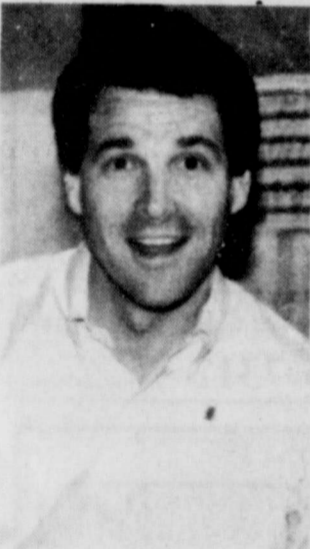
Sue Bentley, who says she had never won anything, can't

Rick Perry Will Speak At Chamber Breakfast

Rick Perry, Republican candidate for Texas Agriculture Commissioner, will be guest speaker at the quarterly breakfast of the Cisco Chamber of Commerce.

The breakfast will be at 7 a.m. Wednesday, Sept. 19, at the White Elephant Restaurant. Everyone planning to attend needs to make reservations by noon Tuesday, Sept. 18, by calling the chamber officer, 442-2567.

The breakfast is open to all chamber members and the general public. Area farmers who have questions they would like to ask Mr. Perry are invited to attend.

A native of Haskell, Mr.

Perry is a fifth generation farmer and rancher. His family has lived in the same area near the community of Paint Creek for more than 100 years.

He has been a member of the Texas House of Representatives, representing the 64th District, since 1984. During this time, he has served on the Committee on Agriculture and Livestock; Appropriations Committee; House Calendars Committee; Southern Legislative Conference Agriculture and Rural Development Committee; Select Committee on Workers Compensation Insurance. He has authored Fire Emergency Program and Fund for training and equipment; percent severance tax reduction for enhanced oil recovery projects; and co-authored HB1, 1989 Workers Compensation Reform Act.

Mr. Perry was named one of 10 most effective lawmakers by *The Dallas Morning News* in 1989. He received Texas Chamber of Commerce Distinguished Service Award in 1989. The Extension Service honored him as a Friend of Agriculture in 1989; and he was named to the Honor Roll of Best Legislators, Young Conservatives of Texas, 1987.

To Reopen Hospital

Hospital District Attempts To Raise Taxes

For the second time as many years, the Cisco Hospital District will attempt to increase its tax rate to a point which promises to support the operation of E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital in Cisco. The first attempt, in 1989, ended in a roll-back of the tax rate in a January election.

Because of the roll-back and other factors, the hospital was forced to close its doors on August 25 when funds were exhausted. The new tax rate, 50 cents per hundred dollar valuation of property, will establish a firm base for the hospital when it is reopened, according to Bob Connor, hospital board president. That amount would generate approximately \$500,000 per year.

In addition to the tax money, a start-up fund of some \$300,000 must come from other sources, and community leaders are planning an organization to attempt raising that amount, to be used in physician recruitment and alternative health care delivery services. Part of those services would be reactivation of the chemical dependency unit which the

"In the years we have worked out of town, we bought 90% of our material locally and hauled it to our job sites," Mr. Rabel said. "That translates to two and a half million dollars — \$1,600,000 in material and \$900,000 in payroll — kept in this county."

The company built the First Baptist Church in Eastland, the Church of the Nazarene in Lewisville, First Baptist Church in Tomball (near Houston) and several Dairy Queens throughout Texas.

Eastco Homes is currently building a new doctors' clinic in Eastland. In addition to building new structures, including residences, the company also remodels existing homes and businesses.

hospital operated earlier, and development of a specialty clinic and respite care program.

Built in 1970, the hospital is structurally sound and well-maintained. However, there are some repairs to be made to X-ray equipment and a boiler prior to opening.

"What we need now is support from the community to finance the survival of a viable, strong, health facility which can only be done by the desire of the area to have our own facility without depending on other towns," Connor said.

By keeping the hospital, Cisco stands to gain, in addition to convenient and adequate health services, opportunity to recruit new physicians for the town, and retain local ambulance service from the hospital base, rather than out-of-town service, which result in emergency service delays.

Also, the approximately \$1,500,000 annually generated by the hospital will be retained in Cisco, and medicare and medicaid payments will be used in Cisco treatment rather than other locations. Too, the aged and poor

Middle East Crisis Exposing Children To Military Conflict

The crisis in the Middle East is exposing children to something that this country hasn't seen in a long time—military conflict.

The nightly news offers children a view into the dark world of war: soldiers, tanks, machine guns, and gas masks. Adults then accept it as a necessary evil, but it can be frightening for children.

"Parents need to discuss the crisis with their child," said Dr. Florence Eddins, a child psychiatrist at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston. "Children hear rumors and if not reassured, they may think the situation is too terrible to discuss."

It is important to consider the child's age and development level when explaining the crisis. One way to determine this level, is to have the child ask questions. Parents will be better informed about the child's fears and can alleviate them without creating new ones.

Eddins says that ignoring children's fears may cause them to surface in other ways. A change in behavior is the

first sign that something is wrong. If the pattern continues for more than one week, parents should consider professional counseling for their child.

If a family member is overseas, then a good support system is critical. Support can come from a number of places including family, community, teachers and counselors. Maintaining contact with that family member prevents the child from feeling forgotten. Encourage them to write letters or send packages. Older children may keep a scrapbook of newspaper accounts.

"The child may ask if the family member is in danger," Eddins said. "Parents must be honest with the child and not make any promises that cannot be kept."

To help a child through the separation period, relate the homecoming to a major event or make a calendar and mark off the days until the family member returns. Children are also comforted by routine. Keep changes minimal during the separation.

"I strongly encourage parents to make an effort to communicate with their children," said Eddins. "Honesty builds trust which can dispel fear."

Dental Dialogue

Child's First Visit

Q. How can I prepare my child for his first dental visit?
A. Actually, the less "preparing" you do, the better. For instance, if you try to describe some of the equipment used, and choose words like "drill" or "shot", you may find that your dentist doesn't use those words at all. He may say something like "tooth cleaner" for drill, or "put the tooth to sleep" for injection. It's best not to even mention hurt or discomfort unless you want to condition the child to the idea of pain before he even has a chance to sit in the dental chair. Besides, the first visit usually doesn't involve any procedure that would be uncomfortable anyway. And most important, try not to communicate any fears you may have yourself. Children are very sensitive to what their parents are feeling.

Notice May Require Social Security

Starting on October, some people in the Big Country area may receive a notice from their financial institution indicating that the Social Security number and/or the name in the institution's records are different than the ones in the records of the Internal Revenue Service, Glyn Hammons, Social Security manager in Abilene said recently.

In some cases, Hammons said, it may be necessary for the person to contact Social Security to change his or her name in Social Security records or to verify the information already in those records.

If the person needs to change the information in Social Security records, he or she should have documentary evidence showing both his or her old and new names, as well as evidence of identity, Hammons said.

It is a good idea to call Social Security first to make sure what action is needed. That way, an unnecessary visit to the office may be avoided. It is easy to call Social Security's toll free telephone number, 1-800-234-5772.

Toll-free telephone service is available from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. on weekdays. The best times to call are early in the morning and late afternoon. And if you can, it is best to call later in the week and later in the month.
