The following article was written for The Catalyst, a teachers' association publication in New York. It was written by Frank Alberti, RTC President, after he visited Jim and Jean Fitzgerald in Cisco recently.

We found it interesting and want to share it with our readers. It was entitled "The Leisure Class."

"CISCO, TEXAS - For those of you who never heard of Cisco, I can tell you that it has at least two claims to fame in addition to being the home town of Jim and Jean Fitzgerald. Back in the days of the oil boom, Conrad Hilton bought the first hotel in what eventually became the Hilton Hotel dynasty. Cisco also had one of the wildest bank robberies ever seen, led by Santa Claus!

"In the early 1900's the Ranger oil field brought booming prosperity to the area of Texas where Cisco is located. Conrad Hilton arrived in town attempting to purchase a local bank. Although he thought he had a deal at first, eventually it fell through. As he prepared to leave town he observed that the Mobley Hotel, located by the railroad

"Jim's move to Cisco does not come as a surprise. His wife Jean grew up there and Jim began his career in education there. He was serving as a elementary school princial when Helmer Petersen came recruiting. Helmer really struck gold when he obtained the services of Jim and a group of other members of the Church of Christ. It must have shortened that year's recruiting and it certainly enhanced the quality of edu-

cation in West Babylon. "When he retired from West Babylon, Jim did not exactly stop teaching. He moved to Northeastern Christian Junior College in Pennsylvania where he served as a History Teacher, Soccer Coach, and Dean of Students. At the same time Jean took charge of the boys' dormitory, which kept her fully occupied.

"After six years at Northeastern, Jim and Jean decided it was time to 'retire' to Cisco. However, some people don't ever seem to completely put

station, had a line of men outside. Further investigation revealed that lodging was so scarce that beds were being rented in three shifts a day. Hilton soon negotiated a deal and became the owner, although the name was never changed. In recent years the building was renovated and serves as the Chamber of Commerce office, a museum and a community center.

"The so called Santa Claus robbery took place in 1927 and was the type of incident you would think was dreamed up by a movie scriptwriter. On December 23 a man in a Santa Claus costume walked down the street and entered the bank. It soon became clear that he had served as a distractor while three other bandits positioned themselves. In spite of their numbers they were unable to prevent someone from escaping and spreading the word. The sheriff quickly had the bank surrounded, including the alleys where the getaway car stood. With two small children as hostages the bandits shot their way out and left in a hail of gunfire. It was estimated that over 150 shots were fired in the alley behind the bank, killing the sheriff and another officer and wounding the others on both sides. A wild chase took place, but in spite of the huge posse it took several days to capture the last bandits. One died of bullet wounds, one was executed after a trial, one was lynched after killing a guard in an attempted prison break, and one served a long prison term. It's amazing what you can learn when you go to visit an old friend.

"Jim Fitzgerald was well known in the Junior High School as a member of the Social Studies department and

VIDEOTAPERS ... THE HILTON NEEDS YOUR HELPH

Persons in or around Cisco who have had videotape recorders over the past few years, and have taped certain programs, could be of valuable assistance to the Hilton Community Center, Board President Eris Ritchie has stated.

Ritche said that the Hilton board is now in the process of completing programming work on a permanent video exhibit that will become a part of the Hilton's attractions in late summer or early fall. the project has been made possible by grants totalling nearly \$14,000 from the Hilton Foundation in Los Angeles, the organization that funded the rehavilitation project which converted the old Mobley Hotel into the Conrad N. Hilton Memorial Park and Community Center.

Videotapers can provide absolutely invaluable assistance to the project IF they have good, sharp recordings of any or all of the following programs, in a normal or standard speed:

1. The "Big Country Reporter" program about the Mobley/Hilton project, done approximately late summer or fall of 1984, broadcast by KTAB-TV, Abilene, Channel 32.

2. The "Big Country Reporter" program abou the "Santa Claus Bank Robbery" done in November or December of 1984, broadcast by KTAB-TV, Abilene, Channel 32.

3. The CJC Wrangler Band and Belles in the Macy's Parade in New York in 1977, broadcast by NBC Television.


4. The CJC Wrangler Band and Belles in the Macy's Parade in New York in 1981, broadcast by NBC Television.


5. The CJC Wrangler Band and Belles in the Macy's Parade in New York in 1984, broadcast by NBC Television.

6. KTAB-TV news coverage of Hilton Community Center dedication on October 13, 1986.


Mr. Ritchie stated that he has all of the above videotapes in his possession, but most of them are recorded at extended play (very slow) speeds. For purposes of the video permanent exhibit, tapes are needed that are recorded at normal speed. The tapes are also dated so far back that the Abilene television stations do not have them on file.

"Anyone having one or more tapes of these programs could be of tremendous assitance to us in the development of this project," Ritchie said. We need only to borrow the tapes, and they can be returned to the owner unhampered in anyway. Any person who can help provide a tape or tapes



The Texas Legislature's committees on redistricting will conduct public hearings in Fort Worth on July 13 and in Dallas on July 14 in preparation for the drawing of new district lines for seats in the U. S. Congress, in the Texas Legislature, and on the State

Board of Education. The legislature is required to redistrict after publication of the 1990 United States census. Districts drawn in 1991 are to be in effect for the next 10 years. The public hearings are to gather information about how district lines should be drawn.

