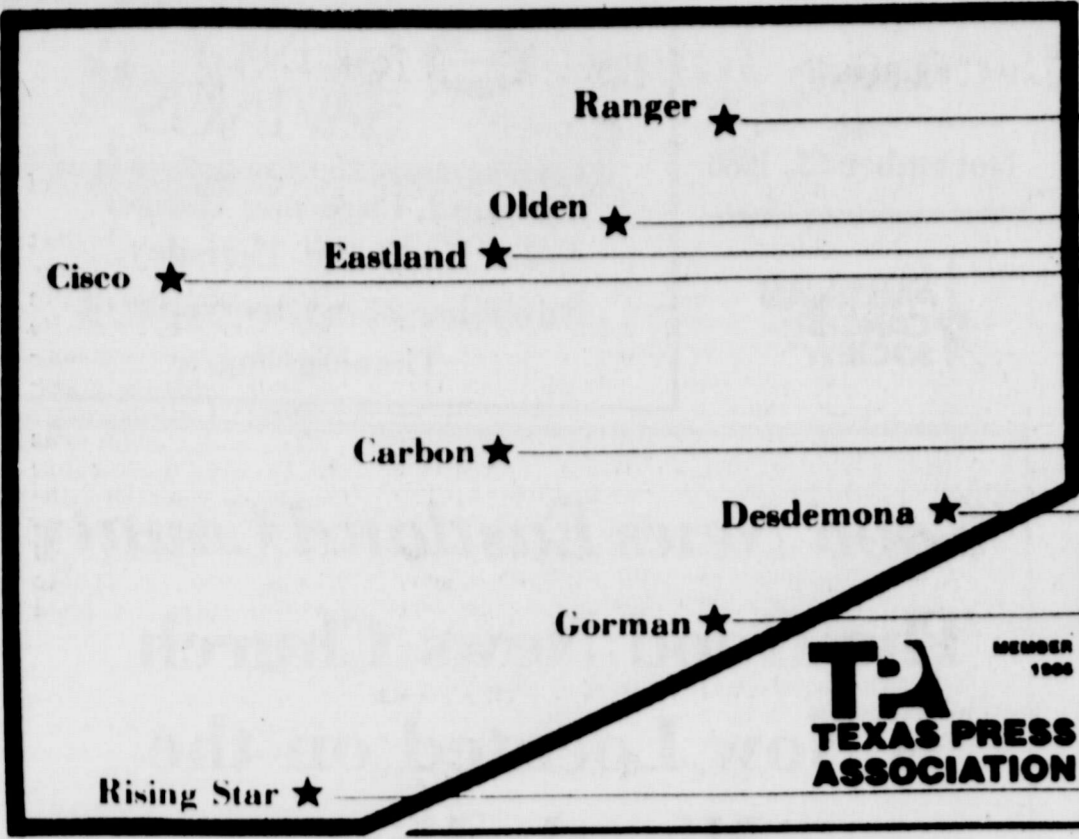

### Area News Briefs

**EASTLAND**  
Eastland City Commissioners have voted to get professional help in determining the fate of the controversial shrubs at the cemetery. At their October meeting, a citizen requested removal of these 600 plus evergreens, stating that they were diseased, had little upkeep, and were unappealing. A survey was then held to determine the opinion of city residents. Results of the survey showed that 59 were for removal and 60 Against. At the latest City Commission meeting the officials decided to seek advice from someone who deals in this type of shrub.

Commissioners have approved the entering of a contract with the Eastland Centennial Memorial Library. The city is giving the library \$6,000 as their part of funds needed for the library to become a part of the Big Country Library System. The contract will be drawn up by City Attorney Mike Siebert.

The Eastland County Pecan Show is scheduled for December 4 and 5 in the Courthouse Lobby. Charles Walker, president of the Eastland County Pecan Growers Association, reports that this is the 34th consecutive Pecan Show in the county. The show is sponsored by the Grower's Association and the Eastland Chamber of Commerce. Plaques will be given to exhibitors of champion in-shell shelling and native entries. Rosettes will be awarded to reserve champions, and ribbons for the first three places.

The Public Health Clinic located in Eastland has announced that it, as well as all Public Health Clinics in Region 4, will begin collecting fees from patients December 1, 1986. Payment will be based on the patient's ability to pay. No one will be denied service because they do not have the money. But because funds for patients have been limited, health costs have soared and the number of patients has increased, those who can contribute will be asked to do so.

