

## **Dedication Is Successful**

Restoration of the Mobley Hotel, a "dream come true for Cisco," is a fitting tribute to the late Conrad Hilton and an example of how big business starts in a small way, Congressman Charles Stenholm told a capacity crowd in a dedication program address in Cisco Mon-

"Conrad Hilton came to Cisco to buy a bank. His deal fell through but he saw enough of the hotel business that he decided to buy the Mobley," Mr. Stenholm said. 'Then, he used his experience here to become the world's No. 1 innkeeper."

The speaker, noting that there was a "standing room only" crowd, observed that Mr. Hilton would have been pleased with the turnout today at the Mobley.

The U.S. Constitution, which will be 200 years old next year, guaranteed men like Hilton the opportunity to prosper in business, Mr. Stenholm said. He said the Constitution's five principle guarantees have withstood the tests of time. These were described by the speaker as

1. A belief in the sovergnifor the future; (3) A supreme federal government; (4) Proper respect for the state and local government; and, (5) Provision for the rights of majority rule in all levels of government.

"The Mobley's restoration represents a valuable asset for this community," Mr. Stenholm said. "It preserves for many years to come advantages for future generations. I believe Mr. Hilton would be pleased with what you have done."

The speaker was introduced by President Eris Ritchie of the Conrad Hilton Community Center and Memorial Park (The Mobley Hotel).

The program began with a ribbon cutting directed by Mayor Joe Wheatley. Participating were Donald Hubbs, president of the Hilton Foundation, Los angeles; Steve Hilton, representing the Hilton family, Los Angeles; Dr. Ayres Cermin, president of the Cisco Historical Society: Eris Ritchie, president of the Conrad N. Hilton Memorial Park and Community

Center; and Mrs. Shirley Hargrave, president of the Chamber of Commerce.

The invocation was given by the Rev. Otto Urban. pastor of Redeemer Lutheran Church, whose dedication prayer asked divine guidance for the community "in using our proud past as a standard of measurement for our future endeavors."

Mayor Wheatley welcomed visitors, including some 35 members of the Mobley family who had gathered in Cisco for a reunion and to attend the dedication.

Mr. Ritchie, in introducing the distinguished visitors, presented a plaque to Mr. Hubbs to express to the Hilton Foundation of Los Angeles the apprciation of Cisco for making possible the restoration of the hotel. Mr. Hubbs was given a standing ovation as he accepted the plaque.

Steve Hilton, representing the Hilton family, was also introduced. John Van Ness of the University of Houston was presented a plaque for that school's advise and contributions to the restoration project. The plaque was accepted by Dr. Carl Conrad, an official of the University of Houston's Hilton school, for Mr. Van Ness. Also introduced were the architects and contractors and board

members. Harry Gray of Houston, grandson of Henry L. Mobley, the hotel founder, presented a plaque on behalf of his family to the Cisco board for their work.

Mrs. Lela Lloyd, author of "Cisco-Cradle of Hilton's Empire," was introduced. The Cisco Writers Club held a sale of her books during day, and Mrs. Lloyd

### **Trio of Outdoor Pageants Highlights of Ozark Area**

For those who could not get away, and apparently a lot of senior citizens do, this must surely be a beautiful time to visit the nearby Arkansas-Missouri wonderland that's known as the Ozarks.

And if one were to hurry, two of that area's major attractions could be hit before the end of October.

The Great Passion Play in Eureka Springs, Ark., runs through the last Saturday in October, and the Shephard of the Hills Homestead and Outdoor Drama runs through Oct. 25, near Branson, Mo.


And it's a key area for busloads of elders this time of year, after schools are in session and the summer crowds are slacker.

With planning (and it's not too early to think about doing it with your family for next year), you can in fact add a third major attraction and achieve a triple crown of spectacular outdoor dramas by doing the Trail Of Tears Pageant in Tahlequah, Okla., in that state's lush, green, watered part of the state. It does need careful planning - but it's well worth the effort because this 'world of difference' destination area is so vacation-oriented. (The Cherokee Indian story runs only through late August.)

From our area, a family could by auto hit State 51 at Weatherford to Gainesville; then Highway 69 out of Sherman all the way to Muskogee, which is right in the heart of the Green Country that Oklahoma's so proud of. Just across the Arkansas River and a little east is Tahlequah, center of the Cherokee Nation. (This entire region was flooded by and north.) The entire area is a maze of lakes, rivers and streams.

