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

The annual homecoming of the Cisco Junior College Ex-Student Association will be held Saturday at the college with the football game at 3 p.m. between CJC and Navarro JC as the



Cisco JC To Play Tyler JC Here

The Cisco Junior College Wranglers, who lost a hardfought football conference game to Tyler JC here last Saturday night, will meet Navarro County JC of Corsicana in a conference contest at Chesley Field in Cisco at 3 p.m. Saturday. The game will be the climax of the annual homecoming activities for CJC Ex-Students. Tyler's Apaches scored twice in the final period on the passing of QB Ronnie Rittiman and the running of Fullback Cedric Jackson to score a come-from-behind 28-to-17 victory over Cisco. The Wranglers had led until midway in the final period. Rodney Dolgener, sophomore Cisco defensive lineman from Fredericksburg, was pro-bably lost for the season when he suffered a knee in-

jury in the game. An ambulance took him to E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital where x-rays showed a cartilage tear in his right knee area. Surgery was scheduled for Thursday by an Abilene specialist.

Both teams scored in the opening period. Tyler took the kickoff and, starting from their 37, used passes and runs to send Tailback Eric Sanders across for a score on their first posses-

sion. Chris White added the extra point.

The Wranglers came back to score on their first possession. Ezell Scott, running back from Irving, brought the kickoff back to Tyler's 46. QB David Dacus hit Wide **Receiver Kevin Evans for 22** yards, and Diron Lintz then caught a 12 yard pass to the Tyler 5. Cisco drew a fiveyard penalty and Running Back Randy Rowe plowed over to score. Eric Edwards

converted to tie the score. Late in the third quarter, Cisco got the ball on the Tyler 20 and, on 4th down, Edwards missed a field goal. On their next possession, Dacus passed to Running Back James Dixon who raced 73 yards for a touchdown. Edwards converted. Both teams scored in the second period. The Wranglers scored after **Defensive Back Andre Hor-**

and ran to their 14. On 4th down, the Wranglers were still on the 14 with 10 yards to go, so Edwards went in and kicked a field goal.

Later in the period, the Wranglers were held for downs on the Tyler 46. Five plays later, Jackson went in to score and the extra point was made by White. Cisco had a 17-to-14 lead at halftime.

The third quarter was scoreless. Edwards missed a field goal from 45 yards early in the quarter.

Cisco Police Arrest Two For

Taking Purses From Parked Car

Two purses taken from a parked car in Cisco last Saturday night were recovered when Cisco police arrested two persons, one a 14-year old boy, according to a report by Police Chief Billy Rains.

Randy G. Litton, 17, was arrested along with the boy and charged with burglary of a vehicle and placed in the county jail, Chief Rains reported. He was released Sunday after posting a \$500 bond, the sheriff's office reported. The 14-year old was released to the custody of his parents.

The purses were stolen from the car of Tami Richards, Abilene, that was parked in the Cisco Junior College parking lot. Her purse and another belonging to Gayla Search, CJC student, were taken.

Officers Frank Thumsuden and Kenneth Preston arrested the pair in a 1979 pickup on south Hilton near I-20 and recovered the purses with their contents. The pickup was from Killeen.

Last Thursday, Larry Seabourn, 308 West 12th Street, reported that a car starting off by the driver spinning the rear wheels threw rocks and gravel that broke out a window in his car parked on the street. Damage was estimated at \$100. Police were investigating.

Theda Jones, 612 West 4th Street, reported to police Saturday that a 1980 model pickup parked in her yard was broken into and her purses that contained check books. \$32 in cash, her driver's license and other cards was missing. Police were investigating, Mr. Rains said.

Since August, the McAllen Police Department has been singing about a man named Jose who went to the first day of his murder trial and then "never returned".

While the Kingston Trio song had a humorous side to it, the folks in McAllen are not laughing at all about the disappearance of Jose

police. When officers arrived, they found Isabel Elizondo in the kitchen with a critical head wound. She died a few hours later at McAllen

Methodist Hospital. Jose Elizondo disappeared after the shooting. A week later, however, he turned himself in to McAllen police

officials. He discovered much to his surprise, however, that his wife's murder wasn't the onthe Texas Crime Stoppers

years in the Texas Department of Corrections and fined him \$5,000.

However, no one has been able to catch up with Elizondo long enough to collect the fine or make him serve the prison time.