**RISING STAR**  
This is being proclaimed "The Year of the Cat" in Rising Star, due to the 1986 Wildcats Football Team being in the Bi-District Playoffs. The Wildcats have not been in a Playoff game since 1973, and spirits are high. The Playoff game this weekend is between the Wildcats and Throckmorton Greyhounds. This is being held Friday night, November 21, in the Clyde Football Stadium. Rising Star has a good chance to win this one.

**RANGER**  
Approximately 25 high school students and 15 parents expressed concern after a recent school board meeting that Ranger Football Coach Phil Bailey may be fired at mid-term. A spokesperson for the group asked if they (the board) would listen to the people if they presented their thoughts to them at a future meeting. President Jones of the board said they could be put on the agenda for a future meeting if the proper papers were filled out. The students and parents ap-

parently feel that just because the team was short on scores does not give the board reason for firing the athletic director. Bailey is reported to be loved and respected by the students, parents and the coaching staff, and the students also say he is a good classroom teacher.

All funds donated during this service will go to the Baird Community Fund, which helps people who have been stranded along the roads and lack resources to help themselves.

# Roaring Ranger Bowl To Be Held December 6

Two former National Champion junior college football teams will meet Saturday, December 6th in the Fourth Annual Roaring Ranger Bowl in Ranger, Texas. Kickoff is at 1 p.m. for the game sanctioned by the National Junior College Athletic Association. The bowl is sponsored locally by the Ranger Chamber of Commerce.

Ranger Junior College of Ranger, which captured the national title in 1979, and is among the top teams in Texas every year, will play host to Northwest Mississippi Junior College of Senatobia, which reigned in the top spot in 1982.

The game in Ranger's newly refurbished Bulldog Stadium will feature two teams of "Rangers" since both teams have the same mascot. The Ranger Rangers enter the game with a 7-3 record and a second place finish in the Texas Junior College Football Federation behind Tyler JC. The Northwest Rangers bring a 10-2 mark to the bowl and finished runner-up to Gulf Coast JC in the Mississippi Junior College Conference.

Ranger will be making its

fifth bowl appearance ever and its third appearance in the Roaring Ranger Bowl. Ranger won the Beef Bowl in Garden City, Kansas in 1978, the Rodeo Bowl in Arkansas City, Kansas in 1979, and lost the Roaring Ranger Bowl to Butler County, Kansas in 1983 and to Jones County, Mississippi in 1984.

Northwest defeated Ferrum, Virginia 14-9 in the East Bowl for the 1982 national championship in its only other bowl appearance.

Ron Butler, II, bowl chairman, expressed his pleasure in the matchup by saying, "We think we will have one of the best games of any of the NJCAA bowls this year. We're bringing in two teams that are always among the top in their own states and are usually found in the top twenty ranking year in and year out. Mississippi and Texas play the best quality junior college football in the country and these two teams both finished second in their states this year. We're looking for a hard-fought, gut-busting contest."

Northwest will bring a running offense into the tilt. The Mississippians have made their reputation on the ground, operating out of a

split backfield and I-formation and running the option often and successfully. Coach Bobby Franklin relies heavily upon the running of two-time all state performer, Leatrice Pickett, a 6'0", 225 lb. tailback who has rushed for 1162 yards this season on 173 carries and ten touchdowns. He has also caught the ball nine times for 94 yards.

Quarterback Leon Reed (5-11, 180 lb.) has started two years and is considered one of the best running and option quarterbacks in Mississippi. The Ranger offense has averaged 325 yards and 27 points per game during the season.

The Northwest defense is led by James "Bo" Holliman at cornerback. Holliman (6-3, 205 lb.) was chosen as the Most Valuable Defensive Back in Mississippi with his eight interceptions and 56 solo tackles. The Rangers have given up only 14 points per game.

Coach Jerry Watson's Ranger Rangers have also run up some impressive stats including being named the number one defense in the Texas Junior College Conference. Ranger's of-

fense did almost as well, finishing number two in overall offense. The Ranger offense averaged 325 yards and the defense allowed only 225 yards per game.

Ranger has several outstanding individual performers including Robert McWright who was named to the first-team All-Conference defensive squad at cornerback, and Keith "L.A." Ellison who has gained a reputation as a man with a nose for the ball at the centerfield free safety position.