Tahlequah (which means "two is enough") has been capital of the Cherokee Nation since 1839. Nearby runs the Illinois River where rafting is popular, and the town is the home for Northeasterns State University, dating to 1889, 18 years prior to statehood. The school's tradition really began in 1841 when the Cherokee people began planning the first free, coeducational public school system in the world.

"TRAIL OF TEARS" At the Cherokee Heritage Center there is a national

museum, an ancient village where Indians demonstrate the skills of their heritage in an exact recreation of an ancient 17th century settlement; and a modern outoodr amphitheatre where the pageant is presented.

Surely all Oklahomans and other good historians know that in the fall and winter of 1938-39, the Cherokees were forced by the federal government from their lands in the Georgia-North Carolina area, and re-located. (Reports of gold discovery in the area prompted the ousting of the Indian.) The Cherokees were pushed along a dreary march to the then Indian-Territory. Of 16,000 who started the joruney, more than 4,000 died along the way from disease, hunger and exposure. The march lasted nearly a year and ever after it was known as "The Trail

Where They Cried.' There's an interesting side-note: Some of the Cherokees got away, hid in the Great Smokey Mountains and finally established a village where they now have a Heritage Center with an active village, museum and outdoor pageant at what is now Cherokee, N.C., at the foot of the mountains.

In the drama, written by

Kermit Hunter (who with Paul Green, are well-known historical outdoor dramatists), the story of the March and the resulting Indians' trails and tribution in their nation are beautifully portrayed on a giant outdoor stage with a lot of special effects, including major fights, gunfire scenes, dances, etc.


Principals are Chief John Rose, General Sand Watie and Sequoyah, Indian credited with inventing the Cherokee 85-character alphabet over a 12-year period. The first Cherokeelanguage newspaper was published in 1828.

This written language ability is credited with the advances made by the Cherokees, and the eventual establishment of a seminar for higher education, the ramins of which are on their grounds today.

Devotees of the outdoor spectacular may be a little disappointed in the lack of demonstrated sufferings and hardships of the actual march, but there's plenty of action otherwise to give an overall history of what these native Americans suffered

in the early days. The town of Tahlequah offers adequate facilities including an inn owned and operated by the Nation. Boating and other water

related activities abound and the university has a full program of activities.

Tourists relish slightly greasy, but good-with-honey Squaw Bread served at most restaurants in the area. Here's the recipe: one pint sour milk, one tablespoon shortening, one-half teaspoon soda, three heaping teaspoons baking powder and one teaspoon salt. Add enough flour to make the dough easy to handle. Knead it smooth and roll out until your dough is about one-half inch thick. Cut this into portions about the size of a quart jar lid and make some slits in it. Now cook in deep fat, just like doughnuts.

EUREKA SPRINGS AND THE GREAT PASSION PLAY

Highway 62 will take you into Arkansas and you can skirt Fayetteville (unless you just have a look at the U of A) and go north to Rogers (where you might want to stop and holler at Roy Webster, headquarters of the House of Webster .. and a heck of a booming town, by the way), and there's Pea Ridge National Military up the hills, around the bend and finally, you're in Eureka

Springs. A Swiss Village, Gatlinburg, Tenn., Estes Park, Toas, N.M., Disneyland and maybe more, are all rolled into this unbelieveable mountain

There's not a straight street in town, nothings on a level and tourists love it. The Passion Play is probably the big draw but there's more: a number of "mountain music theatres", scenic drives, a re-building steam railroad, and skads of shops offering

art, novelty, or nicety know to man or beast. It's a place where you just want to park and take off exploring. For instance, you can get on the steam train and take a little ride while having lunch or dinner in a real moving din-

THE PAGEANT

Where to begin on this? From their material: "...a powerful lifelike drama depicting Christ's last week on earth. To date, nearly four million people have viewed this presentation..."

It's powerful. The 4,400-seat amphitheatre set into a wooded hillside and the cast includes about 200 people and many live animals common to the Holy Land of that day. The set is elaborate: a recreation of buildings, temple, upper room, the tomb, court of Sanhedrin, Pilate's judgement porch, garden of Gethsemane, typical Jerusalem housing and of course, Golgotha.

