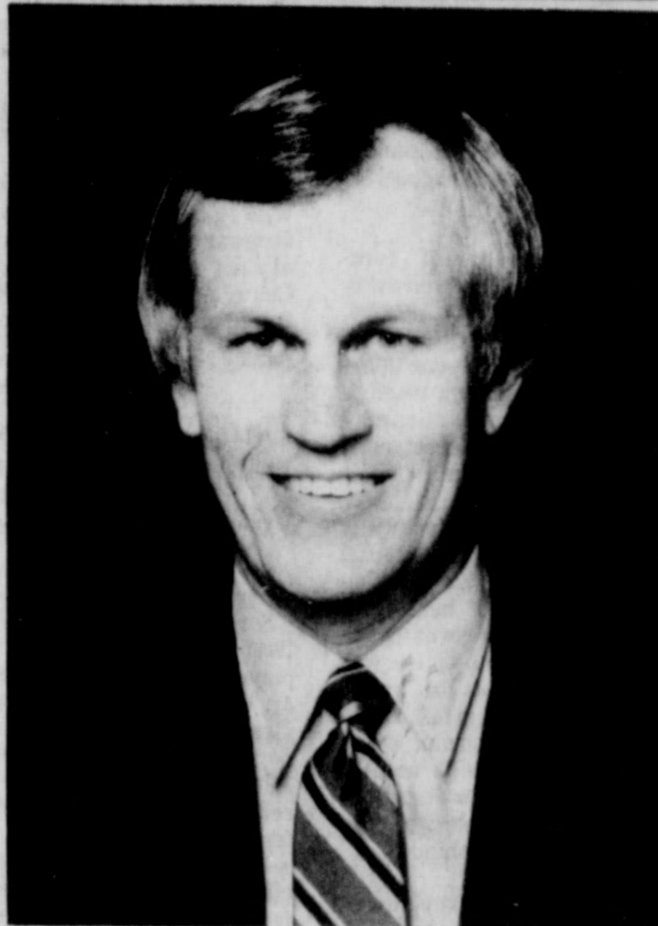
Cards have been sent to the volunteers on the current list. But the hosts want past volunteers as well as the present ones to attend Appreciation Day.

On February 28, 1990 a developmental screening will be held for young children ages zero to six (0-6). This screening will be conducted at Eastland County MHMR Center, 301 Pogue Ave., Eastland, TX from 9:30 to 11:30 a.m.

The screening, which takes about 20 minutes to complete, tests a young child in four areas; personal/social skills (playing, eating, dressing, etc.), fine motor skills (ability to manipulate small objects), gross motor skills (running, jumping, etc.), and language development (speech, following instructions, etc.). If a child is found to have two or more delays in one area, there is further testing available or referral to the appropriate agency.

The purpose of Early Childhood Intervention is to identify and correct as many problems as possible for young children. Early detection of young children's delays have proven beneficial to the child, parents, and teachers.

On March 2, 1992, the National Archives will make the 1920 census microfilm available to the public for the first time. And, the National Archives Microfilm Rental Program will rent copies made from the original silver masters.

"We're excited about the release of the 1920 census," said Rita Hope Counts, President of Professional Mail and Distribution Services, Inc. (PMDS), the company now fulfilling the Microfilm Rental Program contract for the National Archives. "In fact, we expect such a great demand for the census microfilm, we're taking advance rental orders starting September 1, 1991, so we can have them processed and ready to go as soon as we get the

microfilm in March." The National Archives awarded PMDS the Microfilm Rental Program contract in September 1989, and PMDS plans to uphold the same level of service the program has provided since 1983. Under PMDS, the program will continue to be the only microfilm rental program to offer microfilm copied directly from the National Archives silver masters. "Because of this," said the National Archives spokesperson, "the quality of film PMDS provides cannot be matched by any other rental program."