Redistricting in the past two decades has resulted in significant increases in legisla-

eas have gained population and legislative seats while rural areas have lost.

The 1990 census is expected to reveal the continuation of population trends that have shown increases in the percentage of the state population that is Black or Hispanic, as well as a shift in population away from the rural East and West Texas and metropolitan central city areas toward suburban communities

A study by the Texas Legislative Council indicates that the state is predicted to have grown by about 20 percent between the 1980 and the 1990 census, increasing in population from 14.2 million to 17.11 million. Collin, Denton, Ellis, Hood, Parker, and Rockwall counties are projected to have grown by more than 50 percent, with Rockwall County showing the largest growth rate in the state, with 98.4 percent.

Dallas County, with a 21.6 percent increase in population, is projected to have approximated the state rate of growth. Tarrant County's projected growth rate of 35.9 percent is substantially higher than the state rate and appears to be great enough to give the county an additional seat in the Texas House of Representatives. Growth in both Tarrant and Dallas counties appears to have occurred outside the urban centers in the surrounding suburban areas.

As a result of these uneven population changes, the census is expected to show that about half of the current Texas house districts in the hearing region have more population than that required for the "ideal" size of a district (114,100). Although districts 90, 100, 103, and 111 are all 20 percent or more below ideal district size, district 93 is projected to be 38 percent above ideal size. Senate districts also show a wide range of variation in projected growth rates, from 19 percent below the ideal district size (552,000) in district 23 to 40 tricia Hill (R-Dallas) are the North Texas area member of the House Committee.

Justice Charles A. Loreto

Justice Charles A. Loreto, who served twelve years on the Municipal Court and fifteen years on the New York State Supreme Court in the First Judicial District of Manhattan and The Bronx, N.Y. died in Eastland, on July 1 in Eastland Memorial Hospital.

He was recognized for his quiet judicial restraint, his high sense of integrity, and marked legal ability. For many aspiring young lawyers he was a role model.

In retirement, beginning December 31, 1972, in Stony Brook, New York .and Eastland, Judge Loreto worked on his memoirs, which appeared in book form in 1985, aptly entitled In The Name of Justice - with Compassion in Judging. The book is a reflection of the man as well as a rich collection of some of the matters on which he ruled, such as evaluating the private property taken to build the World Trade Center in New York City, resolving the contractual rights of the New York Central and New York, New Haven, and Hartford Railroads in the area of the Grand Central Station, and deciding

the public schools of the City before receiving his B.A. degree from Columbia College in 1923 and his LLB degree from Columbias University Law School in 1925. (Classmates were former Governor Thomas E. Dewey of New York and Justice William O. Douglas of the United States Supreme Court.)

The Judge was active in community affairs in The Bronx and Manhattan - the Boys Scouts, the Columbus Alliance, public educational affairs, and as a Corporator of the New York Botanical Garden.

Judge Loreto is survived by his wife, Rosalie Leslie Loreto, former Assistant Dean of Women at the University of Maryland. Rosalie Loreto graduated from Eastland High School in 1927. Her parents, Judge and Mrs. W. P. Leslie, were long-time residents of the city.

Also surviving Judge Loreto are two brothers, Michael Loreto of West Palm Beach, Florida and Arthur Loreto of North Palm Beach, Florida, and ten nieces and nephews.



Texas Department Of Health

Chronically ill and disabled children who are eligible for Medicaid but have been denied access to health care services due to administrative delays in adjusting the computer system at the Texas Department of Health, according to State Senators Chet Brooks (D-Pasadena/ Galveston) and Bob Glasgow

(D-Stephenville). Arrangements were made by the senators with the Chronically Ill and Disabled Children's (CIDC) program at the Department of Health after TDHS advised Brooks and Glasgow it would not have its computer system "reprogrammed" until August 1. The two senators became aware of TDHS' computer problem after inquiring on behalf of children in their respective districts who were not receiving badly-needed medical attention even though the children became eligible for Medicaid benefits under a new federal law which went

into effect April 1, 1990. The new federal law, signed by President Bush last December, increased the income eligibility for Medicaid to 133% of poverty for children up to age six and for pregnant women. Pharmacy Topics

Children with chicken pox seem to get better faster when treated with acyclovir, a widely used antiviral drug, according to a study at the University of Minnesota. The severity of the illness is reduced, too.

The University of Southern California's School of Dentistry has done a five-year trial of a new dental "anesthesia" that doesn't use novacain or needles. Instead, low level of electrical current blocks pain signals.

On the way to a vaccine against Lyme disease, researchers at the University of Wisconsin have come up with a serum that prevents laboratory animals from developing symptoms.

For those who have difficulty digesting milk, adding a little chocolate helps. (Mama knew this -- but researchers at the University of Rhode Island checked it out scientifically.)

New once-a-day antibiotic, cefixime, is effective against many bacteria resistant to amoxicillin. It's available in both pediatric and adult dosages.