The lighting system is outstanding and according to information, the sound system, one of the most elaborabte used in the world.

to life the glory and triumph of the life, crucifixion, resurrection and ascension of Jesus Christ. It is called by many, the nation's number one outdoor drama.

"Shepherd of the Hills" the Wildwood and presently

under construction, the new Holy Land. All of these are open for visiting. Each viewer of the Play will have his own opinions of

how successfully the production conveys the feel and the story of the Bible, how effectively the special effects help tell the story, and whether this is in fact the "number one outdoor pageant."

It's attendance is said to exceed the German Pageant which is produced every ten years, with visitors from all over the world.

BRANSON, MO., AND THE SHEPHERD OF THE HILLS

When you've had all of Eureka Springs you can stand, head north up to Branson, Misouri - a combination of Las Vegas neon, Nashville entertainment, really serious arts and crafts including TOP wood carvings, and of course, home of the Shepherd of the Hills Farm, a tribute to Harold Bell Wright and the characters he made famous in his book by the same name.

For the fun of it, you'll want at least a day or two at Silver Dollar City, a family entertainment park patterned after an 1880s Ozarks mining town and Marvel Cave. at the park's entrance, which features a 20-story chamber and a 50 feet high underground waterfall. An Ozark-Six Flags? Well not exactly, but a really fun variation.

The old part of downtown Branson is pretty well normal, but the new highway by-pass strip is a maze of country music shows, inns., restaurants, and you may find Elvis Presley's cousin, The Sons of the Pioneers, and any number of greater and lesser lights appearing nightly in well-orchestrated

The whole town appears to be "family oriented."

In its 25th year, the Shepherd pageant would have a familiar ring to those who have read the book-it's kind of a soap opera that might have happened 80 years ago in the Ozark Mountains.

Once again, a vast naturalsetting stage, with exciting action including gunfire, a cabin fire and a lot more, makes it an entertaining spectacle. The radio mikedactor sound system makes the whole think work on such a big scale.

ty now. TIME FOR TEXAS:

This might be a good spot to inject that most true Texans probably wouldn't even want to consider visisting a pageant anywhere else until after they had seen either "Texas" at Palo Duro Canyon or "Lone Star" on Galveston Island, or both.

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### Homemaking Briefs...

HARD WATER CAUSES LAUNDRY PROBLEMS-

The quality of your local water supply has a lot to do with whether detergents can actually work to get clothes clean, says Dr. Ann Beard, a Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service clothing specalist. "In hard water, much of the detergent added to the washer goes to soften the water instead of clean the clothes," she says. "Over time, clothes washed in hard water become dingy or yellow, develop a build-up of soil, may have a stiff, harsh feel or snow white or gray steaks on colored fabrics." The specialist says that you can compensate for hard water - to a certain extent by using adequate amounts of low-sudsing phospate detergent and water as hot as recommended for the fabric. The harder the water, the more phosphate

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use, she says, although this can be expensive and contribute to water pollution. Non-phospate detergents and soap will not perform satisfactorily in hard water, Beard notes. In addition to using extra detergent, water can be treated in the washer with a non-precipitating water conditioner, or water softener, commonly sold in powder form in the detergent section of grocery

CONSIDER SOURCE OF DIET ADVICE-Three na-

tional health agencies have issued dietary guidelines that cut through the flood of often misleading advice on how to lose weight, prevent disease and "eat right." Dr. Alice Hunt, a nutritionist and registered dietitian, savs

many diet plans are designed to sell books, magazines, products, vitamins and special foods. Even legitimate nutrition research findings are sometimes used as a basis for overstated claims about certain diets or "miracle" foods, notes the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service Specialist. To reduce some of the confusion, the U.S. Departments of Agricultural (USDA) and Health and Human Services (HHS), the American Heart Association (AHA) and the American Dietetic Association (ADA) have each set forth their own dietary recommendations this year. Hunt says these recommendations are sufficient guidelines for achieving a healthy, balanced diet. 
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# Area News Briefs

CISCO Hundreds of people thronged the restored Mobley-Hilton Monday for the formal dedication. # A Bright Day For Cisco

The restoration of the Mobley-Hilton Hotel probably meant something different to every person who attended the Dedication Monday.

"A dream come true," said Eris Ritchie, President of the Mobley-Hilton Board of Directors. Ritchie and all the Board members had worked long and hard on this project. Other people in the town and country had contributed much.

