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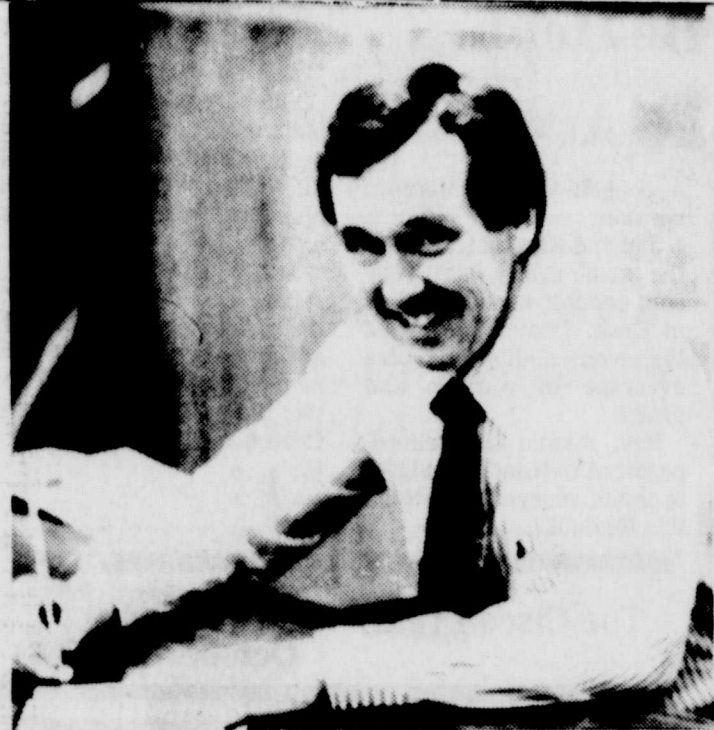

Wayne White Is Weekly Teacher

Today's feature story is about a very versatile, dynamic individual, Mr. Wayne White, the Cisco Lobo Band Director.

William Wayne White was born in 1946 to Mr. and Mrs. G. T. White of Gunsight, Texas. Mr. White's father was involved in farming as well as the oil field industry while his mother was a secretary and bookkeeper to Mr. A. Z. Myrick, owner of the Cisco Locker Plant.

Wayne attended public schools in Breckenridge and Cisco and graduated from Breckenridge High in 1964. While attending Breckenridge High, Wayne was involved in Buckaroo Band, the school's debate team, stage band and the famous community's boys' choir. The group of boys was invited to perform for the

New York World's Fair in 1963. Also, an interesting event that happened to Wayne while attending high school was that Wayne and the Boys' Choir were invited to the White House to sing for President Kennedy in 1972. Because Wayne had met President Kennedy in 1962 at the White House, the events of one year later on November 22, 1963, really stunned Wayne as he heard of the assassination in Dallas. The next day, Wayne quit his job, and he and another boy of Breckenridge drove in Dallas to see what had happened at the Texas Book Depository. Wayne remembers upon entering the Book Depository one day after the events of November 22, the person guarding the building left his

Gramm Announces \$13.2 Million For Cisco Housing

U.S. Senator Phil Gramm has announced the award of a series of Comprehensive Improvements Assistance Program contracts totalling \$13.2 million to 51 Texas cities.

A total of \$129,901 has been earmarked for the Housing Authority of the City of Cisco.

The CIAP is a program of the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Develop-

ment.

The contract obligates the federal government, through annual contributions, to pay the principal and interest on project notes sold by the local housing authorities over a period of 20 years.

The funds will be used to physically modernize and upgrade management of low-income housing units.

"I am pleased that, once

again, we have been able to return some of the money Texans have paid in federal taxes to make permanent improvements that will directly benefit Texans," Gramm said in announcing the program.

Each loan is subject of field office approval of the final application by the local housing authority.

The Dean Drug Co has been in business for 77 years. It is the second oldest drugstore in the state of Texas under the same family ownership.

Owners are Lloyd and Betty McGrew. The organization began with Mrs. McGrew's grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. T.J. Dean. The Deans moved to Cisco from Big Spring in 1909 to join

Floyd Jones in operating the Dean Drug store. A few years later, Dean bought out Jones' interest in the store. The Dean's had one daughter, Elizabeth, who was Betty's mother.

