Christmas Program To Be Held

Plans are complete for the "Christmas at the Hilton" program at the Mobley Hotel at 8 p.m. Friday, Dec. 19, according to a report Tuesday by Co-Chairmen Sherry Wright and Yolanda Anderson of the sponsoring Cisco Civic League.

The highlight of the program will be the presentation of the cantata "Merry Christmas" by Don Wyrzten and Phil Brower by a community choir of some 30 voices under the direction of Miss Pam Jackson. Soloist of the cantata will be Doyle Walker, Cisco High School football coach. Others in

leading roles include Susan Wester, Sue Covert and Brenda Thomas.

The cantata will feature traditional Christmas music and Mrs. Wester and Mrs. Betty Odom have been working with the choir in rehearsals. Taped music will accompany the choir during the performance.

Miss Jackson, the director, is choir director at First United Methodist Church and is a member of the music faculty of the Cisco Public Schools.

The cantata will tell a Christmas story with music, featuring a grandmother

recalling the holidays in her home. Mrs. Mary Bob Leveridge, retired teacher, plays the part of the grandmother.

Tickets will be on sale

through Thursday, Dec. 18, by members of the Cisco Civic League and at the Chamber of Commerce offices. Mrs. Betty McGinness is chairman of ticket sales.

Proceeds from the "Christmas at the Hilton" program will be used by the Civic League to help finish the kitchen at the restored Mobley Hilton.

Eastland County Jail In Compliance - Population Count Of Sixteen

"At this time there are sixteen (prisoners) in the jail - we are in total compliance."

This was the information brought by Sheriff Don Underwood to a called meeting of the County Commissioners Court on Monday, December 15.

All four Commissioners were present at the meeting, with Commissioner C.B. Dill, Pct. 4, presiding. County Judge Scott Bailey was absent, due to illness in his family.

The sheriff's report was obviously good news to the Commissioners, who learned on December 3 of the Texas Jail Standard's Commission's Court Order placed on the Eastland County Jail.

On December 8, Sheriff Underwood received an official letter from the Jail Commission, directing that he comply with the Order within 15 days. This included the segregation of prisoners

as outlined by the Commission, and keeping of the jail population down to 25.

Sheriff Underwood stated to the Court that District Judge Jim Wright and District Attorney Emory Walton had been "Very cooperative - worked a lot of the week on this."

"They set a bunch of cases and got them out of jail," the Sheriff reported. "Everyone has been receptive of our problems."

When asked by the Commissioners if guidelines were set (on keeping down the jail population) during a meeting with the County Law Enforcement Officers on December 10, Underwood replied that "We have not set strict guidelines. We are going about this on a voluntary basis."

The sheriff requested that the Commissioners give him authority in emergencies to negotiate contracts with other counties to keep prisoners.

The County Commissioners approved this arrangement on a temporary-emergencies basis, to stay in compliance with the Jail Standards Commission order that the total in the Eastland County Jail not exceed 25.

"We've been extremely lucky," Underwood said, referring to the current low count at the jail. "Normally we get several people every weekend for drug possession and other things which cannot be dealt with quickly by the courts."

In other business, the Commissioners approved a supplementary budget item of \$264.50 for the D.P.S. Court Clerk Coordinator. This request was brought to the Court by Sgt. Jerry Matthews, who noted that it would cover fees for a Notary Appointment and Bond, and secretarial office supplies for one year.

As the meeting concluded the Commissioners reported that they were very pleased with the repair work done on the interior of the courthouse

by Sam Justice of Rising Star. This includes work in the County Agent's office, the Tax Collectors and County Auditors offices, and the County Tax Appraisal offices.

The County Commissioners will hold a regular meeting on Monday, December 22. At that time they will hear a report from a structural engineer on his survey of the condition of the outside of the Courthouse.

New Judge To Take Bench On January 1, In Eastland County

A 36 year old Abilene attorney was selected by Governor Mark White to fill the vacancy in the 11th Court of Appeals in Eastland left by Raleigh Brown who is retiring December 31.

William G. "Bud" Arnot III will become one of the youngest appellate judges in the state when he takes the bench January 1.

Arnot was selected from six applicants, and at least three of those were district judges including Eastland's own 91st District Judge Jim R. Wright.

A longtime friend of Mark White, Arnot said he hadn't considered seeking the appointment until he was approached by friends who asked if he would consider allowing them to submit his name. He said he was both flattered and flabbergasted when he was appointed.

