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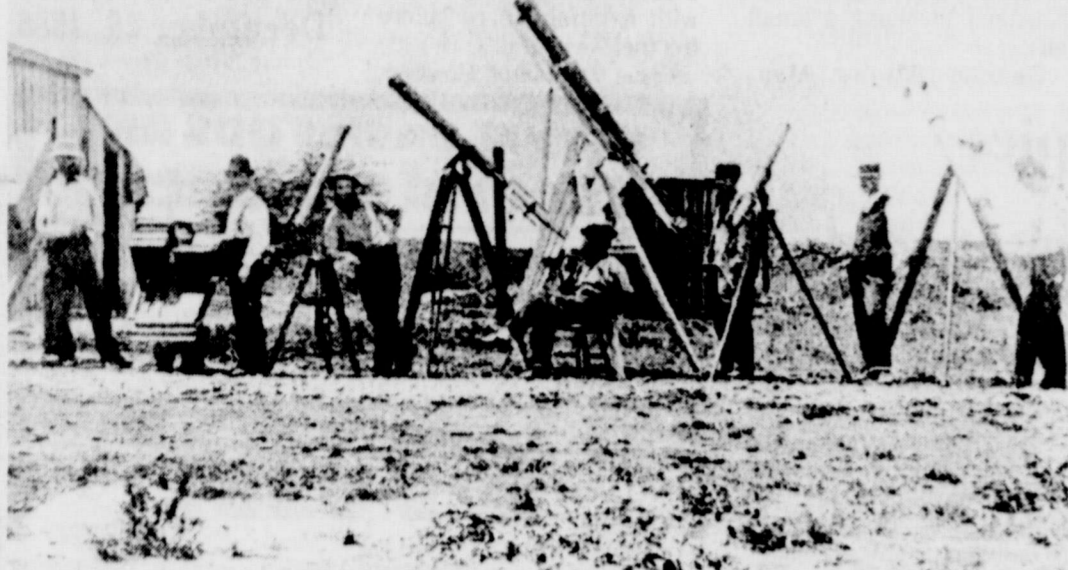
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# Science Is Bright Deep In The Heart Of Texas



In 1878, observers assembled at Forth Worth to watch a rare transit of Mercury across the face of the sun.

We Texans tend to think it was oil alone that kept Texas running and space that launched us into a new future. But the story, and importance, of science and technology in Texas is much longer than that; and oil and space are just two of its chapters.

"The fact is, Texas science and technology is much bigger and more beautiful than anybody has ever realized, including me," Dr. Loyd Swenson says. "In fact, while oil and space are key elements in the story, they were by no means central to the development of Texas Science and technology," he adds.

A science historian in the University of Houston history department, Swenson reached this conclusion after co-editing 100 Years of Science and Technology in Texas, a book tracing the roots of science and technology in the Lone Star State from 1886 to the present.

While astronauts and oil may dominate our thinking, Swenson says we're forgetting about the pioneer days and the development of barbed wire, the use of windmills, or research in cotton or screw-worms.

We have also seen pioneering genetic research on the fruit fly, development of an influential school in mathematics, output from the first successful solar thermal power plant, and the establishment of a top-notch astronomical observatory.

Swenson's book is being published by the Southeast Texas Council of Sigma Xi, The Scientific Research Society, through the Rice University Press to mark its own 100th anniversary as well as the Sesquicentennials of Texas and Houston.

Planning for the book started three years ago and the actual writing and editing began two years ago. It mentions scientists from Ferdinand Von Roemer, a German who published Texas' first scientific article (about the state's geology) to Maurice Ewing, a native Texan and father of oceanography. More than 20 authors were selected from across the state. Each chapter in Part 2 traces the development since World War II of specific fields in science and technology, from geology to psychiatry. "This book should become the reference work on the history of Texas science and technology until the Hand-

dollars of research, establishing endowed professorships, and ensuring Texas' major role in the chemical industry.

Or consider William Johnson McDonald, a northeast Texas lawyer-banker. It seems that he and his heirs had a falling out, so, to keep them from sharing his estate, he left his money to the University of Texas to build an astronomical observatory.

