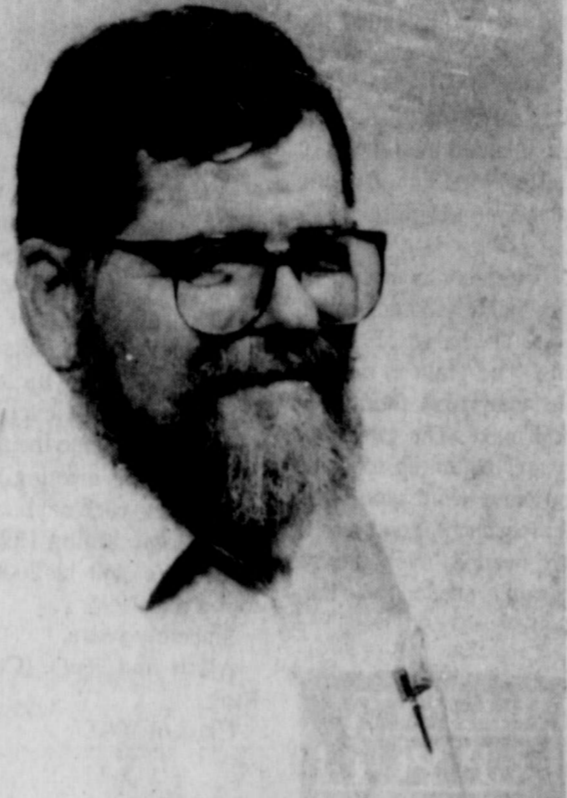
Revival Is Planned At Pleasant Hill

The inspection occurred after a patient, who was not satisfied with the care he received during a transfer to another facility, filed a complaint with the state.

Administrator Don Henry said, "Most of the problems

were corrected and Medicare payments will continue."

"They found us to be in substantial compliance," Henry said.

"Some procedural deficiencies were uncovered by the review team Wednesday. Another Medicare inspection will occur in 45 to 60 days to see if these problems are corrected," Henry said.

Area residents will have the rare opportunity of hearing the Rev. Dr. Lewis L. Wilkins, Executive Presbyter of Palo Duro Presbytery, who will deliver the sermon when the Rev. Robert E. Crumley is installed as incoming minister of the First Presbyterian Church of Cisco. The installation service will take place Sunday evening, June 17, at 7 p.m. at First Presbyterian Church.

Other dignitaries participating in the installation will be the Rev. Dr. Roy Zuefeldt, pastor of the First Central Presbyterian Church of Abilene and the Rev. Dr. Duane Bazil, retiring interim minister of First Presbyterian Church, Cisco. Other members of the Installation Commission of Palo Duro Presbytery include Farren Sadler, Elder, Westminster Presbyterian Church, Abilene; Grace Sadler, Elder, Westminster Presbyterian Church, Cisco; Effie Kamon, Elder, First Presbyterian Church, Cisco; and Helen Crawford, Elder, First Presbyterian Church, Cisco.

Guests will include visiting clergymen as well as members of the First Christian Church, First United Methodist Church, and Wesley Methodist Church, it being the first Sunday this year on which the four denominations join in their customary Sunday evening worship services during the summer months.

The Rev. Crumley comes to Cisco from the First Presbyterian church of Quanah, Texas. He holds degrees from Southeast Oklahoma State University and Austin Pres-

byterian Theological Seminary at Austin. His career has covered a broad spectrum, not only in the ministry but also in the field of mental health. While pastoring the Quanah church, he also served as the Director of the Mental Health Clinic of Quanah. He had previously served as chaplain at Children's Medical Center in Dallas. Seven years as deputy sheriff in Durant, Oklahoma during his student days added its dimension to his varied experience.

service, Holy Communion will be celebrated after which a reception will be held in the Fellowship Hall. Friends of the church and the general public are cordially invited to attend this evening of worship and fellowship. It is hoped that a large congregation will be present to participate in this ecumenical experience with fellow Christians and become acquainted with the Rev. Crumley and the Rev. 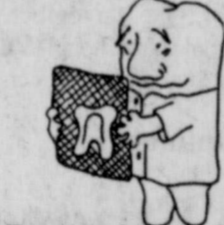

Q. What does my dentist look for on my X-rays?

A Thought For The Day.....

