## J's Jottin's

The following article was written for *The Catalyst*, a teachers' association publication in New York. It was written by Frank Alberti, RTC President, after he visited Jim and Jean Fitzgerald in Cisco recently.

We found it interesting and want to share it with our readers. It was entitled "The Leisure Class."

"CISCO, TEXAS— For those of you who never heard of Cisco, I can tell you that it has at least two claims to fame in addition to being the hometown of Jim and Jean Fitzgerald. Back in the days of the oil boom, Conrad Hilton bought the first hotel in what eventually became the Hilton Hotel dynasty. Cisco also had one of the wildest bank robberies ever seen, led by Santa Claus!

"In the early 1900's the Ranger oil field brought booming prosperity to the area of Texas where Cisco is located. Conrad Hilton arrived in town attempting to purchase a local bank. Although he thought he had a deal at first, eventually it fell through. As he prepared to leave town he observed that the Mobley Hotel, located by the railroad station, had a line of men outside. Further investigation revealed that lodging was so scarce that beds were being rented in three shifts a day. Hilton soon negotiated a deal and became the owner, although the name was never changed. In recent years the building was renovated and serves as the Chamber of Commerce office, a museum and a community center.

"The so-called Santa Claus robbery took place in 1927 and was the type of incident you would think was dreamed up by a movie scriptwriter. On December 23 a man in a Santa Claus costume walked down the street and entered the bank. It soon became clear that he had served as a distraction while three other bandits positioned themselves. In spite of their numbers they were unable to prevent someone from escaping and spreading the word. The sheriff quickly had the bank surrounded, including the alleys where the getaway car stood. With two small children as hostages the bandits shot their way out and left in a hail of gunfire. It was estimated that over 150 shots were fired in the alley behind the bank, killing the sheriff and another officer and wounding the others on both sides. A wild chase took place, but in spite of the huge posse it took several days to capture the last bandits. One died of bullet wounds, one was executed after a trial, one was lynched after killing a guard in an attempted prison break, and one served a long prison term. It's amazing what you can learn when you go to visit an old friend.

"Jim Fitzgerald was well known in the Junior High School as a member of the Social Studies department and

as a coach for all seasons. He worked with boys' teams and girls' teams in just about every sport except baseball.

"Jim's move to Cisco does not come as a surprise. His wife Jean grew up there and Jim began his career in education there. He was serving as an elementary school principal when Helmer Petersen came recruiting. Helmer really struck gold when he obtained the services of Jim and a group of other members of the Church of Christ. It must have shortened that year's recruiting and it certainly enhanced the quality of education in West Babylon.

"When he retired from West Babylon, Jim did not exactly stop teaching. He moved to Northeastern Christian Junior College in Pennsylvania where he served as a History Teacher, Soccer Coach, and Dean of Students. At the same time Jean took charge of the boys' dormitory, which kept her fully occupied.

"After six years at Northeastern, Jim and Jean decided it was time to 'retire' to Cisco. However, some people don't ever seem to completely put an end to employment. It wasn't long before Jim was back in harness, teaching an evening course for Cisco Junior College. He also began to work as a substitute in the local high school. There are times when his attendance is better than some of the regular staff members. The principal told me that he loves to have Jim come in. He said, 'Jim tells them a story, gets them settled down, and before they know what's happening the classwork is getting done.'

"I had looked forward to this part of my trip and I wasn't disappointed. I am sure that Jim would like to hear from some of his old friends in West Babylon. You can write to him at 7009th Street, Cisco, Texas 76437.

## A Walk For Others Inspires

ROSA GENE CARROLL OF BRECKENRIDGE WAS BORN IN 1902 IN THE NECESSITY COMMUNITY, STEPHENS COUNTY, TO A PIONEER FAMILY NAMED YARBROUGH. SHE AND HER LATE HUSBAND, TOM CARROLL, LIVED IN EASTLAND COUNTY DURING THE 1960's.

It was 5:45 a.m. on May 30 when Rosa Gene Carroll and I reached the outdoor track behind South Elementary School in Breckenridge. I turned off the lights of my pickup, leaving only a faint gleam on the track.

This was Mrs. Carroll's 88th birthday, and she had pledged to walk eight non-stop miles to celebrate. For one thing, she wanted to highlight years of living and miles of walking, and to encourage other Seniors in more physical activity.

But, most importantly, the trim little lady wanted to fulfill her promise to walk eight miles for donations to buy a new stove for the Senior Center in Breckenridge.

"If I'm going to walk, why not for a cause?" she said. "That old stove in the Center is about ruined, and they try to serve around 240 dinners Monday, Wednesday and Friday."

As we stepped onto the track Rosa Gene hurried to the quarter-mile lap. "I believe I can see well enough to start," she said. "Let me know when it's Six O'clock."

I recalled that the word "see" had a special meaning to Rosa Gene Carroll, for she was almost blind. Plenty of excuses to stay home, but here she was - in rose-colored slacks and a white blouse, with a new hairdo and bright smile.

