





Do Smaller Schools Face Future Consolidation

With smaller school educators lobbying for their share of the state public education funds and larger school educators trying to hang on to funding which the courts have ruled is more than their fair share, school funding bills were sent by the legislature to the Governor.

While some educators were following a large school and media program of criticizing Governor Bill Clements for vetoing early funding bills, they may have overlooked some of the wording in the bills. We are told that one nearly overlooked provision in a vetoed bill would have resulted in some of those educators losing their jobs.

The bill reportedly would have forced the smaller school districts in the state, expect possibly those at a great distance from another school, to consolidate. The metropolitan areas have a majority of the voters in Texas and probably three fourths of Texans are in school districts larger than the class A and AA districts. This gives small schools little clout with the legislature, and the larger

schools should consolidate for better efficiency. And but for the Governor's veto, forced consolidation could have started this year, throwing the latest UIL classifying and district alignments into confusion.

With the possibility of such drastic changes which would have an enormous impact on the state's small towns coming so close, maybe small town residents should give the subject some thought and wonder if the next governor will veto such a bill. And such a bill could appear again in the next session.

We don't have the details of the vetoed bill and we can only speculate about what could happen. One possibility is that our area could end up with four larger or class AAA schools: Clyde-Baird, Breckenridge, Eastland-Ranger-Carbon, and DeLeon-Gorman; and four smaller or class AA schools: Albany-Moran, Cisco, Cross Plains-Rising Star-May, and Santo-Gordon-Strawn. Of course there are also other possible combinations.







Humid Heat Can Cause Hypothermia

The late spring of 1990 may well be remembered in some parts of the state as the time when torrential rains, flooding, high winds and lightening repeatedly brought death and property destruction. The Trinity River flood in May, for example, killed as many as 12 Texans. The extent of damage along the river's course through East Texas is still uncalculated.

But as if the ravages of violent weather were not enough, an early heat wave has combined with high humidity to pose a less obvious, but also deadly, threat to humans.

Health officials warn that heat stree, or hyperthermia, causes about 200 deaths and thousands of illnesses each year in the U.S. the victims usually are the elderly, the

very young, or people weakened by other illnesses, although prolonged heat stress can be fatal to anyone. Last year, as many as nine Texans may have died from excessive heat, although weather records for the state show that the hot months of 1989 were generally cooler than aver-Dr. Patti Patterson, Acting

Associate Commissioner for Personal Health Services at the Texas Department of Health (TDH), said that high temperature alone is physically tolerable to most people. Combined with high humidity, though, heat can cause a person's natural cooling system, perspiration, to work overtime. "If a person fails to replace fluids and salts they lose during perspiration," Dr. Patterson said, "dehydration

can follow." The symptoms of dehydration include muscle cramps,

dizziness, nausea, low blood pressure and headaches. "These are serious warning signs," Patterson siad. "Anyone with these symptoms should immediately find shade, ventilation and fluids-preferably water-to drink until the symptoms subside." She explained that if fluids are not soon replaced, heat stroke can follow, causing sudden weakness, severe headache, disorientation leading to loss of consciousness.

brain damage and death. To avoid overheating, Dr. Patterson said, people should wear light-colored, loose-fitting clothing and drink more than their normal intake of water. Those with heart or respiratory conditions or people taking medications should be especially aware of early signs of physical prob-

"One of the best ways to know whether to take special

precautions on a given day is to follow a local weather forecast. Although forecasts cannot be exact all the time, meteorologists are usually accurate enough to predict approximate temperatures and humidity," she added.

Forecasters often refer to a 'heat stress index," a numeric table which reflects how hot the air will feel to humans. A heat stress reading of 105 degrees is considered very dangerous, yet it can occur while thermometer readings are still in the mid 80s.

The following is the official National Weather Service heat index table. To calculate heat stress, find the index number in the column under current humidity (top line) that is directly to the right of the your thermometer reading (left column).

Pharmacy **Topics**

Oldsters do lose some memory skills as they age, says a neuroscientist at University of California/Irving--but they keep improving verbal reasoning skills and semantic memory used in complex decision-making.

New automated eye test for infants has been invented by a neurologist at MIT. Doctors recommend vision testing at six months for preemies and babies with family history of lazy eye or eye misalignment.

Doctor at the University of Missouri in Kansas City used a balloon catheter to dilate clogged brain arteries of patients at risk for stroke. Blood vessels stayed open up to five years in most patients.

Expectant mothers at risk at Magee Women's Hospital in Pittsburgh were trained to recognize early warning signs of premature labor. Result: early births dropped from 14 percent to 9 percent.

Shock waves within the body, delivered via endoscope, are shown to be effective against gallstones, doctors at University Hospital, Boston University School of Medicine, report. Procedure takes about an hour.