After McDonald died, the heirs were amazed to discover his will and contested it in court, trying to prove him weak of mind. During litigation McDonald's personal barber told of his former client's dream to "build an observatory to see the pearly gates and to know who's inside."

The outcome? The case was settled out of court, UT built the McDonald Observatory in West Texas with the help of the University of Chicago, and still, no one has reported any sighting of the pearly gates!

book of Texas is updated about five years from now," Swenson says.

And as might be expected, the story of science and technology in the state is dotted with personalities that grow larger with time. For example, Robert Alonzo Welch, a successful merchant, decided that the future of Texas would be linked to the chemical industry. So, 25 years ago, he established the Welch Foundation. His foundation has grown in importance each year, sponsoring millions of

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# Area News Briefs

**BAIRD**  
Callahan County Historical Commission members honored their retiring chairman and nominated new officers during the final meeting of 1986. Mrs. John Berry of Clyde is retiring as chairman after 15 years of service. Mrs. Berry was given a plaque in honor of her work as chairman, and also for her 24-year membership. Jud Gilliland of Baird has been nominated as chairman for the 1986-87 term, with Mrs. Archie Nichols of Baird as treasurer.

The year 1986 has been noted as a very active one by the Callahan County Historical Commission. The publishing of the County History Book was the largest undertaking, but several Historical Markers were also placed. These were at the Hittson Ranch Headquarters, east of Putnam, the First Baptist Church in Baird, and the Texas and Pacific Railroad Depot in Baird. This building is also under restoration. Numerous other activities were also held throughout the county in celebration of the Sesquicentennial.

The Callahan Divide Soil and Water Conservation District is making the purchase of quality trees and shrubs for windbreak plantings available to landowners at a reasonable cost. Included in these are Afghanistan Pine, Austrian Pine, Eastern Red Cedar, Arizona Cypress and Ponderosa Pine. There are also nine species of bare rooted hardwoods available in bundles of 25.

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**RANGER**  
Norman Christian, who was named Commissioner of Pct. 2, in the 1986 election, will begin his term of office on January 1. Bill Riddell, who was appointed to this position after the death of Commissioner Jack Blackwell will resume his duties as Foreman of the Pct. 2 road crew. Mr. Christian has attended various Commissioners Court sessions this year to learn of current issues. He was sworn into office by County Judge Scott Bailey on December 22.

The Ranger area is winding down its Christmas celebration, with interest now centered on the New Year. One highlight of the season was the Christmas Concert performed by the Elementary School Music Department and Ranger Bulldog Chorus, in which each grade represented a country and a song. This program, presented in the high school gym, was under the direction of Mrs. Cindi Jobe.

Buddy Davis, Billy Bradshaw, David Cross, David Pickrell and Glendale Burkhalter, all Ranger firefighters, attended a training session at Dyess Air Force Base in Abilene last weekend. Also attending were four firemen from Cisco. The training included all aspects of firefighting, including car fires, house fires, chemical fires etc. There was also training on aircraft fires, including emergency procedures in rescuing personnel from planes and how to disarm the ejection seat. The Ranger firemen state that they enjoyed the course and feel they learned a lot.

**EASTLAND**  
Tommy E. Hixson, structural engineer, brought a optimistic report to the County

Commissioners about the condition of the Courthouse. He says that the building which was first occupied in 1928, is "structurally sound", with any cracking or settling confined to the outer surface or interior walls. He recommended that his data be filed and the building monitored every few years, with the floor levels surveyed. Minor repairs were suggested for various places in the building. Commissioners said this would certainly cost a lot less than what they had feared. Some repairs have already been made to the interior of the building.

Edith McCullough, who retires January 1, as County Treasurer, and C.B. Dill, who retires as County Commissioner, Pct. 4, were honored with a reception in the Courthouse on Monday, December 22. Mrs. McCullough has spent 26 years in county offices and Mr. Dill has spent 24 years as County Commissioner. A number of people from all around the county stopped by to wish them well in their change of pace. The reception was hosted by County Officials.

