
Videotapers can provide absolutely invaluable assistance to the project IF they have good, sharp recordings of any or all of the following programs, in a normal or standard speed:




Taylor reveals how well the Davises worked together when they performed at a local civic organization recently. "They were nervous before they started, but one look at Lou Jane and Jerry



The day schedule will include classes offered Tuesday through Thursday, because on Monday and Friday the classrooms will be occupied by nursing classes, said CJC President Dr. Roger Schustereit. Day class hours will be 8 a.m. - 10: 15 a.m.

Letter To The Editor Dear Editor,



JEAN GRANBERRY SCHNITZ, 9015 Cedar Trail, Boerne, TX 78006 needs help with information about some of her family who lived in or near Desdemona, also called Hogtown, TX, as well as some of the buildings, customs and happenings in the area during the time her family lived there.

She write: I am in the process of writing a book about my families who came to Desdemona ("Hogtown") TX in 1878, and am seeking information about the LEE, YANDELL and O'REAR

families. Great grandparents were Columbus Addison LEE and Parmelia Caroline (YANDELL) LEE. Some of the YANDELL families came to Eastland/Comanche/Erath County areas at the same time in 1878. Additionally, Captain Jack O'REAR, whose family came to "Hogtown" area around 1878 was an uncle of my grandfather, William Ira SCUDDER (whose mother was a sister to jack O'REAR). Columsus Addison LEE and family lived just across the county line in Comanche County, but Hogtown was the town they lived nearest. Captain Jack O'REAR his wife and four of their children are buried in the Desdemona Cemetery.

The entire family was active in a church there and I would like to know which church and something about it. The Columbus Addison LEE family moved to Seymour, TX in 1891. LEE children included: ROBERT (or

school when they came to Hogtown, the others were definitely of school age. I would especially like to determine what school they attended. Columbus Addison LEE (C.A.LEE) was a music master, which was what music teachers were called in the old days. He was also a rancher. In 1890 my grandmother wrote letters that spoke of my father leading singing at church and other

musical gatherings, and described "singing conventions" that the family attended. Frequently included at the gatherings was the playing of a hammered dulcimer that C.A. LEE bought in Sedalia Missouri in 1859 which he brought with the family to Hogtown in 1878. All the LEE children were proficient playing the instrument and my Grandmother (Dore Lee SCUDDER) told of musical gatherings that took place while the family lived near Hogtown.

I now have Addison LEE's hammered dulcimer. I play the instrument and sing the songs I learned from my grandmother. This same instrument has been heard at the Texas Folklife Festival in San Antonio (for the last ten





Gordon Spot

The mild summer we experienced here in Eastland County in 1989 apparently will not be repeated in 1990. It has really been hot. It's summer time, and more folks are heading for the parks, lakes and beaches.

"But as you heed the call of the wild you should also watch out for being bitten by animals, wild or otherwise," said Dr. Bruce Lawhorn, veterinarian with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"Animals bites may cause rabies," he warned, explaining that human beings and all warm-blooded animals are susceptible to rabies, a virus disease of the central nervous system that without treatment is invariably fatal.

Rabies can be controlled if you understand the problem and know what to watch out for.

You should watch out for these situations:

* Bold, "friendly or apparently tame" wild animals.

* Night animals such as skunks or foxes that are seen during the day.

* Pets that have difficulty walking, cating or drinking. * Signs of excitement or viciousness in normally quict

animals. A veterinarian should be consulted immediately, if any

of these signs are noted. If a person is bitten by an animal, treat the bite as if the animal were rabid and follow these steps

* Identify the animal - by kind, size, color, and location. Caution children to seek the help of a policeman or other adult.

* Have the animal caught, and immediately report the incident to animal control officials or police. Keep the animal in sight until it is

apprehended. Trying to catch the animal without professional help means added risk.

* Cleanse the wound immediately and thoroughly by washing with soap and water. Rinse well and disinfect with alcohol, iodine, or other disinfectants. This lessens the chance of contacting the rabies virus.

* See a doctor immediately after washing the wound. The physician will decide on the need for treatment to prevent rabies

Biologist Bob Howells of the departments Heart O' the Hills Research Station at ingram said the fish exceeded all expections and are now fairly abundant in the San Antonio river Authority, reservoir just southeast of the

We stocked the hybirds in Braunig partly because we knew there were no white or

black crappie in the reservoir," Howells said. "That makes it easier to judge their success for failure since there is no identification problem."

Howells said the introduced fish obviously had a high survival rate, since a cove rotenone survey found almost three pounds of crappie per acre. He said anything over one pound of crappie per acre is generally regarded as a good crappie population.

The best part, Howells noted, is that virtually all the fish are over the 10-inch minimum length limit that will be going into effect statewide on September 1. There currently is a 25-per-day bag limit en crappie on Braunig. "These crappie have grown faster than either white or black crappie normally grow, which is often the case with hybird fish," said Howells. "Another good feature about them is that they obviously spawned this year, since we picked up some young-of-theyear crappie in our survey."

"Right now I don't think many fishermen realize crappie exist in Braunig, although some probably have been caught by anglers fishing for other species," he said. How-Lake. ells said it might be more difficult to locate schools of the hybirds right now than it will be later. "I think fisher-

men will be able to catch them easily during the fall and winter when the fish likely will move into deep water around the dam and close to the power plant outlet."

Lake Braunig is located adjacent to interstate Highway 37 just south of Loop 410. An entrance fee is charged.



State Begins Collecting New "Tax Rate on Sunday, July 1

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Tuesday reminded everyone who collects or pays sales tax there will be an additional quarter percent sales tax collected on all taxable purchases beginning Sunday, July 1.

"The change means we'll all be paying a little bit more to help fund education and human services in Texas," Bullock said.

The new rate of 6 1/4 percent was approved by the Texas Legislature after a fourth special session on the issueended in early June. The increase brings the maximum sales tax rate in Texas to 8 1/ 4 percent when optional local sales taxes are included.

Bullock's office estimates that a family of four making \$35,000 a year will pay an additional \$24.65 a year in the state sales tax.

The Comptroller's Office has sent almost half a million postcards notifying sales tax permit holders across Texas of the change.