Although Father's Day was not officially proclaimed a national holiday until former President Richard Nixon signed a congressional resolution in 1972, fathers have been honored in June since the early 1900's.

Mrs. John Bruce Dodd of Spokane, Washington is generally thought to have done more to originate Father's Day than any other American. She became known as the "Mother of Father's Day." The idea occurred to her in 1909 when she was living in Spokane. In June, 1910, the first observance was held in Spokane and slowly the day came to be recognized in other cities, some thinking they were the first to do so. Many Presidents through the years helped observe the holiday and The National Father's Day Committee furthered the holiday when it was created in 1935. They dedicated the day "to building a democratic world through wholesome child upbringing."

Through the years Mrs. Dodd was approached many times to endorse many gifts and products for Father's Day, but she refused. She had very definite ideas how the day should be observed. "It should include family attendance at church, a little gift for Dad and some tender words you've always longed to say to him," she said in 1953.

Long Trip To Church Is Worth It

Four men from a local Southern Baptist Church had a long day Tuesday as they made what was surely the longest trip to attend a church service that they ever traveled.

They drove 130 miles or so during the early morning hours to catch a jet plane at Love Field in Dallas by 7 a.m. Landing more than an hour later in New Orleans, the foursome took nearly an hour and a half taxi ride through the rush hour traffic to travel more than 15 miles to the Superdome, the huge domed building which seats 80,000 people for events such as the Super Bowl.

The church service was something special for the four as it was the Southern Baptist Convention and they were messengers representing their church. After registering and receiving ballots to be used in electing officers and voting on policies to guide the Southern United States' biggest denomination, they were seated in the huge auditorium among a crowd which ranged from 35,000 to 40,000.

It took a few minutes to adjust to the awesome surroundings and to get a clear picture of the business meeting which was beginning.

The speaker seemed so small down in the center of

the stadium and he was usually in a crowd of Convention executives, advisors, or committee members. Loud speakers and huge screen televisions helped the messengers to keep track of the proceedings.

It quickly became clear that the liberal or moderate faction of the Convention, who have been seeking for years to replace the Convention's conservative or fundamental leadership, would once again seek to gain control of the Convention.

The conservative viewpoint includes the opinion that, except for translation mistakes, the Bible is the divine, inspired word of God written by prophets and followers of Jesus Christ, under the direction of God, and that it is both theologically and historically correct. They also insist that the instructors in Southern Baptist seminaries and colleges should be professing Christians. And they believe that Christian morals should be practiced in public and political life as well as in private life.

It is harder to determine the beliefs of the liberals as they preferred to use good sounding but nearly meaningless slogans while avoiding discussions or details of their actual beliefs, but their actions speak.

Some of the liberals are

instructors and administrators at Baptist institutions, and some teach that the Bible is merely a book of fables for teaching moral lessons, that its historical accounts didn't actually happen, and that it probably wasn't written by inspired men of God. And the liberals insist on keeping such Baptist employees on the Convention payroll and teaching their beliefs to Baptist students and preacher boys. The young preachers sometimes become followers of the teachers, some of which profess to be atheists and members of cults. And members of their churches in turn become followers. They also continuously used the term "separation of church and state" during the convention as they opposed the taking of a stand by the denomination to oppose immorality in public and political life.

Early contests over committee appointments, assignments, and financing clearly indicated that conservative Baptists continued to control the Convention. The liberal minority then embarked on a program of opposing everything, and questioning most everything, sometimes continuing with unfounded, trivial, or pointless statements to the point of harassment. When they were cut off from addressing the crowd longer due to time limits or because, their subject was out of order or pointless, they complained that they weren't being given

a voice in the Convention, staging a show for their followers. They insisted that their minority represented all Baptists and that there would be unity if they were elected to power.