This microfilm can be ordered directly by individuals or through more than 6,000 local libraries across the country. The rental rates are \$3 per roll for orders of 1-4 rolls; \$2.50 per roll when 5-9 rolls

are ordered; and \$2 per roll for orders of 10 or more rolls. The postage and handling fee of \$3 is waived for orders of 4 or more rolls. To assist first-time users, the Microfilm Rental Program offers a Start-Up Kit for \$20. Included in the Start-Up Kit are the complete set of catalogs required for census and Revolutionary War research, order forms for ship passenger arrival and veterans records, research guides, coupons for free rental of two rolls of microfilm, additional catalogs that list available genealogical publications, and a Rental Program membership card. The membership is a lifetime one, entitling the member to a 10% discount on a selection of National Archives and other genealogical publications. Interested individuals can

request a copy of the Archives Microfilm Rental Program, Post Office Box 30, Annapolis Junction, Maryland 20701. NOTE FROM JEANE: This is a good program for any serious researcher. Remember you can start now with the census records 1790 through 1910; Military; and other valuable records. Even though you do not have to purchase a Start-Up Kit to rent through this program, it is my opinion the benefit is worth far more than the \$20 spent.

Q. I feel that my husband is abusive. Could I be contributing to this abuse?  
A. There are some patterns that women may develop that may allow them to continually take abuse. According to the book *Abused No More, Recovery for Women from Abusive or Co-Dependent Relationships* by Robert J. Ackerman and Susan E. Pickering there are some patterns that may be in a present or a past relationship.

- We received little nurturing ourselves and try to fill this unmet need by becoming a care giver especially to men who become needy.
- We believe almost nothing is too much trouble, takes too much time, or is too expensive if it will 'help' the man in our relationship.
- We are accustomed to lack of love in our relationship and are willing to wait, hope, and try harder to please.
- We are willing to take far more than 50% of the responsibility, guilt, shame, and blame in a relationship.
- We have a desperate need to control our relationships, usually because of lack of security in childhood, and mask our control of people and situations by 'being helpful'.
- Our self-esteem is critically low, and deep down inside we do not believe we deserve to be happy or that we are as good as other people.
- In relationships we are much more in touch with our ideas of how it could be than with the reality of how it is.
- We are drawn to people with problems that need fixing or we become involved in chaotic uncertain or emotionally painful relationship ignoring our responsibility or ourselves.
- We may have a tendency toward episodes of depression which we try to forestall through the excitement provided by an unstable relationship.
- We find 'nice' people and comfortable relationship hard to identify with or be around.

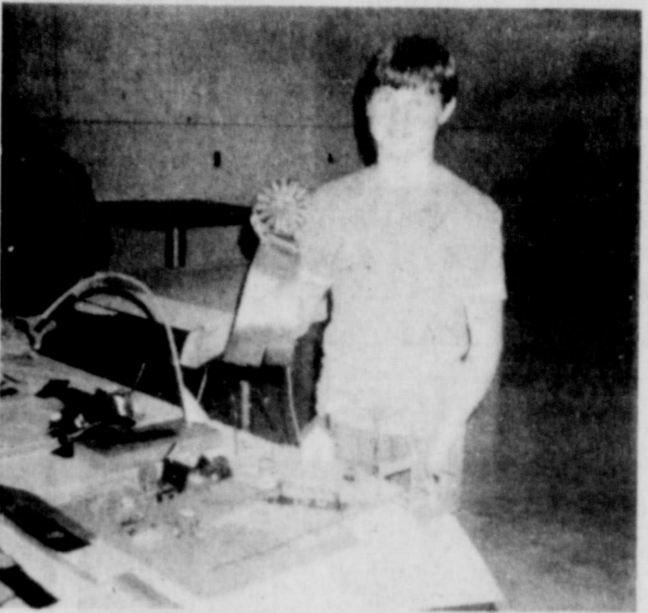

## HIGHLIGHTS

AUSTIN—Next week the Texas Legislature will convene in special session to attempt to repair the state's unconstitutional system of funding public education.