Her plan was to "beat the heat" with her eight miles. It was cool now but humid, with clouds scudding toward the southeast.

I signaled and she started down the track. Slowly at first, then warming up as she circled the side. The track was shaped like an elongated egg, with grass in the middle.

As Rosa Gene faded into the darkness I could hear the town beginning to rouse, like faint sounds of a brass band tuning up. Mockingbirds in nearby mesquite trees sang an obnoxious, while an oil well chugged its rhythm.

I realized that what Rosa Gene was doing was simply an outgrowth of her ideas on life. "This old house needs fixing, but I'm not going to sit around and wait for the undertaker," she often said. "Doing things for other people brings improvement to your own health."

On Sept. 9, 1984 I had brought her to this same spot for a 14 1/2 mile walk to raise money to pay off our church building (the Seventh-day Adventist) and also to take pledges to pay medical expenses for a sick baby.

She had raised over \$2,000 in that marathon, and needed about that much again on the stove project. But others were working on this too - a beautiful handmade quilt had been given to the Center for fundraising. They were accepting

## Eastland-Ranger Experience Water Delivery Problems

Water delivery problems continue to make news in Eastland, Ranger and surrounding communities. High temperatures and dry weather led to peak demand this week, straining the pumping capacity of the Eastland County Water Supply District.

On Wednesday and Thursday Eastland citizens were requested to stop outdoor watering, and use water "for basic purposes only." Water storage tanks dropped to below 40 ft., leading to this crisis.

The situation has now improved, according to Paul

Catoe, Eastland City Manager. The odd-even system of outdoor water resumed Friday, where citizens may use water outdoors on days corresponding with odd or even house numbers. That will give them a chance to water every other day.

"It is still vital that people conserve water," Catoe states. "No water at all should be wasted. I've driven around town and seen water out into the streets from lawns - right in the middle of the day. That's what I call wasteful!"

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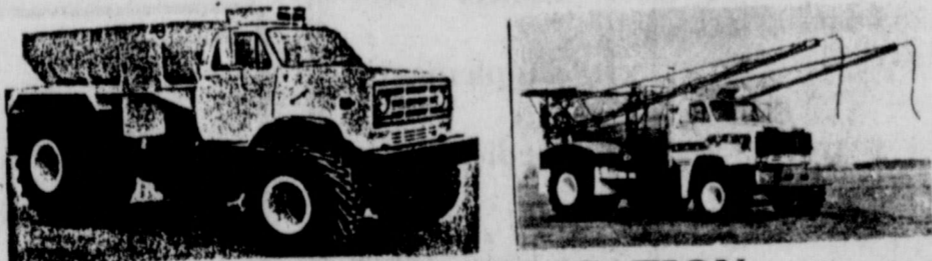

## Texas Department Of Health

Chronically ill and disabled children who are eligible for Medicaid but have been denied access to health care services due to administrative delays in adjusting the computer system at the Texas Department of Health, according to State Senators Chet Brooks (D-Pasadena/Galveston) and Bob Glasgow (D-Stephenville).

Arrangements were made by the senators with the Chronically Ill and Disabled Children's (CIDC) program at the Department of Health after TDHS advised Brooks and Glasgow it would not have its computer system "re-programmed" until August 1. The two senators became aware of TDHS' computer problem after inquiring on behalf of children in their respective districts who were not receiving badly-needed medical attention even though the children became eligible for Medicaid benefits under a new federal law which went into effect April 1, 1990.

The new federal law, signed by President Bush last December, increased the income eligibility for Medicaid to 133% of poverty for children up to age six and for pregnant women. "Because these new clients do not have official computer authorization numbers issued by TDHS," Brooks said, "some health care providers are understandably reluctant to treat them, especially when the provider has indicated it could be four months or longer before providers can get reimbursed. Frankly, it's beyond our comprehension why it would take the Department so long to get its computers adjusted." Brooks is Chairman of the Senate Committee on Health and Human Services.

Although not all of the 42,000 children expected to be eligible for Medicaid under the new federal law can be served by the CIDC program, those who have chronic and disabling conditions such as cancer, spina bifida, cystic fibrosis or cardiovascular diseases can get the medical attention they so desperately need.

"We are extremely grateful to the Department of Health for its willingness to step in and help these sick children and their families," Senator Glasgow stated. "Some of the children have life-threatening medical conditions which cannot wait for a computer to be updated."

For those who have difficulty digesting milk, adding a little chocolate helps. (Mama knew this -- but researchers at the University of Rhode Island checked it out scientifically.)

New once-a-day antibiotic, cefixime, is effective against many bacteria resistant to amoxicillin. It's available in both pediatric and adult dosages.