Elizabeth married Ernest Lennon in June, 1930, and they bought the interest to the store in 1945. They had

one daughter, Betty. She was born and raised in Cisco and graduated from Cisco High School and attended Cisco Junior College for one year. She received a A BS degree in pharmacy from the University of Texas.

Lloyd McGrew is a native of Ponca City, Oklahoma. He came to Cisco in 1949 to attend Cisco Junior College. He is a veteran of World War II, having served in the Air

Force. McGrew is a private pilot and flies his own plane.

Lloyd tapes the Cisco Lobo Football games each week for the high school along with Al Anderson.

Lloyd and Betty were married soon after graduating from college. McGrew spent three years as a salesman for a pharmaceutical house before buying an interest in

Cisco's Fall Farmer's Market

Cisco has a new business that was scheduled to begin Saturday. The Farmer's Market was scheduled to open at 8 a.m. Saturday, October 11, at the corner of Conrad Hilton and 13th Street.

Farmers and gardeners who live in a 50-mile radius were expected to sell their products in the market, said

Harold Rich, a member of the market's board of directors.

There is a charge of \$10 a year to join the Farmers Market, Rich said. First-day stall fees are included in the membership. Non-producers who want to support the market may become non-voting associate members for \$10 per year.

The fall market will continue every Saturday morning as long as there is produce to sell, he said.

Stall fees per day will be \$6 for commercial farmers and \$3 for home gardeners.

The Board of Directors will be at the market Saturday to collect fees and distribute membership applications.

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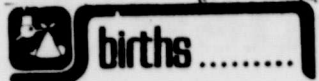

Plans now are underway for a Wrangler Belle and

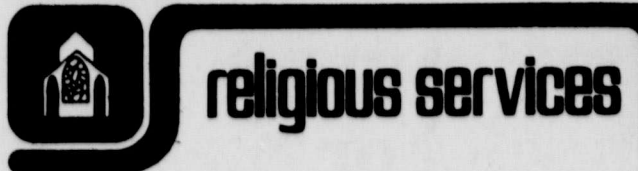

Project Explore In Second Year

Project Explore, a counseling program designed primarily to help high school students explore college and career opportunities, is beginning its second year of operation at Ranger Jr. College.

---helping students apply for admission, housing and financial aid

---assisting in enrollment in GED or adult education programs

---referring students to community agencies and resources.

Along with working individually with students, the counselors are available for parent conferences and to present workshops.

October School Attendance Is Critical in Cisco School For State Monies

Local school students and parents have a unique opportunity during the month of October to provide maximum financial support to the local Independent School District.

Students may do this at no cost to themselves - providing only their bodies in a classroom. This goal may be achieved simply by assuring that each student attends school each day during the period of Oct. 6 through Oct. 30.

"State funding for the 1986-87 school year will be based on average student attendance during the first four weeks in October," said a local school official. "The district will receive state support in the amount of \$1,465 per student for the average number of students who attend school Oct. 6-30.

"Conversely, the district will lose a minimum of \$73.25 per day for each student absence during this enrollment period."

The official roll call at each school will be held at 10 a.m. Parents who have medical, dental or other appointments that require the presence of their children are encouraged to make those appointments after 10 a.m. on school days, and to have students attend school until 10 a.m.

"Each effort will create a financial advantage of \$73.25 for the school district and will have the effect of local tax requirements by that amount. Regular school attendance is always important for the student, but it also becomes important for the taxpayer during October."

Each of the school campuses will have special activities to promote high attendance during the month. Patrons of the local ISD are encouraged to join with the personnel of the school district in effort to assure maximum attendance.

Sam Rayburn Reservoir in East Texas was the most productive bass tournament lake in the state during 1985, according to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

The department conducts a voluntary bass tournament survey each year, in cooperation with bass clubs across the state.

Rayburn anglers enjoyed a 77 percent success rate, and more than 17 percent caught their tournament limit.

Second place lake Amistad, had an increase in percent success, bass per fisherman and hours per trophy bass.

The largest bass caught during a reported tourney in 1985 was a 12 pound five ounce fish from Lake Murraul in East Texas. Falcon had the next largest a 10-15 and a 10-13.

