



Area News Briefs

EASTLAND

Eastland City Commissioners have voted to get professional help in determining the fate of the controversial shrubs at the cemetery. At their October meeting, a citizen requested removal of these 600 plus evergreens, stating that they were diseased, had little upkeep, and were unappealing. A survey was then held to determine the opinion of city residents. Results of the survey showed that 59 were For removal and 60 Against. At the latest City Commission meeting the officials decided to seek advice from someone who deals in this type of shrub.

Commissioners have approved the entering of a contract with the Eastland Centennial Memorial Library. The city is giving the Library \$6,000 as their part of funds needed for the Library to become a part of the Big Country Library System. The contract will be drawn up by City Attorney Mike Siebert.

Pecan Show is scheduled for December 4 and 5 in the Courthouse Lobby. Charles Walker, president of the Eastland County Pecan Growers Association, reports that this the 34th consecutive Pecan Show in the county. The show is sponsored by the Grower's Association and the Eastland Chamber of Commerce. Plaques will be given to exhibitors of champion inshell shelling and native entries. Rosettes will be awarded to reserve champions, and ribbons for the first three places.

The Public Health Clinic located in Eastland has announced that it, as well as all Public Health Clinics in Region 4, will begin collecting fees from patients December 1, 1986. Payment will be based on the patient's ability to pay. No one will be denied service because they do not have the money. But because funds for patients have been limited, health costs have soared and the number of patients has increased, those who can contribute will be asked to do so.

The Eastland Ministerial Alliance will hold a Community Thanksgiving Service at Camp Inspiration Church of God at 7 p.m. Wednesday, November 26. The Rev. Ben Tibbs of the First United Methodist Church will give the sermon, with a number of other local ministers taking part in the program. No, I do not want to deprive the person who has a real taste for snails of the delectable escargot! I use "delectable" loosely as I do not know from personal experience that snails are delectable. I never will know unless someone tricks me.

There is no urge I can't control to try a recipe that calls first for, "36 unpeeled garlic cloves.

Neither does it rouse any great enthusiasm for what comes next to read, "Boil 1 pound fish trimmings (head, tail and bones)" Mama Marley, the greatgrandmother, may have simmered fish trimmings to use to make mush for the cats, but she didn't have to feed her family fish trimmings. Maybe she was not 'gourmet" enough to know what great stuff she was wasting when she deep-sixed the garbage. As her food was prepared

with the aid of a woodburning stove, I doubt that she ever did "Deglaze the skillet with the win." Greatgrandpa probably beat her to the wine anyway...for "medicinal purposes."

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
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

Medical Perspectives

HEADACHES

Headaches come in all shapes and sizes, and we all have them from time to time. They are used as excuses in all sorts of situations. Our ears seem to perk up especially when people say they have a "migraine" headache. What is a migraine headache, and when should you see a doctor about a headache? I would like to discuss these questions and others today.

Tension headaches are the most common types of headache. They are directly related to stress in our lives. The pain may be felt in the temples, forehead, neck or back of the head and is often described as a tight band encircling the head. They are commonly associated with demanding jobs and stressful situations, such as taking care of small children, filling out tax returns and balancing the check book. Those who make TV commercials work long and hard to train people to immitate the symptoms of tension headaches. The best solution to tension headaches is to deal with the source of one's stress. Relief may also be obtained from a simple massage, a hot shower, resting in a dark, quiet room with the eyes crosed and various other relaxation techniques. If you were a doctor on a desert island, you may also prefer to take Bayer aspirin. Otherwise, you might try Tylenol (acetaminophen), ibuprcfen (Advil, Nuprin) or a slightly more potent pain reliever prescribed by your doctor.