The appointment will last until the next general election in 1988 and then the term will be elected for only the

remaining two years of Brown's term. The next full 6 year term will not come up for election until 1990.

Arnot attended Washington and Lee University before receiving a BBA degree from the University of Texas at Austin in 1972. He graduated from Baylor Law School in 1975 and while in school he worked as a summer intern in the Taylor County district attorney's office.

After graduation, he joined the Abilene law firm of Wagstaff, Harrell, Alvis, Stubbeman, Seamster & Longacre and later became a partner.

He became one of the founding partners of Glandon, Erwin, Scarborough, Baker, Choate & Arnot in 1982.

A native of Breckenridge, he is co-owner of Paloma Exploration which is an oil and gas company and is headquartered in Breckenridge.

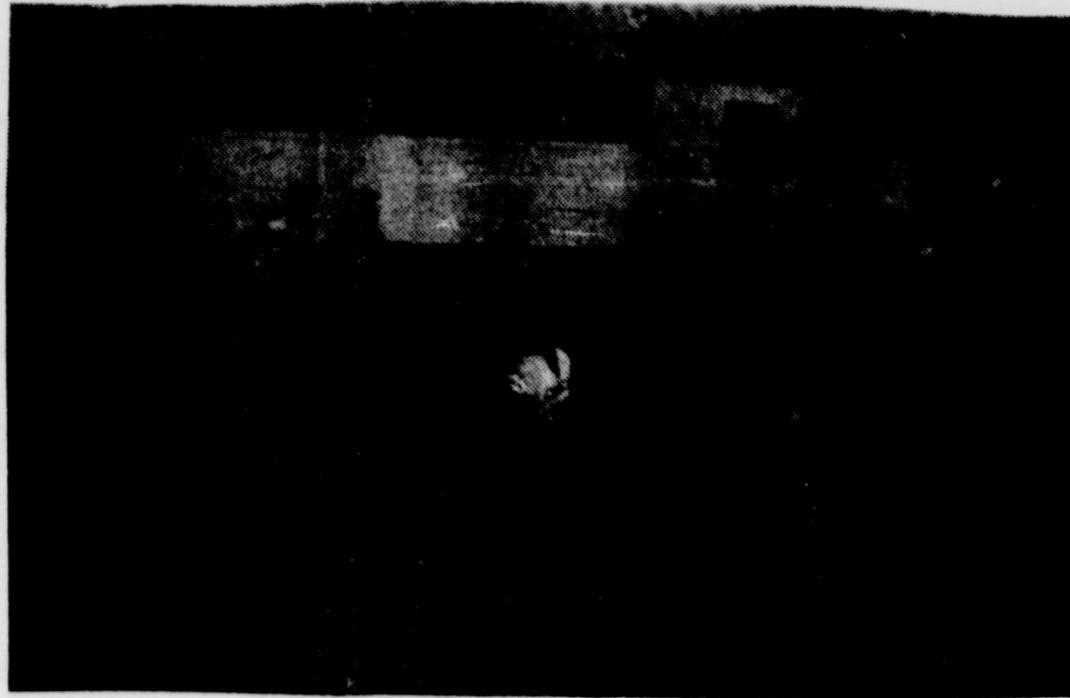
Student Council, band, and flag corps. Her favorite subjects are English and government.

Gold And Silver In Eastland County

In the last "Gold and Silver in Eastland County," I promised to state where gold and silver were located in the county. I do not presume to know where all of it is, just my personal knowledge.

There is one gold mine (90' shaft) just over the Callahan County line south of Putnam toward Indian Peaks. I am fairly sure it is not Spanish. In the 1930s it was a producing mine. There is one Spanish mine between May and Rising Star (either mined out or a poor producer). There is a mine near Hogtown (Desdemona) which appears to be Spanish in origin. Flour gold in trinity sands can be found on the branches of Sabanna River between Union Center and Rising Star. Due west of there is a 134 foot horizontal shaft which has not been mined in over 40 years (mostly gold). Americans were the last persons to operate this mine. In the canyon north of Cisco was an old mine from which gold was extracted many years ago.

Southwest of Cisco a solitary miner mined gold and silver ore (about 3 miles from town). He never showed anyone the mine shaft so it has become lost.

Although not in Eastland County I found flour gold in trinity sands of the Leon River east of Lake Proctor.

