## Stenholm Addresses Local R.C. & D. Area

The Leon-Bosque Resource, Conservation, and Development Area had its annual meeting April 11 at the PAR Country Club on Lake Proctor in Comanche County. The biggest crowd in years, and probably the largest ever, was present as the Leon-Bosque R, C & D Area is growing to become one of the largest in Texas.

Following supper, guests were introduced and a financial statement was given. Then two awards were presented to 15 year Bosque County Director C. Pernell Aars of Clifton.

The five county area of Eastland, Erath, Comanche, Somervell and Bosque Counties then voted to add Hamilton County. The Constitution and Bylaws were changed to accommodate the addition.

But once they got started they didn't stop. Brown, Callahan, Mills, Shackelford and Stephens Counties were also voted in, increasing the R, C & D Area to eleven counties.

It was reported that the county committees had identified sixteen main problem areas in the counties. Among the problems were solid waste and animal waste management. Consultants have been used and studies and programs have been entered into as solutions are sought. Another need mentioned was for a dam near Cisco to impound a water supply for Cisco area

It was pointed out that increasing the R, C & D Area to eleven counties is subject to approval by the Secretary of Agriculture of the United

The County Directors, Executive Council Directors, and officers were approved as nominated. Don Shepard of Cisco and G. A. White of Eastland are Eastland County Directors and Leo Williams of Ranger was approved as a new County Director. Henry Burk of Rising Star is the Vice-Chairman.

U.S. Representative Charles Stenholm of the 17th Dist. of Texas was the speaker. He was introduced as an eleven year veteran of the House who represents one half million people and who hasn't had an opponent since he was

Stenholm used a campaign incident in Baird to describe the pressure he faces. A little lady told him that she was

supporting him, but when he made his first mistake in Washington, she would write him. When you make the second mistake, she continued, I will call you, and when you make the third, I will come to Washington and get

Stenholm told of visiting a collective farm in Czechoslovakia and talking with the farmers. He said that armed police were everywhere and that he spoke into the flowers so that the police could hear him clearly. They were feeding the dairy cattle roughage and getting very little milk production while the people were going hungry. He suggested that they buy a little grain, or something with strength, from us to add to the cattle feed to double their milk production. The first issue was dated September 1907. After that, two issues came out every year until 1937. They then ceased to appear, a victim, probably, of the Depression.


Most of the meetings of the Bates Association took place in Massachusetts. The objective of the association was "the colection, compilation and publication of all available data concerning Bates families." Its membership was open to all 'persons having a Bates ancestor by descent or marriage." The membership fee

was one dolar per year. CONTENTS: BATES BULLETIN articles, many illustrated, deal with such topics as: -Lydd, Kent, the ancestral home in England of many American Bates families; the old Meeting House in Hingham, Massachusetts, first built in 1635, in which many early American Bateses worshipped' the Heraldry of the Baters name; the amusing story of how the sisters, Abigale and Rebecca Bates frightened off a British warship when it threatened Scrituate harbor in 1814; detailed genealogical notes on many Bates families from all over the United States; Joshua Bates, the financier and benefactor of the Boston Public Library (its Bates Hall is named after him) and his great-granddaughter, the Sultana of Sarawak, Borneo; Captain Martin Van Buren Bates of Seville, Ohio, the Bates Giant; Katherine Lee Bates of Wellesley, Massachusetts, the author of the "sea to shining sea" verses of the anthem, 'America The Beautiful'; Lindon Bates Jr. who gave his life to save others at the sinking of the lusitania in

Most important and valuable of all are: the IN-DICES to each Series; AN INDEX OF OFFICERS & ILLUSTRATIONS; GENERAL INDEX; AN IN-DEX OF BATES NAMES; An INDEX OF OTHER NAMES: An INDEX OF LOCALITIES.

