## Bronze Bust Presented To Congressman Stenholm

It was a special day at the Majestic Saturday when the bronze bust of Congressman Charlie Stenholm was unveiled and presented to him by Eastland County friends.

A number of these contributing friends were in the audience, along with Stenholm Staff members and news media from the area.

The Majestic was resplendent for the event, with antique cars at the curb and a beautifully decorated stage inside. Stage appointments included an American and Texas flag, with a background of greenery and a large basket of red gladiolus highlighting the speakers rostrum.

On stage for the program were Congressman Stenholm; H. V. O'Brien Editor and PUBLISHER; Dale Stewart, bronze artist and creator of the bust; Ed Allcorn, Manager of the Majestic; and C. W. Hoffmann, Eastland Mayor and Master of Ceremonies.

Of course attention of the audience was also centered on an object to the left of the stage - a large purple cloth covering the bronze bust on a high stand.

Pianist Carolyn Bolt, in keeping with the program theme, gave a medley of patriotic songs as the crowd gathered. She also played for the National Anthem.

Mayor C. W. Hoffmann greeted the crowd and gave the Invocation. Ed Allcorn led the audience in a stirring rendition of "The Star

Spangled Banner."

H. V. O'Brien then addressed the "fellow coordinators and friends," saying that the bust came about because of a desire to show appreciation to Congressman Stenholm for the kind of representation he gives this District in Washington.

In looking for a personal

and different kind of gift, the thought came of having something made by a unique way to pay tribute, but Charlie's out of the ordinary too," O'Brien said.

## Applications Available At School For Reduced Meal Program

Applications are available for parents who want to sign up their children for Cisco Independent School District's free and reduced-price breakfast and lunch program. Applications are at each school in the district and will be given to each child when they register.

The program, funded by the federal government, provides free and discount breakfast and lunches to children who qualify according to government and district guidelines.

Families who qualify for food stamps or are housing foster children automatically qualify for the meal program. Other families can qualify if their total household income is at or below a certain amount. For example, a family of four with a total annual household income of less than \$23,495 qualifies for reduced prices. If the same family had a total income of \$16,510, their children would qualify for free breakfast and lunch. Student lunches regularly

cost \$1.00 and breakfasts costs .40 Children whose families qualify for reduced prices pay 40 cents for lunch and 30 cents for breakfast.

There is no deadline to apply for the program, and families turned down may reapply. The food services supervisor will verify eligibility. The information will be kept very confidential.

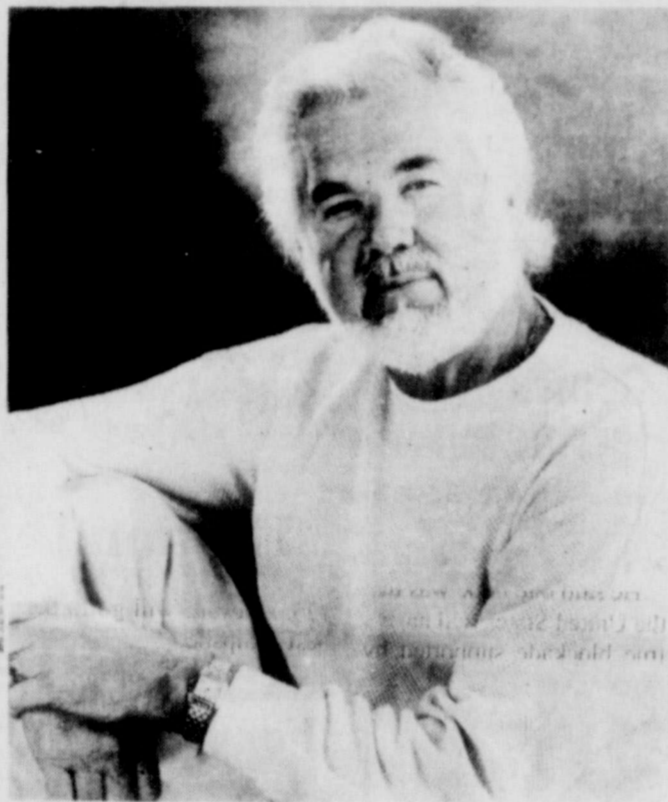

## Applying For Social Security Retirement Benefits

If you plan to apply for Social Security retirement benefits, but find it difficult to visit a Social Security office, you can apply by telephone. Social Security personnel will take the necessary information over the phone and arrange to complete your application by mail.

You can call Social Security's toll free telephone number 1-800-234-5772, 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. every business day. The best times to call are early in the morning and later in the afternoon after the first week of the month.

You should apply for retirement benefits at least 2 or 3 months before you plan to stop working. This will help assure that your benefits will start the month of your retirement. The first check should be received early in the month after the first full month of your retirement.

You will need certain documents to establish your eligibility for benefits. They include your Social Security card or a record of the number and proof of your date of birth, such as a birth certificate or religious record of birth or baptism recorded early in life. These documents must be original records or copies certified by the agency that issued them.

