Blood Drive Set At Hospital Wednesday

The Cisco Blood Drive has been set for Wednesday, June 6, at E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital. A team of laboratory technicians from Meek Blood Bank of Hendrick Medical Center of Abilene will be present from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. and from 2 until 6 p.m.

In order to insure an adequate blood supply and to gradually reduce the Cisco blood bank's debt, it is mandatory for every Cisco citizen's effort in this most worthwhile effort.

Due to Federal Drug Administration legislation, there are no longer "paid" donors, therefore, we must depend on voluntary blood donations.

Blood donors would be aware of the following when preparing to give blood:

1. All donors must be age 18 or older; there is no age limit, only that each donor is healthfully able to give blood.
2. Blood donors should eat normally, and are encouraged to do so before giving blood.
3. No medication should be taken 18 hours prior to donating blood, however no medication should be deleted without checking with the

prospective donor's own doctor.

4. Any person who has been sick or had a cold within the last seven days prior to donating blood should not donate blood.

5. Any person who has had ears pierced within the last six months at any place other than a doctor's office should not donate blood.

6. Any person who has been in Southeast Asia in the last three years should not donate blood due to malaria possibilities.

7. Any woman who has menstruated in the last three to four days prior to donating blood should not donate.

8. A woman who is pregnant, or suspects pregnancy, should not give blood, and should not do so until six weeks after termination of pregnancy.

9. Persons can donate blood every two to three months, with no foreseen problems, although it is hopeful to not have to call on the same donors nearly this often.

So necessary is this blood, for life itself, every appeal is made for your continued

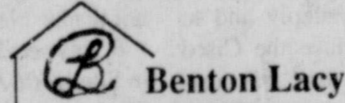

Gordon Spot

There seems to be a variety of foliage eating worms in home landscapes. Some are armyworms and some are other species which causes the same damage and may be controlled with the same methods. Larvae, or caterpillars, are green or brown with various markings. Color depends on the species, individual variation and food. They range in size from about 1/8 inch or less for the newly hatched to a full grown larva of about 2 inches.

When feeding, larvae strip foliage and then move to the next available food. High populations appear to march side by side to the new food. Thus, the name armyworms has been applied.

These worms should be controlled when they occur in large numbers or plant damage is becoming excessive. Preventive treatments normally are not justified because attacks are sporadic. Early detection seems to work best and is achieved by frequent, thorough inspection of

plants. Insecticides recommended for armyworm control are: carbaryl (Sevin), chlorpyrifos (Dursban), diazinon (Spectracide), malathion, methoxychlor, and trichlorfon (Dylox). Follow all directions, particularly safety precautions on the insecticide package label. Although any of the insecticides will control armyworms, not all are labeled for use on all host plants.

Peanut growers have the choice of a new Spanish peanut variety this year. The Texas Agricultural Experiment Station has released Tamspar 90.

Dr. Olin Smith, peanut breeder at Texas A&M University, said that Tamspar 90 averaged more than 10% higher gross value per acre return than Starr, the Spanish peanut variety that has been the most popular in Texas for about 25 years.

Smith thinks the Tamspar 90 will provide some protection against diseases and yield

more, which means more dollar for the farmer.

The new variety has resistance to two major soilborne diseases of the peanut: sclerotinia blight and pod rot.

Smith said the development of Tamspar 90 can be traced to 1976, when the first cross was made. He said the vegetative growth and physical appearance are similar to Starr, but the seed size is larger.

The use of organic mulches is very important in the home vegetable garden. An organic mulch is especially desirable on light, sandy soils, and on cool-season crops. Organic mulches keep the soil several degrees cooler than bare soil or soil covered with black plastic mulch. Mulches re-

duce heat radiation from the soil, increasing the chance of frost damage on a cool night. Organic mulches are best applied after the soil is warm and as soon as plants are large enough to avoid being buried

by the material. It is usually applied just after the first cultivation.