The Bates Bulletin was issued regularly between 1907 and 1937 in the form of unbound, stapled leaflets. Generally, two booklets were published per year. They were arranged in 6 Series. Volume I of the fascimile printing, which is now available, contains Series 1,2, and 3. Volume II will contain Series 4,5, and 6 and will be available later.

The book measures 10" x 7". They are case-bound with hard-back and boards covered by ultra marine blue Lexotone with the title gold stamped on the spine. Volume I contains 382 pages. Volume II will contain slightly fewer pages. Price, \$49.00 per Volume plus \$3.00 shipping and handling. California residents add 7% sales tax.

#### Highway Dept. Seeks Maintenance Contractors

The highway department is sending a message to maintenance contractors: "We want you as a new recruit."

"Since the Legislature directed us last year to increase contracting to 25 percent of our routine maintenance budget, we need to attract more bidders to keep the process as competitive as possible," said Engineer-Director Arnold Oliver,

Routine maintenance includes just about any kind of work perfomed on the highway right-of-way, from mowing and picnic-area maintenance to pavement marking and crack sealing. Contracts are awarded throughout the year in all areas of the state.

In the past, each of the department's 24 districts maintained its own list of prospective bidders. When a contract was to be let, the district would notify contractors on the local list. Now, the department will maintain one computerized statewide bidders list in Austin. The data base will include the types of work each contractor can perform and the areas of the state where each contractor wants to work. When a district office needs bids on a contract proposal, contractors on the statewide bidders list will be notified automatically by mail.

To reach more prospective bidders, the department has installed a toll-free number for contractors to obtain information about getting on the statewide list. The service is active between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. at 800/535-9013 (465-6283 in the Austin area).

Anyone can get on the list. Many of the department's contracts go to small businesses. The State Department of Highways and Public Transportation is an equal opportunity employer.

#### Fish Pond Management

Kurt Kalkomey, owner of Irving Marine, underwrote expenses for the tournament which was held at Lake Fork east of Dallas during March.

All entry fees paid by 231 two-member teams for the one-day tourney were donated to the Operation Share A Lone Star Lunker Hatchery Fund. Prizes valued at more than \$60,000 were donated by merchants in the marine and fishing industries.

Kalkomey said he viewed the tournament as an opportunity for the marine industry. "An event like this may help the boat industry be aware of the need to put something back into the industry and support fishing and conservation at the same time," said Kalkomey. "The best part about this particular tournament was that it was a true benefit tournament, with all funds going to the lunker program." Kalkomey added that he hopes to make the tournament an annual event.


Bill Rutledge, hatchery chief for the department, said the members of the Lone Star Lunker Foundation will decide how the funds will be used. The foundation is supported by corporate members Lone Star Brewery, HEB food stores, Jungle Labs and Honey Hole Magazine. The lunker program invites anglers catching 13-pound-plus largemouth bass the opportunity to lend their fish to the department for research and hatchery use. Participating anglers receive fiberglass replicas of their catch, and the fish normally are returned alive to their lake of origin after the spawning period.

Q. As a parent of a child with some learning disabilities what can I do to help him learn?

A. One of the primary things a parent can do for a child, especially one with some learning problems is to provide a stable home environment. Bickering between the parents puts children on edge and can cause emotional problems that make it even more difficult to learn or to concentrate on anything.

Disagreements will surely come up from time to time, but try to settle them peaceably out of the hearing or visual range of the A stable home can help to promote self-esteem of the child. It means so much for the child to know that his parents believe

he can do well and they are EXPECTING him to do well. Constructive criticism should be given in loving ways, such

Constructive criticism should be given in loving ways, such as, "You have five out of ten right and that's a good start. I believe you can get more correct next time."

Helping the child feel good about himself can help in social skills as well. Making and keeping good friends takes continual effort and the child with learning disabilities may need more guidance than usual in developing friendliness. Parents and teachers can be very influential in helping a child understand how their actions and words affect others. A good place to start is to simply treat others as you would like to be treated. The golden rule helps in developmental years as well as in adult life.