Convention President Jerry Vines, whose leadership kept the convention, which sometimes resembled a political party's national convention without the demonstrations, under control, and he also delivered the Convention sermon, he preached on "the church", and the crowd rose to their feet and applauded some of his moving points. He also mentioned some conservative views, saying that we believe in a Holy Bible rather than a holy Bible.

There was some good special music, including some by handicapped persons and there was huge choir.

Morris Chapman of Wichita Falls and Daniel Vestal of Atlanta were nominated for Convention President by Texas pastors, and the conservative Chapman was elected by a large majority. He pastors the First Baptist Church in Wichita Falls.

Motions and resolutions were made to be voted on, usually at a later time. Some were applauded heavily by the crowd while others seemed to be frivolous excuses to address the Convention, or even radical harassment. Any messenger could go to a microphone and address the floor.

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Crimestoppers To Be At Freedom Festival

At the monthly meeting of the directors of Eastland County Crimestoppers, plans were initiated for a Crimestopper float to be in the Rising Star Freedom Festival Parade in July. Sheriff Dee Hogan, a guest at the meeting, informed Crimestoppers that Rising Star was seeking more participants for their Freedom Festival and parade in order to make it a big event for that city. Answering a question about the drug situation in the county, Sheriff Hogan said that the drug problem continues but that it has greatly reduced during his time in office as indicated by the number of felony calls we receive are drug related, Hogan continued, and the number of calls has dropped from 150 a month when I took office to about 15 a month at the present. Crimestoppers increase the chances that lawbreakers will be caught and help with this reduction, he added.

They had to catch the airplane, which stopped in Houston before returning to Dallas, there were no later flights. And by early morning, the five were tired and at home.

Pharmacy Topics

One key to adult-onset diabetes, says a biochemist at the United States Department of Agriculture, is a deficiency in chromium, the mineral that augments insulin activity. To increase chromium uptake, eat more whole grains, meats, fruits and vegetables and less sweets.

New technique to repair brain aneurysm has been developed by a doctor at the University of California/San Francisco. Balloon-tipped catheter is threaded through the groin artery to the brain, then a quick-hardening polymer is injected into the balloon to form a plug which remains in place after the catheter is removed.

To reduce the stress that may accompany dental appointments, a University of Cincinnati study offered an eight-minute tape that described what would happen at the next visit, and taught how to replace negative thoughts with pleasant ones.

New protection against poison ivy is in the works. A spray-on clay (it doesn't show) is said to be 95 percent effective and will be available in two years. Current barrier creams offer 60 percent protection.

GTRO Annual Meeting Held

The Golden Triangle Royalty & Oil, Inc. (NASDAQ: GTRO) annual meeting on June 8, 1990 was attended by approximately 140 people including stockholders and brokers from all over the United States, the company announced. The meeting was held at the Conrad Hilton Memorial Center. (Hilton's first hotel recently renovated in Cisco). The present directors, Dr. Thys B. Johnson, Howard Siegel, Robert Kamon, Effie Kamon, Lloyd L. London, and Karen Lee were re-elected for one year terms.

The activities of GTRO in the United States and Australia were presented by Robert Kamon, president, and by Lloyd L. London, director. London discussed the payout on 53 producing royalty and overriding royalty interests in Kansas and Texas, and discussed the purchase of 13 producing royalty interests in Colorado and 10 mineral deeds in western Oklahoma.

In reviewing Australia, Kamon announced that the Company increased its Australian ORRI holdings under 1,803,200 acres with a net 180,940 royalty acre addition. The area under ATP 415P was re-issued from a relinquishment on ATP 299P.

Eighty nine percent (89%) of GTRO's ORRI in Australia is located in the Eromanga Basin. The Eromanga Basin is Australia's largest onshore oil producing basin. GTRO holds overriding royalties on concessions which adjoin all four sides of the block with the highest onshore oil production in Australia, the Exxon-Santos concession, in the middle of the Eromanga Basin. Current production from this Exxon-Santos block is 16,000,000 barrels of oil, 10,000,000 barrels of condensate products, and 170 billion cubic feet of gas per year.

