This was down 58 from last year, Mr. McCullough said.

A bid of the Texas Association of School Boards was the lowest for property and liability insurance on school buildings and officials for the coming year. The bid of \$23,576 was accepted.

The board authorized Dick Woolley, president, to negiotate with the Thomas Canan Estate concerning proposed changes in an oil and gas lease held on college property. The monthly financial statement was presented by Vice President Ralph Glenn.





On Return of Front-End Loader

Eastland County Commissioners, during their meeting Tuesday, Oct. 14 passed a resolution authorizing the execution of an agreement for the return of a front-end loader to Pct. 2 of the county.

Richard Robinson, Commissioner of Pct. 1 made the motion to authorize the execution of the agreement. This was seconded by Bill Riddell, Comm. of Pct. 2. The other Commissioners, L.T. Owen of Pct. 3 and C.B. Dill of Pct. 4, also voted in favor of the Resolution.

This agreement was reached after some mention of two lawsuits involving the loader. One is by Calvin Ainsworth against the County Court, and the other a cross-action by the County Court against Ainsworth.

It was stated that the relinquishment of the front-end loader by Ainsworth would have no effect on these pending lawsuits. The equipment has been held since

In other action the Court appointed Mrs. Bill (Faye) Medley of Rising Star as Alternate Election Judge for General and Special Elections in Election Pct. 7 (Rising Star).

The Commissioners also voted to increase retirement benefits for county employees. Work for the county before any possible retirement was lowered from 12 years to 10 years, and retirement may begin at age 60. The amount of retirement received will continue to be based on length of

employment and salary.

EARLY DETECTION OF CANCER, PART II Robert Matthews, M.D.

I discussed in last week's article the screening tests which are useful in the early detection of cancers of the lung and colon. Today, I will discuss the tests and symptoms which allow one to detect certain other cancers at an early stage. These include cancers of the breast, prostate, uterus, cervix, testicles, mouth, and skin.

Breast cancer is the leading cause of cancer death in women. The incidence increases with age and can run in families. Every woman should examine her breasts once a month. She should have a physician examine her breasts every three years when age twenty to forty, then annually. This will increase the likelihood of detecting a cancer while it is still small and before it has spread to other parts of the body. If you find a lump or experience drainage or bleeding from the nipples, contact your physician immediately so that it can be evaluated. Another method of early detection is the mammogram, a special x-ray of the breasts. It is recommended every one to two years after age forty, then annually after age fifty. If there is a history of breast cancer in your family, let your physician know; you may need even more frequent exams.

Prostate cancer is a common cause of cancer in men, especially in those over

Malignant melanoma, that is cancer of a mole, is easily cured by simple removal of the mole if discovered at an early stage. It is on the increase though and can be deadly, so be on the lookout.

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
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

Little Texas Town Keeps Going Through Days of Boom and Bust

PUTNAM, Texas — Even if your last name isn't tion for suffering humanity." Putnam, this town has a certain allure at night, its neon lights beckoning in soft rays of reds and blues, glimmering in the West Texas twilight along I-20. By day, it is only a small cluster of buildings left

Putnam, population 110, now has another pull: as the Ranger and Abilene, it is to many the watering hole of

Larry King, author of "The Best Little Whorehouse in Texas" and other tales, spent the first 13 years of his life in Putnam, decades before the liquor sales began.

"It had been dry forever," King said in a telephone interview from his home in Washington, D.C. "It had always been a staid and dry and preacherful place."

Putnam lies along the Texas & Pacific Railroad 30 miles east of Abilene. On a north-south line, it falls just about where scrub oak stands are replaced by mesquite for the next 300 miles west.

The town first was called Catclaw, for a native bush that grows in rocky hills that make the terrain look like a scene out of the Old Testament. It also was briefly known as Breman, but that was changed in 1881 because of the similarity to Bremond, another Texas

In the early part of the century, developers sought to take advantage of the railroad and local mineral wells, billing Putnam as "The New Carlsbad of America." The Carter-Holland Hotel opened March 20, 1910, our two hotels.

with 50 rooms near the two mineral wells that bubbled water promised to be "Dame Nature's own prescrip-

The mineral water business never was as kind to Putnam, however, as another mineral. About 1920, the first oil wells were discovered in the area.