The First Baptist Church of Eastland announced a new ministry for the deaf and hearing impaired. On Sundays, the 11 a.m. and 7 p.m. services are now being interpreted in sign language. 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## Water Board Approves

### \$1.9 Mil. For Projects

AUSTIN--The Texas Water Development Board today approved \$1,945,000 in loans to local governments across the state to help them build needed water supply and wastewater treatment facilities.

The Board also approved \$198,436 in grants for planning to help meet future water needs and control flooding in the state.

The largest loan, for \$850,000, was extended to the Brookshire Municipal Water District in Waller County to help it improve its existing sewerage system. The project includes construction of a 350,000 gallon-per-day treatment plant that will operate with an existing plant. Other improvements will include approximately 155 repairs to the sewage collection system. The Brookshire M.W.D. serves about 3,000 people in an area approximately 35 miles west of Houston.

Other loans authorized by the Board at its meeting included:

-\$500,000 to the town of Fulton in Aransas County to help pay for the first phase of a project to improve sewerage service to the town's 1,002 citizens. The loan will help build a new wastewater treatment plant and sewage collection system.

-\$320,000 to the Angelina-Neches River Authority to allow the agency to meet its 50 percent share of a matching planning grant to continue studies and design of the proposed Eastex Reservoir Project. The other half of the cost of these studies is being funded through a Water Development Board grant made in July.

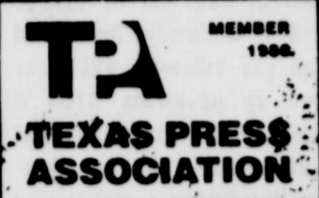
-\$275,000 to the City of Ladonia in Fannin County to drill a new water well, build a water storage tank, and install a water line from the well to the distribution system. The city, with a population of 762, is about 75 miles northeast of Dallas.

Grants authorized by the Board at the meeting included:

-\$176,356 to the Brazoria

County Conservation and Reclamation District No. 3 to pay for 60 percent of the cost of developing a comprehensive drainage and flood protection plan for the district. Extensive flood damage has occurred in the area south of Houston in the last 15 years, and the district's plan will provide ways to improve drainage and minimize future flood damage.

-\$22,080 to the Texas Multi-State Water Resources Planning Commission to pay for the Commission's operations during fiscal year 1987. The Commission was established by the Texas Legislature in 1985, but received no appropriations for its expenses. Staff support for the agency, which is to study regional water needs and water development strategies in cooperation with neighboring states and Mexico, is provided by the Water Development Board.

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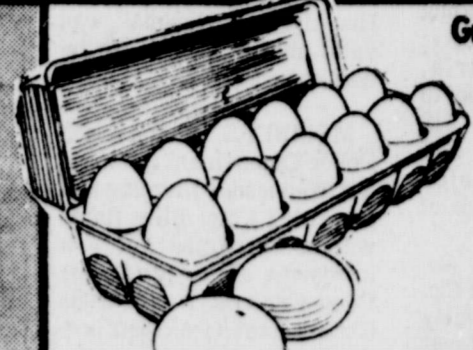

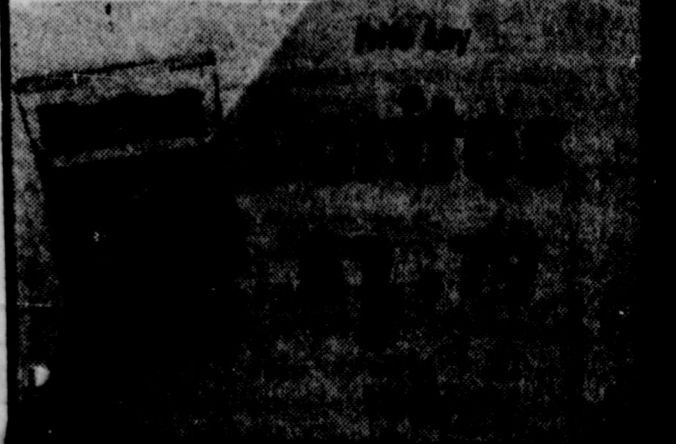
