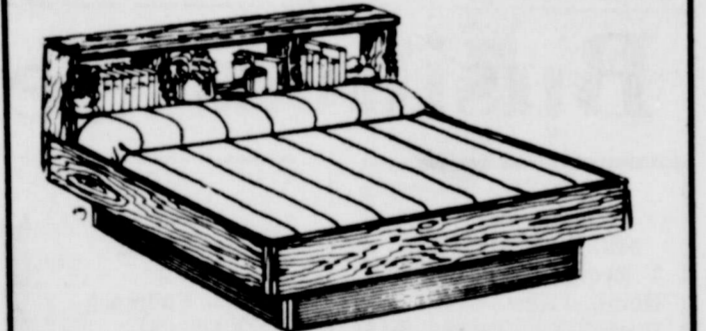

ANSWER - The VA does provide a headstone or marker without charge. However, the cost of placing the marker in a private cemetery must be borne by the family.

QUESTION - What is a Presidential Memorial Certificate? ANSWER - A Presidential Memorial Certificate expresses the country's grateful recognition of an individual's service in the armed forces and bears the signature of the President.

These certificates are made available to the next of kin of deceased eligible veterans or to persons who are on active military duty at time of death. Next of kin need not apply for a certificate. Relatives or friends are asked to make application at any VA regional office.

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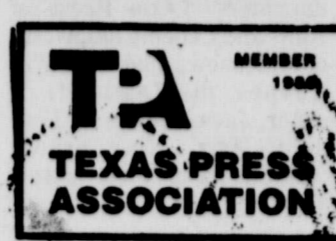

Cross Safety Week 13-19

"There's just no doubt about the outcome when a 12 million pound train hits a 3,000 pound car or truck straddling a railroad grade crossing. The train can't swerve or stop on a dime; the road vehicle loses the contest, too often with tragic, fatal results for the driver and passengers." R.J. Stutes emphasized this reality of rail and highway safety when announcing the date of Texas Railroad Grade Crossing Safety Week October 13-19, 1986.

As Chairman of Texas Operation Lifesaver, Stutes was part of the public signing of a proclamation designating the week in Texas by Governor Mark White on September 18. The proclamation reads, in part, "...prevention of these accidents is a shared responsibility... although Texas experienced an encouraging decline in train-auto accidents in 1985 as compared to 1980... public awareness must continue in order to reduce these tragic numbers even further."

"With 14,000 miles of track, Texas has the largest number of crossings in the U.S. This exposure also has brought the highest number of grade crossing accidents in the United States. Opera-

tion Lifesaver has helped in an encouraging reduction in these accidents. There were 1,196 train-motor vehicle accidents in the state in 1980, but only 648 in 1985," noted Stutes.

Operation Lifesaver is a public awareness program operating in 49 states and administered in Texas through the Railroad Transportation Section of Texas Safety Association. Texas railroads support and fund the Operation Lifesaver program. Their lifesaver message reaches Texas residents through a speakers bureau of railroad personnel who visit schools, civic groups, shopping malls, and fairs.

This August a special train, the "Lone Star Limited," rolled through Texas for three days to communicate Operation Lifesaver information during its "whistle stop" tour. Its engine-mounted camera broadcast the engineer's view to monitors in every car of the train so that its law enforcement, municipal, and civic leader passengers observed grade crossings and "close calls" all along the route.

Texas railroads adopted the Operation Lifesaver program in 1977. The program is supported in Texas by state officials and rail labor.