On the TV news recently, a company leased land south of Van Horn and is now mining for gold in a large vein. There is something wrong with the report, notably the news mentioned south of Dell City (which is west of El Capitan in the Guadalupe Mountains), but Van Horn is between Dell City and El Paso. Someone either didn't know their geography or was being deliberately misleading. If it was south of Eagle Mountains this vein of gold could be Col. Snively's lost ledge of gold and if east of El Capitan in the Rustlers' Hills it may be Sublett's mine. If it is either of the above it would be a rich strike, as Col. Snively's ledge of gold was one of the richest strikes in the west and most people know of Sublett's mine.

I was unable to gain anymore info on the following, so maybe some one of our readers can help me. It involves a murdered man (alleged to have been killed by a blow to the head with a sharp instrument). He had 2 Spanish silver bars in a leather bag next to him about two and a half miles from an Indian burial ground a few miles south of the community of Long Branch on the Long Branch of the Sabanna in a canyon. These and other clues were related to me by truthful people but no official record exists or was destroyed. A least I was unable to discover a record of name, time and only approximate location.

A word of caution, do not enter private property without written permission or you may be shot at or jailed. Rest assured the Spanish nor the 49ers didn't get all the gold or silver in Texas or the West.

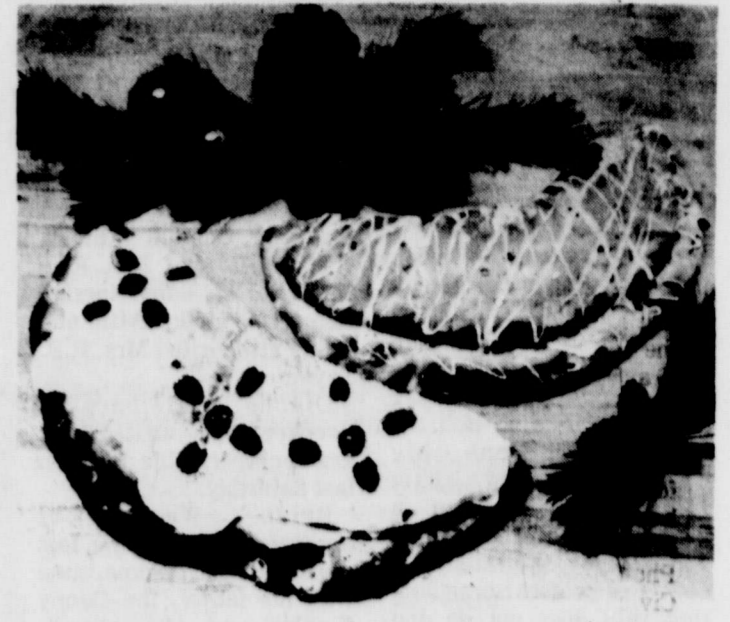

Add eggs. Blend at low speed until moistened; beat 3 minutes at medium speed. By hand, gradually stir in cherries, citron, raisins, walnuts and enough remaining flour to make a firm dough. Knead on floured surface until smooth and elastic, 5 to 8 minutes. Place in greased bowl, turning to grease top. Cover; let rise in warm place until light and double, about 1 hour (30 minutes for Quick-Rise Yeast).

I've Been Wrong Before

But it seems to me that the ability to read or write are only indications of a potential for literacy rather than proof of it. There is a saying "Use it or lose it."

You are obviously reading a news paper but many supposed literate people don't even do that, much less take time to read a book. The library? Well, I have to confess that I seldom look in there. I don't have a library card and the books I read are mostly given to me, though I buy a few. Still, I believe in libraries, at least as much as some people believe in their religion. Like, it is nice to know it is there, in case—

Carlisle said that the only true university is a collection of books. I have a lot of books gathering dust on the shelves but many I just never found time to read. Like most people, the TV commands all that time. But why learn to read if you never do? Just think of all those miserable hours wasted learning. Well, maybe you do read a pay check but I bet you don't read instructions on say, a can of shoe polish. And if you do read can you understand such things as are found on many packages?

A friend once used a bottle of drain opener. He burned his hand when he touched the clogged trap. "What the Devil is in that stuff," he asked me.

"Aren't the ingredients listed on the bottle?" I asked.

He said they were but he didn't know what oil of virtul was. When I asked if he would dump concentrated sulfuric acid in the sink he said that was forbidden in chemistry class. He could hardly believe that indeed he had until he consulted Webster. So I asked him if he used spirits of hearts horn.

He didn't think so until I informed him that it was only ammonia. A druggist would know those archaic names for things but a manufacturer is only required to list ingredients on packages. It seems that if a name no longer in use serves their purpose they will run one in on a consumer, strictly obeying the law, you see?