Offensively, Ranger has hung its hat on the running of Troy Simpson who has scored 5 TD's and ran for 187 yards on 27 carries in his last outing against arch-rival Cisco. James Benson, a product of six-man football in Abbott, Texas (home of Willie Nelson) has developed into a dependable fullback with a couple of 100 yard games even though he did not start until the second half of the season.

Ranger's kick return game has been exciting this year with the addition of Bobby Johnson of Dallas. The 5'6", 150 lb. Johnson put his credentials as State 100 meter sprint champion to

good use by setting one Texas Junior College record and tying another running back kicks. His punt return of 91 yards broke the standard and his 93 yard kick-off return equalled the all-time best.

Northwest is coming off a heartbreaking 14-13 loss to Gulf Coast in the Mississippi championship game. Ranger finished the regular season with a 16-7 victory over cross-county rival Cisco in the 9th Annual Lions Benefit Bowl in Breckenridge.

Northwest will arrive in Ranger late Thursday, December 4th. They will work out Friday the 5th, at Bulldog Stadium. Both teams will be special guests at a banquet Friday at 7:30 p.m. at the Ranger Public School Cafeteria. Anyone wishing to attend the banquet may make reservations with Kim Watson at the Ranger Chamber of Commerce office at 647-3091.

Kickoff will be at 1 p.m. on Saturday, December 6th at Bulldog Stadium. Tickets are \$4 per person and are available at the Chamber office in the old T&P Depot or by calling 647-3091.

### Two Eastland Men Are Indicted In Taylor County

Taylor County grand jurors indicted two Eastland men in connection with the Oct. 30 abduction of an Abilene woman.

Jerry Wayne Ables, 27, and Cornelius Lamone Govan, 21, were each named in two indictments in the incident, one alleging aggravated robbery and one alleging burglary of a habitation.

The men were arrested in downtown Abilene on Oct. 30 about four hours after the 35-year-old victim was taken from her home, police reported.

The woman came home to the house, which is in the 2800 block of Piping Rock, about 3 p.m., police said. When she walked in she was grabbed by a man who was inside. He and another man bound the woman's arms behind her and tied her

ankles before taking about \$10,000 worth of jewelry and a \$400 VCR, police said. The woman was then driven to a downtown bank where the men forced her to cash a check for \$320, police said.

The men drove the woman, around town before releasing her safely on Southwest Drive, police said. The victim's car was recovered at an apartment complex on South Clack Street.

Each of the indictments charging Ables and Govan contains an allegation the men had each been convicted of a prior felony. If convicted of the enhanced first-degree felony charges, they face a sentence of 15 years to life in prison.

In addition, Ables is named in a third indictment accusing him of another count of burglary.

### Highway Patrol To Conduct Special Enforcement Effort

Captain G.J. Matthews, Commander of the Texas Highway Patrol for Abilene District of the Texas Department of Public Safety, said, "As we approach Thanksgiving Day Weekend, all of us will be making plans of one kind or another for observance of this traditional season of the year. Many DPS officers will be making plans of a different kind. They will be working in an attempt to stimulate safety-consciousness on the part of the motoring public throughout this festive holiday."

The Highway Patrol Service in the Abilene District

will be conducting a special enforcement effort on Wednesday and Sunday of the holiday period. On each of these days a special emphasis program will be generated between the hours of 3:00 p.m. and midnight each day. The majority of enforcement officers will be on duty during those hours in an attempt to apprehend hazardous violators. Special attention will be given to speed and driving while intoxicated. The enforcement officers will be concentrating their efforts in the high traffic and accident problem areas. Matthews stated that Wednesday and

Sunday are targeted since these will be the days of travel for many motorists.

During the weekend of Thanksgiving last year, Texas experienced 34 fatal traffic collisions which results in 38 persons being killed. Captain Matthews said, "Speed and alcohol are the main contributing factors in the majority of our fatal collisions in Texas."

The Texas Department of Public Safety urges all motorists to avoid the use of alcohol or drugs before driving and to obey all the traffic rules and regulations. Slow down a little and live a lot!

"Take one pound..."  
Is there anyone who isn't a recipe collector?

This is not the same as asking if there is anyone who is not a cook. Some of my favorite recipe collectors should be barred from their own kitchens--certainly, they are barred from mine.

But I do love a cookbook, new or old. I actually try some of the recipes. Sometimes.