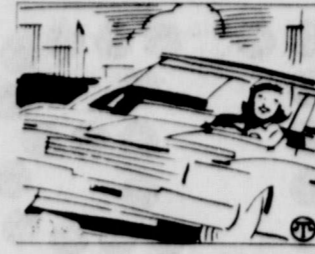

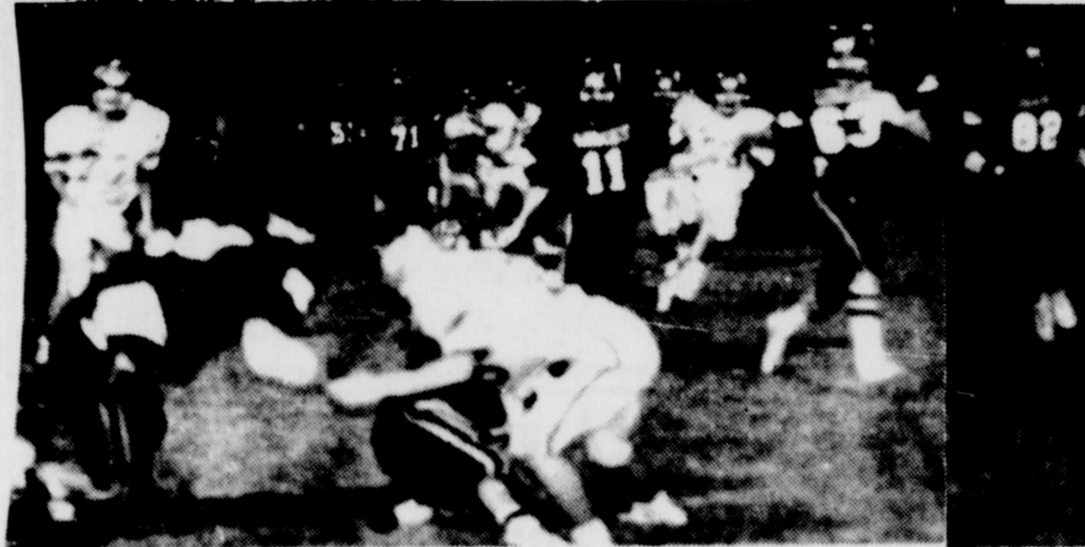

ROLE MODELS

My sympathies are with the kids, but it does not necessarily follow that my approval is with all their activities.

It is not hard for me to appreciate the titled reasoning behind some of the youngsters' stunts that inspire adult reactions of "Crazy kids!"

Aside from my own feelings about many things that pass for teenage amusement now, I can't say adults set very good examples in many instances.

Sunday's Ft. Worth paper prompts this line of thought.

A half-page editorial, titled "When law gets ground under political whim," cites Article 3, Section 19, of the Texas Constitution.

This section spells out that no judge in or out of Texas is eligible for the Texas Legislature while he's drawing money for judicial office. The language is not that simple, but that is what it says.

When one of the good ol' boys is allowed to file, despite the fact that he is a current judge and ineligible to do so, wins, and is sworn into office, what is a young'un to think?

Indeed, yes. Yes, opinions were sought, appealed and overturned when adverse (though legal) to the cause of the judge-cum-legislator. As a sop, he, the winner, promised he wouldn't be sworn in until after January 1, 1987, which was after his term as a judge had expired.

As are many election promises, this was so much hot air. He was sworn in at the second special session this year.

A teenager, and anyone else, could ask how much allegiance is owed to a Senate willing to seat as a fellow law-maker a man who filed for the office, though clearly ineligible under the Constitution, who won an election in which he was not legally a contestant—well, no doubt, the voters of that district have exactly the kind of representative they want. There were three other fellows who wanted the office, too. It wasn't that the voters didn't have a choice.

In the same issue of the paper it is reported that before the U.S. Supreme Court is an appeal from a heroin dealer who claims he was "convicted by a biased jury." Described as a "key link in a U.S. - Mexico drug ring," the black defendant got to the Supreme Court because he was convicted by an "all-white jury."

This appeal, in my opinion, a cop-out at the expense of all decent, law-abiding people of whatever color, and it is a very low blow to all black people. It says, in effect, that the black citizens who might have been on that jury, would not have found him guilty just because he was black. It says that black jurists would vote color before the merits of the case.

I don't believe it. I do believe that some cases in the courts fall through the cracks for various reasons and that the rights of the individual should be safeguarded.

