# **Train Derails Tuesday**

Traffic was interrupted on the Missouri Pacific Railroad's main line through this region late Tuesday, Dec. 23, due to the derailment of 24 freight cars, including some 15 tank cars carrying chemicals, eight miles west of Cisco.

The derailment took place at about 7 p.m. Tuesday near the old Highway 80-PutnamCisco road - five miles east of Putnam and eight miles west of Cisco. The site was about a quarter of a mile inside Callahan County and a half mile or more north of I-20.

Although hazardous chemicals were spilled from some 13 of the tank cars, there appeared to be no serious health or en-

# **New State Sales Tax To Go In Effect Jan.1**

AUSTIN,---State Comptroller Bob Bullock has reminded Texans not to forget the increase in the sales tax rate that begins New Year's Day-January 1, 1987

"Only the rate has changed. In every case, what is and what is not taxable under current sales tax law remains the same when the new law goes into effect January 1,'' reminded Bullock.

A special session of the Texas Legislature raised the state's sales tax rate one and one-eighth percent to deal with a shortfall of tax revenue caused by the collapse of oil prices. The state sales tax rate goes from 4.125 to 5.25 percent. The local additional city sales tax remains one cent for a total tax of 6.25%.

Comptrollar Bullock said that in many areas of Texas the state rate and local sales taxes, including transit and

city sales taxes will put the combined rate to as much as 7.25 percent. In making accounting changes to collect the new tax rate, business should have adjusted cash registers and alerted and trained their personnel to collect sales tax at the new local rates. The new law also raised

the motor fuels tax 5 centsfrom 10 cents to 15 cents a gallon. "My office has contacted

vironmental damages, according to Mary Ellen Mc-Clary, EPA official from Austin, who came here to inspect the wreckage. She said no harmful levels of toxic materials was found in water, air or soil samples in the wreckage area.

Some 50 railroad workers and officials and a dozen tank trucks brought in by the Western Emergency Company of Kellar were on the job all day Wednesday clearing the tracks and cleaning up the spilled liquids and the wreckage. Railroad officials said it would be ten days before the wreckage would be completely cleaned up but they expected to have rail traffic moving normally much sooner.

When acid fumes began spewing from the tank cars Tuesday night, DPS troopers ordered the evacuation of a dozen homes in a radius of a mile and a half from the wreck site. The home owners were permitted to return to their dwellings Wednesday morning.

DPS Trooper Tom Sharp directed operations in the wreckage area Tuesday night and was relieved by other troopers and railroad

relieved by Trooper Sharp. A Cisco fire truck, the rescue unit and some 12 volunteer firemen answered the call for help. Firemen and equipment were also present from Eastland, Ranger, Clyde, Baird and Putnam. FM Road 2945 and the

Cooper Road in the area were closed to traffic soon after the wreckage. Hershell Wagley, heavy equipment contractor at Putnam, took a bulldozer to the scene to build dams around the wreckage area to limit movement of the spillage, which was composed mostly of anti-freeze ingredients and a small amount of chemicals used in plastics manufacturing.

Some of the fluids flowed into Cooper Creek, which connects to Battle Creek. City Manager Mike Moore of Cisco ordered the city's pump station at Battle Creek, which sends water to Lake Cisco, to be shutdown to prevent any contamination. Officials were checking but they did not believe any of the chemicals reached the Battle Creek pump station area.

The train had a four-man crew and nobody was injured in the mishap. One worker said he believed the derailment was caused by a train wheel that was broken. He based his opinion on an examination of the railroad tracks in the area.

Traffic moved normally on I-20 as there was only a light breeze and no fumes were noted along the highway.

### **Water Board Approves**

### \*1.9 Mil. For Projects

AUSTIN--The Texas Water Development Board today approved \$1,945,000 in loans to local governments across the state to help them build needed water supply and wastewater treatment facilities.

The Board also approved \$198,436 in grants for planning to help meet future water needs and control flooding in the state.

The largest loan, for \$850,000, was extended to the Brookshire Municipal Water District in Waller County to help it improve its existing sewerage system. The project includes construction of a 350,000 gallon-per-day treatment plant that will operate with an existing plant. Other imrpovements will include approximately 155 repairs to the sewage collection system. The Brookshire M.W.D. serves about 3,000 people in an area approximately 35 miles west of Houston.

Other loans authorized by the Board at its meeting included:

-\$500,000 to the town of Fulton in Aransas County to help pay for the first phase of a project to improve sewerage service to the town's 1,002 citizens. The loan will help build a new wastewater treatment plant and sewage collection system.

-\$320,000 to the Angelina-Neches River Authority to allow the agency to meet is 50 percent share of a matching planning grant to continue studies and design of the proposed Eastex Reservoir Project. The other half of the cost of these studies is being funded through a Water Development Board grant made in July.