The old ones I read with interest, but I shy away from. "Render one pound of fresh butter and add two pounds of refined sugar..." Or "Beat the whites of twelve eggs..." I do tend to rely on recipes from one of my great-grandmother's era, but either she standardized her measurements or they were so close to standard that they translated into yummy eating with no problems.

In reading recipes, which I do much oftener than I follow them, I am often repelled by some of the "gourmet" ingredients. No, I do not want to deprive the person who has a real taste for snails of the delectable escargot! I use "delectable" loosely as I do not know from personal experience that snails are delectable. I never will know unless someone tricks me.

There is no urge I can't control to try a recipe that calls first for, "36 unpeeled garlic cloves."

Neither does it rouse any great enthusiasm for what comes next to read, "Boil 1 pound fish trimmings (head, tail and bones)" Mama Marley, the great-grandmother, may have simmered fish trimmings to use to make mush for the cats, but she didn't have to feed her family fish trimmings. Maybe she was not "gourmet" enough to know what great stuff she was wasting when she deep-fried the garbage.

As her food was prepared

with the aid of a woodburning stove, I doubt that she ever did "Deglaze the skillet with the wine." Great-grandpa probably beat her to the wine anyway...for "medicinal purposes."

Another recipe calls for poaching what sounds like chicken patties. To shape these dainty morsels, you "Dip two teaspoons into boiling water. Heap one spoon with the chicken mixture and round off with the other."

The instructions never do say to take the teaspoon out of the boiling water, but that may be supposed to be understood from the use of "dip." However, when skinny-dipping, I don't believe it's customary to pop right out--though of course, you don't skinny dip in boiling water. The English language can stray down some odd paths, can't it?

Some of the recipes I read take all day to prepare. It's nice that we have refrigerators and freezers to help now. What would we do if we had to depend on chefs, second cooks, scullery maids, milk maids and kitchen boys?

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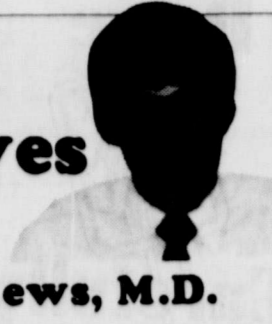
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# Medical Perspectives

**HEADACHES**  
Headaches come in all shapes and sizes, and we all have them from time to time. They are used as excuses in all sorts of situations. Our ears seem to perk up especially when people say they have a "migraine" headache. What is a migraine headache, and when should you see a doctor about a headache? I would like to discuss these questions and others today.

Tension headaches are the most common types of headache. They are directly related to stress in our lives. The pain may be felt in the temples, forehead, neck or back of the head and is often described as a tight band encircling the head. They are commonly associated with demanding jobs and stressful situations, such as taking care of small children, filling out tax returns and balancing the check book. Those who make TV commercials work long and hard to train people to imitate the symptoms of tension headaches. The best solution to tension headaches is to deal with the source of one's stress. Relief may also be obtained from a simple massage, a hot shower, resting in a dark, quiet room with the eyes closed and various other relaxation techniques. If you were a doctor on a desert island, you may also prefer to take Bayer aspirin. Otherwise, you might try Tylenol (acetaminophen), ibuprofen (Advil, Nuprin) or a slightly more potent pain reliever prescribed by your doctor.

Migraine headaches are not just bad headaches. They are also called vascular headaches and result from changes in the diameter of blood vessels going to the brain, at least in theory. They typically affect only one side of the head, usually behind the eye, are throbb-

ing and often are accompanied by vomiting. The migraine headache may last hours or days and may be entirely incapacitating. Some people have warning signs prior to the onset of the headache, such as flashing lights and colors, nausea, dizziness, and numbness. In some individuals, certain factors may trigger the headache—the menstrual cycle, certain foods and additives like mono-sodium glutamate, caffeine, chocolate; strong odors, and cigarette smoke. There is no easy cure for migraine headaches, but most can be controlled by eliminating any known trigger factors and by medications and other therapies. The most successful treatments are those aimed at either

preventing an attack or aborting it in the early stages. A drug called Inderal is now commonly used to prevent the headaches but must be taken consistently and at the proper dose. Certain people especially those with asthma, diabetes or heart trouble may not be able to take this drug, however. Ergot drugs, for example Cafergot, cause the blood vessels to narrow and thus hopefully abort a migraine if taken at the first sign of a headache. Narcotics, either by injection or by mouth, are also helpful but should not be used frequently as they may lead to physical and mental dependence, an even worse problem. If you suffer from what you think may be migraines, see your physician about it. Success requires persistence and good communication between the patient and the physician.