If original birth or baptism records weren't recorded, you should submit the best evidence you have of your date of birth. This includes, among

others, schools and church records, a marriage license, a passport, and employment or military service papers.

You should also have your Form W-2 for the preceding year, or, if you are self-employed, a copy of your Schedule SE. The reason is that most recent reports of your earnings may not yet have been recorded in Social Security records.

If your spouse is applying for benefits, she or he will have to provide similar evidence.

If you have any more questions, call Social Security. Our toll-free telephone service is available from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. in all time zones weekdays. The best times to call are early in the morning and late afternoon. And if you can, it is best to call later in the week and later in the month.

## Abilene Council On Alcohol/Drug Abuse Inc. Receive Funds

## Researchers Seek To Improve Water Efficiency Of Crape Myrtle

If it comes to choosing between a popular beauty and limited water use, urban landscapers may soon be doing a double take on the crape myrtle.

The flowering shrub, once called the "lilac of the South," may not be utilizing water best under traditional plantings, research at the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station has shown.

"We are looking at how to do less watering in a landscape and still keep it pretty," said Dr. Jayne Zajicek, an ornamental horticulturist. "Water is a scarce resource in Texas. About 60 percent of the urban water use in the summer is for irrigating landscapes. And of that, 50 percent is used inefficiently; it's running down the drain."

As a researcher in the urban systems group - which includes agricultural engineers, landscape architects,

horticulturists and soil and crop scientists - Zajicek examined the crape myrtle for two years to see how the plants use water.

She chose the crape myrtle because it is a popular flowering shrub grown throughout the South - practically anywhere that average minimum winter temperatures don't drop below 0 degrees Fahrenheit.

About 25 genera of crape myrtle - eight of which occur in Texas - include some 550 species ranging from pink to purple and white. New varieties in hanging baskets are miniatures of the shrubs that can grow to more than 20 feet tall and all sizes between.

"That's why it is so popular," she said. "There are so many different sizes and colors. But in the past, people have designed their yards without thinking about water use."

Zajicek, whose speciality

is woody ornamentals, studied 36 crape myrtles under three planting surface conditions: bare soil, Bermuda grass cover and pine bark mulch. She used four varieties in each trial.

The trees were planted in special pots in the ground to simulate the natural setting but also allow them to be hoisted above surface. Every evening for a month she weighed the trees, watered them, weighed them again and returned them to the ground. She also used a stem gauge, a new instrument that resembles a wrist sweat band, to measure water loss from the plant.

Water use by the crape myrtles was significantly affected by all the surface materials. But, surprisingly, those with pine mulch surfaces used more water than plants located on bare soil or turf surfaces, she noted.

The mulch heated up earlier in the morning, so the hotter temperature forced the plant to transpire more, she explained.

But Zajicek said the study doesn't necessarily mean

people should not mulch crape myrtles for maximum water savings.

"We didn't measure under the mulch to see if we were saving on evaporation, so this doesn't necessarily mean that water was wasted," she said. "And it may be that we can come up with a mulch that doesn't heat up as quickly as the pine bark did."

She said planting turf around the base of the plant may improve water use by the crape myrtle, but measurements are needed to determine total water use under such a system.

The urban landscape group plans to do more research on total systems using information on individual species such as this as a base, she said.

"This study points out that our environment definitely has an influence on the amount of water used by plants," the horticulturist said.

## Quality Healthcare Close To Home

Eastland Memorial Hospital has a fully equipped physical therapy department. It is located in the main patient care area of the hospital and is staffed with licensed personnel. The department is able to provide services for both in-patients and out-patients in Eastland and surrounding counties.

Physical therapy is a profession which develops, coordinates, and utilizes selected knowledge and skill in planning and directing programs, under a physician's referral, for the care of individuals whose ability to function is impaired by disease or injury. Physical therapy focuses on those individuals whose impairment is related to neuromuscular, cardiovascular, and pulmonary systems. Specific methods of evaluating the function of

these systems are used. Appropriate therapeutic procedures are then used to return function to an optimum level.

Patients typically seen in the Eastland physical therapy department are those who have sustained trauma to the neck, back, and upper or lower extremities. Occasionally, these patients have fractured bones, other times they have bruised or torn the soft tissue which supports these bones. Often, there are open wounds associated with injury or poor circulation which need special care and debridement. Burns often need debridement and cleaning to promote healing. Physical therapy is also involved with the rehabilitation of patients after stroke, heart attack, closed head injury and amputation.

The greatest emphasis in Physical therapy is on patient education. It has been observed that the more the patient understands his/her physical limitations, the better the patient is able to cope with these changes.

Different types of physical agents can be used to assist a patient in recuperation. The agents include hot packs, ultrasound, electrical stimulation (galvanic and faradic), traction, TENS, whirlpool, massage, ice, gait training, postural education, therapeutic exercises and joint mobilization.