-\$275,000 to the City of Ladonia in Fannin County to drill a new water well, build a water storage tank, and install a water line from the well to the distribution system. The city, with a population of 762, is about 75 miles northeast of Dallas.

Grants authorized by the

County Conservation and **Reclamation District No. 3** to pay for 60 percent of the cost of developing a comprehensive drainage and flood protection plan for the district. Extensive flood damage has occured in the

area south of Houston in the last 15 years, and the district's plan will provide ways to improve drainage and minimize future flood

damage. --\$22,080 to the Texas Multi-State Water Resources Planning Commission to pay for the Commission's operations during fiscal year 1987. The Commission was established by the Texas Legislature in 1985, but received no appropriations for its expenses. Staff support for the agency, which is to study regional water needs and water development strategies in cooperations with neighboring states and Mexico, is provided by the Water Development Board.







As governments are only collections of people, we might expect the same reactions only on a grand scale. We have those who express dissatisfaction as, for example, in letters to editors, the refined version of the soapbox orator. On the other extreme we have those who build up internal pressures like a dormant volcano. When the eruption comes it can be horrifying.

Serious problems can be created and moderates be pushed to extremes when the soap-box is jerked uncerimoniously from under them or when they fail in other attempts to find an outlet for pressures, real outlets or imagined.

who put out hit lists.) When this nation was being founded a wise man made several astute observations on governmet. One was "Let us hear no more prattle about honorable men but bind them down from mischief with the unbreakable chains of a Constitution." Unfortunately, it seems that those chains have been worn to breaking by the

constant tugging og scoun-

drels seeking to escape them. Against the sage said "Of what use is law to the people if they be made so complex or volumnous that the citizen can not understand them?" DO YOU **UNDERSTAND??** In the beginnings of civilizations there was obviously the family as the

parents had to control the offspring until the child was able to make decisions. The fact that some did not guide and that some children refused control migh be why civilization got a slow start. Today the same parental direction is just as vital even without the saber tooth tiger to avoid but children are now taught, in some instances deliberately taught, to disregard parental government. If then one grows up in an environment of no control or even active opposition to controls the results are predictable.

Unfortunately, the equally evil choice can be totalitarianism. Just think how much smoother things run when one in total authority says, "Do it," and it is done. As the Italians said, "At least under Musselini the trains ran on schedule for the only time in Italian history.' Royal rule was another,

but no longer popular, system of order. Simply "the king's word was law." People soon learned that even kings can be overindulgent parents of spoiled brats and when a spoiled brat inherited the crown the people suffered. Beneath the surface the same forces are active in even the U.S. Consider some of the strictly political families. Now in the case of the

Children of Israel the begin-

ning was the family. Though they lived in the lands of kings old Israel as Abraham before him roamed free. The individual was sovereign. Or too express it as scripture later puts it, "The Kingdom is at hand, even within your heart." Now, if the heart is right there is no need of volumnous laws because normal people KNOW when their desire will infringe on their neighbors sovereignty. Unless blinded by greed, 'Do unto others ---'' is enough. Even among the Vikings the individual followed whom he chose and defective leaders were uncerimoniously dumped.

Among the true Israelites the system God approved was Individual Sovereignty. Consider scriptural passages wherein they disagreed with proposed actions. They would then shout EVERY MAN TO HIS TENT" and thus the motion could not carry.

Then came invasions and oppressions against which judges would arise. How unfortunate that what are called judges today bear no similarity except in name only. Unfortunately, even in those days people could not bear with short time inconvenience and they opted for the totalitarian systems of those around them. Before long the tune was "I Never Promised You a Rose Garden.'

One might think that today Individual Sovereignty can exist only in primitave cultures. NOT SO. For you can be free in many ways within your own heart, or though not restrained, still subject yourself to controls by others.

It may be oversimplified by reflecting on that old line

about, "Stone walls do not a prison make nor iron bars a cage," or you can be ruled by the pesemitic observation of the Cockney Englishman, "No, but they 'elps.'

The first steop then in being relatively free to to look for freedom of action. Next, avoid unneeded dependence, and above all let your heart reiterate your knowledge that only you can free yourself. Ultimately, it boils down to not doing that which invites oppression by letting anyone tyranize over you unless there is absolutely no choice. Thousands of years ago a Greek philospher said that most slaves were slaves by choice. True the choice may be as hard as the one stated by Patrick Henry, "Give me liberty -" But if those were the only choices, how many are ready for the ultimate price? HONESTLY??



For the past nine years, Miss Jones has served as transportation-van driver. kitchen aide and records clerk for the Cisco Senior Center