I also believe that you have to pay the piper if you dance.

For that same reason, I resent the cost of the appeal to the Supreme Court by a person who contends police officers should not have zeroed in on him at Houston International Airport just because he "appeared nervous." Cocaine was in his pocket and "drugs" were found in his luggage. He had a police record known to the arresting officer.

What message does this send to young people?

Wouldn't the public have had a case of dereliction of duty against the officers if they had not picked up the "nervous" guy? If he'd been straight, he wouldn't have been nervous.

Unfortunately, the demarcation between "Right" and "Wrong" seems to become less clear year by year, and why is that?

It is asking a great deal of a youngster to warm his hands in his windbreaker while most of the kids are playing with fire.

However, Piaget, a man of repute in educational circles, came up with a formula which boils down to "Monkey see; monkey do." Which offers more guidance: "That's wrong!" or a tolerant, "Heh, heh, heh! Crazy Kids!"

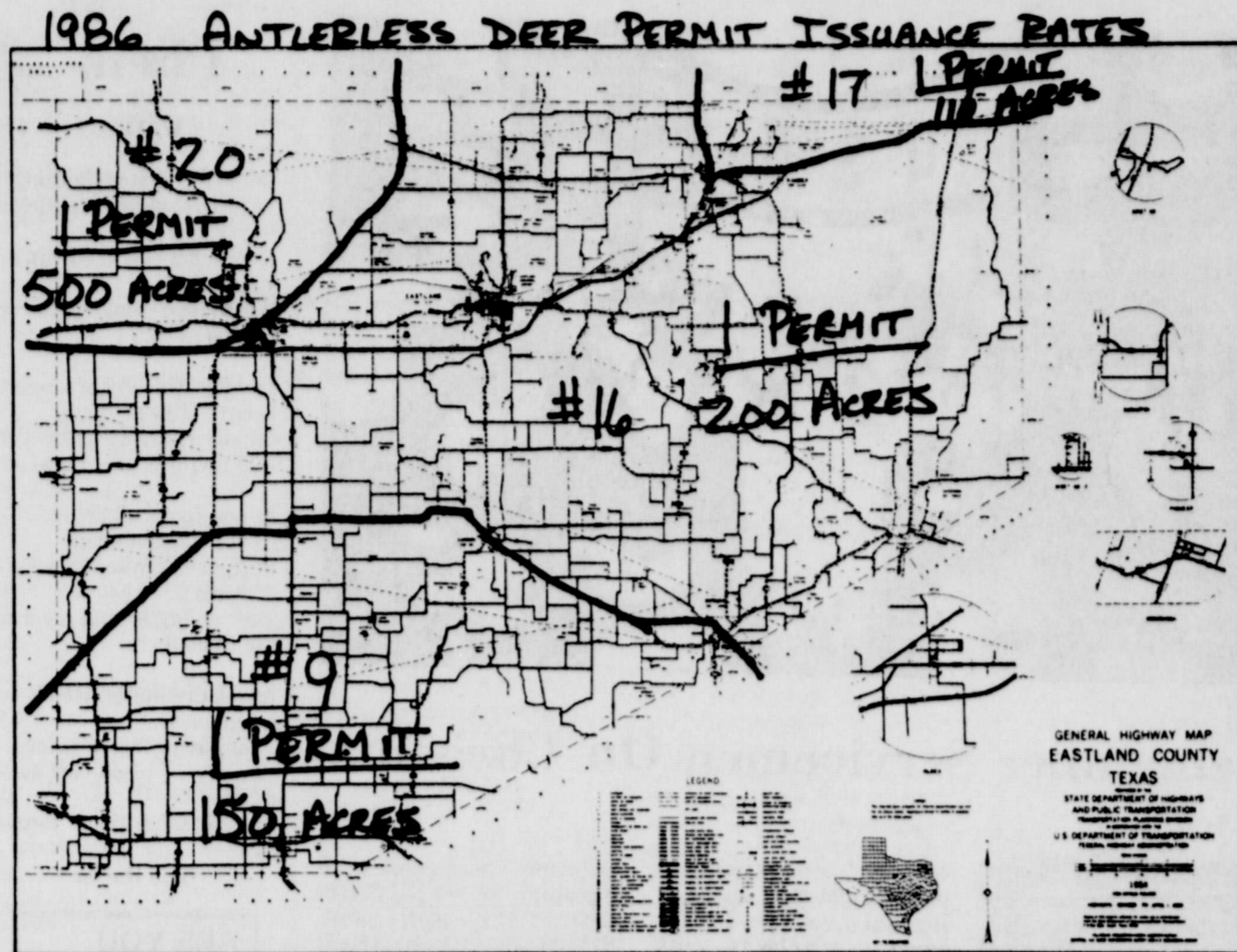

Cancer Treatment Needs

Test For Effectiveness

Cancer therapy could be greatly improved if there was a test to determine a patient's response to particular anticancer drugs, according to the September issue of Texas Medicine.