Lake reports: Proctor 6" above full; black bass slow on topwater, worms and gold rattle-traps; catfish good on

shad, hybrid stripers slow.

Brownwood: water murky 8" high; black bass fair on spinners and worms; striper fair 3-5 pounds on half ounce roadrunner jigs; catfish fair.

Whitney: Water clear; 4 inches above normal; black bass good to 5 pounds on purple worms, jellow jigs, stripers slow, crappie fair on minnows.

Conroe: Water clear, 1 foot low, bass very good to 7 $\frac{1}{4}$ pounds on smoke worms, purple worms and black lizards in 5-15 feet of water, catfish excellent.

Possum Kingdom: Lake full, fresh water coming down, black bass fair to 4 pounds on plastic worms and top water striper fair, crappie good on minnows, catfish fair to 3 pounds on minnows.

Hubbard Creek: 8 feet low, black bass fair to 3 pounds on purple or black worms and white spinners, hybrid striper slow, crappie excellent on minnows. Catfish slow.

Leon: Water off colored, black bass fair to 3 pounds on top water and spots, catfish excellent in river section, crappie fair most small in size.

Bullock Urges Businesses

To Plan Ahead

AUSTIN - State Comptroller Bob Bullock Tuesday urged Texas businesses to plan ahead to avoid year-end confusion over the state's new sales and gasoline tax rates.

"Consumers won't see the increased taxes until January 1, when they go into effect, but businesses have to get ready for it in advance," Bullock said.

A special session of the Texas Legislature has raised the state's sales tax rate on one and one-eighth percent and added a nickle a gallon to the state's gasoline tax.

"Many cash registers will have to be reprogrammed and employees will have to be trained to handle the new taxes," Bullock said. He said the end of the year is normally busy for many businesses and the tax changes can add to the workload unless businesses plan for it.

"My office will be contacting taxpayers and will be sending new rate cards and

updated information on these state tax changes," Bullock said.

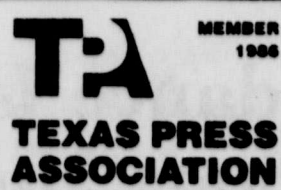
"I want to remind companies that only the rate and not what is taxed has been changed," he said.

The new tax law will increase the state sales tax rate to 5.25 percent and bring motor fuels taxes to 15 cents a gallon. Optional local sales tax will mean even higher rates in most areas of Texas.

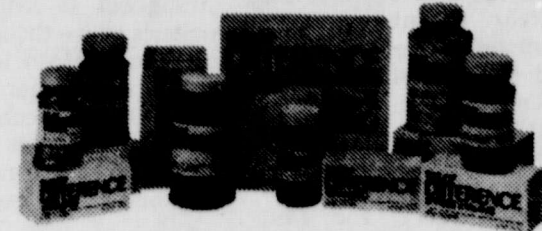
Revival To Be Held At Olden Baptist Church

WACO-The Texas Farm Bureau has urged members of the Texas Congressional delegation to vote "no" on the Tax Reform Act of 1986.

The Board of Directors for the state's largest general farm organization contacted Texas Congressmen this week asking them to vote "no" on the final conference report, which is expected to come to a floor vote soon.

"It is our best judgment that the tax reform bill, in its present form, is not in the best interests of Texas

agriculture," TFB President S.M. True wrote in his telegram to the Congressmen.

"Elimination of capital gains and income averaging and the reduction in investment tax credit carry-forwards offset any gains that would accrue to farmers and ranchers by lower tax rates," True said.

According to Vernie Glasson, TFB public affairs director, tax reform could turn out to be a trap in the long run. "The idea of the

