## **Elam Participates In WTU Task Force Study Recently**

James Elam, District Manager of West Texas Utilities in Stamford, was recently one of six persons selected to participate in a task force to determine what computer capabilities and information will be needed by employees to help meet the needs of WTU customers

and regulatory bodies. Elam is a native of Scranton and is the son of Bonnie Nelms Elam Davis of Abilene and the late Jasper Elam of Scranton. He is the son-in-law of Mr. and Mrs. R.E. Blailock of Cisco.

The purpose of the task force was to search for ways to improve service to the company's customers and to give employees the tools to more readily respond to questions customers have concerning their service, bills and other components that make up their monthly bill

Elam pointed out that as time goes on regulatory bodies are requiring more information and detailed information about the utilities business, and the company felt it was important to improve their information system in order to be able to respond in a timely manner. "The goal of the task

force," Elam said, "was to reduce the number of manual operations and to move these operations to some type of computer automated system so that we don't have to add new employees or replace old employees who retire, resign, etc. We are searching for ways to hold our cost steady or to reduce

costs where possible and therefore reduce or hold down the need for rate increases. In order to reach their

goal, the task force designed and sent out 770 questionnaires to employees in various companies and asked them to tell the task force what information they needed in order to accomplish their job and if they were getting this information or if they needed more information to accomplish their job. They also went to each company and interviewed the senior executives. Besides asking these executives the same questions the employees were asked,

of each company and the central headquarters in Dallas to determine if the company had enough computer hardware (equipment) to meet the needs that were identified.

Three or four middle managers from each company went to Dallas where they discussed basically the same subject with the task force members and assisted in recommending solutions to providing the new information required and improving the current flow of information, Elam commented.

"From all of this imput," Elam said, "we put together a set of recommendations that will hopefully solve problems and provide the information needs of employees to operate their jobs over the next 5 to 10 years." Elam pointed out that the last task force that undertook this same project, was held in

1979. Elam began his career with WTU 30 years ago in Abilene. After nine years in Abilene, Elam moved to Mc-Camey where he spent three years before moving to Childress as District Auditor. Elam staved in Childress for three years before becoming District Manager at Marfa. After spending seven years in Marfa, a place Elam says his children call home because they graduated from Marfa High School, Elam became District Manager in Stamford in 1982

#### **Catch And Live Release Is A Must**

By now most of you have heard me use the term "Catch and Live Release." the following are a few guidelines to help insure the future of all species of fish receive our help to survive: 1) Land the fish as quickly as possible. An extended battle can over stress the fish and could result in death. 2) Avoid using a dipnet. Dipnet's will remove a fish of protective slime allowing for possible infection. 3) Wet your hands before touching fish. Though not too harmful to humans, the hands can be lethal to fish. Contact once again removes the slime protection plus human contact can and does transmit bacteria to the fish. 4) If you're not planning to keep your catch try to remove the hook without removing the fish from the water. Already traumatized from the fight imagine the shock of being lifted by your jaw. 5) Cut the line of deeply hooked fish. Most fish posses chemicals which can deteriorate a fish hookin about 2 weeks. 6) Dip your catch in a solution of a commercial livewell additive before releasing fish gently back into the water. A number of fish chemical treatments are available to anglers which benefit the fish by replacing slime, calming the fish down and uping oxygen content in the water.

Whether it be a 10 pound black bass or a two pound channel cat, the fish you hook, battle, and land is the future of its species, treat it as the

sole survivor. Remember its not just catch and release, but catch and live release.

State fishery officials, somewhat giddy over this year's hatchery production of largemouth bass, pronounced that if this spring's fingerlings were laid nose to tail they would reach from downtown Dallas almost to Waco.

## **Gordon Spot**

#### By DeMarquis Gordon, County Agent-

Owners of coastal bermudagrass pastures have been worried for sometime about their grass stands. Much of the grass has not greened up. I've looked at several stands and dug roots to try to determine if the roots are alive. It appears to me that most roots in the top three inches were killed by the December freeze. The soil is still cold and many of the live roots are not sending up growth. We have found large numbers of live roots that should produce growth when the soil gets warmer.

I think the coastal pastures will eventually green up, but we will not get that early June cutting of hay. The coastal bermudagrass will have to be treated like the first year of establishment.

When the grass begins making runners, it should be fertilized. Fertilizing before the grass is making good growth will only promote weed growth and much of the fertilizer will be taken up by weeds before the grass is ready to use it.

Based on a number of calls I have received, all the fruitless mulberry trees in the county must be loosing their leaves. This is caused by

Bacterial Blight and some fungus leafspot is present. These diseases are caused by humid weather. We are recommending spraying with a copper fungicide at 10 to 14 day intervals. Some of the copper fungicides are Kocide 101, Champion, Basicop and Top Cop.

The Elm leaf beetles are beginning their damage on elm trees. New infestations of young elm leaf beetle larvae are easily overlooked because of their feeding location. At first, the green part of the leaves are removed with just the thin veins remaining. As damage accumulates, dry skeltonized leaves become

obvious. There are some natural enemics of the beetles such as birds, toads, diseases and predaceous and parasitic insects. Unfortunately, these natural controls often are not sufficient to hold the beetles in check and the application of chemical control becomes necessary.

Products containing carbaryl (Sevin), methoxychlor and acephate (Orthene) are effective against elm leaf beetles.