In 1925, there were 40 businesses about the town square and the population had swelled to more than through boom and bust in ranching and oil, along with 1,000, up from an estimated 250 in 1890. Some say it

Then came the Depression, and by 1940 the town had dwindled to about 500 people again. During World War only place to buy liquor in the 60-mile stretch between II, the government offered people an opportunity to move their houses to cities like Fort Worth and Abilene, where the defense industry offered jobs, said LaVerne Rutherford, the postmistress and a cousin of Larry King's.

In the mid-1960s, Interstate 20 divided the town in half. The once grand hotel was leveled. The springs were covered and the square plowed asunder.

The town's gravel streets now connect to a paved road that passes under the highway, not far from where the hotel once stood. To the north of I-20, there is a single strip of stores, many of them bearing neon signs advertising beer and wine.

Alcohol sales, which began about a decade ago, have helped keep the town from drying up completely, said the town's justice of the peace.

King, whose father was a blacksmith here, chronicled the town's demise in his essay "Requiem for a West Texas Town."

He remembered it as a place where "hammer on anvil could still be heard in my father's blacksmith shop" and "roadwise drummers in straw boaters and polka-dot bow ties still brought their sample cases into

Hilton Hotels were started by oil boom



The worldwide Hilton Hotel chain started in Cisco, Texas, in 1919. Conrad Hilton, founder of the chain, had arrived in town to buy a bank, but the owner reneged on the price. Unable to get a place to sleep, the young New Mexico native decided the big money in that oil boom town was in the Mobley Hotel, which was sleeping guests in eight-hour shifts around the clock.

The hotel owner, on the other hand, was anxious to be rid of the Mobley so he could get into oil. Although unfamiliar with the business (he had been in banking), Hilton bought the two-story, brick hotel and reported, in his autobiography, "The Mobley, my first love, was a great lady. She taught us the way to promotion and pay, plus a lot about running hotels. She was indestructible, the ideal hotel to practice

His second hotel was the Melba, in Fort Worth. With the help of a young Dallas banker, R.L. Thornton (later to become famous as Dallas' "dynamic Uncle Bob"), Hilton bought a third hotel, the Waldorf in downtown Dallas. Then Hilton obtained the Terminal in Fort Worth, one of the city's finest, and expanded to Corsicana, where he leased the Beaton.

In July 1924, Hilton spaded the first dirt for a Hilton hotel, the Dallas Hilton, which opened in August 1925. The second Hilton was built at Abilene, then in rapid succession he added hotels in Waco, Marlin, Plainview, San Angelo, Lubbock and El Paso.

After World War II (and a stormy marriage to Zsa Zsa Gabor), Hilton opened hotels around the globe, the first American hotel chain to do so. In 1954, Hilton bought the Statler hotel chain, the largest real estate transaction in history at the time, and in 1954 took over the Shamrock, Houston's glamour hotel which Glenn McCarthy had opened five years before. At Hilton's death in 1979, his chain, from its Texas beginning, had grown to be the largest in the world

If you're a newcomer to woodsplitting chores and believe that all that is needed is brute strength with the swing of the axe to get the woodsplitting job done, read on says the Hand Tools Institute, an association of tool manufacturers whose members include suppliers of woodsplitting tools dating back to colonial times. HTI says certain rules must be followed to do the woodsplitting job.

Foremost, safety goggles should be worn to prevent serious eye injury from possible flying chips of metal or wood.

Perhaps one of the most common misconceptions among many woodsplitters is that it is correct to strike a woodsplitting steel wedge with the flat striking face of the axe. HTI says this should never be done. The axe is not intended for nor capable of withstanding the impact of the blow and the possibility of metal chip fragementation is very high. The correct tool to strike a woodsplitting wedge is the sledge end of a woodchopper's maul or a double face sledge, 6 lbs. or heavier.

HTI points out that single bit cutting axes are used to fell and trim trees and split and cut wood with their cutting edge. Their striking face may be used to drive soft material such as wood or plastic stakes, but never


against woodsplitting steel wedges. The double bit face axe is used only to fell, trim or split and cut wood. Both types of axes come in a wide range of patterns and weights. When selecting an axe be certain its weight is the proper one for your strength.