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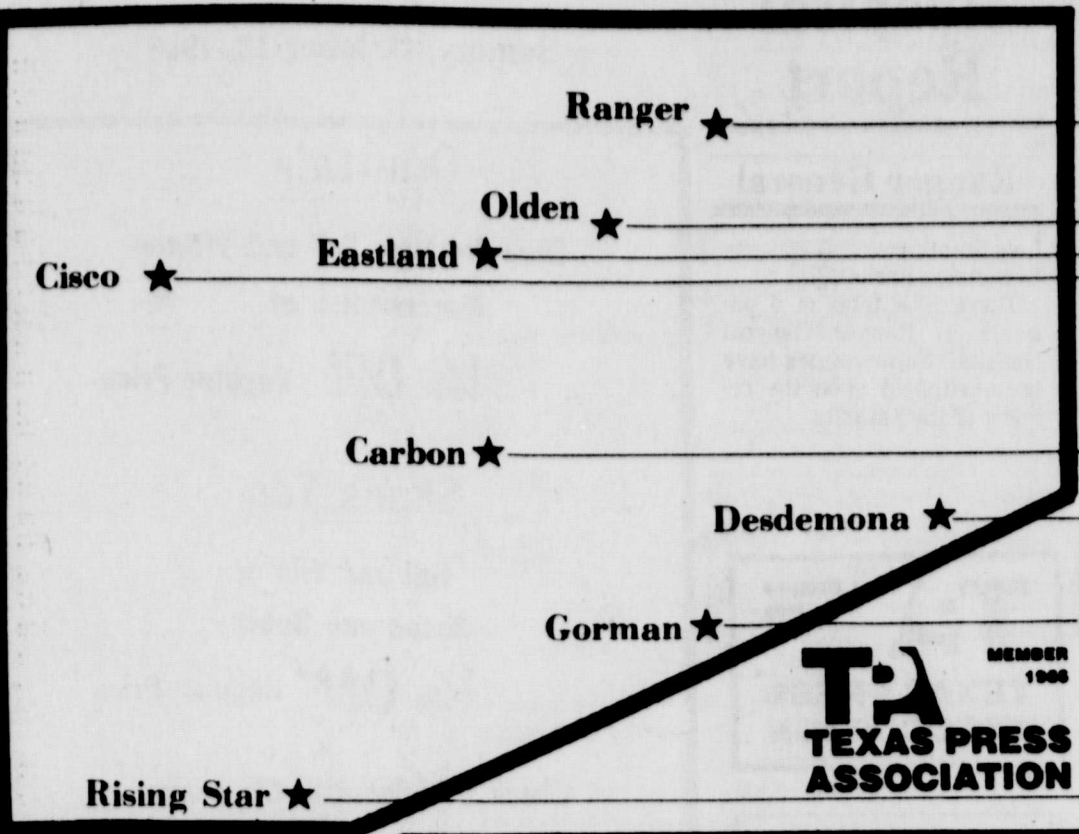

Clements States Concern About Crime In County

AUSTIN, TEXAS -- Republican gubernatorial nominee Bill Clements today said the increase in crime in Eastland County and across Texas is alarming.

"Alarm bells are sounding in Eastland County when crime increases 32.54% for the first six months of this year. The problem is the early release policy of Mark White. He is soft on crime," Bill Clements said. The number of crimes in the state increased more than 100,000 between 1984 and 1985, the largest single year increase and the fourth highest increase in the nation.

"Crime is a crisis in our state. Mark White ignores it. Mr. White has mismanaged and mishandled the prisons in Texas to the point that there is no more capacity and the 'early release, easy release policy' of the current Administration is not even enough."

Mark White's record shows that thousands of criminals were released early because of his refusal to build prisons. The result of his "early release, easy release" policy can be seen in the increased crime rate.

There are more paroled convicts than there are inmates in Texas prisons. Forty-five percent of the prisoners paroled by Governor Mark White and his parole board in the fiscal year 1983 and fiscal year 1984 had not served even half of their sentences. And 25%

served only about one-third of their sentences. Fewer than one out of eleven of the prisoners paroled serve 80% or more of their sentences. Nearly half of these prisoners paroled were murderers, rapists, other sex offenders, burglars, and assault cases.

"Prisons and sentencing are suppose to be a deterrent to crime. Today, Texas prisons are a holding tank for criminals before many of them are back on the streets waiting to commit another crime. Mark White's early release, easy release is ad-

ding fuel to the fire."

"There is a full blown crisis and Mark White refuses to admit it exists. This again shows the lack of leadership and failure of Mark White to address a problem."

Clements has organized a Criminal Justice Task Force to make recommendation to reform the entire justice system in Texas. Criminal justice will be a number one priority in a Clements Administration.