Headaches may be caused by sinus problems—when the membranes lining the sinuses become swollen or the sinuses become plugged or infected. In this case, the pain may be felt over one of the eyebrows or cheekbones,

and there may be fever and almost always a runny nose. Decongestants may be helpful, and occasionally antibiotics may be necessary. Headaches may be caused by high blood pressure. They represent a side effect of a medication—for example anti-inflammatory drugs used in treatment of arthritis. Birth control pills may occasionally cause headaches. Headaches may simply be a signal that it's time to get new glasses or contacts. Depression can also be a cause of chronic headaches.

There are a few signs which should prompt immediate medical attention—a sudden severe headache "out of the blue", especially in an elderly person; confusion or loss of consciousness; headaches, especially in the temple accompanied by partial or total loss of vision; headaches of increasing intensity and frequency; headaches accompanied by a stiff neck and fever.

The vast majority of headaches are not medically serious but are definitely a nuisance. If you have headaches severe enough to

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# Wyley Peebles Gives Program And Workshop

Cisco Junior College students know that when Fine Arts Dept. Wyley Peebles talks about music things are never dull.

The members of the First Baptist Church in Eastland know it too, where he has served as Minister of Music for a number of years.

Members of the Eastland Music Study Club were reminded of this fact again on Wednesday, November 19, when Peebles gave a study and chorus workshop at the Women's Clubhouse.

Some of the Music Club members had been part of the County Choir he had directed for the Sesquicentennial Program in Eastland, and welcomed a chance for more singing.

Admittedly Peebles was not familiar with some of the music he discussed from the Willoughby book "Texas Rhythm - Texas Rhyme" as he is with classical and

choral numbers. His assigned subjects were "Country Blues" and "Western Swing", which are seldom taught in college.

But, like any true musician, he demonstrated an interest in these types of melodies - music which has become an art-form. He also showed that he could play a mean blues on the piano, students.

Mr. Peebles expressed appreciation for the wide scope of musical material available at Maner Learning Center at CJC. He used some of this information to add to the Willoughby book.

He explained that musicians in Europe recognized the "black blues" from the American music more quickly than it was recognized in America. He said that the classical pianist Chopin used this blues rubato structure in a lot of his music.

The blues, Peebles said,

came from the Mississippi deltas and Texas farmlands. It first centered in Dallas and later expanded to Houston.

Blues led to jazz, with its rubato effects and solo improvisations. Then along came Western Swing, which included a number of influences - blues, jazz, tin-pan alley songs, German Polka, Spanish, Anglo reels and Cajun Swing. The "Progressive Country" music of Austin, with its Texas sound, is an outgrowth of that blending, Peebles remarked.

Peebles also said that isolation helped people generate their own type of music. He stated sadly that there is a drought of young musicians today - generally they are merely imitating, not creating.

After this talk, Wyley Peebles led out with some choral music. He included "The Eyes of Texas", "Come to the Bower", and other Sesquicentennial songs.

Club members and guests expressed appreciation for this lively and informative program.