The math assignment seems simple enough, but some lawmakers would like to raise taxes so that each child gets a bigger share.

To stop the pro-tax soions, Gov. Bill Clements scheduled the session just two weeks before the primary elections, when undecided voters are finally choosing a favorite candidate.

Politics has a rule of thumb which says the voters have a short memory — six months, at best.

Clements' lesson is obvious: Any legislator who wants to raise taxes had better be prepared to face immediate public reaction.

He assumes, like Texas conservatives do, that voters will punish lawmakers who raise taxes.

Texas liberals assume just the opposite: Voters will reward lawmakers who spend money on them, especially new tax money.

**Task Force Okays Plan**  
Who's right? Clements will likely win this session.

For one thing, sane lawmakers don't want to waste the last two weeks of a campaign in Austin discussing any issue. Period.

For another, the Governor's Task Force on Public Education said it has found the extra money to increase public school funding

by \$230 million next year. By the 1996-97 year, when the plan would be fully implemented, the state would be spending \$1.6 billion more on schools than it is now.

State Rep. Jim Rudd, chairman of the House Appropriations Committee and a member of the task force, said he believes the plan "is a doable deal without a tax bill" the first year.

The odds are legislators will be back home before election day.

### Dominant Issue

Public education — quality, spending levels, fairness — will be the last issue of the primaries, and some say education is already the key issue for the general election.

If they're right, look for a classic conservative-liberal battle on the campaign trail all summer with surprising lessons on both sides.

Polls show voters will raise taxes first for education, but they don't really need a poll on that emotional issue. You're talking about the voters' children, or the kids next door, or why the voter is a success because of his/her own schooling.

Some candidates are going to bet the ranch they'll get elected pledging new taxes for education.

Need a barometer? Four years ago, Mark White was defeated for setting new records raising taxes, tuition and fees to finance HB 72.

Today, White's comeback bid is real and growing. He's the "education governor," and, in the TV debate, he said he'll raise taxes again, if necessary. You can bet he already thinks it is.

### Campaign Somber Note

Meanwhile, the GOP gubernatorial campaign switched from barbs to a somber note following the crash of a twin-engine plane owned by Clayton Williams which took the lives of four key business associates, raising questions about his campaign's future.

Williams canceled personal ap-

pearances and pulled all commercials off the air. But a spokesman said his campaign staff assumed the campaign would resume.

Reports filed last week showed Williams leading the gubernatorial spending field with \$5.7 million and Democrat Jim Mattox second with \$3.2 million.

In the GOP camp, Williams loaned his campaign \$1 million; Tom Luce got a \$50,000 contribution each from H. Ross Perot and Peter O'Donnell, and Kent Hance received \$40,000 from Lonnie "Bo" Pilgrim, who shocked senators last session by passing out \$10,000 blank checks in their chamber.

Among Democrats, Mark White and Ann Richards raised about \$350,000 each to \$71,000 for Mattox.

### Other Highlights

■ State Sen. Ike Harris, R-Dallas, wants the special session to consider his bill to help the racing industry by reducing the state tax on pari-mutuel betting.

Housemen say the reduction is needed to get the fledging industry off dead-center. Plans are to include dog racing in the bill in exchange for that industry's lobbying assistance.

■ U.S. Rep. Lamar Smith, R-San Antonio, said he will introduce legislation to add 20 new federal judges to districts most affected by drug-related criminal activities.

■ A federal grand jury is investigating whether tactics used to raise campaign contributions for Agriculture Commissioner Jim Hightower resulted in the misuse of public funds.

■ A hearing on a proposed settlement of Southwestern Bell's rate case at the Public Utility Commission will begin on March 19, a PUC official said.

■ The State Board of Insurance approved a simpler homeowners' insurance policy with shorter sentences, simpler words and larger type.