Medical Perspectives

EARLY DETECTION OF CANCER

Cancer is of concern to all of us today and for good reason. Thousands of Americans die every year as a result of this disease; and, yet, there is hope. Many cancers are curable if detected at an early stage. I would like to discuss the warning signs of cancer and the screening tests which allow us to detect some cancers at an early stage. Today, I will touch on lung cancer and colorectal cancer.

The general warning signs of cancer include a persistent, unintentional weight loss, a persistent loss of ap-

petite, unexplained bleeding, a change in the size or shape of the stools or a lump in the neck, breast, or another part of the body which does not go away. These signs are often the result of other illnesses, many less serious than cancer, but should never be ignored. Consult your physician when you experience any of these.

Lung cancer is the most common cause of cancer death in men and is rapidly becoming the most common in women. Eight percent of cases are directly associated with cigarette smoking and are thus probably preventable. There are no good screening tests for early

detection of this cancer. If you are a smoker, I would recommend a chest x-ray about every three years.

Colorectal cancer is the second leading cause of cancer death. Early detection is important and may increase one's survival significantly.

There are three recommended methods of screening for this illness: the rectal exam performed by the physician during a physical exam, the testing of stools for the presence of blood and a procedure called sigmoidoscopy.

The easiest, cheapest and most effective test is the test for blood in the stool, often referred to as occult blood since it cannot be seen with the naked eye. A positive test may indicate a problem somewhere in the intestinal tract but not necessarily cancer. If the test is positive, further tests will be required to find the source of bleeding.

Sigmoidoscopy is a procedure in which a flexible fiberoptic instrument is inserted into the rectum and lower colon. It is an extremely useful technique, though somewhat uncomfortable and more expensive. It requires about twenty to thirty minutes and allows the physician to actually visualize the lower section of the bowel. Suspicious masses and polyps can also be biopsied with this instrument. If necessary,

visualization of the remainder of the large bowel can be done with a longer scope called a colonoscope or by special x-ray techniques.

In order to increase our ability to detect colorectal cancer at an early stage in those who have no symptoms, the American Cancer Society has made several recommendations. They recommend that:

1. Men and women over the age of forty should have a rectal exam every year.
2. Men and women over the age of fifty should have a stool test for blood every year, best performed while the person is on a meat-free, high roughage diet, without taking aspirin.
3. Men and women over

the age of fifty should have sigmoidoscopy every three years after two initial exams, one year apart.

These screening tests are the best method we have at this time of detecting certain cancers at an early stage. I encourage you to make every effort to obtain these tests. They are readily available and, for the most part, easy to perform. Any questions you have may be directed to your physician or to your local branch of the American Cancer Society. I will discuss several other types of cancer in next week's column.



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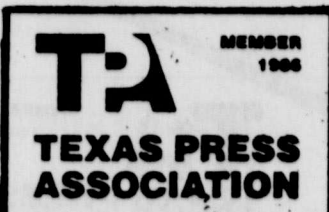

Children's Development Often Worries Parents

A common worry among new parents is whether their child is developing normally. Parents should be reassured that most children are normal and that a wide range of conditions and behavior are considered "normal."

Because no two children are exactly alike, parents cannot accurately judge their child by comparing the youngster with another. But most children go through developmental steps at certain ages, and knowing these can relieve many anxieties for parents.

The Texas Medical Association offers these milestones as a general guide in child developments:

- 1 month: lifts chin off floor.
- 2 months: lifts chest off floor.
- 3 months: reaches for objects but without success.
- 4 months: sits with support.
- 5 months: sits on laps; grasps small objects.
- 6 months: sits in high chair; grasps dangling objects.
- 7 months: sits alone.
- 8 months: stands with help.
- 9 months: stands by holding onto furniture.
- 10 months: crawls.
- 11 months: walks if led by one hand.
- 12 months: pulls up and stands with the help of furniture.
- 13 months: climbs up a few stairs.
- 14 months: stand alone.
- 15 months: walks alone.

These time periods for development are broad generalizations. A normal child might well be behind or ahead at any stage. Still, parents should be attentive to the general course of normal development. Any major departure from it should be discussed with the child's doctor.

It may have taken a parade and fair, but we finally got a general rain in Eastland County. Some parts of the county had received rain during the last three months, but the northern part of the county had their last good rain in early June.