Such a test would allow physicians to use the most effective chemotherapy drugs and avoid undesirable side effects of ineffective ones, write Dr. Daniel D. Von Hoff and Barbara Forseth, both with the department of medicine, division of oncology, The University of Texas Health Science Center at San Antonio and the Cancer Therapy and Research Center of South Texas.

The most recent test to predict a patient's sensitivity to anticancer drugs is the human tumor cloning system (HTCS), according to the article in the scientific journal of the Texas Medical Association. "This test has

been successful in predicting the response of the patient's tumor to a particular anticancer agent 56 to 84 percent of the time and can predict nonresponse 76 to 100 percent of the time," write the authors.

The article notes that while the HTCS appears promising, it has two problems that prevent it from becoming a routine procedure in treating cancer patients. Some patient's tumors do not form "colonies". Second, not enough random tests have been performed to prove that the HTCS is a more effective way of choosing an anticancer drug compared to a physician's selection of one based on diagnosis of the patient.

They add that when studies on these two problem areas are complete, the role of the HTCS in caring for cancer patients should be more clearly defined.

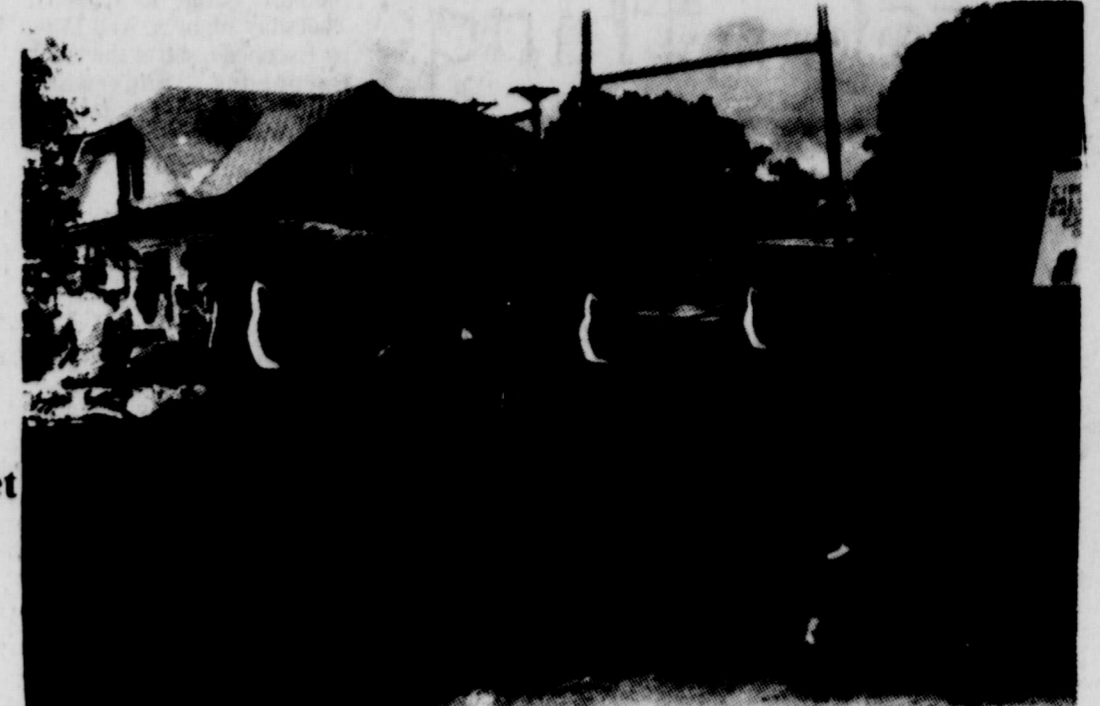
Rules and regulations for the operation of the Farmers Market were approved and a board of directors was elected.