Use organic mulches when vegetables are 2 to 3 inches high. Before applying remove weeds, any weeds remaining the soil will grow through the organic material, but they can be removed easily by hand.

Old straw or hay which is free from weed seed is ideal. A 3 to 6 inch layer of straw or hay is required, whereas a 1 to 3 inch layer of peat moss, grass clippings or composted leaves is sufficient.

Chest pain is not the only indication of a heart attack in people at high risk. Doctors at the University of California/Los Angeles found that any unusual pain -- in the jaw, teeth, neck, wherever, may be a warning for high risk people.

New Recommended Dietary Allowances have been announced by the National Academy of Science's Food and Nutrition Board. They call for more iron for women, more calcium for men and women up to age 24, more vitamin C for smokers, and less sodium for everyone.

Experimental vaccine uses cowpox virus together with strains of melanoma cells to fight cancer recurrence in people who've had melanomas. Testing is coordinated at M. D. Anderson Cancer Center and six other centers are involved.

Lyme disease continues to spread across the country, and more people are using insect repellents to ward off the ticks that carry the disease. However, the products should be used strictly according to directions to avoid toxic reactions, especially among youngsters.

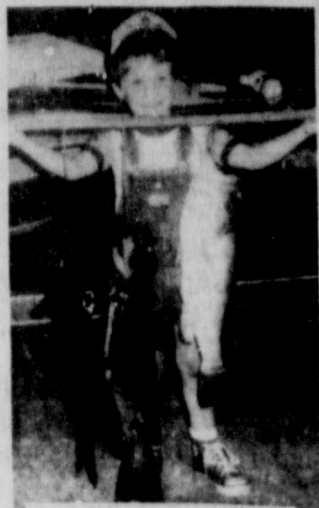

Texas Oil Production Rate Continued At 100 Percent Of Market Demand

The Railroad Commission has continued the Texas oil production rate for June 1990 at 100 percent of market demand.

Chairman Kent Hance and Commissioners John Sharp and James E. (Jim) Nugent continued the top production allowable after reviewing oil companies' nominations to buy a total of 1,849,888 barrels of Texas oil per day. The June nomination total, a decrease of 8,056 barrels daily when compared to May purchaser nominations, estimates Texas oil production in the coming month. June 1989 nominations totaled 1,898,920 barrels daily.

The commission first went to the ceiling level for oil production in April 1972. It applies to all fields in the state except those that are assigned lower legal rates of production so that reservoir pressures will not be depleted before the maximum amount of oil has been recovered.

Chairman Hance also reported that June nominations

for the purchase of Texas gas totaled 20,031,969 Mcf/d. June 1989 nominations amounted to 20,845,214 Mcf/d.

The next statewide oil and gas production allowable hearing will begin at 10:00 a.m., on Wednesday, June 20, 1990, at the Railroad Commission in the William B. Travis Building, 1701 N. Congress Ave. in Austin.

Major purchasers filed these nominations from the floor at the hearing: Amoco Production Company, 148,000 barrels, unchanged; Conoco Inc., 61,000 barrels, down 1,000; Exxon Co., U.S.A., 158,500 barrels, down 2,500; and Mobil Oil Corp., 119,000 barrels, unchanged.

Chairman Hance reported that crude oil and petroleum products imported into the U.S. averaged 7,954,000 barrels per day for the month of March 1990. This was an increase of 637,000 barrels per day from the same period a year ago.

This again was an impressive win and we look for more and more of the same in the weeks ahead because for the Morgan girls its "on the road again."

Local Enumerator Part Of National Agriculture Survey

Although some of us may have trouble getting from "here" to "there," Evelyn Hare of DeLeon has no problem finding her way as she travels the back country roads with only a stock tank or windmill as a landmark. In fact, the less travelled highways and byways of Texas provide many of the short cuts Hare needs as part of her job as a field enumerator with the Texas Agriculture Statistics Service.