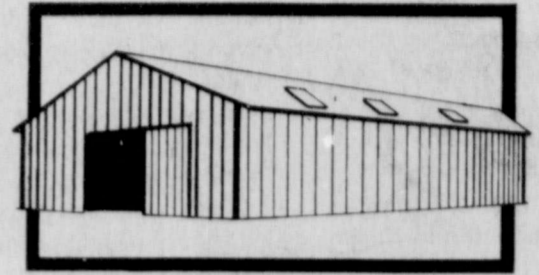

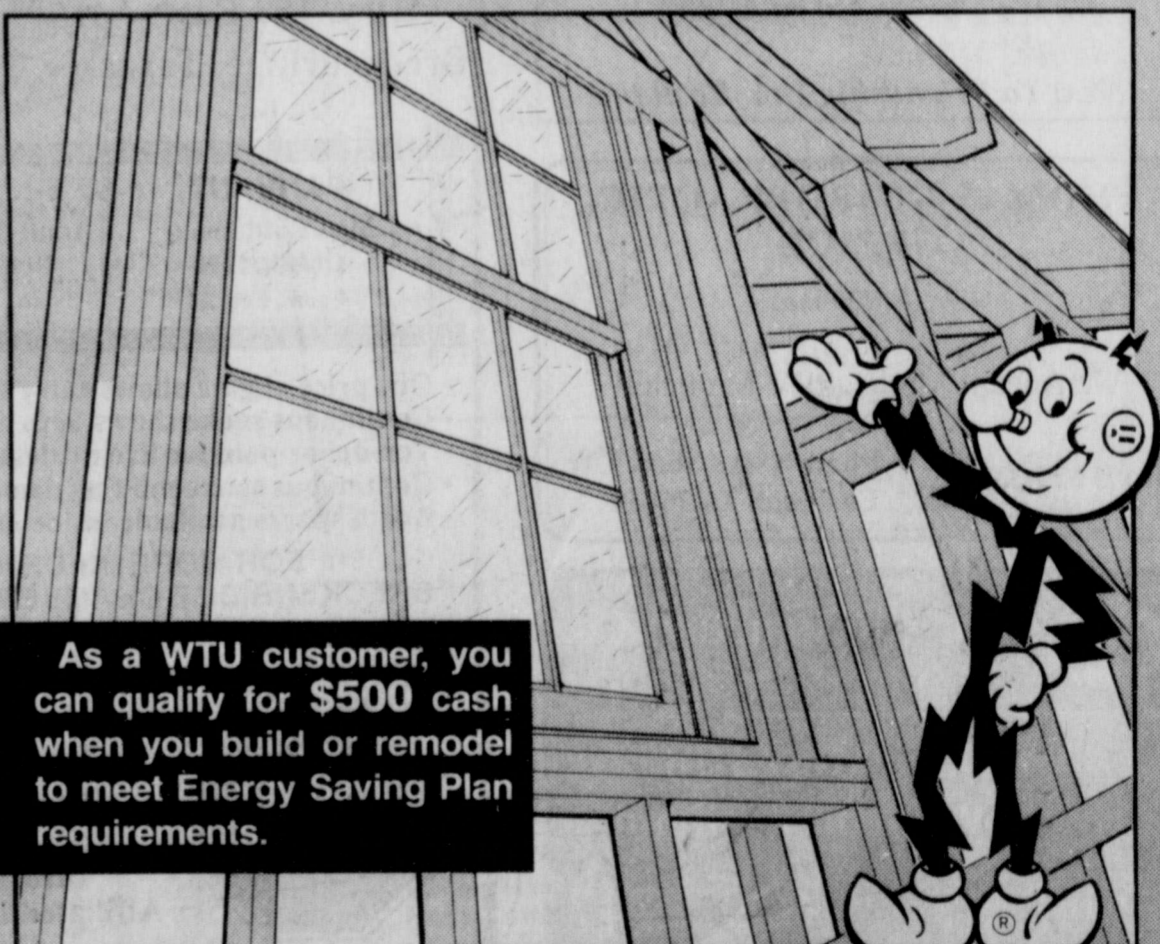