Eastland County Parade Cancelled Till Oct.- 1987

Welcome Early October rains cancelled the Giant Eastland Chamber of Commerce Parade for the first time in history this past weekend.

Showers that began Friday came in earnest Saturday morning and dampened beautiful floats, polished riding gear, flags, pretty dresses, hairdos and the parade spirit in general, causing the cancellation of the scheduled 10 a.m. step-off of the looked-for event.

In a called meeting Monday morning, Chamber of Commerce officials decided that because of confusion and conflicts in so many areas, that it would be better to cancel the parade completely this year, and begin

immediately toward planning the 1987 edition.

Chamber officials expressed regret and will forward these in letters to participants for the cancellation, explaining that weather conditions are the one thing over which there is no control.

It is a shame that so many people had worked so hard to help bring about the Parade and not be able to march off and compete for the trophies which were waiting to be claimed.

Those participants who still have un-soaked entries are urged to enter them into area parades so that all efforts won't be lost. (A parade is scheduled Saturday in Comanche.)

The Eastland High School Band will be in marching contest Saturday in Abilene, and there are so many other conflicts that it was deemed wise to cancel the 1986 edi-

tion in an effort to maintain the integrity of the Eastland parade for years to come.

Date for the Chamber of Commerce Parade will be Oct. 3, 1987, and Parade Chairman Sam Beggs Jr. expressed his appreciation to all who had worked so faithfully to help make this year's Parade a success.

"You just can't have a parade in the rain," he said, "and we regret that we couldn't have the parade, but we think most people will understand and look forward to next year."

There will be consideration given to planning a rain date for next year in the event that rains come again.

However it was decided that staying with the "first

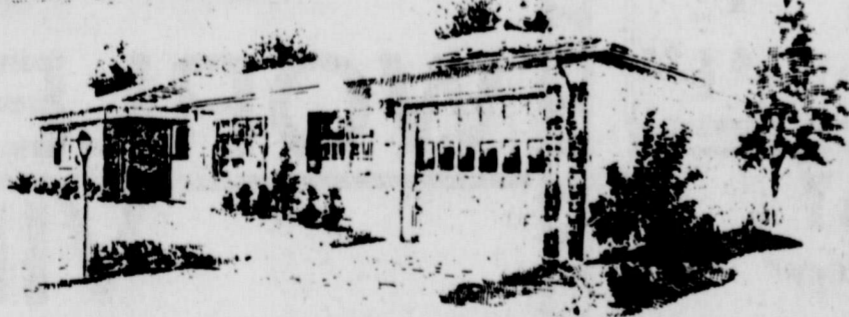
Saturday" is the best plan so that everyone near and far can plan in that direction.

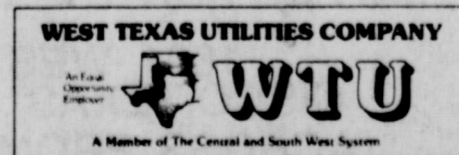