Beginning June 1, Hare will once again fill up the gas tank and log many travel miles, as she begins interviewing farmers and ranchers in Eastland County for a national agricultural survey. 1990 may be the year to count people, but Hare is going to be busy counting livestock and collecting data on crop acres.

Information gathered on this confidential survey will be used to make state and national estimates of crop acres, livestock inventories and grain stocks, information that is vitally important to the producers in Eastland County, Hare noted.

"These estimates are a working tool farmers and

ranchers can use in their production, marketing and investment decisions and are the only unbiased information source available," state statistician Dennis Findley reported.

Survey information will be extremely important this year in measuring crop and live-

stock losses from the severe flooding across north and east Texas.

Field enumerators provide a basic link in the data collection service of the Texas office, since they are the primary personal contact Texas producers have with the agency. Currently there are over 100 field enumerators working on farm and ranch surveys across the state.

Most of the enumerators have an agricultural background and are familiar with the many day-to-day problems facing Texas producers. "Like the farmers and ranchers they are interviewing, our enumerators also deal with low prices and severe weather conditions at harvest and mother cows that wait until 3:00 a.m. to calve," Findley added.

The June Agricultural Survey is the largest of a series of surveys conducted throughout the year by the Texas office. The random sample of producers selected for this survey represent a broad cross-section of Texas agriculture, and producers selected for this survey represent other operators of similar size and type.

"Our field enumerators will be putting in some long hours during the next two weeks," Findley reported, "but their hard work is the only way to provide Texas producers with accurate, reliable agricultural information."

Cisco Junior College Receives Student Literacy Corps Grant

Cisco Junior College has received a Student Literacy Corps Program grant from the U.S. Department of Education. Jenny Lawrence, reading instructor at CJC, developed and wrote the successful grant proposal.

Lawrence will serve as project director. She has a Bachelor of Science degree from the University of Texas at Austin and a Master of Education degree from East Texas State University.

The project is designed to aid in combatting family illiteracy. Illiteracy is a growing problem in the U.S. It is estimated that 20 percent of the adults in Eastland County are illiterate.

CJC students participating in the project will receive college credit in a specific course for tutoring those with literacy needs. The course is transferable to certain senior

colleges for education majors. Students will work in cooperation with the Eastland County Literacy Council throughout the county.

Monies from the grant will go toward the purchase of literacy materials and the cost of transportation expenses for student tutors. The project begins July 1, 1990, and continues through June 30, 1992.

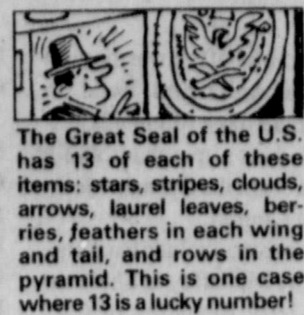

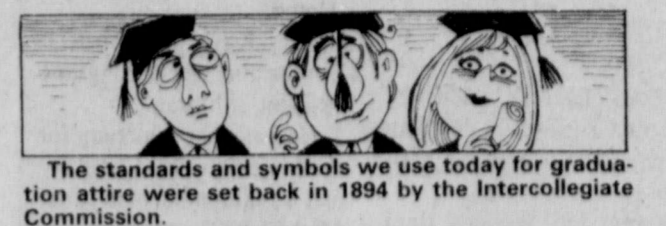

Dental Dialogue

Protection Pointers

Q. What can I do to protect my teeth from injury?

A. The most important protection you can provide for your teeth is to refrain from using them as a "tool". Don't open bobby pins with your teeth. Don't bite thread from the spool; use scissors. Never crack nuts between your teeth, or bite down on hard candy. Avoid holding items such as nails, straight pins, pens or pencils with your teeth. Use dental floss or a toothpick with a rounded end to remove food stuck between your teeth; never use a pin or other sharp object. Any of these "don'ts" can result in chipped or fractured teeth or fillings, and that means a visit to your dentist and a repair bill.