Jose Homar Elizondo is 5-7, 185 pounds, with gray hair that is quickly receding, and brown eyes. Anyone who has information concerning Elizondo's possible whereabouts is asked to call

Major Accomplishments Of 1986 Special Sessions

Governor Mark White has sent this list of the Major Accomplishments of the 1986 Special Sessions to keep us all updated on what is happening.

STATE FINANCE SB 1 - Budget Cuts -Reduces current fiscal year spending by \$502 million. SB 40 - Pay Raise - Saves \$71 million in general

revenue by canceling the 1987 pay raise for state employees. HB 79 - Temporary taxes -

Increases the state sales tax by 1.125 cents on the dollars and the gasoline tax by a nickel per gallon from January 1, 1987 to August 31, 1987. Raises \$872.3 million to meet the state's projected budget deficit. Also allows cities and counties outside a mass transit district to levy, with voter approval, an additional half cent sales tax to give property tax relief.

S.B. 28 - Interest savings -

New Policy On Letters To The Editor

Due to the number of "Letters To The Editor" we have received recently, and the context of some of those letters. the Cisco Press has been forced to issue a policy on the 'Letters' we receive.

1. All letters must be brought in to our office at 700 Conrad Hilton, Cisco, Texas, and signed in front of a member of our office staff (to be able to witness the signature if needed). Also, please show your address and telephone number below your signature, this being for Cisco Press office use only.

2. 'Letters' should be typed or printed, or LEGIBLY written in longhand, and should be of reasonable length. 3. All letters will be edited for length, taste, and clarity.

4. In the past, we have accepted requests to withhold signatures when publishing these letters. However, as previously mentioned in this notice, due to the context of some of these letters, we must be permitted to print the letter-writer's name when the letter is published. The lack of signatures is causing a great deal of concern in our office and among the citizens of Cisco, especially the ones most affected by the letters.



Allows the state to not pay interest on sales taxes collected for local governments. Expected to save \$223 million for the state in the current budget year.

H.B. 62 - Cash flow management - Changes state employees' payday from the last of each month to the first of each month for an anticipated savings of \$202 million in this budget year. H.B. 3 - Financing of DPS -Uses \$62 million in highway funds to finance Department of Public Safety operations, thereby reducing the drain on state general revenue.

H.B. 5 - Voluntary savings - Reduces highway department spending by \$25 million.

NOTE: The Legislature passed bills to save additional general revenue by closing some state field offices, eliminating general revenue payment of tax credits for gasohol plants, retaining the interest on taxes paid erroneously, and clearing the way for collection of previously mandated higher district court filing fees.

EDUCATION HB 13 - Student discipline -Gives teachers and school officials clear guidelines for disruptive removing students from the classroom and suspending or expelling

serious offenders. HB 50 - Paperwork reduction - Mandates that the State Board of Education and local districts adopt rules reducing the number and length of written reports required of teachers in order to give teachers more time with students.

CRIMINALS SB 40 - Mandatory release - Requires prison inmates convicted of aggravated offenses or use of a deadly weapon in an offense to serve all of their sentences, unless paroled earlier by the parole board after careful review. This bill eliminates mandatory release of violent criminals who have served only one-third of their sentences

CHILD SUPPORT SB 26 - Child support - Improves administrative processes to speed up the enforcement and collection of child support.

SB 31 - Savings and Loan Act - Authorizes savings and loan associations in Texas to purchase out-of-state savings and loan associations to the extent permitted by the laws of other states.

(From Page 1...) Lutheran Churches **History Is Told**

North Central Texas. With the beginning of the Southern District came also the beginning of organized systematic mission work. Men were called to find scattered Lutherans in outlying communities, and if possible, organizing them into new congregations. They were the Missionaries at Large

J.J. Trinklein was the first of these heroes. He was a man of great stamia, dedication, and missionary skill.

By 1885 Pastor Trinklein had made Waco the base of his operations and had organized a congregation at Riesel, then known as Friedensau. He penetrated to Cisco and Abilene, stopping at a number of points along the way.

By 1886, Pastor Trinklein had left the area, accepting a call to Trinity, Houston. This left North Central Texas without a missionary.