Woodsplitting wedges are used when the cutting edge of the axe will not do the job. This is normally the case when the diameter of the wood to be split is too large or the length of the wood is too long. In this case, it is recommended that a starting notch be made with the cutting edge of the maul. Then insert the wedge followed by a few light taps to assure that the wedge is well imbedded into the wood to be split. Next, position yourself so that your weight is well balanced to strike the wedge squarely with the face of the maul or sledge hammer. Avoid glancing blows, as they could send the wedge flying

Regardless of which tool you are using when splitting wood, it is good practice to periodically examine it for chips, cracks, excessive wear or mushrooming. If any of these signs are shown, HTI recommends the tool be replaced. Handles, of course, can be replaced.


There are two further points to remember: first, rest frequently as fatigue can result in a miscalculated swing and second, keep others away from the woodsplitting area to avoid injury from flying chips.



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


New infestations of fire ants were confirmed in both Easltand and Cisco recently. In fact the infestations in Cisco are quite wide spread. There are indications that they have been there for at least two years. Two different groups of ants were confirmed in two different locations in Cisco and a third location will probably be confirmed this week. I expect the fire ants could be in any location in Cisco and Eastland.

The new infestation in Eastland was found in a backyard on West Main Street, but not far from a location where ants were found last year.

In my opinion, the unwelcomed guests are here to stay. The best you can do to control the fire ants is to learn to identify nests or mounds and treat those areas where they are a threat to you and your fami-

Most people are surprised to learn that the fire ants are so small. Most mounds we have found are one to four inches tall and appear to be a small pile of loose soil. When the soil on the mound is disturbed you immediately see thousands of small dark red (almost black) ants moving around very rapidly. If your hand or foot is near the mound the ants will quickly attack and begin

The Texas Department of Agriculture's Fire Ant Program was one of the cuts made by the Texas Legislature in the special session last month. Therefore, no more ant bait or technical help is available from the TDA fire ant con-



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trol. However, the Extension Service will continue it's educational program on fire ant control. We have a very informative publication, B-1536 "Fire Ants and Their Control" available at the County Extension Office. This publication gives a complete description of the ants and all known control methods including home remedies, non-chemical control methods as well as chemical control methods. It also contains a long list of inproducts secticide registered for fire ant control. These insecticide products are available at many businesses in the county who sell insecticides.

All cattlemen in the county should make plans to attend the Tri-County Cow-Calf Clinic Tuesday, October 29. It was planned and is being conducted by livestock committees in Eastland, Stephens and Palo Pinto Counties. The clinic will be held in the Cowboy Sports Arena which is five miles south of Mineral Wells on Highway 281 on the west side of the highway. It is located 9 miles north of Interestate 20 on Highway 281. Registration begins at 9 a.m. and the program begins at 9:30 a.m. The program will end about 3:45 p.m. and a free lunch will be served. 
The monthly financial statement for September was presented by City Bookkeeper Maryann Perry. It showed general fund collection of a total of \$935,286.54 for the fiscal year ending Sept. 30. Budgeted for the year was \$941,400. This included \$248,311 in ad valorem taxes - 94 per cent of the budget total. Sales tax collections for the year was \$246,050 - 133 per cent of the budget.

Expenditures in the general fund totalled \$851,433 - about \$10,000 more

Utility fund revenue was 100 per cent of budget -\$624,670. Expenses for this fund amounted to some \$34,000 more than budgeted. Revenue sharing funds amounting to \$101,549 were received during the year and the city spent \$87,811 from the fund.

City Judge Douglas Fry reported revenue totaling \$5,467 during the third quarter of 1986. Of this sum, \$4,462 went to the city and \$1,004 was paid to the state. There were 179 traffic tickets issued during the



A slide presentation on the child abuse program in Eastland County was presented by Mrs. Otto Urban of Cisco, child protection specialist with the Texas Department of Human Services, at the weekly luncheon of the Cisco Rotary Club last Thursday noon.

The slides showed numerous child abuse illustrations, many resulting from parental neglect, some with physical injuries and others with shabby clothing and evidence of health problems.

Mrs. Urban told Rotarians that the county office's docket currently has 43 cases scheduled for investigation. The office endeavors to investigate fully all cases referred to them, she said. They endeavor to work with parents in correcting problems and are often

successful, she added.

In some instances of severe abuse, the county office has removed children from custody of their parents, Mrs. Urban said. She noted that county office workers investigated from five to 27 cases per month in Eastland County from March, 1984, through

August, 1986. The Rev. Otto Urban was program chairman and introduced his wife.

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