The Eastland rainfall total for the first nine months is 17.89 inches, several inches below normal, but about the same as last year. The recent rains which totaled from three to five inches bring out total up to 21 inches which is just short of normal for this time of year.

Peanut growers would like to see some clear weather for harvest now.

The Cisco area Farmers' Market had their opening Saturday morning, October 11, at 8 a.m. The purpose of the market is to benefit both growers and consumers by allowing the growers to offer consumers fresh produce, locally grown, and in a wholesome and neighborly atmosphere.

Producers from counties within a 50 mile radius of Cisco can become members and market their produce. Membership for producers is \$10 per year. First day stall fee is included in membership dues. Stall fees per day are \$6.00 for commercial farmers and \$3.00 for home gardeners (under 1/2 acres). Any consumer may purchase from the market.

During the fall the farmers market will be open from 8 a.m. on Saturday, until all produce is sold. Next spring the plans call for two days per week for the market. It will be open from 3:30 p.m. until dusk on Wednesdays and from 7 a.m. until sell out on Saturdays.

form in which he certifies that he's exempt.

The check off dollars will be used to maintain and build demand for beef products that satisfy consumer needs and wants through market development programs such as promotion, research, education, and communication. The dollars go to the Texas Beef Industry Council, a non-profit corporation, organized and controlled by cattlemen for cattlemen.

Cattlemen may ask to have their money refunded if they wish. You may request the refund on application. This request must be postmarked no more than 60 days after the cattle were sold.

I have more information on the check off program if you need it. I also have request forms to claim an exemption from assessment.

The condition known medically as shock from a lack of blood circulating in the body.

External or internal bleeding or the loss of body fluids in severe burns can interrupt circulation. Hard blows, crushed bones or muscles, bone fractures, and bullet wounds may cause shock.

Shock is dangerous because its symptoms can go unnoticed by the untrained person, according to the Texas Medical Association. An accident victim may appear only slightly injured but can be suffering from shock. If not treated promptly,

shock can cause death.

Early signs that may indicate shock include cool, pale, clammy skin; restlessness and anxiety developing into mental cloudiness, listlessness and unconsciousness; and a pulse that is weak but of normal rate.

Late signs include great thirst; rapid weak pulse; shallow, irregular breathing; and nausea and vomiting.

If you encounter an accident victim, you should try to control severe bleeding and restore breathing while someone calls a doctor.

Next, treat for shock. Here are some tips:

—Keep the person lying down. If neck or back injuries are apparent, keep the victim lying flat. If the person has chest pains or difficulty in breathing, slightly elevate the head and shoulders, but not the legs.

For other injuries, elevate the feet and legs 8 to 12 inches.

—Protect the person from chill or dampness, but don't let the victim become overheated.

—Lost fluids must be replaced, but do not try to force liquid into the mouth of an un-

conscious person. If the person is conscious, give plain water. Never give alcoholic beverages. Start slowly but give the person all the water he or she can drink.

—Anything that lessens pain will help in reducing shock damage. —Reassurance often works like medicine. Handle your patient calmly and confidently. Above all, do not panic.

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

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Oct. 31 Is Deadline For FCIC Insurance

GEORGETOWN, TX—October 31, ends the 1986 year insurance period for barley, oats, and wheat grown in Eastland, Texas and insured by the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation (FCIC) according to Ardell Kalmbach, a representative for the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation.

"Under the terms of the policy, any acreage on which harvest will not be completed must be left intact until an inspection is made.

Any claim for indemnity may be rejected if these loss reporting requirements are not met," Kalmbach stated.

"Any notice of loss must be given promptly after the total destruction of the unit, completion of harvest, or October 31, whichever occurs earlier," according to Kalmbach. The producer who anticipates a claim should notify his or her crop insurance representative immediately.

Re-elected to the Board of Directors were Bill Brown, Truman Fambrough, Joe Frank McCollum, Preston McWhorter, Ernest Reich, Bob Shults, and Morris Underwood. Currently serving on their two-year term of this office are J.C. Clearman, Grant Lewis, John Kidd, Bill Walton, D.B. Warren, Leo Williams and Cecil Self.