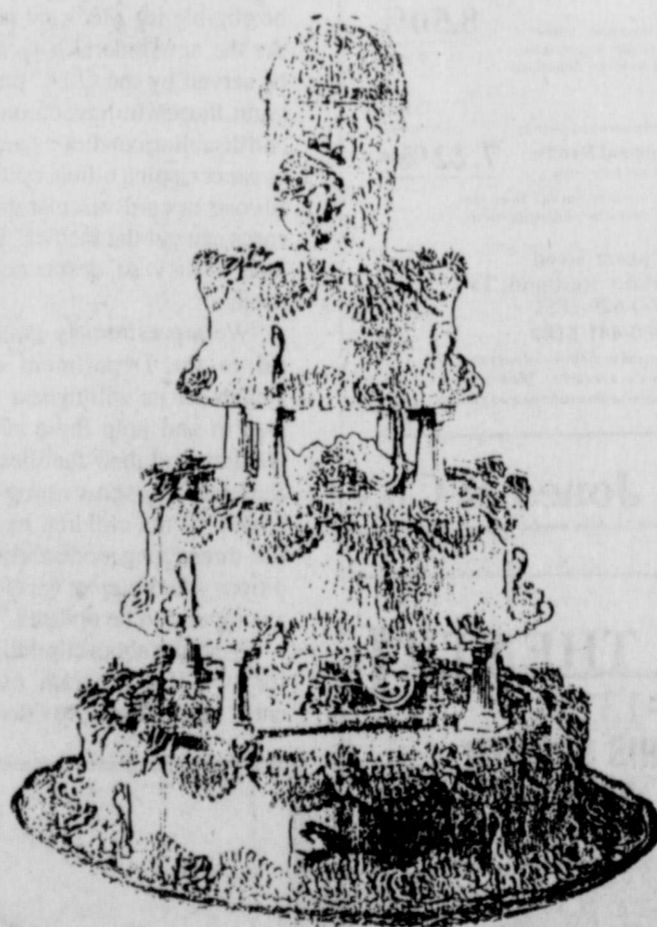

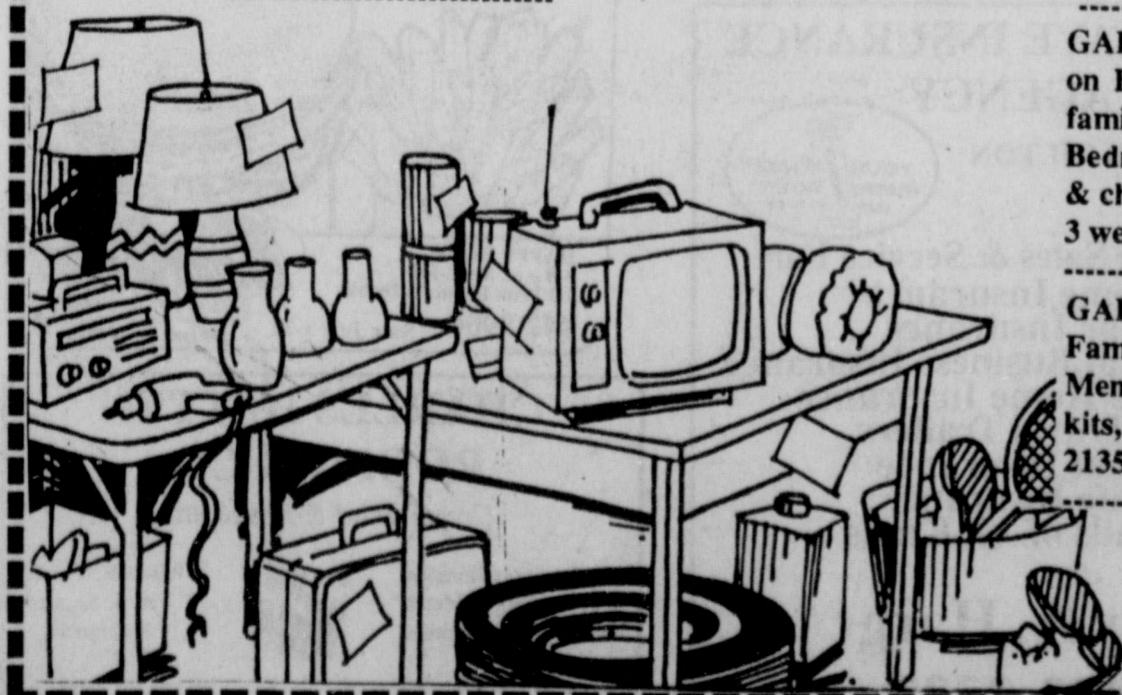

Within two weeks of quitting, a person's energy level rises, toxic gases will no longer irritate the eyes, nose, and throat, and one's sense of taste and smell improve. Over time, the risks of developing lung cancer, emphysema, and chronic bronchitis, are greatly

reduced by stopping smoking.

If you're ready to declare your freedom from smoking, the American Lung Association has a few tips:

- Throw away all smoking materials and ashtrays;
- When you feel the urge to smoke, take ten deep breaths;
- Prepare a non-smokers kit that contains: toothpicks, straws, chewing gum, sunflower seeds, and raw vegetables;

- Make a list of the reasons you stopped smoking and keep it with you; and

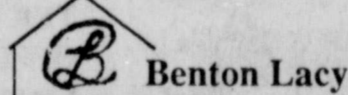
- Practice saying, "No thank you, I don't smoke."