Mr. Kamon also announced

that during 1989 five new oil wells were drilled on the 3,680,000 acre ATP 267P, bringing the total to eight fields with nineteen successful wells. Two new oil wells were drilled on ATP 299P, bringing the total to eleven fields with twenty three successful wells. This year GTRO doubled its overriding royalty interest in ATP 267P to a total of 51,048 net royalty acres. The drilling rig is reported to be currently on ATP 267P waiting for the roads to dry sufficiently to move on to the Paragoona No. 1 drilling location. This is on a large seismic structure on the East end of the Jackson Producing Trend located as a result of a multimillion dollar 1500 km seismic program conducted by Shell. The Endeavour No. 2 was reported to be drilling on ATP 299P with two more wells planned

to be drilled on this concession.

An announcement was made concerning the lawsuit in Australia that verbal agreement has been reached with 89 percent of the working interest holders regarding the method of calculating the overriding royalty and payment of monies out of court. The verbal agreement provides that the working interest holders will pay the royalties due GTRO from ATP 299P on which the following producing oil fields are located: 1) Tintaburra; 2) Koorooopa; 3) Takyah; 4) Talgeberry; 5) Toobunyah; 6) Ipundu; 7) Cranstoun; 8) Monler; 9) Tarbat; 10) North Ipundu; and 11) Endeavour.

The production from the producing fields on ATP 299P in which GTRO holds a one and a quarter (1 1/4) percent overriding royalty interest has

been increasing steadily from 1984 to 1989, the years on which the Company has figures. GTRO now holds a total of 3,436,165 net royalty acres under 56,396,000 non-producing and producing surface acres in Queensland, Australia.

A return to stock holders in the form of a 5 percent stock dividend was announced by the directors of GTRO. The ex-dividend date was set for September 5, 1990; record date was set for September 11, 1990, and the payment date was set for October 15, 1990.

The date of the next annual meeting was set for June 14, 1991.

The summer bite we have all become families with is here folks. The little peck-peck, like perch that can be so frustrating. Many times we all are too quick to hammer down and set the hook only to come back with half a worm. Over the years we have all tried different methods to help increase hook ups. Nails placed in the worms head and moving the hook to the tail section draws some success. This is rigged without a weight due to the nail taking its place. The old two hook set up is a good bet, threading line thru the worm body with a needle and tying two hooks together one at the front half and one near the tail. This method does tend to roll your worm more during the retrieve which sometimes is desirable. Waiting for line movement normally means its time to set the hook, but to often during the summer this too provides only limited success.

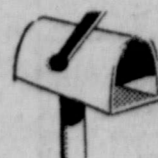





This is not a "how to research" book, instead it is a marvelous detailed guide to genealogical sources and resources, covering what records to look for, what are available and where they can be found. It identifies records on state land, regional level and then county level (county by county) providing details of vital records, Bible, church and cemetery records, newspapers, military records, naturalizations, census records (including special schedules, indexes and census substitutes), land records, maps and city directories. There are appendices with (1) a complete inventory of the Historical Records Survey Archives on microfilm, and (2) a list of West Virginians who filed Civil War damage claims, 1871-1880.

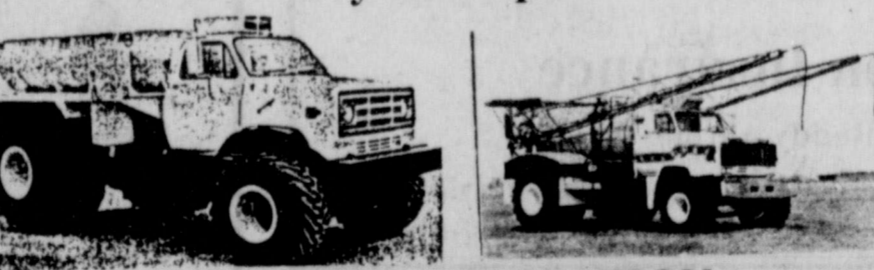