Migraine headaches are not just bad headaches. They are also called vascular headaches and result from changes in the diameter of blood vessels going to the brain, at least in theory. They typically affect only one side of the head, usually behind the eye, are throbb-

ing and often are accompanied by vomiting. The migraine headache may last hours or days and may be entirely incapacitating. Some people have warning signs prior to the onset of the headache, such as flashing lights and colors, nausea, dizziness, and numbness. In some individuals, certain factors may trigger the headache-the menstrual cycle, certain foods and additives like mono-sodium glutamate, caffeine, chocolate; strong odors, and cigarette smoke. There is no easy cure for migraine headaches, but most can be controlled by eliminating any known trigger factors and by medications and other therapies. The most successful treatments are those aimed at either aborting it in the early stages. A drug called Inderal is now commonly used to prevent the headaches but must be taken consistently and at the proper dose. Certain people especially those with asthma, diabetes or heart trouble may not be able to take this drug. however. Ergot drugs, for example Cafergot, cause the blood vessels to narrow and thus hopefully abort a migraine if taken at the first sign of a headache. Narcotics, either by injection or by mouth, are also helpful but should not be used frequently as they may lead to physical and mental dependence, an even worse problem. If you suffer from what you think may be migraines, see your physician about it. Success requires persistence and good communication between the patient and the physician.

Headaches may be caused by sinus problems-when the membranes lining the sinuses become swollen or the sinuses become plugged or infected. In this case, the pain may be felt over one of the eyebrows or cheekbones.

and there may be fever and almost always a runny nose. Decongestants may be helpful, and occasionally antibiotics may be necessary.

Headaches may be caused by high blood pressure. They represent a side effect of a medication-for example anti-inflammatory drugs used in treatment of arthritis. Birth control pills may occasionally cause headaches. Headaches may simply be a signal that it's time to get new glasses or contacts. Depression can also be a cause of chronic headaches.

There are a few signs which should prompt immediate medical attention-a sudden severe headache "out of the blue", especially in an elderly person: confusion or loss of consciousness: headaches, especially in the temple accompanied by partial or total loss of vision: headaches of increasing intensity and frequency: headaches accompanied by a stiff neck and fever.

The vast majority of headaches are not medically serious but are definitely a nuisance. If you have headaches severe enough to

Cisco Junior College students know that when Fine Arts Dept. Wyley Peebles talks about music things are never dull.

The members of the First Baptist Church in Eastland know it too, where he has served as Minister of Music for a number of years.

Members of the Eastland Music Study Club were reminded of this fact again on Wednesday, November 19, when Peebles gave a study and chorus workshop at the Women's Clubhouse.

Some of the Music Club members had been part of the County Choir he had directed for the Sesquicentennial Program in Eastland, and welcomed a chance for more singing.

Admitedly Peebles was not familiar with some of the music he discussed from the Willoughby book "Texas Rhythm - Texas Rhyme" as he is with classical and

choral numbers. His assigned subjects were "Country Blues" and "Western Swing", which are seldom taught in college.

But, like any true musician, he demonstrated an interest in these types of melodies - music which has become an art-form. He also showed that he could play a mean blues on the piano, students.

Mr. Peebles expressed appreciation for the wide scope of musical material available at Maner Learning Center at CJC. He used some of this information to add to the Willoughby book.

He explained that musicians in Europe recognized the "black blues" from the American music more quickly than it was recognized in America. He said that the classical pianist Chopin used this blues rubatto structure in a lot os his music. The blues, Peebles said,

came from the Mississippi deltas and Texas farmlands. It first centered in Dallas and later expanded to Houston.

Blues led to jazz, with its rubatto effects and solo improvisitions. Then along came Western Swing, which included a number of influences - blues, jazz, tin-pan alley songs, German Polka, Spanish, Anglo reels and Cajun Swing. The "Progressive Country" music of Austin, with its Texas sound, is an outgrowth of that blending, Peebles remarked.

Peebles also said that isolation helped people generate their own type of music. He stated sadly that there is a drouth of young musicians today - generally they are merely imitating, not creating.

After this talk, Wyley Peebles led out with some choral music. He included 'The Eyes of Texas' "Come To the Bower", and other Sesquicentennial