Pastor Trinklein's long awaited successor to the Central and West Texas Field, also known as the T and P Field because it was strung out along the Texas and Pacific Tracks, came in 1886 in the person of Johannes Barthel. He was ordaned at Aleman near Hamilton by Pastor Trinklein the last Sunday in September, 1886.

Making Aleman his base of operation, Pastor Barthel conducted services once a month in Pottsville, Indian Gap, Cisco and Abilene.

Heading northwest, Pastor Barthel went as far as Olney. No railroad went through Olney, so a member of the congregation in Olney met him at the railroad station in Throckmorton.

Pastor Barthel even traveled as far as El Paso, which is now a part of the Colorado District. In those



could get there. But his reception in El Paso was cool - El Paso was not ready for the Missouri Synod at

thwest Texas in 1886 and continued into 1887. Hard hit farmers began to move away. Seriously depleting the mission congregations Pastor Barthel has been serving, some of which disappeared altogether. Early in 1889 Pastor Barthel accepted a call to Trinity, Houston, succeeding Trinklein, the

man whom he had earlier succeeded. Pastor Berthel was succeeded in 1889 by the Rev. Richard Seils. Seils found the people who had clung tenaciously to the land during the great drouth of 1886-87 recovering gradually. Unfortunately there had been many who had not been able to cling to their land, with the result that the congregations were much smaller than they had been when Pastor Barthel had

served them. Pastor Seils left the area after two years of service with Rev. A. W. Kramer succeeded him. The District Convention of 1891, at this time, voted to divide the huge field into three parts, with the western field being the Cisco, Baird, Abilene and Big Spring area. So, came the Rev. Emil F. Morbe to the western field, succeeding Rev. Kramer.

Pastor Moerbe began by making Cisco his base of operations. Cisco had no house of worship at this time. He later moved to Abilene.

pastorate of the Rev. P. Waechter, when over half of the congregation's members left to form a new congregation affiliated with the Ohio Synod. Precisely what caused this rupture is not clear

from the records. But the rift continued through the pastorate of the Rev. Karl Hoeh (1899-1902). In 1903 the Rev. Gustav G. Mueller was called to serve Cisco. Romney, Abilene, Big Spring, Winters, and Clyde. Pastor Mueller was able to regain most of the lost members back to Christ, Cisco along with new ones, so that by 1906 Christ together with Romney was able to form a self-sustaining duel Parish.

After Pastor Mueller left the western field in 1907, Rev. A. L. Gresens succeeded him. A preaching station was added at Strawn at this time. He served for two years and then was succeeded by the Rev. C.A. Neumann.

Rev. Neumann served this area until 1919 and was succeeded by the Rev. George Beyer.

Christ, Cisco, began to feel the need, at this time, for a full time resident pastor and requested that the Mission Board find some other means of serving the congregation at Romney and the Strawn preaching station. Romney was then combined with the Albany congregation into one mission parish. A vicar was engaged to teach the school in Romney for the 1919-1920 term after which Romney was served by Pastor Riess along with

other congregation. Pastor Peiss resigned because of illness in 1921. His successor, Cand. Arthur Arndt, was encouraged by the Mission Board to make his home in the town of Cisco. Another congregation, Grace, Cisco began to spring into being. Pastor Arndt accepted a call to Harlingen in 1925. Cand. Herbert Peimann was installed as Pastor Arndt's

successor that same year. With the disbanding of the Romney congregation and a turn over of pastors during the years, the two congregations at Cisco remained; Christ Church in the country and Grace Church in town. In 1954, Rev. John Elser was called to Cisco, Pastor Elser began to serve both Grace

Dear Lord, Let my speech be always with grace. Curb my temper, give me seasonings of love and patience.



had only a vague notion of what the strange word - sesquicentennial - meant. A year later, I would wager that there are very few Texans who aren't familiar with the term's meaning. Perhaps a few of us even learned how to spell and pronounce it.

Although many people may have grown a bit weary of the festivities surrounding Texas' century-and-a-half birthday, no one can deny that this event put the Lone Star State in the nation's spotlight.

Before that attention is diverted from us, however, we have one last opportunity to show the rest of the country that Texas is a dynamic state, committed to shaping its own future. And what better way to prove that fact, than by Texans voting in record numbers during the November general elections?

Few people would disagree that this year's elections are especially critical to our state, in light of our difficult economic situation. There is no doubt that the people we elect next month will be charting the future of Texas. Since each of us has a stake in this process, we must be certain our voices are heard by casting our ballot.