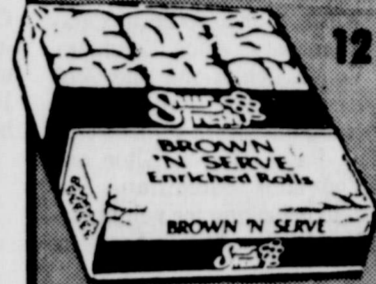

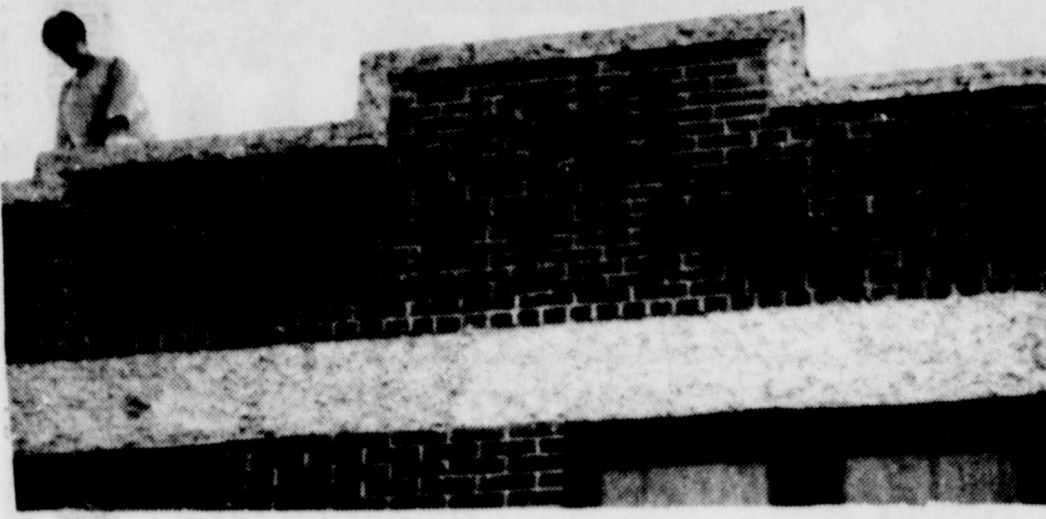

## Life On The Quiet Side

We accidentally found the nest while picking blackberries near the lake behind our home. The enraged mother duck squawked her disapproval when we came upon her private domain. My husband and I backed away and left the berries to their fate, leaving the expectant mother her privacy. We knew her instincts told her she was guarding something precious. She left the nest infrequently for a swim and food. We left bread crumbs and corn near her nest. She came not to fear our careful, distant presence. Soon seven tiny, fuzzy specks followed her around the shores, searching for food, and finally on into the larger part of the lake. Daily we fed them. They would quickly snatch the bread crumbs from the water. The mother would even take bread from our outstretched hands, but would not allow her brood to come too close. She would squawk and swim back and forth in front of them if they approached us. A typical, protective mother.

As the ducklings grew they would stray away from their mother, yet they continued to heed her warning. They never came too close for contact.

One late afternoon my husband and I were puttering around in our backyard when we heard hysterical squawking from the mother and her ducklings. I rushed to the dock. One young duckling was in trouble! It couldn't seem to leave the

spot in the lake it was at. It's wings flapped furiously as the mother duck swam round and round it squawking.

What evil had befallen our favorite, smallest snow white duckling?

My husband waded waist deep to the duckling in distress. The mother moved away, continuing her squawking, seeming to give instructions. To whom, her duckling, or my husband?

He gently lifted the duckling from the water. It became very still in his hands. It's legs were entangled in something. What? He slowly brought it to our dock and took the plastic six pack circle that usually contains coke or beer from its legs.

Once removed, the duckling remained still as we tenderly stroked him/her and spoke soft reassuring words. We wanted to keep it for our own. Yet the mother and the other ducklings looked at us quietly, expectantly, waiting for their own to be released. My husband gently set the duckling into the water and it rushed to it's family, not even looking back.

I don't know why we decided the duckling was male, or why we named him Joseph, but now full grown, he still swims our area and he is one of the few that will take bread from our outstretched hands.

And some say we live life on the quiet side in the slow lane at Lake Brownwood.

## Texas Agriculture Extension Program Planned At Meeting

Specific issues in Eastland County that will receive priority with regard to educational programs by the Extension Service will be these: Profitability of Agricultural Products, Marketing of Agricultural Products, Water Use and Conservation, Parenting, Nutrition and Health, Environmental Concerns, Drug and Alcohol Abuse, Financial Management Youth Involvement in the Communities and Attitudes Affecting Economic Development.

"Our main objective is to deal with the issues of most concern to our citizenry," says DeMarquis Gordon, Janet Thomas and Crystal Akers Wilbanks, county Extension Agents. "We must deal effectively with the issues that have the greatest impact on our citizens—those issues that affect their quality of life. It is particularly important at this time to cope with these issues in the light of the rapid changes occurring in the economy of this area and the entire state."

"We are facing some of the sternest challenges ever regarding our resources, and we must do our best to plan wisely and to direct our efforts to those areas of most concern to our citizens," the agents added.

Such a program has been

developed in each of the state's 254 counties, with input from more than 12,000 citizens across Texas. The program will provide a blueprint for Extension educational programs in agriculture, home economics, natural resources, community

development, and 4-H and youth development for the next four years.

Programs by the Extension Service are made possible by cooperative funding from the U.S. Department of Agriculture, the State of Texas and the County Commissioners Court.