For those such as Mrs. M.D. (Maude) Bailey of Cisco, who remembered the old Hotel in operation, it must have been like seeing an old friend resurrected.

"I used to sit out on the front porch here and wait for trains," said this Eastland County native.

For me it was a diamondbright day, a kadeliscope of people, sights and sounds. the weather cooperated, with storms rolled away and sunlight building. Rains had turned the lawns green and made the shrubs want to live

By 9 a.m. people were hurrying inside, smiling as they came. As I helped Lela Lloyd arrange her books on a table in the auditorium I noticed early arrivals Dick Wooley, Brad Kimbrough, Eris Ritchie and members of the Civic League. Dale Stewart was also visible, with a display of his bronze pieces in one corner of the room.

The Hotel, from the front lobby across this spacious auditorium, was totally charming. The gleaming oak floors and the colors of the decor were a focal point. The walls were a soft pink-biege, heightened by deep rose and



terra cotta doors. Teal blue was used as an accent in window frames, rugs and other accessories.

Lela Lloyd and I were lucky - we got to sit behind surged around us, filling up seats and standing in lines around the room. I estimate that by 10 a.m. about 400 persons were in the auditorium, with several hundred more overflowing the entrance. lobby, and out on the porch and grounds.

Noticed in the crowd:

Jamie Gibson, District Representative for Senator Bob Glasgow's office who stopped and chatted for a moment, saying that she always reads the Eastland County Newspapers. Three generations of the Bailey family, Mrs. Maude Bailey, Judge Scott Bailey, and his son John Bailey, CJC student. Dr. Henry McCullough CJC President, and a number of students from the College. Albany journalists Elsa Turner and Betty Townsend, and of course Cisco's own J.W. Sitton, covering one of the big stories of his life.

Duke Dixon of the Eastland County Newspapers hunted a vantage point for photographs, while Caroll Barnhill of Fort Worth attempted to find a good spot for video taping. Frank Strawn of Abilene assisted at the book table, while members of the Mobley family came by and visited and bought more

Yellow chrysanthamums banked a beautiful bouquet of white mums in front of the speaker's stand. Other flowers in fall colors were arranged around the building, with white orchids on the desk of Helen Gaeta, Chamber of Commerce Secretary.

Involved in the ribbon cut-

was all over. Special thanks were expressed to Donald Hubbs, President of the Hilton Foundation, who had come from Los Angeles, California. He and Conrad Hilton's grandson Steve Hilton were recognized for the special gift of \$1.2 million from the Hilton Foundation - a gift which had made this restoration possible. Dr. Karl Conrad of the University of Houston was presented a plaque in grateful appreciation, as was Dr. John Van Ness of Houston (not present).

The unveiling of the Hilton bust was an impressive moment. Applause broke out as Dale Stewart removed the cover from his work. All expressed interest in this tribute to Hilton from the ci-

For Congressman Charles Stenholm, Guest Speaker, this was probably a day with a sobering backdrop, what with the collapse of the Eastconsidered his speech an excellent one, in which he outlined the basic differences of the American way of life as contrasted with the Russian. After the formal program was over I attempted to talk with some of the visitors for a moment. Donald Hubbs remarked on the cordial reception he had received from the people here, and said he felt like he had made a lot of new friends in Texas.

Oilmen and ranchers spoke earnestly to Congressman Stenholm after the program. Then I asked for the Congressman's opinion on the breakdown of the talks in Iceland between President Reagan and the Russians.

"I do not choose to try to second-guess the President on these matters," he said. "I think we should put partisan politics aside where foreign policy is concerned. There is great difficulty in dealing with the Russians. Americans and Russians are coming from two entirely different worlds."

The gravity of his words lingered, but it was hard to be grave in such surroundings. For people started moving around, enjoying the grand old facility. This restoration should mean a new day for the downtown

I found myself speaking to total strangers, just like other people were doing.
"Glad you came. Great

day for Cisco, isn't it." That was a statement, not a ques-"Sure glad it didn't rain."

There was something about the old place that really put me in a good humor. But maybe that's something that always happens on diamond-bright day.

Included in those new channels are American Movie Classics (AMC) and The Discovery Channel (TDC). 
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## Loboes Defeated By Dublin; To Play Eastland Here Friday Night