However, voting demands responsibility. Many would contend that it is better not to vote, than to vote without a firm grasp of the issues. As citizens of this state, we have an obligation to learn about each candidate's platform so that we are able to vote with the conviction of our beliefs.

Then, is it better to pay higher individual taxes or higher prices at the counter? We must decide that answer for ourselves.

Question # 2 - Is it better to levy taxes from the federal or from the local level?

Corollary #1 - Does it matter, aren't we going to end up paying the bill anyway?


One argument can be made that when taxes are paid locally, there are fewer middlemen to claim a portion of those monies. Additionally, some would say local tax revenue can be monitored more closely by local residents. Theoretically, this allows each of us to have more of a say regarding how funds are spent.

Is this type of control evident in your community? If you answered, "No," speak up at your town's next council meeting. Your elected officials want to hear from you.

As you probably guessed, there are no right or wrong answers to these questions. This is usually the case when discussing complicated issues. However, I hope this short quiz may have started you thinking. We all need to give these kinds of topics some thought. After all, any constructive act has to begin with an idea. Perhaps something great will come from one of yours.

On a recent visit to The Rock House Springs facility. located south of Caldwell Motors, my first impression was that of a spacious suburban residence.

The earth-tones of the brick exterior flowed inside to the carpeting and pale beige walls. Comfortable furniture and bright accessories added to the relaxed feeling.

It was hard to realize that this was a group home for the very mildly disabled - a Level I House, in clinical language.

Dave Hulett, the director, was not inclined to dwell on this sort of description. A soft-voiced person, he left the impression of individual concern interwoven with strength.

"The home here was built for around 15 people," he said. "There are 15 presently residing here, ages 16 to 59. "They stay here all the time, unless they are carried out for recreation or to go to

church.' Various rooms, large and small, opened from the main hall beyond Hulett's office. I was wondering how any place with 15 residents plus

surroundings. I finally found most of the residents - they were in a large classroom with several teachers. There didn't seem to be complaint from the students - they were digging

into their lessons. Back in Mr. Hulett's office he explained more about this home, which is owned by a private company but operates with a contract from the state. The company has a profit-sharing plan in operation for all employees, and operates with a low turnover of personnel.

Although new to Eastland, there are three Rock House Homes in Stephenville and two in Austin. The company operates on a basic Christian philosophy, Hulett said. This includes emphasis of the worth of each individual, and the concern as to the moral development of clients.

The homes provide services in the area of academic training, home maintenance, personal and social adjustment, and

medial care, he said. A pre-vocational program will begin immediately here, providing a service of shelling pecans for the public

FBI Announces **Burglary Possibilities**

The FBI has announced that, over a 10-year period, an average of one of every four residences throughout the Nation is likely to be burglarized, according to recently tabulated Uniform Crime Reporting probability figures. The data, based on the current residential burglary experience, show the chance is even greater over longer timeframes. For a 30-year period, the burglary probability exceeds an average of one of every two households.

The Nation's households have lost an estimated \$13 billion to burglars during the 1980. Residential burglaries reported to law enforcement totaled more than 13 million from 1980 to 1985, or 27

burglaries annually for every 1,000 households. The average loss per burglary was \$945.

Data concerning those offenses for which time of entry is known show more residential burglaries occur during the daylight hours than at night, and the average loss per break-in is higher for daytime occur-Household rences. burglaries result in greater average losses than those against nonresidential property such as commercial and industrial buildings.

Residential burglary reached a nationwide alltime high between 1980 and 1981. Declines in the next three years were followed by a 3-percent increase in 1985.

These are the kinds of questions faced by many families with aging members.

"Between 80-90 percent of the care needed by elderly persons is provided from within the family," says gerontologist Dr. Judith Warren.

"Sometimes these situations become unsatisfactory, either because the elder is not receiving necessary support, or because one member of the family has been burdened with almost all of the caregiving duties,' she adds.

Family members may also feel the situation can't be changed, when in fact there are resources they can use to discover alternative approaches to their caregiving responsibilities, says Warren, a specialist with the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service home economics program.

The gerontologist points out that family members can learn something about coping with their situation by attending courses on caregiving offered through county

Extension offices; community colleges, health care or other organizations.