All of that has little to do with my problem of the aging of an old friend. From that friend I learned those old chemical terms. The older edition of DISEASES OF CATTLE put out by the DEPT OF AG. is almost exactly like the latter except that the terminology is updated. The old pages grow yellow and brittle. Soon, as mentioned in one "Believe It Or Not" TV show (the paper will be dust. Some very old books will outlast later ones because they were printed on rag or linen paper whereas most are now on wood pulp paper which is cheaper.

Is there no way that our modern libraries can survive more than a fraction of the time some libraries of clay tablets in languages no longer used have survived? Some may consider putting them on microfilm but early movies have already been lost because celuloid films deteriorated. How durable are microfilm? For that matter, does anyone know for sure how long anything as new as a computer chip will survive? Now there is a project for research.

An ancient Chinese ruler is said to have ordered all books destroyed and rewritten so that future generations would consider that all knowledge had its origin in his reign. Like good citizens will, many hid their books and the man who wanted to go down in history as the father of all knowledge simply went down in history for what he was, a very small mind and over inflated ego.

Of considerable more success were the efforts of small men who claimed that the very durable lead in printing plates was needed during WW II. Thus they succeeded in destroying many books they did not want reprinted. The fact is that the lead was not that critically short.

So how can libraries preserve rare old books and manuscripts? It is certainly too much of a job for smaller institutions but the great ones should be equal to such a task unless like those old movie reels, time slips up on them.

Even as the blessing of the printing press became a curse when lies were printed, people deceived and morals perverted, so the curse of photo printing by people in Taiwan infringing on copyrights of legitimate publishers should be turned to a blessing if great libraries were to catalogue their old books, gather the best and most valued to be photo copied on more expensive paper.

They can not all be put under glass in an atmosphere of helium or other inert gasses as a few documents are. Too unwieldy but though they would lose the distinction and antique value of originals the contents would be preserved faithfully.

A friend who thought he had a valuable old book because the date was in Roman numerals was a bit disappointed when I told him I believe the MCMXL date

was 1940. The book was by Louisa May Alcot, whose name I seem to recall from my school days but I'll be hanged if I recall what she wrote. Anyhow the value of the old book lies not strictly in its age but also in its historic significance. Too illustrate, there may be paintings older than Rembrants, or other old masters but the prices go not simply by age.

My spelling which was never good becomes steadily worse so maybe I will say it because the pages of my old dictionary are crumbling with age. No kidding, I have to get a newer one. I might resort to "Y'know" or "well, whatever" but somehow those seem to lack exactness required for honestly conveying thoughts.

An ancient Egyptian belief was that by writing anything in washable ink, washing it off the papyrus with beer and drinking the beer the knowledge would be gained. Actually it is like jotting anything down on a note but after seeing it a bit longer before ones eyes there is no more need of the note as it is fixed in the memory. Besides, with all one should learn that Egyptian method would lead to monumental hang-overs and miserable alcoholism. Metallic content of some inks might be equally bad for the body and mind.

In these days of powdered coffee, instant tea, instant potatoes, etc. someone might try hot water over those powdered pages of old books but the result would be more disappointing than I find most instant food products; instant garbage.

To what profitable use do we put all that time and labor saving from the instant products? Watching soap operas, videos, and listening to rock (?) music?

To Receive

Another Refund

West Texas Utilities Co. plans another refund to its retail customers early next year.

The company was to file a request Wednesday with the Public Utility Commission of Texas requesting permission to refund a total of \$4.9 million in retail revenues collected in excess of actual fuel costs during October and November. The total includes \$4.7 million actual fuel cost savings, plus \$2 million in interest.

Jack Kennedy, local WTU manager, said recently negotiated contract revisions reflecting the continued soft price of natural gas makes the refund necessary.

"As our cost for boiler fuel went down, we simply over-collected under the fuel rate approved by the PUC," Kennedy said.

This will be the fifth refund made to WTU retail customers since the summer of 1985. With each refund, the fuel rates charged to customers have been adjusted, but the price of natural gas, WTU's main power plant boiler fuel, has continued to decline.

WTU's base rates have not changed since December 1984. However, company officials have said that a base rate increase will be necessary after the new coal-fired Oklaunion Power Station near Vernon is completed and placed in service. The assumed supply of coal under a long-term contract is expected to stabilize WTU's power plant fuel costs and to partially offset the necessary base rate increase.

The refund will be made through one-time credits to retail customers in January or February depending on when the PUC approves it. The typical residential customer will receive about \$9.00.