Around 250 Farm Bureau members attended the Convention, which was held in the Siebert Elementary Cafeteria. A barbecue dinner was served, and a number of door prizes awarded. The Guest Speaker was Vernie Glasson, Director of the Public Affairs Division of the Texas Farm Bureau.

Glasson, who has worked for the Farm Bureau on a regional, state and national level, talked about the effectiveness of Farm Bureau lobbying for better legislation concerning agriculture.

Besides the election of officers, other important business was transacted by the members. Three Resolu-

tions which had been worked out in committees were brought to the floor and approved. They will be sent to the appropriate persons for consideration.

The title of the COUNTY RESOLUTION is TAXES. It states:

"Eastland County Farm Bureau supports the idea that the County Road and Bridge Taxes be used only for road and bridge maintenance. These funds should not be transferred to other accounts or used for other purposes."

The State Resolution reads:

LIABILITY SUITS - "Eastland County Farm Bureau advocates the drafting of legislation to impose a ceiling on punitive damage claims for bodily injury in liability suits."

The National Resolution reads:

AGRICULTURAL PROMOTION - "Eastland County Farm Bureau opposes the Federal Beef Referendum Program in its present form. We feel the \$1 per head assessment should be lowered to .50 cents per head. This amount should be collected one time only."

Various reports were made, including one from Scott Campbell of Gorman, a student chosen by the County Farm Bureau to attend a Citizenship Seminar at Angelo State University last June. Scott spoke of the benefits he had received

from this experience.

Each year the Farm Bureau sponsors a fireman's attendance at Fireman's School at Texas A&M University. This year Rex Field, Volunteer Fireman of Cisco, received this honor. A report was made of his attendance.

Jim Kennedy, agency manager of the Eastland office, introduced the local office staff and agents. He reported a good year for insurance sales in the county, in spite of the drop in oil prices. Since the Farm Bureau is geared to a farmers and ranchers program, it sales tend to be very stable. Obviously the people in agriculture plan to stick around.

Sales of Safemart tires, as well as batteries and tillage tools, have also been good this year. The current year's total is all sales is more than \$93,000.

Along with these accounts was a report of how Farm Bureau membership in

Eastland County continues to rise. The total at the end of September was 1925, with as many as 2000 members expected by the end of October, 1986! The Bureau, which is called "The Voice of Agriculture", is getting an even stronger voice here.

The Convention closed with members visiting friends from around the county. All enjoyed this annual gathering.

The ads make it sound like easy money. "NOW! As an independent mailer you can earn BIG MONEY in your own advertising business. We will pay you \$100 for every one hundred pieces of mail you process—just by following our simple instructions."

THE COME ON

All you have to do is send a nominal sum, usually between \$10 and \$40, and they will teach you how to make money at home. And since the ad promises that the job will have qualities that many people want— independence, prestige, being your own boss—it's not surprising that many people fall for the old envelope stuffing scam every day.

THE WARNING SIGN

One of the biggest warning signs for this kind of fraud or deception is the statement that in order to get more information about the job or opportunity you must send in a fee. Anyone who wants money before giving you this kind of basic job information is someone to avoid. Regardless of the "guarantees" that accompany the ad, if you answer one of this type by sending your hard earned cash, you are very likely to get burned.

Council To Discuss Land For Landfill

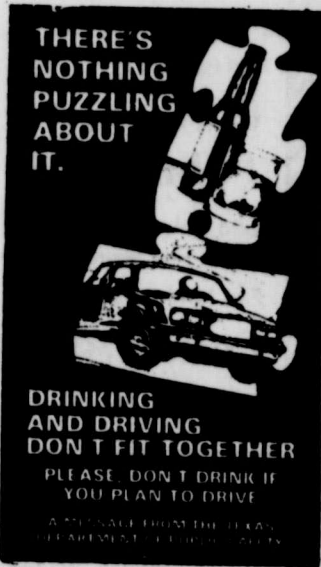

The Council meets at 7 p.m. the second and fourth Tuesdays of each month at City Hall.



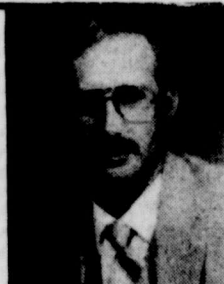
